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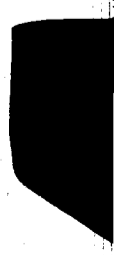

A RESOLUTION

TITLE: A RESOLUTION CALLING FOR A REFERENDUM ON THE LEVYING OF AN ADDITIONAL LOCAL SALES TAX IN HAMILTON COUNTY, TENNESSEE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Quarterly County Court of Hamilton County, Tennessee:

Section 1. The resolution of the Quarterly County Court of Hamilton County, Tennessee, imposing a local sales and use tax as authorized under the provisions of Sections 67-3049-67-3056, T.C.A. adopted by the Quarterly County Court at a special meeting on December 13, 1965, of record in Minute Book No.13, page 265, is amended to levy a local sales and use tax at a rate of one-half (1/2) of the present state rate, as provided in the Retailers Sales Tax Act under Chapter 30, Title 67, T.C.A., as same may be amended and authorized, and to increase the maximum tax on the sale or use of any single item to \$7.50.

Section 2. If a majority of those voting in the election required by Section 67-3053, T.C.A., vote for the increase in the tax imposed by this resolution, collection of the increased tax levied by this resolution, shall begin on the first day of the month occurring 30 or more days after the County election commission makes its official canvass of the election returns.

Section 3. The Department of Revenue of the State of Tennessee shall collect the additional tax imposed by this resolution concurrent with the collection of the state

tax and the local tax now being collected for Hamilton County, in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by the said Department.

Section 4. The County Judge is hereby authorized to contract with the Department of Revenue for the collection of the additional tax imposed by this resolution and to provide in said contract that the Department may deduct from the tax collected a reasonable amount or percentage to cover the expense of the administration and collection of said tax.

Section 5. A certified copy of this resolution shall be transmitted to the said Department of Revenue and shall be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in Hamilton County prior to the election called for in Section 2 hereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

On behalf of the members of the Hamilton County Quarterly Court, I would like to express our "Thanks and Appreciation" to the many civic minded citizens who offered themselves to serve on the Hamilton County Board of Education. I would also like to thank the many citizens who called the Court members to recommend persons to serve.

We informed the public through the news media that a vacancy from the Hixson, Soddy-Daisy area would be filled today. We had about 12 individuals from that area offer to serve.

The members of the Quarterly Court would like to thank Mr. Arnold Stulce who served in that seat for the past 7 years.

The selection we made today, Mr. J. L. (Dobby) Dobson, is one which we think will best serve the people of Hamilton County. It was a difficult choice to make. A report from the Department of Education was presented by Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of the Hamilton County Schools. The report was received by the Court and filed.

Dr. Carter announced that Assistant Superintendent Jack Rodman suffered a heart attack last Saturday and is at Memorial Hospital. The damage seems to be confined to the rear muscle and the report is positive for his recovery. However, Mr. Rodman will be out of the office for some weeks of course.

Dr. Carter made several comments in connection with his report:

The Pony Express system is working very well.

Enrollment for this year is 28,483. Although this is 1815 less than last year's enrollment figure, there was an actual gain of 2785 since 4600 students were lost in annexation.

98% of the kindergarten population are enrolled in kindergarten. The Headstart program for three and four year olds is doing extremely well. There are 411 three year olds meeting once a week in twelve groups.

The Vocational Program at Daisy is supposed to be ready for fall 1976. Crabtree and Graymount are assisting Mrs. Draper. They have all been working full time to finalize these programs.

The reading program is progressing well.

The Middle School at the former Brown Jr. High School is progressing well, with a most positive attitude taking place. The school board has had assurance that full approval for Title III will be forthcoming.

Dr. Carter introduced Jim Monroe, Paul Starnes, Ed Fitch, and June McEwen of his staff and said that they would all be happy to answer any questions.

Dr. Carter stated that Mr. Starnes was the new public information officer and that there has been an article in the paper almost every day since the beginning of August.

Esquire Pendley asked about other Middle Schools. Dr. Carter said that the present Ooltewah School has already been reorganized and when the new building is completed, students will go there on a split shift basis, allowing work to progress on the older building. The

split shift situation will only be temporary. Some students will elect to attend the Vocational School near Daisy when it is completed in the fall of 1976, and this will free some space in all of the high schools north of the river.

Esquire Duggan asked how long the split shift would have to operate.

Dr. Carter said probably for the rest of this year, until changes are made and renovation is complete. The move into the new school is scheduled for about February 1. If the renovation will take 4 or 5 months, then the split shifts would continue for the rest of this school year. If only minor changes are needed, then perhaps the split shift would not operate after March 1.

Esquire Wilson asked how many kindergarten pupils we are serving. Mrs. McEwen figured 74 schools x 25 pupils each or approximately 1850.

Esquire Adcock asked if there were no children served in Category A under Chapter 839. Mr. Fitch explained there would be additional money this year. Esquire Adcock asked how much more money? How much per child? Mr. Fitch said we anticipate having some more but the amount is not yet known. Esquire Franklin stated that there were quite a few children served in Category A, through PTA and school projects, etc., just not by state funds.

Dr. Carter stated that the state appropriation for last year and the projected state appropriation for 74-75 are actually about the same even though it looks different in the school report because the money will be coming to us in a different way. We have made a strong appeal for additional funds but we do not know if we will get it. They hope to employ 12 additional personnel.

Esquire Tate asked if there is any follow up done in homes on lead poisoning? Mrs. McEwen said there is not much found in the County, but the social workers do go into the homes where it is found. Esquire Tate wondered if there was some way of requiring owners of these places to fix them up. Dr. Carter explained that our program is primarily for information to the parents but it might be good to look into a program to make laws to require owners to do this.

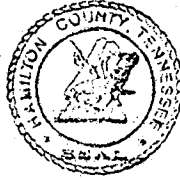

Some of the significant activities of the second quarter are listed below in various categories.

We are glad to report that Mr. Jack Rodman has returned to a near full time schedule following a six weeks absence due to a heart attack.

Progress in Central Office Reorganization. An extensive survey by the IBM Corporation and our own personnel division has resulted in plans for a new procedure in the production of most all typewritten work. Three IBM Mag Card Typewriters and facilities for telephone dictation have been ordered on a six month trial basis. The utilization of modern equipment and organizational procedures, along with increased specialization, should produce greater efficiency with an ultimate reduction in staff. Job descriptions and career paths have been developed for all non-certified personnel and placed on a salary scale commensurate with national surveys and surveys of the Southeast United States in similar positions by similar organizations. The new schedule became effective December 1 and resulted in a raise for most all clerical positions. The new equipment is scheduled for delivery in February.

The new Media Services, pony express and reproduction center are functioning very effectively. A summary report of these services follows:

Curriculum and Instruction. The primary focus of the C & I staff for the period September - December has been in assisting teachers new to the profession and others new to the Hamilton County System in becoming familiar with the established basal programs in reading, math, writing and social studies in the elementary schools and different subject areas at the high school level. Giving direction to instruction has included guidance in techniques, exploring supporting resources such as Reading and Resource teachers and scheduling, record keeping, and insurance of professional growth. All elementary grades, through the combined effort of teachers and grade level supervisors have published Language Arts Guides. These will be on display at the national meeting of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development. Secondary guides have been developed in some subject areas.

For the first time a comprehensive art program has been initiated in the elementary schools of Hamilton County. Art Specialist, Mrs. Felix Stuart, coordinates the program. After school at the Department of Education, she has conducted a total of sixteen two-hour workshops on art media.

Continuing the emphasis of reading for pleasure as well as information new Reading Centers are being established in many high school English classrooms. New Language Arts Programs include an Independent Study Class at Sale Creek, Values Unit - Soddy-Daisy Dialectology - Red Bank High, The Newspapers You Read - Birchwood, and Center for the Humanities Units at Central, Hixson and Red Bank High.

The first Vocational Program of the Human Resources Center, Occupational Child Care, was begun at the Northwest Hamilton County Human Resources Center. The class is conducted in the morning at the Children's Services Building and in the afternoons at Soddy-Daisy High School. The morning class enrolls seniors from Soddy-Daisy, Red Bank and Sale Creek High Schools and the afternoon class enrolls juniors from Soddy-Daisy High School. Many activities are in progress with respect to ongoing planning for the implementation of the comprehensive career education centers. In order to prepare students to gain the maximum utilization of these new facilities, the career education staff and all secondary principals have met several times in planning a pre-vocational program at the junior high or middle school level. It is proposed to change the middle grade program from a few vocational electives to a broad exploratory program covering some twelve career clusters. Several meetings have also been conducted with advisory committees composed of representatives of business and industry. Five crafts committees, averaging ten persons each, meet regularly with the career education's staff in the planning of the career development program.

The program and staff development of Brown Middle School Project is continuing in very positive directions. A new report card was designed requiring more student and parent involvement in the assessment of student progress as well as the assessment of the

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program. A summary of the responses, along with some typical comments, are listed:

The total responses on the Middle School Concept were:

124 positive responses

26 reported on student achievement instead of Format

"Had been quite concerned, but now very pleased."
"Very pleased to see students grouped into team according to ability - this has long been needed."
"Reading program is excellent."

Several personnel changes have occurred in the Hamilton County Child Development Program. Dr. James Kayler, former Director and Dr. Sam Brown, former Curriculum Specialist, have both resigned to take positions in other systems. Mrs. Ruth Benton, former Parent Involvement Coordinator and Nutritionist in the Program has been promoted to the position of Director.

Research and Development. Three major assignments are presently being undertaken by the Research and Development Division. The first project in priority is the study of projected enrollments and determination of facility needs. The first stage of this study is attached to this report. A second project of this division is the development of liaison with all youth agencies and juvenile authorities. The purpose of this project is to establish some alternative procedures to lengthy suspensions. The third project is the study and assessment of the year around school program.

Facilities. The new Ooltewah High School is nearing completion and is projected to be ready for use by the first of March, 1975. Plans for the renovation of the present Ooltewah High School for use as the Ooltewah Middle School are now in preparation.

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Plans for an additional twelve classrooms at the Dallas Elementary School are also in progress. Although this is the first year of operation for Dallas Elementary School, there are already two classrooms being housed in the library.

The foundation has been laid and some walls are now being constructed at the Northwest Career Education Center and present projections call for the completion of both the Northwest and Northeast Centers by January of 1976. Other efforts in improving facilities across the county are listed below:

1. One partition constructed at Bakewell Center to house an additional kindergarten class.
2. Paving of an outside basketball and tennis court at Central High School (121' x 240').
3. Construction of a concrete sidewalk at East Ridge Junior High.
4. Construction of a concrete bus loading station at Falling Water School.
5. Paving of a 45 x 40 foot play area at Lacey School.
6. Paving of a 100 square foot play area at Ooltewah Elementary School.
7. Construction of a 95 x 175 foot play area beside the Ooltewah Middle School Gymnasium.
8. Installation of concrete sidewalks at Sale Creek School to the Relocatable Classrooms.
9. Construction of a sidewalk and canopy connecting the permanent school at Summit with the relocatable building.
10. Clearing and leveling of five acres of ground that had been purchased some years ago to be used as a playground at Westview School.

Litigation. Two suits are presently on file against the Board of Education. The injunction against closed meetings sought by the Chattanooga Times was denied on its initial presentation to Chancellor Thrasher. At present, this suit is being held by Chancellor Thrasher pending the filing of a motion by the County Attorney, Mr. James Turner, asking that he reconsider his action and declare the law unconstitutional.

The second petition was filed by the American Civil Liberties Union alleging that the teaching of Bible in Public Schools is a violation of the Constitutional Guarantee of separation between the Church and the State. At present, Mr. Ward Crutchfield, School Board Attorney, has filed a response questioning ACLU's standing in the case.

On another matter of litigation, the Board of Education assumed judicial role in providing a hearing of complaints by several teachers and patrons against Mr. Sammy Gooden, principal of Harrison Elementary School. In this first effort under the open meeting law, some twenty-five hours of testimony and two hours of deliberation were conducted before an audience of approximately 100 persons. The many conflicts between administrative and judicial responsibilities were readily apparent under these conditions. On the conclusion of the hearing, the Board of Education found Mr. Gooden guilty on one of four charges lodged against him and reassigned him as principal to Harrison Elementary School. The sustained charge was, "conduct unbecoming to a member of the teaching profession."

Public Information Office. Between August 2 and December 31 a total of 51 news releases were prepared by the Public Information Office and distributed to the Chattanooga News-Free Press, Chattanooga Times and the Hamilton County Heralds. Eight of the 51 news released were "feature articles." Twenty-one of these releases were distributed to fourteen radio stations and sixteen were sent to the three television stations. Radio and television interviews have been held in addition to the prepared releases. A total of 33 schools in the system were visited by the Public Information Office between August 2 and December 31, and presentations have been made to the Lions, Rotary, Kiwanis and Exchange Clubs in the county.

Preliminary information needed for planning and decision making is in the process of being compiled. This report contains preliminary data on student population only. Copies of the forms used in the survey are attached.

Preliminary Analysis of Data Contained in This Progress Report:

Conclusions or recommendations should not be made on the basis of this progress report. Corrections or changes may be needed; however, trends do emerge from the analysis of the data.

One observation which can be made from the data is that Hamilton County Schools could be held responsible for approximately 21,000 students using this school year's enrollment figures. This figure is based on the assumption that all City students will attend Chattanooga Public Schools next year and that no growth will occur in County Schools as a result of options available or population movement. It is also assumed that the 451 County students attending City Schools will enroll in County Schools in 1975-76.

If the conditions prevailed as described above, the County Schools would serve approximately 6,000 fewer students than it presently serves (approximately 27,000 as of September 30, 1974). To plan for this number for 1975-76 is probably not realistic. Many variables which cannot be controlled by either City or County Schools are present and unpredictable.

If legal constraints do not regulate student options and if a comparable number of City students choose to attend County Schools, the enrollment could then be approximately 25,000 (2,779 City students in the County Schools plus 1,235 County students in the annexed area schools). On the other hand, the City Schools may show substantial gains (above the 451 presently enrolled) for a total of 3,000 or more depending on options available.

In the past, gains have been experienced in County Schools of from 500 to 1,000 students per year due primarily to population movement from City to County. This trend is expected to continue.

* * * * *

A new salary schedule with a career path for each job has become effective for all non-certified personnel. Plans have been worked out for a new procedure concerning typewritten work; this will be done in conjunction with the purchase of data processing equipment. Dr. Carter said they would be able to reduce the number of staff for the amount of work done. They hope to bring in much of the clerical work from the individual schools into the central office.

In the area of Curriculum and Instruction the primary emphasis has been assisting new teachers.

Mrs. Felix Stuart is coordinating a comprehensive art program in the elementary schools.

The new career centers will be ready by January 1976; efforts are being made to implement the program in all high schools on both sides of the river. The pre-vocational program (rather than industrial arts) at the junior high level will prepare students for the high school program. Mrs. Draper is working on this. It is being expanded to 12 vocational clusters.

Brown Middle School is exceeding all expectations. Dr. Carter's report gave a summary of responses to the middle school program with several quotes of positive statements from students and patrons.

Mrs. Ruth Benton is heading up the Child Development Program. Due to resignations, administrative staff has been reduced by three.

Litigation involving a petition filed by the American Civil Liberties Union concerning the teaching of Bible in Public Schools is under way; Attorney Crutchfield has filed a response. The injunction against closed meetings by Chattanooga Times is pending with Chancellor Thrasher. Mr. James Turner, County Attorney, filed a motion that this be declared unconstitutional.

The Public Information Office is doing a good job of making the public aware of the work in the Hamilton County Schools.

Results of a feasibility study were attached to the report.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter and asked if there were questions.

Esquire Adcock asked about the \$15,000 figure listed as expenditures in Plant Maintenance, which seemed small in view of the fact that more than \$350,000 was budgeted for 1974-75.

Dr. Carter replied that their figures do not stay current with the purchases; that they actually stay about three months behind in receiving the bills. He asked Mr. Rodman to explain.

Mr. Rodman said the charges are kept on a six-month to a year basis, that they may spend 150,000 to 200,000 at one time. It is not kept up month by month.

Judge Moore said this is a hand operation which takes a long time and when we get the Data Processing equipment it should reflect a more current picture.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter when they would move into the new school. (Ooltewah High School). Dr. Carter said they hoped to move March 1st, that the entire operation would move but because of arrangements for busing, etc., they would remain on split shift this year.

Esquire Ball asked about the remodeling of the old building. Dr. Carter said the entire remodeling they would like to do would cost more than the money available. If they are restricted to the amount of money available now, remodeling will be finished by September 1. If they can get more money, it could take as long as 5-6 months. They are working to bring the building up to the new fire codes which is a very expensive operation.

Judge Moore said that previously departmental budgets have been amended but this is a violation of the law, and we are now drawing legislation to allow us to function.

Dr. Carter said they did not have sufficient money for the remodeling but they hope to find additional money.

Esquire Duggan asked what kind of money. Dr. Carter said a minimum of \$250,000 and a maximum of double or triple that amount. \$250,000 is a minimum to get the building operable.

Esquire Johnson asked if there had been any thought of our own maintenance department. Dr. Carter said they are studying this, and have talked about it with County officials. It is very complex and there would be duplicate facilities; it might not be economically feasible. Dr. Carter and Judge Moore have discussed this and will be looking at it rather closely. Accounting is one of the big variables. We don't know if we are getting our money's worth. Mr. Franks and Mr. Monroe are working together, and we are coming closer in accountability.

Esquire Franklin stated that he would like to go on record asking the Hamilton County Delegation to support legislation permitting budgetary amendment.

ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Ball, that the Quarterly Court request the Hamilton County Delegation to support legislation permitting budgetary amendment. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for his report.

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Dr. Carter stated that the report covered three main areas: re-organization, housing of students, and budget procedures. A copy of the budget is included.

Dr. Carter stated the reorganization plan has been approved by the Board of Education for the purpose of better education in the system, offering more services. The plan is a pyramid type of structure and the two top positions will be identified at a meeting this week.

Concerning housing, Dr. Carter stated they are proceeding to follow HEW directive. They were at a meeting last week in Atlanta; six of the seven members of the Board of Education were present. The rationale of the Board of Education is based on figures, number of student transfers that will be required. There are two plans: Plan 1: Continue to attend school in neighborhood; Plan 2: all city students attend city schools. Dr. Carter discussed some of the comparisons between the two plans as shown on the sheet enclosed with his report. A total of 1804 in the Hixson area would be required to change schools to show a change of only 290 students, In the four areas described a total number of 2980 pupils would be required to change schools to actually shift only 606. This is actually exchanging white for white and the total effect on desegregation is almost negligible. Our appeal was that we are changing 3,000 students to accomplish a minimal change. If these shifts are made we must make many additional internal changes. There will be several thousand more changed within the system, in schools not actually affected, and all this to no advantage to either education or integration. If we remove this number of students from Central High we will jeopardize the new vocational center; it is doubtful that we can operate it. HEW should consider very strongly our request. HEW's response was that they do recognize our problem. The meeting lasted 2½ hours and they expressed a desire to assist us but said they are not sure of the amount of flexibility. The directive came from the office in Washington and an appeal will have to go back there. Mr. Thomas (director of HEW in Atlanta) was not optimistic that any appreciable changes would result. This community and our school system should continue to express their feelings to the office in Washington. Senator

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Brock has expressed a desire to assist us in making the conditions known to that office. Dr. Carter said we are not giving us; we are not optimistic but it is not hopeless.

Esquire Green commented on the school board's and superintendent's trip over the weekend to Atlanta to get clarification on the ruling. He indicated that it was the feeling in their community that it was not necessary for them to go. They feel the problem may be students that are supposed to be in city schools going to Kirkman and being supplied with academic courses along with trade courses. Did Dr. Carter think this had anything to do with it?

Dr. Carter said he was not aware of it, that this is the preferred direction, that they did not feel the vocational should be separated from the academic. Most educators endorse this system. Dr. Carter said he has not recognized this as a problem.

Esquire Green said he had charged the city school board with this, that a lot of white students were allowed to enroll at Kirkman to escape schools such as Howard, Riverside, etc. They had not gotten to this point of the problem. They are allowing city school students to attend Kirkman; Kirkman is supplying students with academic courses and they are supposed to go to Kirkman just for trade courses only.

Dr. Carter said that was an internal problem within the city schools and does not involve transfers. He said HEW has not yet made it clear if we could continue some of the exceptions: hardship cases, seniors finishing schools, etc. They needed to understand our situation; we needed to understand the directive. It was a profitable meeting on both sides. It lasted 2½ times longer than they had anticipated. It was a very successful meeting; this kind of meeting is essential for understanding.

Esquire Franklin asked about Plann II, if all county students could continue to attend city schools while the city students would not be allowed to continue in county schools. Dr. Carter said that it does not affect white county students in city schools or black city students in county schools. County students would be disenrolled from city schools only to make room for the city students that were disenrolled from

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county schools. Esquire Franklin said this means we could lose as many as 2,980 students if the city schools have room to keep the county students. Dr. Carter said this is the total number of shifts.

Esquire Ball said we are not trying to get quality education; we are just trying to get the ratio worked out.

Esquire Pendley asked what the alternatives are if our appeal fails. Dr. Carter said the County Board of Education could file suit.

Esquire Pendley asked about the funds the schools would lose. Dr. Carter stated the loss of funds was insignificant in terms of the outcome. If we decide not to abide by the directive we would lose funds until a court decision is made. If it was just a question of loss of funds, the Board would look at it differently.

Esquire McKinney asked about the 100 teaching positions we would lose, if these could be shifted within the system.

Dr. Carter stated that they would try to do this as the budget would allow, that only about 25 eachers are retiring this year, 12 or 13 voluntarily and the rest are being retired.

Esquire Tate asked if the Quarterly Court would be advised of any action the Board will take. Dr. Carter said they will provide this group with any information, that he does not anticipate any action at the school board meeting this Thursday. A new letter will have to be issued, probably by the first meeting in May. When any final action is taken it will be reported in the newspapers, but he will give this group a report from the minutes of the meeting.

Regarding the budget, Dr. Carter said it is a very tentative arrangement, not knowing what our income will be. The budget of \$21,851,596.00 reflects a reduction in instruction of 8 principals, 2 assistant principals, 227 teachers, 9 secretaries, 14 aides; and the addition of 100 teachers, 1 assistant principal, 2 secretaries and 50 aides. The teachers are needed to accomplish the expanded programs in music, etc. This does not consider the potential loss due to the HEW directive, only annexation. The budget does include a 6% salary increase.

Esquire Johnson told Dr. Carter that he wanted to commend them on the expanded music program but he also wanted to encourage them to give the same consideration to physical education. Dr. Carter said they see a tremendous need in the elementary schools in this area and the reorganization will make it possible to develop a good program. Sometimes if a program is staffed first, your program just grows. They prefer to have the program developed prior to employment of the staff. If the budget allows this can be added next year, and they would like to do this. They started with music and library this year with the idea of going to physical education next year.

Esquire Pendley asked when all the positions in the reorganization would be filled. Dr. Carter said by the 1st of July, that the two top positions would be identified at the meeting this week, then they will begin on the others.

Esquire Duggan asked how all this would affect the Ooltewah Middle School. Dr. Carter said it all hinged on HEW. Based on studies made, it was not feasible to do what they had wanted to do, a total remodeling was not economically feasible. Their option was to use the money to build a number of additional classrooms on the site of the new high school. They will start with about 17 new classrooms; there are 22 new classrooms already being built. This will allow more flexibility in case many students have to be shifted due to the HEW directive. Some of the rooms could be used for community programs and other programs in addition to classroom work. Total remodeling to bring the building up to standards would not be feasible.

Esquire Duggan asked if split shift would be necessary this year; Dr. Carter said no.

Esquire Gardenhire stated that she would like to go on record commending Senator Brock for the interest he has shown. Mrs. Janet Printz from his office was here for the meeting. She felt that voters would be interested in knowing that Senator Brock is concerned and had a representative here. She personally appreciates it.

Esquire Ball stated that Ooltewah is one of the top schools in drop-outs, and he wondered if it would be possible to have vocational programs in the old school. Dr. Carter stated that this would be one of the alternative programs.

Esquire Nolan stated that he would like to nominate a person to fill an office that has not been filled for some time, that of County Ranger. He said the person had served well and was 81 years old today. He is a pilot and was one of the first in this area to have a pilot's license. He is important in community life. His name is Harry Porter. With Judge Moore's permission Esquire Nolan asked Carl Gibson to read a statement.

Mr. Gibson read the following statement, a poem composed by Bill Hubbuch:

When the Wrights flew at Kitty Hawk
Porter already knew how to walk.
Racing cars and motorcycles was his next
For lo, he was long past his text.

Next he was the best at flying.
Had all the nurses at P & S crying.
Always in the thick of machineries.
Always at the table of local beaneries.

Always in the best of rolling stock.
Always with the ladies did flock,
But the Cadillacs always licensed 912
So the gentry could know his dwell.

Safety was his middle name,
That's why he can still play the game.
Even tho he's 81 summers,
He's planted doctors by the numbers.

Harry was his given name
But "Angel" suited his world-wide fame.
His fame is really built on age,
And all those men he taught to fly.
Mostly when W.W. II was ablaze
They carried our country's colors thru the sky.

Gibson, Hall, McGinness were his aides
And by the Angel they were paid.
Their school was well known
By all the hours their students had flown.

Now Angel used to be a county ranger
Until Scotty McBryant the Court did favor.
His record was there to read--
Not one rustler was caught or freed,
Not even one rustling act was reported,
Nor to working on the job had he resorted.

His badge of authority we did respect
Because there were no violations to detect.
Of all the people you could muster
None could deliver us from the luster
In this office of county ranger.
To the job he is no stranger
Protecting all our people from the dangers,
Keeping the cattle at their mangers.

The County Court could do no better
Than elect Angel to the job.
He already has the badge to tether
and the County Treasurer he will not rob.

ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, to elect Harry Porter as County Ranger by acclamation.

Esquire Green asked the length of term of office for County Ranger. Judge Moore stated that the job is "of such significance" that he would have to look up the length of term, but it is probably about a couple of years.

Esquire Holder (County Judge Pro Tempore) stated that this body has the responsibility to make a school board appointment at the July meeting. He thought it was important to keep geographical balance on the school board. Gilbert Stein's term will expire in July. Esquire Holder said they would like to begin interviewing applicants. He thought the applicants should be limited to the northern one-third of the County. Anyone interested in securing the school board appointment should get in touch with any member of the Quarterly Court. Judge Moore stated that they would appreciate it if the media would carry this announcement.

Esquire Tate asked if anyone is serving from the 1st Civil district. Esquire Nolan said he believes Mrs. Jerry Perry is. Messers. Dobson and Peoples are both in annexed areas.

Esquire Johnson stated that he would like to commend Dr. Carter and his staff for the report. The Court had been asking for this type of information and they had done a tremendous job.

Frank McKee of the County Technical Systems Service stated that he had copies of the Private Acts of Hamilton County for all who would like copies.

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ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, that the following Notaries Public as presented by County Court Clerk be elected (names of persons approved as Notaries are attached.) The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Separate reports are included describing the activities of the following divisions or departments: Division of Curriculum and Instruction; Research and Development; Child Development Program; Vocational Education; Food Services; Buildings, Grounds and Maintenance and Middle Schools.

Installation of the Word Processing Center and training sessions for all personnel utilizing the Center have been completed. Although it is too early for an evaluation of this system, the potential for economy and effectiveness seems unlimited. Complementing this system, we have employed a computer programmer, Mr. Mike Ragsdale, to begin preparations for the utilization of Data Processing Equipment now available through the County Government.

Some of the major concerns from the Superintendent's office during this quarter have been administrative reorganization, housing of students and the revision of budgetary procedures. A committee composed of two secondary and two elementary principals elected by their peers and an administrative consultant from Middle Tennessee State College worked with me over a two month period in the development of an organizational system which we believe will promote a more efficient system of education for the students of Hamilton County. Organizational charts and job descriptions are attached to this report. This plan of reorganization has been approved by the Board of Education and has been distributed to all personnel. All newly defined positions are being advertised within the system and it is planned to implement the system on July 1, 1975.

Considerable study has been conducted with the officials of the Chattanooga Public Schools in planning for the housing of students next year. All students of both systems affected by annexation have been surveyed and have been given options based upon these surveys. Our intentions were to allow students who were willing to provide their own transportation to continue in the schools near their homes in accordance with the long standing Board policy of allowing annexed students to continue in county schools. As these plans neared completion, we received a directive from the HEW Office in Atlanta which informed us that this procedure was not in compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and would not be allowed. (Correspondence enclosed) We are presently seeking clarification and further negotiation with HEW officials in an attempt to amend these instructions. In the event that this directive remains unchanged, it will essentially prevent inter-district transfers and force the disenrollment of some 2800 students who live in annexed areas and attend county schools. Further details of this study are included in the report from the division of Research and Development.

Based upon our original plans for the housing of students, requests have been made of the County Council for \$2,000,000 in construction money for an additional twelve classrooms at Dallas Elementary School and the complete remodeling of the Ooltewah Middle School. The effect of the HEW Ruling would be to reduce the need of elementary spaces and increase the need for secondary spaces on the north side of the river. It could also reduce the need for spaces at the Ooltewah Middle School as additional students could be zoned to the Brown Middle School. At this point I am still recommending the construction at Dallas Elementary School, but revising the plan for the

Ooltewah remodeling. Further engineering studies of the old Ooltewah building and the potential reassessment of spaces presently indicate the wisdom of constructing a new smaller facility adjacent to the new Ooltewah High School to accommodate Middle School students and the conversion of the older building for other purposes.

New forms and procedures have been developed by the administrative staff to secure budgetary information from the users. Each school and Central Office Department has listed priority needs in all budget categories. This information is being evaluated and compiled and will be used to formulate a more accurate final budget. Enrollment and budget information is presented below.



This tentative budget was prepared without definite knowledge of state revenue. Adjustments must be made when this is determined. A 6% salary increase is reflected in this budget, but the Board gave directions to allocate this salary increase on the provision of matching the state increase percentage not to exceed 8%. The following information will be helpful in the explanation of how we arrived at this tentative budget:

- ADMINISTRATION - Reduction of one assistant superintendent. Salary increase of 6% plus a slight reduction in trustee's commission.
- INSTRUCTION - Reduction of 8 principals and 2 assistant principals. Reduction of 227 teachers, 9 secretaries, 14 aides. Addition of 100 teachers, 1 assistant principal, 2 secretaries and 50 aides. This will add additional teachers due to increased population, music teachers in elementary schools and first grade aides. Salary increase of 6%.
- ATTENDANCE - Salary increase of 6%
- HEALTH SERVICES - Salary increase of 6% less deficit this year.
- TRANSPORTATION - Deficit of \$225,000, not reducing busses and giving 6% increase.
- OPERATION - Reduction of schools plus increased costs should reduce as shown. Will be slight deficit this year. This has been figured.
- MAINTENANCE - Reduction of schools plus increased costs should reduce as shown.
- FIXED CHARGES - Reduction should be as shown.
- FOOD SERVICES - 6% Increase
- OUTGOING TRANSFERS - Remain the same until City of Chattanooga determines number of busses they will run.
- ADULT EDUCATION - No change
- CLEARING ACCOUNTS - No change

RE: POLICY ON ENROLLING CITY STUDENTS

HEW Title VI, Article 16, states:

"School systems are responsible for assuring that no arrangement is made nor permission granted for students residing in one school system to attend school in another school system in any case where the result tends to maintain what is essentially a dual school structure in either system."

HEW officials in Atlanta interpreted this statement in the following manner:

"Transfers may not be permitted between the two systems where the transfers being permitted will reduce the desegregation or re-enforce the dual system in either system. That means simply that minority children may transfer out of the Chattanooga system into the Hamilton County system. The majority children may transfer from the Hamilton County system into the Chattanooga system. This would obviously not have an adverse effect on desegregation."

Strictly interpreted they are saying that the only students we can accept who reside in the city under any annexation are minority students.

Considering our own interpretation of the law, statements from HEW officials, and present needs, the Hamilton County Board of Education in session, Thursday, September 12, 1974, approved the following policy:

- (1) To enroll any student who is zoned for attendance at Tyner Junior or Senior High Schools and to disenroll any student zoned to other city schools.
- (2) To continue the present policy of accepting students of recently annexed areas who were attending county schools at the time of their annexation.

Specifically this means that students in the Murray Hills, Lake Hills, Washington Hills areas who are zoned to the Tyner schools may enroll at Brown or Central regardless of the time they moved into these areas and regardless of

where they attended school last year. On the other hand it means that students who are zoned to Brainerd High School, Dalewood School, Howard High School, or any other city school must be disenrolled immediately. The exception to this rule contained in the second policy simply means that students who live in recently annexed areas such as the Spring Valley area or perhaps some marginal areas on the southern border of Murray Hills and Lake Hills who are presently zoned to city schools other than Tyner and who have continued in county schools may be retained.


The rationale for this first policy is that Tyner schools and Harrison area schools are comparable in racial composition; therefore, the transfer across district lines cannot be construed as a tendency to limit desegregation.

The rationale for the second policy is based on the precedent established when Mr. Dewey Dodd of this same HEW office in Atlanta directed Dr. McConnell to establish this procedure.

I deeply regret the necessity of disenrolling students, many of whom have become active in our county schools, but find this action essential for at least the following two reasons:

- (1) We cannot educate the majority of white students who live in the city, and it is unfair to accept a few and to reject all of their neighbors.
- (2) Even by the most liberal interpretation the continued enrollment of these students is a clear violation of the law.

Thank you for your understanding and efforts to do what is necessary in a cooperative and effective manner.

Dear Mr. Thomas:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 14, 1975 advising that our present policy regarding Inter-district Student Transfers may no longer be permitted. This directive comes as a complete surprise and is a severe disappointment to me. At the time of my informal conversation with Mr. Clements of some five months ago, I explained some of the very serious problems that such a directive would present which were essentially unrelated to the desegregation issue. He assured me that his communication was unofficial and that a decision would be sent to me in writing in two to three weeks. This delayed response, changing at this particular time the procedures established and directed by your office, has, in my opinion, jeopardized our ability to successfully implement the change.

Considering the serious impact of this directive on the operation of our system in areas unrelated to desegregation, I would request an opportunity for members of the Hamilton County Board of Education to discuss this matter further with you prior to the consideration of changes in our Board policies. I will phone your office for an appointment at your earliest convenience. To keep these considerations as brief and meaningful as possible, I would further request written clarification on some points of your directive as indicated by the following specific questions. These clarifications are accompanied by a sense of urgency on our part and any efforts to expedite this response would be greatly appreciated.

1. In the first condition which you specify, you stipulate that the racial impact on any particular school takes precedence over the racial ratio that exists in the system. The clarification I seek is the counterpart of this rationale. May transfers be made between two particular schools which is not in accordance with the system-wide ratio, but which constitutes no significant racial impact on either school involved?

2. How do you define the "special educational services" described in the second condition? The illustration of dyslexia is somewhat extreme. Can you provide a list of those services which would be acceptable under this definition? Does this include special programs not available in City Schools, such as R.O.T.C., Vocational, or Language Specialties, etc.?
3. What consideration may be given to hardship requests? May waivers be granted for seniors? Many of these students have already been elected to offices for the coming year and have purchased yearbooks and class rings.
4. Do certified transfers of guardianship and residence constitute a violation of this directive?

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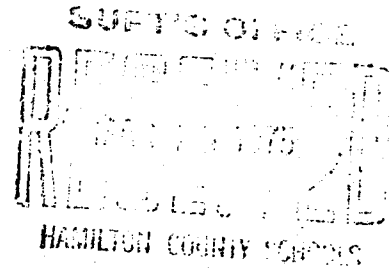

Re: Your March 19, 1975 Letter

The advice given to you in my March 14, 1975 letter is the same as that communicated to you by Mr. Clements in conference with you on October 25, 1974 and should have come as no surprise to you. At that time, Mr. Clements informed you that the policy had been determined at the highest level in the Office for Civil Rights. In no sense was the communication in the conference unofficial, only informal, and for the purpose of advising you prior to completion of the review of Chattanooga schools.

Essentially, the same advice was given to you in your conference with our staff in Atlanta on September 11, 1974. At that time, Mr. Clements agreed that the problems associated with the annexation process were unique and would be evaluated and that a policy clarification would be secured as it related specifically to Hamilton County and Chattanooga City school systems. Interim arrangements were worked out with you and those arrangements were confirmed by you in your letter of September 16, 1974.

My letter of March 14, 1975 only confirmed advice previously given to you.

My response to your questions seeking clarifications is as follows:

1. Transfers may not be permitted unless they are in accordance with the system-wide racial ratio of the Chattanooga City Schools and only if the transfers have no significant racial impact on any particular Chattanooga school. The significance of racial impact on a particular school would be evaluated only after the ratio had been attained.



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2. The key to the second condition is that the "denial of the transfer essentially would be a denial of education to the person requesting the transfer" and the extreme illustration was used because the exception would be rare. Programs such as R.O.T.C., Vocational, or Language Specialites, etc. would not qualify as services without which a pupil would essentially be denied an education.
3. Our prior advice to you was to help you avoid some of the difficulties cited in question number three. Interim arrangements were extended during the 1974-75 school year and may not extend to 1975-76. "Hardship" would have to be given content and evaluated on a case-by-case basis.
4. Obviously if pupils' residences change from the Chattanooga City district to the Hamilton County district, they may enroll in the Hamilton County schools. The matter relating to guardianships is being referred to our Regional Attorney for advice and to the Federal District Court retaining jurisdiction over the desegregation of Chattanooga City schools.

I will be happy to meet with you and members of your Board at any mutually convenient time.

Division of Curriculum and Instruction

A culminating demonstration of the far-reaching impact of music in Hamilton County Schools took place in a series of concerts in both East and North Gate malls during the week of March 10. This was part of the observance of National Music in the schools week. An approximate total of 1,550 students participated.

The system wide annual report to the Southern Associations Commission on Elementary schools has been prepared. All Hamilton County Elementary schools are affiliated with Lookout Mtn. Elementary fully accredited. To maintain affiliation each elementary school must establish instructional goals and purposes with documentation as to progress toward these goals. Volunteer parent tutors and aides are serving in approximately 30% of the schools. These people are guided and counseled by the instructional supervisors.

Visiting school personnel from Roane County have observed playgrounds and elementary physical education programs. Hixson Elementary P.T.A. has employed an instructor for their program and Alpine Crest is in the process of setting up a similar one.

In conjunction with U.T.C. the Hamilton County Dept. of Education is co-sponsoring a summer course for Kindergarten teachers at the Bachman Elementary School. Elementary art teachers are to be given opportunity to attend an art demonstration workshop at the Snow Hill School during April. As a result of a National Science Foundation grant, Hamilton County science teachers will have opportunity to participate in a summer workshop co-sponsored by U.T.C.

An innovative first grade Humanities project is being implemented at Thrasher Elementary for consideration of its effectiveness and possible expansion at such an early academic level.

Dr. Mark Christiansen, U.T. Knoxville, was the leader of a Creative Writing Seminar for secondary English teachers at East Ridge Junior High on February 27.

The Ass't Supt. C & I met with the President of the Chamber of Commerce and the city superintendent to make plans for using films and materials made available by the Chamber. These films which are to be taken into the Economics or Social Studies Curriculum deal with the interdependence of people with business and industry. A survey of the number of non-college bound seniors who will be available to the work force after graduation has been requested. A course on Consumer Education for teachers during the summer is under consideration.

Supervisors are spending most of their time with teachers either new to the profession or the system. Such contacts are vital to promote understanding of curriculum content and purposes.

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R & D DIVISION ACTIVITIES

1. Feasibility Study:

- A. Phase I: Continued to interpret and report data on students, staff, and facilities and to write, edit, and duplicate copy for the Superintendent, staff and Board. This report has not been completed, but it is in rough draft form. It contains relevant data for long-range planning.
 - B. Phase II: Forms were developed (individual student information cards) and pertinent data collected, summarized, printed and provided the Superintendent, staff and Board. (See report given to the Board at Ooltewah meeting.) These cards also contain pertinent transportation data needed for the forthcoming study.
 - C. Phase III: Distributed to annexed area schools and those in periphery areas (total of 15 schools) the option forms provided by City and County Schools. This survey provides the school systems with data on where students intend to go to school next year. The results of the choices made by those in the annexed areas have been recorded. Approximately 1,200 City students indicated they wished to remain in the County Schools near the annexed areas. They chose County Schools even though no transportation was to be provided.
2. A survey of need for athletic facilities at Soddy-Daisy High School, Red Bank Jr. High, and Red Bank High School was completed and a written report made to the Superintendent. Facilities for Science Spaces at Red Bank High were also included in the study. Projected enrollment at these schools indicate overcrowded conditions for a year or two. Temporary relief through moving relocatable buildings from campuses in annexed areas was suggested.
 3. Initiated a study on alternative schools. Community contacts were made with Judge Dixie Smith, the Pine Breeze Center, McBrien School Principal and P.T.A. to seek support for a school for students with special needs and problems. The plan is in the initial stages of investigation.
 4. Initiated a study and data collection of year-round schools. Data has been collected and a visit to Miami, Florida Schools Trimester Program is planned for the Spring.
 5. Prepared and submitted an intent to file a proposal for \$15,000 NDEA Grant for Ooltewah High School. This grant will be used to strengthen the Humanities areas including Language, Art and Music.

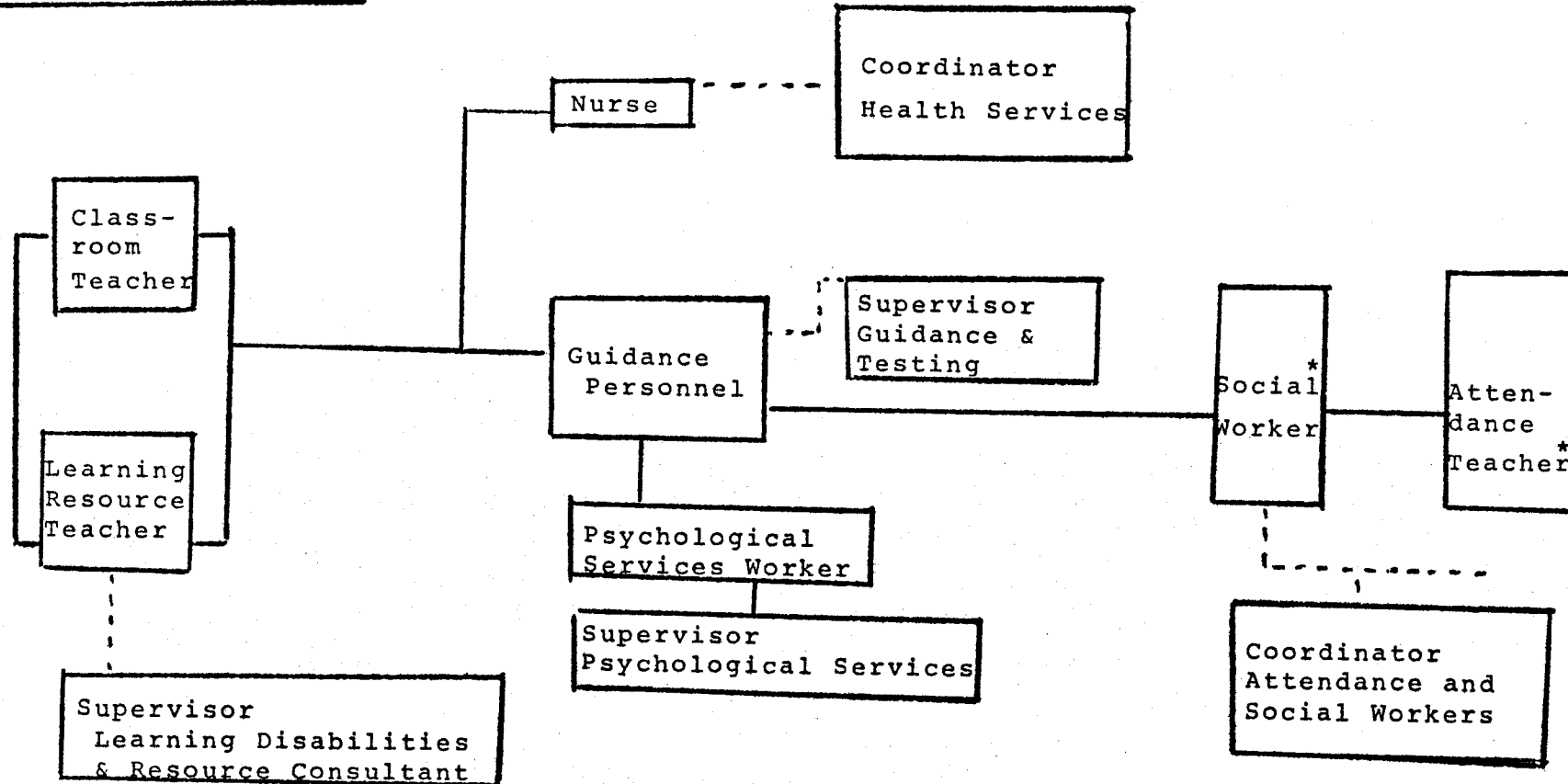

SUBJECT: CURRICULUM PROGRESS

DATE: MARCH 18, 1975

With the finalizing of our curriculum project at hand, you are to be commended for the excellent job you have done this school year. Through the writing of units, curriculum discussions and planning, and the sharing of ideas, our program has been strengthened. The final guide for each subject area will be a valuable asset to our middle school program. I appreciate very much the co-operation of all.

Related Arts - - This team is to be commended for the outstanding program presented March 14. It was the culminating activity for an interdisciplinary unit planned and implemented by the total group. The co-operation of all involved made "Charlie Brown's Middle School Musical" a success.

Reading - - The reading teachers have completed most of the planned curriculum work. During the workday, the teachers worked together on a "How to Study" Unit, established means of evaluating student comprehension in reading, and completed several minor tasks needed for finalizing the reading guide. The typed units and materials were evaluated by the teachers. The final product is excellent and will be most helpful to the reading teachers. A skills checklist has been developed, and it will be used to record progress for each student individually.

Math - - Math teachers have now completed most of the units. Much of the typing of math units is complete. A philosophy of mathematics in the middle school has been written. The teachers have developed a continuum of skills for grades 6, 7, and 8. A system was established for reporting specific student progress to next year's math teacher. A 4 x 6 index card will be completed with areas of emphasis, achievement test scores, and teacher comments. The teachers feel that this will assist them in performance grouping in the fall.

Social Studies - - The social studies teachers have now completed most of their writing. Many units and activities have been planned and implemented. The teachers have developed a philosophy and general objectives for the total social studies program in the middle school. The group discussed the scope and sequence of the social studies program for the middle school. Teachers worked together on materials and shared ideas related to the curriculum.

Language Arts - - The language arts teachers have developed a philosophy and stated general objectives for the middle school language arts program. Most of the planned writing has now been completed. The teachers spent some of their workday sharing and writing up activities by grade-level. The total curriculum has been built around a checklist of skills developed by the teachers earlier in the year.

Science - - The science teachers visited Signal Mountain Junior High School to observe the implementation of the I S C S program. The teachers felt that the visit was most profitable. In the afternoon, teachers discussed the scope and sequence of the middle school science program, developed a philosophy of science in the middle school, and stated general objectives for the total science program. Most of the writing has now been completed.

MEMORANDUM

During the teacher release work days of February 3-7 much progress was made toward our goal of a written curriculum for Brown Middle School. In making plans and setting future goals, each group also planned toward meeting the objectives of the Title III proposal.

The co-operative attitude of all teachers was outstanding. It takes all of us pulling together to make our program a success. You have completed many important tasks, as the report below indicates. Please remember that each subject area has taken a different approach, therefore one area cannot be compared to another. I appreciate the excellent co-operation you have given me, and I look forward, as you do, to a compilation of our total efforts.

READING

The reading teachers have selected a checklist of reading skills. It was decided by the group to divide the reading curriculum into 3 areas; vocabulary, comprehension, and word attack skills. A committee of teachers selected the area they wanted to develop, and set February 10 as their goal for completing the units. Teachers shared many new ideas and helped each other with activities during the day. Many learning activities have been developed for reading this year. Another committee is in the process of developing a student skill checklist to determine student progress and placement for next year.

LANGUAGE ARTS

The language arts department has set up objectives for the total language arts program. By dividing up the essential skills, the teachers will know at which grade level to introduce or emphasize basic language skills. Teachers have identified entry and exit points for some units. Many learning activities have been developed on grade-level for the purpose of sharing with cross-grade level teachers. Twenty-two units have now been completed. Approximately ninety sets of learning activities have been developed this year to support these units. The proposed date for the completion of all planned units is April 15.

SCIENCE

The science department had a consultant from Harcourt Brace Co. to demonstrate the use of some new materials and activities available for an individualized science program. The teachers have identified units taught at each grade level. In some cases minor changes were made to avoid overlapping. Continuous updating will be necessary. The science teachers have set February 20 as the deadline for completing 10 additional units of study. On these units multiple entry and exit points will be identified. Each grade level will co-operate in developing at least one additional mini unit for the science area. Numerous learning activities have been developed for science study this year.

MATH

The math department has now established definite goals for the overall department. In addition to this, the total curriculum for each grade level has been defined. Many learning activities have been developed. Mini units for independent study activities were reviewed and prepared for typing. Everette O'Neal, Math Supervisor, met briefly with the group. Teachers discussed and made plans for continuing curriculum development. The sharing of ideas and the enthusiasm of the teachers made this a profitable experience for all involved. It was decided that the teachers would complete by March 5 the units now being written.

SOCIAL STUDIES

The social studies department has now completed 20 units which are ready to be typed. They have set February 28 as the date for completion of other units now being written. The social studies department has developed 4 mini units. Entry and exit points have been identified on some units, and a general statement will be written in regard to other units. Many sets of learning activities have been developed this year to support units.

RELATED ARTS

The related arts department will have a release day on February 13. They are in the process of planning an interdisciplinary unit centered around American Music. They are also developing a written curriculum for the related arts department.

EXPLORATORY COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

3-Week Courses--Feb. 17 - Mar. 7;
Mar. 20 - Apr. 4, 1975

Adventures in Personal Grooming - Mrs. Baird

A course designed to enlighten girls in personal grooming techniques relating to diet and hair, skin, and nail care. Modeling and photoposing will be a major portion of the class. Twenty girls will be accepted.

Applique - Mrs. Grant

This will be the art of creating wall hangings with the use of burlap, scrap material, glue, and yarn. Materials needed are burlap, scrap material, yarn, yarn needle and glue. Class is limited to no more than 20 girls.

Archery - Mr. Grant

This will be a course for 20 7th and 8th graders (boys only). There will be a fee of 50¢.

Basketball Fundamentals - Mrs. Dunn
(for 6th grade girls)

The girls will learn the fundamentals of girls basketball--the rules and individual techniques used in team play.

Boating Safety - Mr. Atchley

Rules of the road, seamanship, and boat handling will be taught. A certificate and patch will be issued upon successful completion of course. 20 boys may participate.

Bowling - Mr. Middleton

The student will learn basic techniques in bowling--covering approach or address, delivery and scoring. Boys and girls may participate.

Bread Art - Mrs. Schorsten and Mrs. Salstrand

This is the last time this will be offered. Students pay 50¢ and keep all work they create. Students will learn how to make the dough, mold it, and create decorative pieces such as memo magnets, key chains, flowers and jewelry. This class will be limited to 25 students.

Crafts for You - Mrs. Dryman and Mrs. Sparks

Students will construct useful items such as pin cushions from soft drink cans; and, from felt and art foam, they will make decorative figures for the kitchen

and bathroom. Students may also learn to do hand weaving (Pueblo Indian style) on small items such as table mats. A fee of \$1.00 will be necessary to cover cost of materials. There will be a limit of 40 students in this class.

Basic First Aid consists of four self-instructional texts, divided into 20 lessons, and five teacher-led practice sessions. Students work individually, at their own rates, in the self-instructional lessons. As they complete certain lessons, the teacher conducts practice sessions in related skills.

Girls' Self Defense - Mrs. Smith

This course will teach basic techniques in self defense using your hands and feet as weapons against attack. Other defense objects such as umbrellas, purses, keys etc. will be used. Experts will be invited to share their experiences in this field with us. This class will be limited to 20 girls.

Gymnastics - Miss Wilson

This class will have a limit of 15 7th and 8th grade girls. We will work on uneven parallel bars, balance beam, horse, and mats.

Painting and Tissue Paper Art - Mrs. West and Mrs. Walker

These classes will alternate - the painting class will meet on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. Mrs. West, one of our parents, will be teaching the basics of painting with acrylics. There will be a fee of \$1.00 for this class. The Tissue Paper Art class will meet on Mondays and Wednesdays. It will be taught by Mrs. Walker, another parent. Students will need to bring old saucers or salad plates and glass jars with lids that can be covered with tissue paper. (Empty Maxim Coffee jars are great!) There may be a small fee.

Students will sign up for the combination. You will go to Painting on 3 days and tissue paper art the other 2 days. The class will be limited to 10 students.

Rook - Mrs. Boals

The fundamentals of Rook will be taught. Students are responsible for furnishing their own cards.

Stool Weaving - Mr. Don Potts

Students will learn the art of weaving chair seats, etc. There will be a fee of \$1.50 and the class will be limited to 20 students. This course will be offered the second 3 weeks only--Mar. 10 - Apr. 4.

3-Week Courses

Marksmanship - Mr. Friel

Students will learn the proper handling and cleaning of various hunting rifles. We will have target practice using Daisy BB guns.

Teacher Aides - Mr. Hullander

Twenty sixth grade boys and girls will be trained to help teachers with bulletin boards, filing, stapling, etc. They would then be given work by the sixth grade team or any other group.

Terrarium Building and Related Activities - Mrs. Jones

Students will make terrariums, work with dried flowers (experiment with drying flowers), make nature plaques, etc. 25 boys and girls may participate.

Weightlifting - Mr. Crawford

We will learn the basic lifting techniques. This class will be limited to boys.

6-Week Courses--Feb. 17 - Apr. 4, 1975

Blue Jean Art - Mrs. Hulgan and Mrs. Williams

This is a class for about forty sixth grade boys and girls. We will decorate your denims with patches, liquid embroidery, or stitchery. All you'll need is your imagination and a few inexpensive materials which we'll tell you about the first day of class.

Bridge - Mrs. Watson

Bridge will be a basic course to learn rules and procedures of playing. This includes bidding, responding to a bid, playing the hand, and scoring. Students will learn by playing. The class will be limited to 20 boys and girls.

Crocheting - Mrs. Snider

We will have a course in the basic steps of crocheting. We will discuss the crochet threads, crochet hooks, gauge, blocking, finishings and laundering. We will study the abbreviations in crochet and master the basic stitches. You will be able to make the attractive items listed below: scarf, caps or hats, shoulder bag, the hang-on-me poncho, shrink top, halter, pot holders, chain purse, doily, or tote bag; or the student may choose to make anything she desires.

6-Week Courses

Drawing - Mrs. Beard

Students will be given individual instruction in drawing skills. Each student should have his own sketch pad, but there will be no fee. We will decide individually which type of drawing we will study. 15 students may participate.

Geometric String Art - Mrs. Kidd and Mrs. Clemons

Geometric designs will be constructed using thread or yarn. In addition to the thread or yarn, you will need scissors, compass, protractor, cardboard and a ruler. You will be required to construct five minor projects and one major project.

Enrollment is limited to 35 eighth grade students.

Gymnastics (6th Grade) - Mr. Lewis

Sixth grade students will learn basic exercises and movements on the following: side horse and long horse vaulting; parallel and uneven parallel bars; floor exercise; tumbling; and balance beam.

Hunter Safety - Mr. Hale

This course is designed to incorporate the three basic areas of hunter safety; knowledge, skill, and attitude. Sportsmen with a positive and safe attitude is the main goal. The class will be open to 35 boys.

Leather Crafts - Mrs. Blankenship and Mrs. Rutledge

The course will begin with braiding simple articles such as lanyards, bracelets, necklaces and belts. Materials will be provided at a nominal cost for the beginning projects. Other projects will be determined by student interest.

Needlepoint and Crewel Embroidery - Mrs. Highlander and Mrs. S. Davis

In this course we will teach the fundamental stitches of either needlepoint or crewel embroidery. The student will purchase a kit from a variety store, K-Mart, or a craft shop. You may choose to make a picture, pillow, chair cover, pin cushion, etc. This course will be open to 25 students.

Newspaper - Mrs. Bruner

We will prepare, publish, and sell a school newspaper. Many jobs go into producing a newspaper; we will need students to serve as reporters, writers, editors, printers, layout artists, advertising salesmen, and circulation managers. This is the REAL thing.

6-Week Courses

Rug Hooking - Mrs. Hughes

Students will be designing and making a simple rug. The cost will be about \$2.50.

Advanced Square Dancing - Mr. Monroe

All those who are now taking Square Dancing plus anyone who can demonstrate to Mr. Monroe their ability to blend in to the present group may join.

Typing - Mrs. Rodgers

This course will be for 33 8th graders only. They will learn keyboard mastery. Only those students who have not had typing may take this course. There will be a fee of 50¢.

Varsity Band - Mr. Dugan

All varsity band students should enroll in this exploratory.

Additional 3-Week Courses

"Exploring Our National Parks" - Mrs. J. Davis

This will be a 3-week course on our national parks. We will be viewing films, filmstrips, and completing packets of interesting material on our park system.

Fun Flowers - Mrs. Shaver

Students will construct decorative flowers made from cotton fabric and coat hangers. The cost will be \$1.00 for the supplies other than the material and coat hangers. Class will be limited to 20 girls.

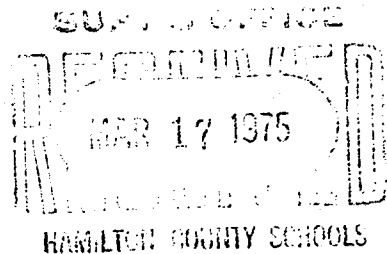

Re: Inter-district Student Transfers

This will confirm the advice given you informally in conference on October 25, 1974 by Mr. Clements of our staff concerning conditions under which inter-district student transfers may legally take place between the Chattanooga City Schools and Hamilton County Schools. As you know, our office wished to complete its assessment of the impact of transfers from the Chattanooga City district into the Hamilton County district before formalizing our communication with you.

We have determined that the racial impact of the non-minority race student transfers from the Chattanooga schools is significant, that it decreases the desegregation of that district and tends to reinforce a dual school system resulting in greater segregation in Chattanooga schools which are 54 percent black and in Hamilton County schools which are 2 percent black. Because of this, the transfers of non-minority race pupils from Chattanooga schools constitute a violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and may no longer be permitted to the Hamilton County schools except under the following conditions:

1. Transfers may be permitted if pupils transferring are in the same racial ratio as exists in the city school district and if the transfers have no significant racial impact on any particular school in the Chattanooga district.
2. Transfers may be permitted if special educational services are available only in the county and the denial of the transfer essentially would be a denial of education to the person requesting transfer. For example, a school for children with certain physical disorders (e.g., dyslexia) may be available only in the county, under which circumstances the child could be permitted a transfer. These would have to be approved on a case-by-case basis.

It is our understanding that during the annexation process over the past few years, the city schools annexing county schools and/or students, that arrangements had been permitted whereby annexed pupils were permitted to continue in the county schools and, in some cases, pupils were prohibited from attending county schools unless previously enrolled, before annexation. Under the above conditions, these practices may no longer continue for non-minority race pupils following the 1974-75 school year, unless the above conditions are fully met.

It is the responsibility of the Hamilton County School System to ensure that discriminatory inter-district transfers are not permitted from the Chattanooga schools to the county schools. Therefore, all non-minority pupils attending county schools this year from the city should be notified that they may no longer attend the county schools after the end of the current school year. Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, minority race pupils may be permitted to transfer into the Hamilton County Schools because there would be no adverse racial impact on either system; such transfers would tend to overcome the racial identity of schools in both systems.

We are requesting you to provide us a report by May 1, 1975 on the actions you have taken or plan to take to avoid illegal student transfers from Chattanooga schools for the 1975-76 school year. The report should include copies of board actions, public announcements, letters to parents of students (sample copy), and the names, race and addresses of all pupils notified that they may no longer transfer into the Hamilton County Schools. We also request you to inform us of the actions you will take to monitor student transfers so as to avoid illegal transfers in the future.

We understand that currently the State of Tennessee permits students freely to transfer among school systems within counties, so long as the receiving system is willing to accept the student transfers, and the receiving school system is provided state aid funds for those students. Please provide us a report on state aid funds received by your district for non-resident pupils attending Hamilton County Schools. If possible, the report should include the names, race and address of each pupil, the school the pupil is attending and the school zone (if known) or district in which the pupil resides.

Our office is advising the Federal District Court which retains jurisdiction over the desegregation of Chattanooga City Schools and the plaintiff's attorney concerning problems posed to the Chattanooga schools' desegregation by inter-district student transfers and the advice we have given the Hamilton County district.

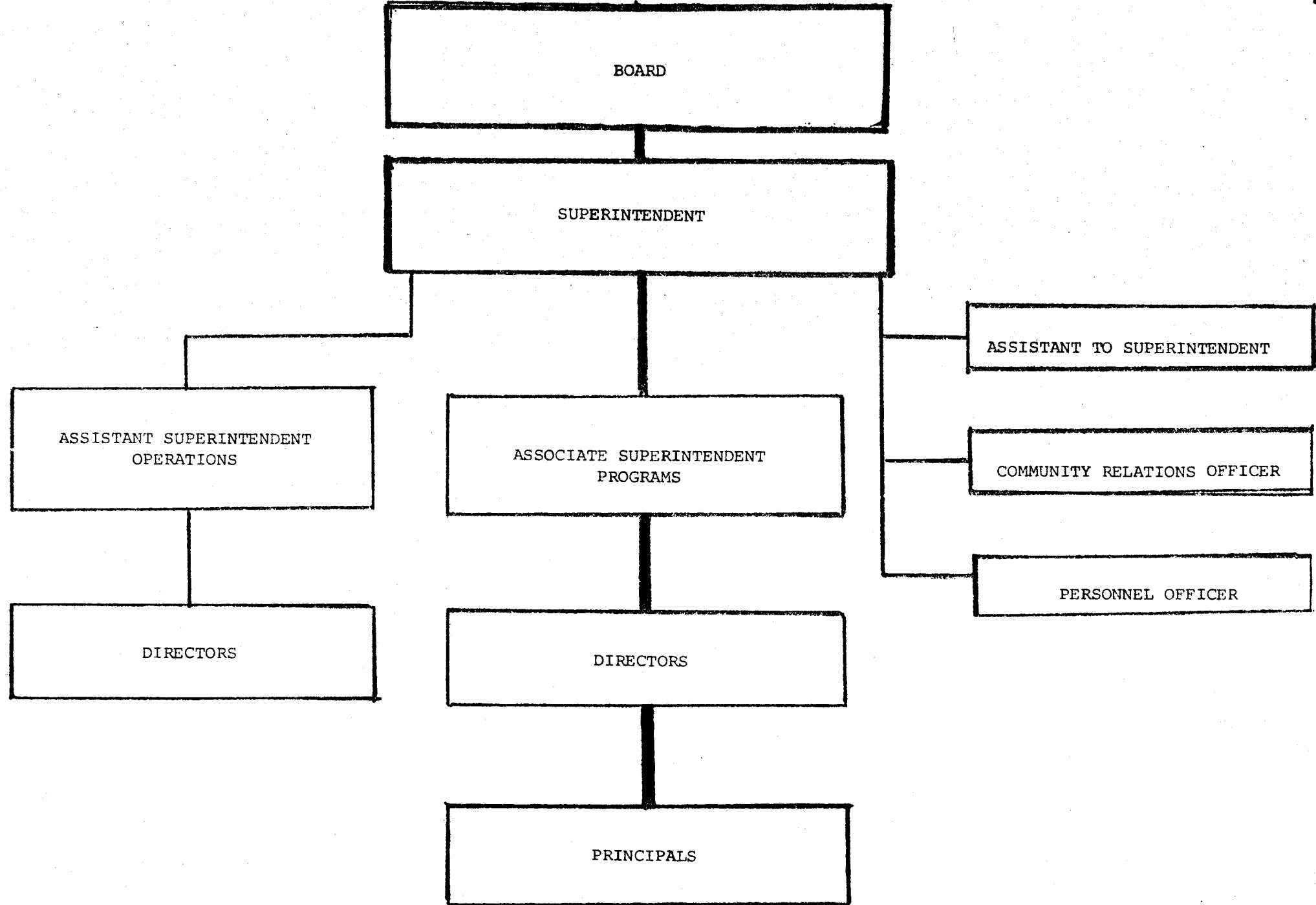

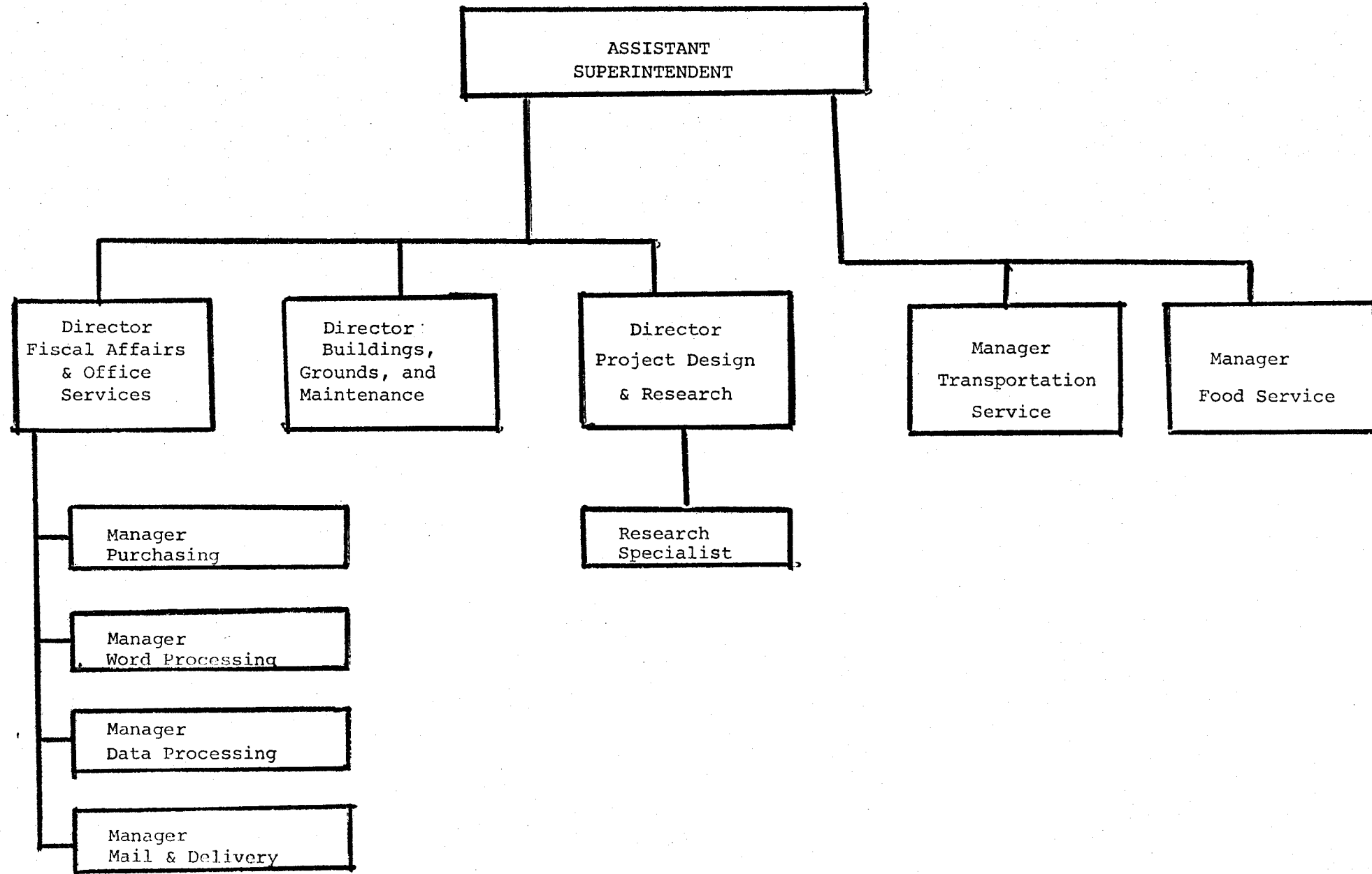

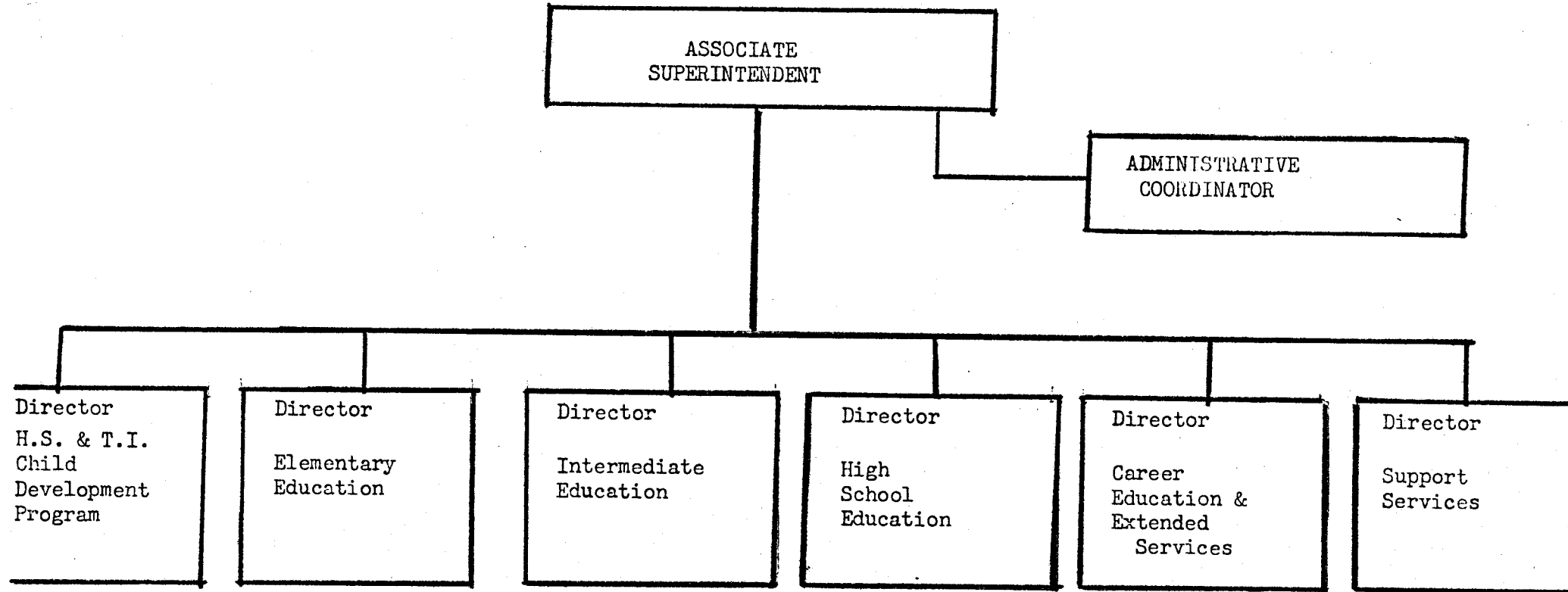

APRIL TERM 1975



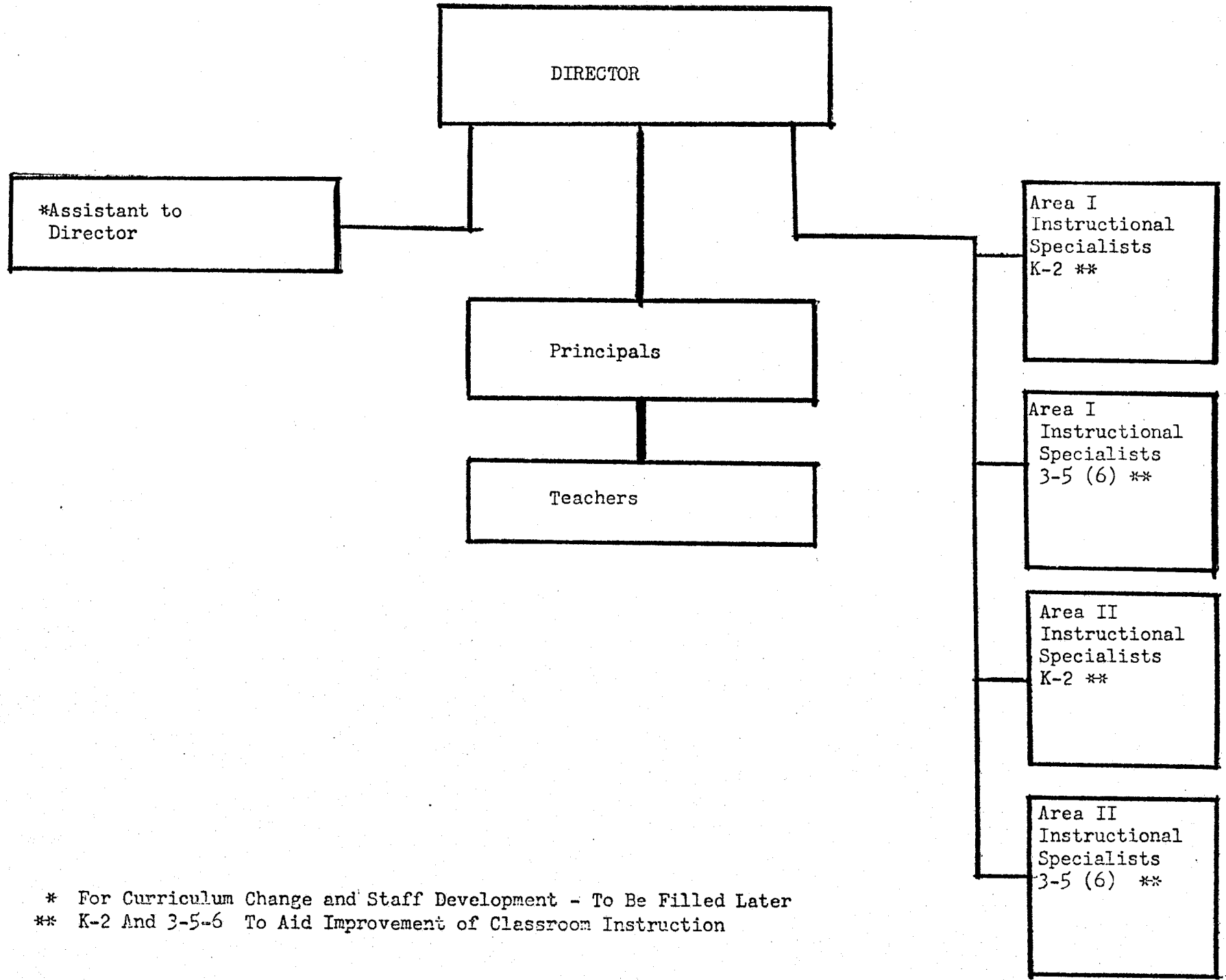

This last quarter of the fiscal year saw the close of another successful school term in Hamilton County with 1643 seniors receiving their diplomas in graduation exercises. The speeches delivered by student representatives during these many ceremonies reflected a genuine concern for patriotism and high moral standards and expressed enthusiasm and optimism toward the future of our country. The talent and dedication evidenced by our students in these programs and the many other activities I have witnessed during this year emphasized the awesome responsibility that rests on the shoulders of every person engaged in the process of public education.

Detailed reports of the activities of several departments are included in this report. The activities of the Superintendent's Office during this quarter have focused on negotiations with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, budget preparation, problems associated with annexation and administrative reorganization.

In Mid-April, the Superintendent and members of the Board of Education and Senator Brock appealed directly to Mr. Peter Holmes, Director of the Civil Rights in Washington, D.C. The rationale presented during this rather lengthy conference was basically that thousands of student displacements would occur within and between the two educational systems with no appreciable effect on racial composition in any given school. This action refers to a directive from HEW which was discussed in an earlier Quarterly Court Report. This appeal to Washington prompted further investigation on the part of HEW officials which resulted in the preparation by our staff of considerable correspondence and documentation of all statistics previously presented. Although the results of these efforts have been a long time in arriving, I did receive a call on Monday, June 30, 1975, from the Atlanta Office of HEW indicating that a letter would be mailed this week and offering an unofficial statement of optimism that our appeal to continue our Board policy of phasing out annexed students would be allowed. Hopefully, I will be able to confirm this action by the time I present this report to the Court.

Faced with numerous contingencies, budget preparation was a most difficult process this year. The HEW directive alone, still unsettled, could affect numerous teaching positions as well as a significant reduction in revenue as a result of loss of students. The extended sessions of the Legislature in determining teacher raises and program funding in addition to our own extended debate on the operation of annexed schools added considerably to the problems of budget preparation. The initial budget presented to the County Council had anticipated increased programs particularly at the elementary level by adding twenty-four teaching positions intended to develop more fully programs in music, physical education and library services. Seventy-one aides for primary teachers were also included. The budget for maintenance, site improvement and renovations was also increased to take care of capital outlay needs and the much needed repair of school facilities. The failure of the County Council to receive compensation for annexed properties, or to increase the budget by a change in the tax rate, required a \$2.4 million dollar adjustment in the budget as requested. This reduction was accomplished by removing all additional positions as described, by a further reduction of twenty-nine existing positions and by a reduction of \$493,000 from the renovation budget. Another major reduction was the decrease in teacher raises to 3.73%.

The serious deficiencies in the programs and facilities in the Hamilton County Schools brought to focus equally serious inequities presented by the historical process of surrendering all County properties to the City following annexations. The question was raised regarding the recent annexations in Hixson and Tiftonia of the financial responsibilities for housing those students who attended schools located in annexed areas but who lived outside the new City boundaries. Questions were also raised

regarding the equities involved by the requirements of County residents outside the City limits in retiring the indebtedness on annexed buildings and the legal responsibilities of the County Government in maintaining the title of schools operated by the City without an agreement. These considerations prompted my recommendation to the Board of Education that we continue to operate those schools needed to provide programs for students not included in the annexation and later to recommend to the County Council that no transfer of properties be accomplished until an agreement had been reached with the City for operation and remuneration. The eventual outcome of these recommendations is well known. The Hamilton County Board of Education decided not to operate any school within the annexed area and the County Council allowed the transfer of buildings based on the promise of negotiations to follow at a later time. I am confident that these negotiations will occur and that compensation to the County for the inequities created by annexation will eventually result. For the first time, the City Board of Education has presently agreed to compensation for equipment in the annexed buildings. A payment of \$267,775.00 has been approved for payment of equipment and portable buildings purchased from the operational budget of the County School System.

Administrative reorganization has essentially been completed and became effective July 1, 1975. This organization differentiated all functions related to instruction from those that are purely operational and placed them under two administrative heads: Mr. Henry Colston was elected as Associate Superintendent in charge of all programs and Mr. Jack Rodman was appointed as Assistant Superintendent in charge of all operations. The entire set of organizational charts were provided in an earlier report. It is anticipated that this organization will allow the Central Office to provide more resources and better accountability for school operations and will relieve the Superintendent for tasks more appropriate for his role. In connection with this reorganization, the clerical and operational functions of the Central Office have also been revised by incorporating a Word Processing Center and the utilization of Data Processing for accounts and budgets and purchasing. These changes have increased flexibility and efficiency of personnel and will provide much needed data for preparing and implementing budgets. Data regarding changes in input information and output production of the Word Processing Center is attached.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

APRIL, MAY AND JUNE, 1975

Research and Development Division

Dr. Thelma Elliott

During the quarter ending June 30, 1975, The Research and Development Division was involved in a number of diversified activities. Following are some of the major assignments which were completed or are in process:

1. Feasibility Study: This study and the reports which pertained to it have been in process throughout this school year. Various interim reports have been prepared for the Board and staff from this data.

A completed report of the significant data will be published soon. Copies of the report will be made available to all staff and others who need it for information, planning, etc. Significant data on County School population, facilities, students, staffing patterns, population movement, growth areas (or declining population areas), black-white student ratios and other data have been compiled in the report.

2. Special NDEA Grant: A special NDEA III grant request was prepared in the amount of \$15,000 which was approved by the State Department of Education for a Humanities Project for Ooltewah High School. Materials and equipment purchased from the grant will assist the Ooltewah staff assigned to the English, Art, and Music Programs to develop an enriched curriculum which would not have been possible without this special financial assistance.
3. ESEA II - Library Resources Grant, 1975: Planning for use of approximately \$42,000 for Libraries was completed and a preliminary proposal prepared. An adjustment in the budget was later made which reduced the allocation to \$33,000. The reduced funds were transferred to the City Schools for use in 1975-76 school year in the annexed areas.

Each school will receive a small allocation with larger portions designated for Ooltewah High, Ooltewah Middle, and Dallas Elementary Schools where library resources are most needed. Hamilton County Department of Education is required to share funds with private schools if they comply with regulations and wish to participate. Two or three private schools will receive assistance.

4. Regular NDEA III Allocation for 1975: The regular NDEA grant request (matched 50-50) has been planned but not submitted. The grant in the amount of \$28,348 (\$14,174 local and \$14,174 federal) will be used for continuing the Humanities Program in selected senior high schools and for improving our Economics (Consumer Education) Programs. Since planning for the Economics improvement program has not been completed, the project will be submitted during the summer.

5. Budget Needs Survey: An extensive survey of needs was made for the entire system. Each principal was asked to report the top priority needs for facilities, maintenance, equipment and materials, and additional staff. The reports were compiled for each division and reports sent to the Division heads. Over \$9 million was requested in the top priority need category. These requests were above the general allocations of staff, transportation, etc., provided on an on-going basis.

The volume of budget requests will be useful for allocating funds for stated priorities during the school year as resources become available.

6. Responses to H.E.W.'s Nine Questions on City-County School Attendance: An extensive report was compiled for H.E.W. in response to their request for additional information on the status of City-County student enrollment across district lines. The report was time-consuming but it was as complete, open, and as honest as the staff could make it. The data were submitted to H.E.W. after examination by the staff and Board and the desirable revisions made.

The report was expensive in terms of both time and materials. Both City School and County School staffs cooperated in the preparation of the answers to the nine questions submitted by the H.E.W. Civil Rights Office in Atlanta.

7. Alternative School Proposal: A preliminary application was prepared and submitted to the Justice Department, Law Enforcement Assistance Agency, for operational funds to initiate a program for students in grades 7-12. These students will be identified as having various problems leading to delinquency or pre-delinquency. Various levels of services and programs will be offered.

The preliminary application is in process of review. The project is competitive with others across the State and only a limited number will be approved (probably 2 out of 6). If we are invited to prepare a fully developed proposal and if it is funded at the level requested, over a two year period the Hamilton County Schools will have received approximately \$1,000,000. This grant would then become one of the largest and most unique the school

system had been awarded. In addition, the source is not from an educational agency.

The proposal is at present in the review process. We understand that the State Agency has given our proposal a number one priority position among the Tennessee proposals. To say the least, we appreciate this level of confidence of our State and local Law Enforcement personnel and of our Juvenile Judge and Court whose assistance was necessary to the proposal submission.

8. Project ACT (Activities Centered Training): A \$10,000 proposal has been submitted to the State Department of Education for H.E.W. funds to be used to develop a program of Prevention and Early Intervention related to problems of school alcohol and drug abuse. This program will be developed to provide activities (as opposed to information) for alternatives for junior high school students.

If the grant is awarded, the funds will be allocated to Soddy-Daisy Jr. High School for developing a preventative program with seventh grade students this year. Upon adoption of the plan developed at this school, it will also be used in other schools involved in the program. The funds provide for a team leader and training for 5 members who will be selected from the junior high school and the community.

9. ESEA - Middle School Continuation Project: Assistance was given in preparation for the ESEA III Middle School Continuation Project submitted for second year funding. The project has received an excellent first-year evaluation and it is expected that second-year funding will be approved by the State Department of Education.
10. Mountain School Governing Board: Dr. Elliott serves on the Governing Board of the Lookout Mountain Environmental School. Meetings of this Board have been held to determine the future of this school as well as to carry on regular business. With the expiration of an ESEA III grant, it was necessary to secure funds from other sources. After considerable effort, the Walker County (Georgia) Board made its commitment. Hamilton County Board offered to continue its support earlier in the year.

This secondary school, attended by both Georgia and Tennessee students, is an exemplary project which meets the needs of a community remotely located to other secondary schools.

A special Environmental Education Project has been funded for a community project to be offered this summer and during the 1975-76 school year. Students, staff, and community served by the Mountain School will participate in this particular program.

11. Committees, Reports, and Special Assignments:

- A. Participation as a member of the State In-Service Education Task Force has been a continuing assignment.
- B. Regular review and publication of items of interest from the Federal Register have been distributed to the Central Office staff. Requests for further information have been responded to by R&D.
- C. Responsibility has been assumed to serve as Chairman of a Committee for Teacher Education and Professional Standards (TEPS) for H.C.E.A. The Committee has set goals for the year 1975-76.
- D. The Equal Employment Opportunities Report to the Office of Civil Rights and H.E.W. was revised, corrected, and returned to Washington. This report is done annually and shows the distribution of staff by sex, race, and job placement.
- E. Dr. Elliott served as representative for the Superintendent at graduation exercises for Sale Creek High School. She also served as speaker for the promotion exercises at Red Bank Jr. High School. Other special assignments have been fulfilled as requested.

MIDDLE SCHOOL QUARTERLY REPORT

Period Covering April 1 to June 25, 1975

The following is a report of middle school activities for the period covering April 1 to June 25, 1975.

Curriculum guides have been completed in Math, Language Arts, and Related Arts.

Posttesting was administered as follows: Achievement tests were given to all students. Reading tests were given to those students two or more years below grade level. These tests have been scored and results recorded.

Consultants worked with teachers in the areas of social studies, math, reading, and language arts.

Teachers, students, and parents from Harrison Elementary School visited Brown for an orientation session.

The slide-tape presentation on the Brown Middle School program was presented to both elementary and secondary principals in the county at separate meetings.

Representative staff members from the Brown faculty visited the Mountain School on Lookout Mountain and a middle school in Hamblen County at Morristown, Tennessee.

Mr. Hale, Mr. Malone, Mrs. Edlund, and Mr. Bentley visited middle schools in Upper St. Clair, Pennsylvania on May 21 and 22.

A two day workshop was planned and conducted with the Brown staff for purposes of evaluating the year's work and planning for the coming year.

Dr. Jerry McGee, Dean of Continuing Education at Middle Tennessee State University headed a five member evaluation team charged with the responsibility of evaluating the total middle school program at the close of the school term. Members of the team were:

- Dr. Stuart Berkley, Chairman, Department of Education, Southern Missionary College
- Mrs. Brenda Manning, Teacher, Cedar Bluff Middle School, Knox County Schools
- Mr. David Tilley, Assistant Principal, Griffin Middle School, Cobb County, Georgia
- Dr. Robert Krajewski, Assistant Professor, College of Education, University of Tennessee at Chattanooga
- Mr. Earl Keese, Director of Public Service and Associate Professor of Mathematics, Middle Tennessee State University

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Dr. McGee also planned with the middle school staff a week in advance for the evaluation.

A parent panel was formed for an evening meeting to help evaluate the program.

An intensive two week career education exploratory course was offered to the Brown students in the month of April.

Dr. Paul Torrance from the University of Georgia spent one day with the staff relative to the students who had been identified as gifted. He presented methods and materials to teachers, by teams, to aid them in dealing with these students.

Mr. Colston and Mr. Malone attended a two day workshop at the University of Georgia on programs in natural and social sciences.

One of the seventh grade teams planned and conducted a most successful two day (overnight) outdoor education unit using the facilities of the Booker T. Washington State Park on May 15 and 16. This was an outstanding program.

The Title III staff spent considerable time during the month of June in writing the Continuation Proposal for the Middle School Project for the school term 1975-76.

Maintenance work for this quarter has resulted from assessment of numerous projects which were needed for the long-range improvement and preservation of the present existing facilities.

Brown Middle Schools reroofing job has been completed. The leaks in the ceiling were replastered and outside painting has been done.

Field lines have been replaced at Westview, Sale Creek, Alpine Crest, Soddy Daisy High, Soddy Elementary, Occupational Training Center, Ooltewah Middle, and Falling Water.

The playground at Falling Water has had grading and other improvements. A new graveled and paved parking lot and bus loading drive has been completed at Soddy-Daisy High School.

County electricians and plumbers installed a new whirlpool for Sale Creek Athletic Department.

1) The Mowbray principal's office was remodeled, partitioned room for secretary, new lighting, paneling, new heating units.

2) In order to meet minimum state requirements for the school, two new restrooms were added at Daisy. The Teacher's Lounge received new electrical outlets.

3) Extensive remodeling has been done at Bachman in order to more adequately utilize the services of the supporting personnel. (Reading, Resource, Guidance, and Nurse).

4) An additional room was built at Snow Hill for housing an oil furnance which has now been installed.

5) The drawings for Dallas School have been approved and returned from Nashville. The contract has been awarded and the addition of twelve new rooms is now in progress.

A new ceramic tile floor was installed in the cafeteria at Red Bank Junior.

A 220 electrical conduit was run to install a booster water heater at White Oak. Three electrical outlets were added at Snow Hill, plus a 50 ft. conduit for new appliances.

Several outlets were needed at Westview for new equipment. Twelve mercury switches were replaced at Brown. Hall light fixtures were changed at Spring Creek.

The plumbing and electrical work was completed for a dark room at East Ridge High School.

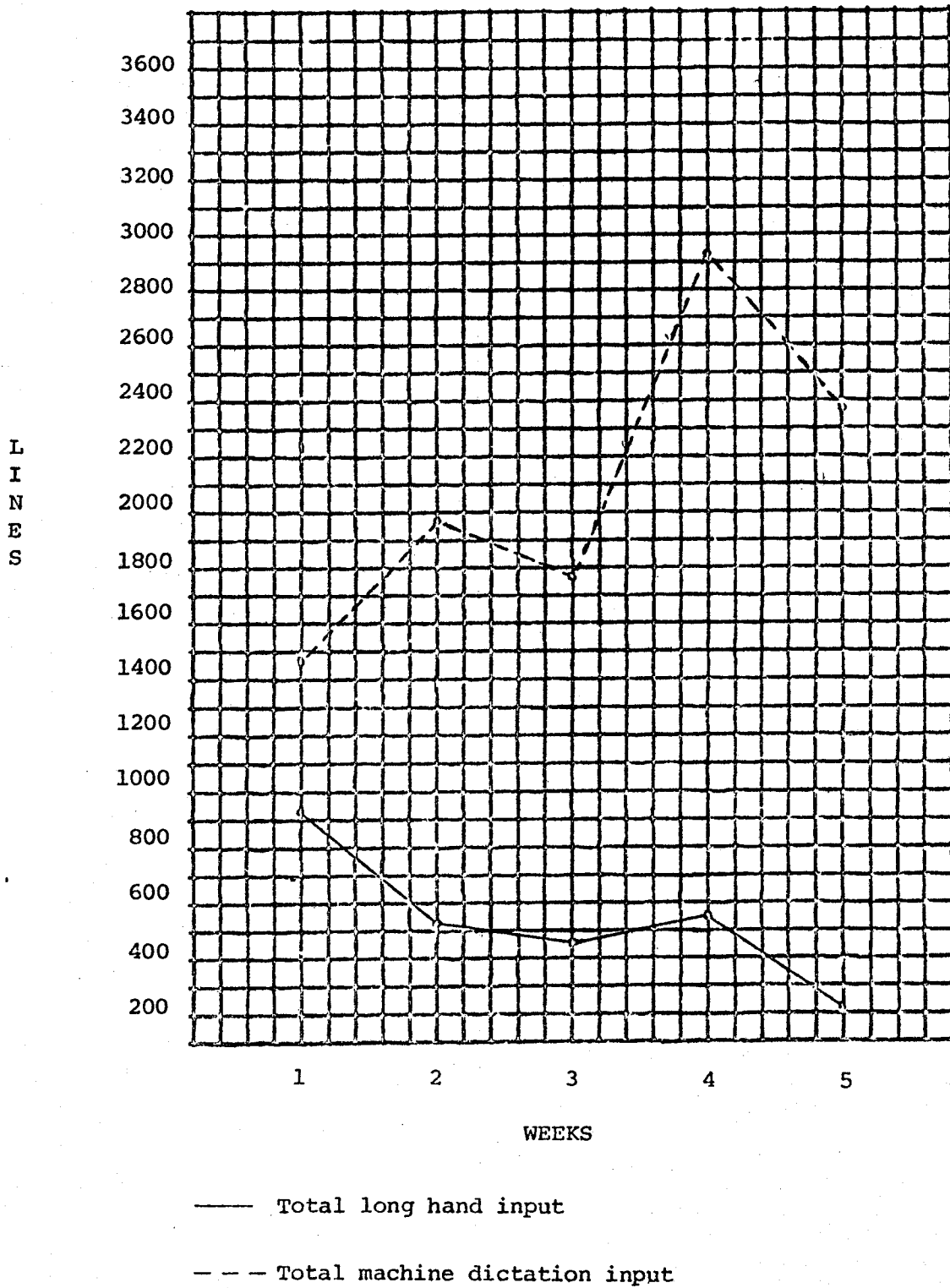

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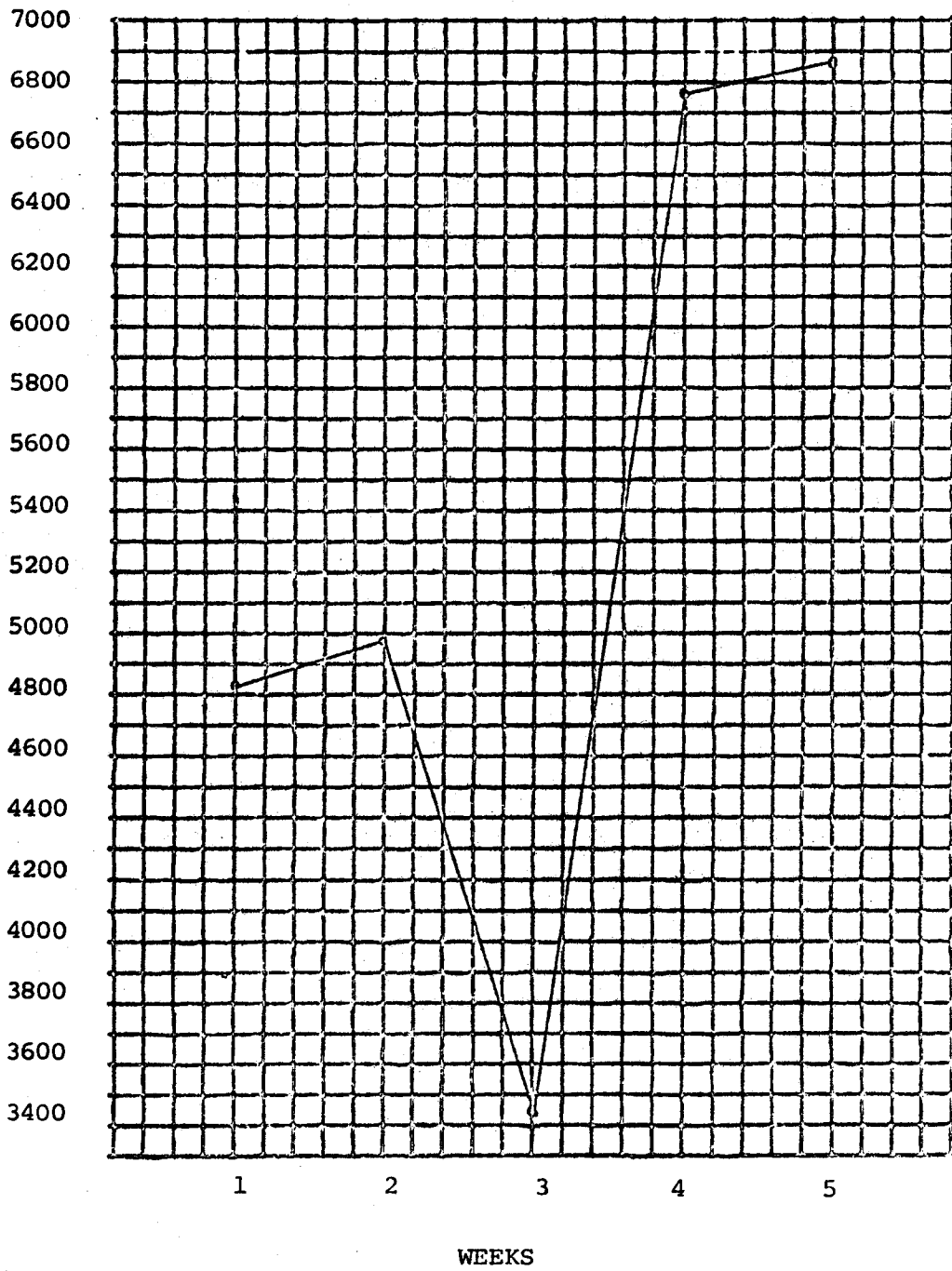
TOTAL INPUT MACHINE DICTATION

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A slide presentation was presented by Robert Lee, a member of the Board of Education staff, who had helped put together the presentation along with the staff.

The presentation followed an eighth grade student, DeeAnn Kyle, through a typical day at Brown Middle School. Following the presentation, Dr. Carter introduced DeeAnn's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kyle (DeeAnn was unable to be present).

Dr. Carter stated that the County had been promised a letter to advise of the final decision by HEW but the letter had not been received as late as this morning's mail. Dr. Carter said they are hopeful for a report that will be optimistic in continuing the policy of phasing students out over a period of time -- not just an immediate withdrawal of all students.

Dr. Carter stated that the budget was quite difficult this year. They had asked for \$2.4 million more than it was possible for them to receive. As a result they had to reduce several programs. One of the most disappointing and serious was the cut in teachers' salaries. They will be operating on a \$20.8 million budget.

Dr. Carter commented on the payment made by the City schools recently. The City Board has made agreement subject to working out details. They will pay \$267,000 for the relocatable buildings and equipment. The reason these were purchased by the city separately from the 7 schools now in question is that these purchases were made out of operating budgets. That is why this request was made to the city and the city has responded favorably. Progress is very favorable at this point.

Commenting on the Alternative School Proposal in Dr. Thelma Elliott's report, Dr. Carter stated that an application has been submitted to the Justice Department for funds to initiate this program but as yet no word has been received. The County is still in leading contention for this grant. What they are trying to achieve is to staff this alternative program for students with problems--either delinquents or prospective delinquents. This is a joint effort by the courts and the schools.

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Dr. Carter stated that regarding the word processing center, on input the use of longhand is reduced considerably and on output in lines of type per person it is increasing. All reports are favorable and this needs expansion. They began data processing for accounts and budgets and purchasing. It will be expanded to include attendance and other reports. The immediate advantage is that there will be a much closer accounting and they will be able to ascertain needs at the time they need to know them. It will give them a great deal more information.

Esquire Ball asked how far the \$267,000 received for the portable schools would go to bring our old schools up to the 7 schools the city got.

Dr. Carter said this would allow the County to build more of the same type of buildings that they may need. He said this was more feasible than trying to move the buildings. The original cost of these was \$342,000. \$267,000 would not go far toward renovations. The city is spending \$700,000 for renovations on these 7 buildings to bring them up to city standards and these were our very best buildings. That will give you some idea of what we need for the other 40. We do not anticipate that we will be able to use the money for that purpose. It will be needed for a few relocatable buildings and to buy supplies and equipment. That money will not be available to go into maintenance of other buildings.

Esquire Kennedy asked what "fixed charges" were. Dr. Carter explained, asking Mr. Rodman for verification, that these were items like insurance, social security, etc., teach paid insurance being the largest item.

Esquire Duggan asked about the basic difference in transportation, how the figure for 1975-76 could be \$40,000 more than 1974-75 after losing 7 schools. Dr. Carter said that because of Standard 17, a Federal law, by January 1977 requirements on school bus space will be (for all above grammar school) two to a seat with no standees. This will almost double the buses needed. We now put 78 on a bus; this will be reduced to 44. We have agreed to maintain all of the contracts we now have with drivers in the annexed areas so we have in effect added that many.

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Esquire Tate asked about the Alternative School Proposal, how they would identify these students and plan to deal with them. Dr. Carter said that they would meet with the Juvenile Court and Judge Smith, and various other agencies to develop a program. For the purpose of identification there would be a screening and selection committee composed of members of the court, school personnel (selected staff), and parents and citizens. Esquire Tate asked about potential offenders. Dr. Carter stated they are those already processed through the court. Esquire Tate asked if they would be isolated. Dr. Carter said yes, in a sense; this would be a separate facility holding up to 200 students. For a given period of time, they would be removed from regular school situation. The difficulties these students have can best be dealt with in a situation where they are removed from regular classrooms for a given period of time. Esquire Tate asked if this would not have a psychological effect on them - isolating them. Dr. Carter explained that this was not isolation in effect because there is a large group, not just two or three. They have found that in a situation like this, moral is so high and they like it so much, they sometimes want to stay. They are in the special school for a given period of time and then most go back. There has been no problem with these students having psychological damage. Often they like it too well.

Dr. Elliott identified a "status offender" as one who had already had a problem with the law. It would be an offense that would not be an offense if he were an adult. Normally he would be placed in the same institution with those with more serious problems. The Alternative School program would provide a school situation for this person instead of his being placed in an institution.

Esquire Tate said that his basic concern, having been through this himself, was that they would isolate potential offenders as well. Dr. Carter said they would use only those who were unable to function in a regular school situation and give them something they wouldn't have otherwise.

Dr. Carter stated that there is only \$8 million available nationally for this program and we are asking for about \$1 million." "Our chances are

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not all that good for getting what we asked for."

Esquire Tate asked if it would be possible for him to have a copy of the response to the 9 questions sent to HEW; he would even be glad to pay for it if necessary.

Dr. Carter said the response was quite lengthy, required 300 pages, but there were a few extra copies and he would see that Mr. Tate got a copy.

Esquire Johnson asked about the 24 teaching positions in music and physical education that they had hoped to add and wondered what they would cost. Mr. Rodman said the 24 positions would cost \$254,112. Esquire Johnson wondered if the budget had been broken down at all, if the Council could have voted an increase just for that part of the budget, so we could have had those teaching positions.

Dr. Carter said this would not have been possible because they have had to remove 29 positions from the existing positions, and if the HEW is not favorable they may still have to remove more. When the city annexes schools, they do not annex teachers. If any more money was available these 25 teachers (4 of the 29 have been taken care of) would stand in higher priority than any new positions. There is just no way at this point to consider additional teachers.

Esquire Franklin asked Judge Moore how the reduction in the school's budget compared to reductions in other asking budgets.

Judge Moore explained that he thought the highway department's budget was reduced much more, but there is \$1.65 of the total tax levy that goes to education (both city and county). The problem we have encountered is two-fold. We have no idea how the annexation situation will end up, it is now in limbo. As a result since the ADA is split, in order to give a given amount of money to the County we must get more than double that amount.

Esquire Franklin asked if the \$1.65 is earmarked by the State. Judge Moore stated this is the County levy and the County Council cannot give more.

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Esquire Franklin asked why County employees are getting a 7% raise and teachers did not. Esquire Adcock asked if the teachers' 3.4% raise was the decision of the school board or the County Council. Dr. Carter stated this was the decision of the school board. Judge Moore said that the County Council has no control over the spending of the school funds, the County government simply transmits the funds. Dr. Carter said it was necessary for the schools to establish priorities. The state was a \$150 across the board raise; the 3.7% is split - 1.5% by the state, 2.25% by the county.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for his report and introduced Esquire Holder.

Esquire Holder expressed appreciation to the 8 applicants for the school board position. He said it was an extremely tough job to interview 8 or 10 people and then select one for the school board position. He said that when this Quarterly Court was elected, they had received discouraging words about the difficulty of finding school board members, but that this had been proven wrong. This community is blessed with many community-conscious citizens. He also expressed appreciation to Gilbert Stein for his service on the school board.

Esquire Duggan nominated John McCoy, 8349 Savannah Lane. Esquire Duggan stated that Mr. McCoy is 34, married, and the father of two children.

Esquire Tate nominated Johnny D. Holloway. Esquire Tate stated that Mr. Holloway's resume was submitted after the cut-off date but that Mr. Holloway is highly qualified, has a B.S. in Mechanical Arts, is employed by TVA, and has been a member of the Mayor's Human Services Commission. Esquire Tate stated that representation is needed from the 4th District and Mr. Holloway would provide this.

Esquire Gardenhire nominated Robert F. Frederick, of Ooltewah. Esquire Gardenhire stated that Mr. Frederick is the father of two children, is vice-president of Rutledge Lumber and Manufacturing Company. She stated that Mr. Frederick can contribute integrity and common sense to the board.

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ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Nolan, that nominations cease. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-1. Resigned-1.

Esquire Pendley asked Judge Moore if a majority vote would be necessary or if the one with the largest number of votes would be the new school board member. Judge Moore stated the largest number of votes would suffice.

On a Roll Call vote, those voting for Robert F. Frederick were: Esquires Franklin, Pendley, Ball, Gardenhire, Kennedy, Holder, Sullivan, and Nolan. Those voting for John McCoy were: Esquires Duggan, Adcock and Johnson. Those voting for Johnny Holloway were: Esquires Green and Tate. Total votes for Mr. Frederick-8. Total votes for Mr. McCoy-3. Total votes for Mr. Holloway-2.

Mr. Robert F. Frederick was declared the newly elected school board member having received a plurality of votes (8 out of 13 present.)

Esquire Holder stated that although the Court would take no action on the matter, he would like to mention the resignation of former Quarterly Court member Keith Wilson.

Judge Moore agreed and stated that since Esquire Wilson had moved from the district to which he was elected, under law he could not continue to serve so he resigned. That particular position will remain open since it would require an election to fill it.

Esquire Adcock asked how another member could be elected if that district does not exist.

Esquire Gardenhire stated that she thought there would be a re-districting of the Justice of the Peace districts before another election is held.

Judge Moore stated that he did not believe the precinct or district was actually abolished.

Esquire Pendley asked what happened if a school board member should move from the county or state.

Judge Moore said he would assume that the position would become

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vacant.

Esquire Nolan asked what actually determines residency.

Judge Moore stated that it is "where you intend to reside." He said that this question had arisen in 1962 or 63 about a member of the Legislature not being a resident. The decision was where you intend to reside, not where your domicile is.

Esquire Nolan said perhaps Squire Wilson didn't need to resign after all.

Esquire Pendley asked if we could get a ruling on this. Judge Moore said there would have to be a lawsuit, that if a person claimed he is a resident and an adverse claim was made, there would be a lawsuit and each case is determined upon individual facts in that case. Evidence of residence would be if he intends to reside. If a person says that he has moved his home outside the state or county, then you might have an uncontroverted change of residence. If a person says the move is temporary, then it can be determined only by the court.

Esquire Ball said that if once money is appropriated then it is the school's money, how can the County Council give away the schools.

Judge Moore stated that the school board does not own anything, it is the county's property held in the name of the schools. To dispose of a building it is first declared surplus, then the county disposes of it. In the case of annexed schools, the County does not lose title simply because the city annexes an area. That property still belongs to the County. If the County chooses we could say no one could use these buildings. In the past the County schools simply turned over the buildings and all the materials inside. There is actually no way the County can ever match what the city does in education because the County has to split the ADA. The city levies additional money. The split in ADA is 57-43; if the County receives \$1, 57¢ goes to the city and 43¢ goes to the County.

Esquire Adcock asked how much of the \$1 actually comes from within the corporate limits of the city.

Judge Moore said he would guess about 70%. The city is superimposed on the county. The growth area has been outside the city and

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and then the city annexes this property. The city simply came out and took the growth area. That argument is basically false. The growth occurred because of county policy. The annexation then occurred because of county policy growth. 67-70% of the taxable value of the county is within the corporate limits, but only $\frac{1}{4}$ of the total land area is within the city limits.

Esquire Pendley asked then if every school that had been annexed was still the property of the county. Judge Moore said yes, all but 1 building (it was built with rural bonds and the city took up the payments.)

Esquire Pendley asked if we still owed money on these 7 schools.

Judge Moore said we still owed money on 15 annexed schools. Esquire Pendley asked if we could take them back, that we had only loaned them. Esquire Ball asked if we could charge rent. Judge Moore said that the city recognized that they were getting a good deal. Esquire Pendley said he wished he could buy a house that way. Esquire Ball stated there was no deal there. Judge Moore stated that the city has spent a great deal of money in maintenance of the school buildings. The county has to use their split of the ADA for everything and there is no money left for maintenance of the school buildings. We must have some compensation from these annexed buildings to at least let us get back on an even keel. We will not collect 100% of the value but we are entitled to an equitable amount. Judge Moore predicted that there will be an exodus again outside the corporate limits as we have had on every other annexation. We will have to take care of the children who move into the county and we have got to have some money.

Esquire Johnson asked if consolidation would solve this. Judge Moore stated that economically it would solve the problem, but he is not sure what the end result of total consolidation would mean. There are 4 different methods of setting up consolidated systems and each one produces a different result. He likened it to the need of a new car, you can buy anything from a Toyota up to a Jaguar. It's a different way of doing the same thing, you're still moving on 4 wheels.

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Esquire Tate asked if the municipalities make any contributions. Esquire Johnson said Lookout Mountain does contribute to that school. Judge Moore said that the municipalities do assist the county in many ways that save the county money and give very good support. They pay for air conditioning, playgrounds, and voluntarily contribute in many other ways.

Esquire Tate stated that we should levy a tax on them. Judge Moore stated that this is the reason America is the United States of America and not a colony of England. Esquire Tate said it seemed to him that was representation but no taxation.

Esquire Duggan asked why the County Council couldn't lease these buildings to the city. Judge Moore stated that this annexation situation occurred more than two years ago (July 28, 1974). The agreements having to do with operation and transfer of the facilities preceded Dr. Carter and the present Council. All agreement up to this point has been oral between the two school systems and the two governmental bodies. Judge Moore stated he hesitated to tell them how much their position has rocked the boat in insisting upon some compensation, but they did get the portable buildings paid for. There was a stormy session two weeks ago that he and Dr. Carter had with the city. Basically the city feels that we are changing the rules in the middle of the game. In future annexations there would be a definite understanding regarding compensation. This has not been done before.

Esquire Franklin asked what would prevent Red Bank or East Ridge from taking the schools in their municipalities without compensation. Esquire Pendley told Judge Moore he thought the majority of the people are behind him and Dr. Carter. All agreed that the prime motive is to educate children.

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ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, that the following Notaries Public as presented by County Court Clerk be elected (names of persons approved as Notaries are attached). The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-1. Resigned-1.

(Don) Duggan, Esquire Mack Franklin, Esquire Mary Gardenhire, Esquire Benton Green, Esquire Gene Holder, Esquire Fred Johnson, Esquire Theo. (T. D.) Kennedy, Esquire Paul V. Nolan and Esquire Alma Sullivan. Esquires G. M. (Speedy) Adcock, Jim (Jimmy R.) McKinney, S. M. (Mac) Pendley and Walter Tate were absent. (Esquire Keith Wilson, resigned). Total present-10. Absent-4.

Judge Moore requested that the Public Notice of this meeting that was published in the local newspapers (copy of notice attached hereto) be made a part of these minutes.

ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Ball, to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, treat same as read, approved, made a matter of record and filed.

Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of the Hamilton County Schools, presented the report from the Department of Education (copy attached). The report was received by the Court and filed.

Dr. Carter stated that the untimely death of Jack Rodman was a sorrow and sadness to the entire Department of Education. Included with the report was a copy of the Resolution from the Board of Education sent to Mr. Rodman's family.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF MEETING

Take notice, pursuant to Chapter 442, Public Acts of Tennessee of 1974, the Quarterly Court of Hamilton County, will convene and meet in open session on Monday, October 6, 1975, at 10:00 A. M. Eastern Daylight Time, in the County Council Room at the Hamilton County Courthouse, 6th and Walnut Streets, Chattanooga, Tennessee, where and at which time and place the said Quarterly Court of Hamilton County will transact such public business as may lawfully come before it.

Don Moore, County Judge and
Chairman of the Quarterly Court

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Enrollment figures show a total enrollment of 21,338. Dr. Elliott's report showed a total of 21,841, the difference being in the free kindergarten enrollment. The county's enrollment is now 42% of the total city-county enrollment. This figure is somewhat less than anticipated and it does affect the total revenue. Dr. Carter said that a successful workshop was held in August for principals and specialists. Middle Tennessee State University will be conducting clinical sessions throughout the year with specialists assigned to different schools. The department is pleased with the progress. The Middle School program has expanded to Ooltewah Middle School; it is progressing very well. The reports are similar to Brown Middle Schools last year; there are positive reports at all levels. The vocational schools are progressing on schedule and will be completed this year. The Northwest Center is not a lock and key contract; it will not have equipment. Dr. Carter has talked with Mr. Jonah Fitch, assistant commissioner in charge of education, and materials will be requested in the near future. Harrison has the equipment in the contract and will be completed near the end of the year. Operation of these two schools has not been funded for this year so the department will begin official operation of these two schools in September of 76. However, they will be using the center for orientation programs for all high school students this summer. It will be a career program prepared by the staff outlining the various programs offered.

Dr. Carter commented on one other matter: the request of the teachers' salary increases before the Board and the County Council. The Board recognizes that this is a legitimate need and the teachers have been given raises not commensurate with other County employees. The Board made a commitment to give raises of 5% to be in line with City teachers. Now that the County Council has declined action, the Board will try to allocate the education budget to give the 5% increase. The Board will make every effort through every resource to make this increase. Dr. Carter said that he feels that this will be accomplished at the Board meeting this Thursday evening.

Esquire Johnson asked Dr. Carter if the solution to the salary increases was to go to capital outlay.

Dr. Carter said that in the interest of fair play with the Quarterly Court's blessing the Board would like to give a 5% increase, or 1.3% more. If at all possible the Board of Education will provide this. They recognize the need and will respond. They hope to find ways to do this before the year is out outside of reducing the capital outlay. Dr. Carter does not know yet if the money from the State will be higher or lower. \$206,000 is the amount projected but it is possible that it will be more than that. Even at the expense of postponing renovations the first priority will be to provide that raise.

Esquire Kennedy asked if the kindergarten at Ooltewah has all the facilities that the kindergarten at Spring Creek has or the other kindergartens. Esquire Kennedy was referring to physical education and library, etc. Dr. Carter said that these things were not particularly assigned to kindergartens, but that Ooltewah does have the same program and equipment the other kindergartens have. The only difference is that some have carpets and others do not. Dr. Carter said there has been \$30,000 in state capital outlays funds to provide carpet and sleeping mats for those that do not have them.

Esquire Kennedy asked if those remaining from 8 until 2 had sufficient time for planning and visitation, as do those that close at noon.

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Dr. Carter said he knew of no kindergarten that closed at 12:00. Esquire Kennedy said that he meant the city kindergartens, that he was comparing the city and county times, that staying until 2:00 would shorten the time that the teachers had for visitation and planning.

Dr. Carter said that there was no correlation between the city and county kindergartens, that he really did not know the requirements for the city. The county does have one differential: to allow parents who desire to do so to pick up the students at 1:00 if they provide their own transportation. It is too expensive and difficult to have buses make runs all over the county just for the kindergartens and that is why their time runs until 2:00. The Board had requested a shorter school day for kindergarten through second grade through the Commissioner of Education but what they were asking was not a temporary thing which could be done by a waiver, but a permanent earlier closing hour which would have to be allowed through a change in law. Most local educators feel that the day for first and second graders is too long--too long for the students, not the teachers.

Esquire Duggan stated that he felt Dr. Carter was pushing extremely hard for the teachers' raises, did Dr. Carter feel that this was his biggest job?

Dr. Carter said that he thought this was his primary responsibility--to do anything he can do for the teachers, appropriating salary increases, securing more equipment, etc. Dr. Carter said that he tries to determine that which is fair and make an effort to obtain it; it is his responsibility to make that judgment. Dr. Carter said that he did not recommend a 7% increase, that 5% seems more fair at this time. But 5% is essential. Dr. Carter stated, "I have the responsibility to maintain some kind of judgment but when we determine this, it is my primary rule to secure this even if it means pushing it, even to the state."

ON MOTION of Esquire Kennedy, seconded by Esquire Johnson, that the Quarterly Court go on record supporting Dr. Carter in recommending to the Board of Education this 5% raise for Hamilton County teachers.

Esquire Duggan asked, "At what cost?"

Esquire Johnson stated \$210,000.

Dr. Carter said this would be a 1.3% increase over the increase the teachers have received already.

Esquire Ball asked where the money would come from.

Dr. Carter stated the only place at the moment is out of capital outlay, that there is very little flexibility in the budget. However, they are very hopeful and optimistic that by the end of the year there will be additional revenue to offset this but he cannot promise it. The Board always tries to place more teachers than the State requires to keep the pupil-teacher ratio down, especially in grades 1-6, and they hope that the number of positions already placed will enable them to pick up money in personnel budget if it is not necessary to hire additional teachers. Dr. Carter said he also hoped that Judge Moore could find ways of relieving some of the expenditure but he didn't know if that would be possible.

Esquire Johnson said that he knew in the Trustee's account that \$900,000 had been collected last year and only \$143,000 used for costs of the Trustee's office. Could the \$760,000 that was left not be used for education? Was there any law to allow them to do this?

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Judge Moore explained the fee system to the Quarterly Court. He explained that all excess fees from the elected county officials are turned over to the County general government twice each year. The amounts are budgeted in the operation of county government. The County anticipates that there will be X\$'s in excess fees from the elected officials (such as County Court Clerk, Criminal Court Cler, etc.). These fees are then appropriated throughout County government. They are not re-allocated to the source from which they come.

Esquire Johnson asked if there was any way they could be.

Judge Moore said that of course they could be, but that any funds that come in for the schools must be split on ADA between the County and the City. The County has \$1.65 per 100 for education. Debt service amounts to another 44¢ for a total of \$2.09 out of the total amount. The City of Chattanooga levies an additional 55¢ which goes to the City Department of Education. The County has to provide funds on a split basis but the city does not. The problem is a continuing problem in attempting to equate educational operations. Also the City annexes County school buildings but does not take all the pupils; this forces the County to provide new structures for these pupils. Another of Dr. Carter's problems is that the County has 20% students than last year. The Judge and the County Council are extremely sympathetic with Dr. Carter and the teachers but Judge Moore knows of no way to solve these problems by allocating fees.

Esquire Nolan asked if the fees are set by the legislature.

Judge Moore said the percentage is.

Esquire Nolan asked if the County could request the legislature to change the percentage.

Dr. Carter stated that this might result in a reduction of fees in some counties, that it is difficult for the legislature to deal with the problem across the entire state. The solution is to handle the problem within the county.

Esquire Nolan asked if we had gotten ourselves into this situation by local acts.

Judge Moore said the problem is not caused by local acts. It is very hard to apply a general rule for counties when some are very small and others very large.

Esquire Franklin asked if it would be possible for the County to dispose of some of the surplus property.

Judge Moore stated that the County is having an auction of one piece of surplus property. An auction is a new approach and the County hopes to get a higher price for the property in this way than they would in the usual method of submitting sealed bids.

Esquire Franklin stated that the County had recently purchased a parking lot and he feels that this is the kind of things in people's minds--if there is enough money to buy property, why is there not enough for the teachers' raises? Esquire Franklin said he didn't know how much property the County has but it seems to him it would be best to convert surplus property into money. "This land that is of no real asset could be disposed of to relieve the current situation."

Judge Moore said there is very little excess property and what there is is of very little value. Basically property becomes excess when no one buys back tax property. These pieces are ordinarily not developable. The County is now in the process of putting together an index of County and City property.

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Dr. Carter stated that everytime the city annexes schools this raises the question of whether or not consolidation is the answer.

Dr. Carter said that it really is not that complicated to work out, that a formula for annexed buildings should be worked out. Dr. Carter said that there is nothing to prevent the County from levying an additional tax as the City does the 55¢. This money would not have to be split because that is only required when the City participates in the taxation. Dr. Carter stated that he does believe negotiations with the City will resolve the problems of the annexed schools. Dr. Carter also stated that regarding the education income, that compared to the taxes paid in other counties, the \$1.65 Hamilton County gives to education is very small, and some counties put more into education than Hamilton Countians pay all together.

Judge Moore said there are only two or three counties that do.

Dr. Carter said that 30% of the counties pay considerably more into education than Hamilton County does.

Judge Moore said these figures include debt service.

Judge Pro Tem Holder asked that a vote be taken on the motion.

The foregoing Motion was Adopted with nine (9) Esquires voting, "Aye" and one (1) (Esquire Duggan) voting, "No."

Esquire Duggan told Dr. Carter that at the next Quarterly Court meeting the appointment of school superintendent will be considered. He asked Dr. Carter if he was going to submit his name.

Dr. Carter said, "Are you asking or telling me something?" He told the Court that he would be a candidate.

Esquire Duggan told Dr. Carter that he would like a break-down on the costs of the administrative office when Dr. Carter took over versus today. He asked Dr. Carter if he could provide that information.

Dr. Carter said he was not sure, whom would he include?

Esquire Duggan said everyone above the principals.

The Department of Education and the entire community was saddened this past quarter by the death of Mr. Jack Rodman, Assistant Superintendent in charge of Operations. The Resolution of the Hamilton County Board of Education in recognition of Mr. Rodman's contribution to our County is attached.


The total enrollment September 15, 1975, excluding pre-kindergarten programs, was 21,338. The primary focus for the month of July, August and September has been the planning and preparation for the beginning of school. This planning and preparation has ranged from interviewing and assigning teachers to in-depth workshops and seminars for principals. The Associate Superintendent for Programs, Henry C. Colston, has held regular staff meetings for the Programs Division Directors. One of the chief purposes of these weekly staff meetings have been to lay out a carefully planned program of work, aimed at providing the best situation for the operation of every school. On July 2, the Program Division Directors met for a half day session with Dr. Lynn Ourth of U.T.C. on "Interviewing Skills." This seminar was helpful to the Division Directors and the Associate Superintendent as they interviewed applicants for the various positions in the department. A total of 692 applications were processed for the 53 openings which became available for this term. The staff meetings in July centered around careful planning for the Principals' Workshop and included preparation of Central Office job descriptions as well as plans for job descriptions to be written by principals, and, in turn, by teachers as a result of the principals' workshop. A Committee was established to devise a plan for a curriculum laboratory and a proposal was drafted to provide funding for this project.

The Principals' Workshops were held August 4 - 8 for Secondary Principals and August 11 - 13 for Elementary Principals. Included in the workshops were seminars on individually guided education and the development of administrative skills. During this period, the Instructional Specialists were interviewed, selected and assigned. There are eight for elementary, four for intermediate and three at the high school level. On August 22, an orientation for the twenty new teachers employed by Hamilton County Schools was held at McBrien Elementary School. On August 26, at the Tivoli Theater, a meeting of all 1100 Hamilton County teachers was held to begin the school year. This presentation included a speech by Mr. J. M. Mankin of the Central Church of Christ and remarks by the Superintendent. Information regarding the new systems of data processing and word processing was given by Mr. Gary Land and a slide presentation of the organization and work of the Programs Division was shown.

The month of September saw the beginning of school with the problems of enrollment, teacher assignment and realignment of teachers to match enrollment in the various schools. The Associate Superintendent and the three Directors worked diligently to provide the best possible ratio of students to teachers and the best possible staff assignment for each school. Preliminary reports to the State Department of Education have been submitted by the principals and forwarded to the Regional Office.

One of the features of the reorganized administrative structure is to allow and to encourage administrative personnel to be in the schools assisting principals and teachers on the job as an attempt to meet the needs in the classroom. Reports showing the efforts and results of various section heads are attached.

WHEREAS, he then became Assistant Superintendent of Hamilton County Schools in charge of General Administration; and

WHEREAS, this year he became Assistant Superintendent in charge of the Operations Division of the Hamilton County Schools, and

WHEREAS, he was a member of the Trinity-Woodmore United Methodist Church serving as chairman of the Administrative Board, a member of the Tri-State Officials Association, Phi Delta Kappa, National Association of Secondary School Principals, Tennessee Association of School Administrators, Tennessee Education Association, National Education Association, American Association of School Administrators and the Executive Council of the National Beta Club; now therefore

Placement of Personnel

One hundred thirty-five (135) applications (May-Sept. 1) for teaching positions were received. July and August were spent interviewing new applicants, placing annexed teachers that had requested to remain in County and surplus teachers - e.g. teachers due to decline in enrollment.

The withdrawal of State Reading funds and the cut in budget 2.4 million dollars necessitated eliminating 16 positions in the special reading program. The reading positions were positions over and above state allocation provided according to A.D.A.

READING PROGRAM

The Basal Reading Program, "Designs for Reading" (Harper-Row) is a program designed from level to level in progression of skills with enrichment and reinforcement components. Transition readers from grade to grade are used to review skills and to eliminate re-reading a reader that was read the previous year. The transition readers are to strengthen those who have no difficulty in reading and to motivate those who have difficulty. The program has a three level Readiness program that has been purchased. Phonics books for re-enforcement have been ordered for children who need extra help.

Schedules and crowded curriculum in grades 1-2 have been adjusted for more instruction in reading by the classroom teachers.

Eight Instructional and Curriculum Specialists

Four Instructional and Curriculum Specialists have been assigned in K-2. Four Specialists have been assigned 3-6. Each Specialist will have seven schools within a given area. The primary focus will be assisting new teachers and non-tenure teachers in techniques and methods of teaching. The Specialists will be available to help strengthen the Reading program and other areas where needed.

Curriculum guides for certain subject areas will be written directed by the specialists. There will be teacher involvement in writing the guides.

In-Service programs and staff development will be part of 1975-76 Specialists program.

The Tennessee State Department of Education P.E. Task Force is conducting a field test of a P.E. Guide. The guide provides sequential movement experiences for children essential to their developmental level rather than according to age or grade placement. The Director of Elementary Education, Mrs. Mildred C. Chapman is a member of Task Force; consequently eleven of the Hamilton County Schools are involved in the program and will be asked to evaluate the content of the guide in the Spring. During the quarter just ended, each of my performance responsibilities was fulfilled to some extent. In addition to participation in all the activities and staff meetings conducted for the Programs Division Staff, a number of significant things have been accomplished by the Career Education and Extended Services Section. A brief summary of these activities follows:

Inspection tours indicate Vocational Education Center construction on schedule at Sequoyah and Harrison Bay.

Architect for Annex at Sequoyah indicates plans should be ready to go out for bid in mid-October.

Choice of woods for casework and colors used in painting almost completed at Sequoyah and Harrison Bay Centers.

BROWN MIDDLE SCHOOL

Report of Activities
July 1 - September 30, 1975

The following report represents activities initiated during the first three months of the second year of the middle school project. These first quarter activities are largely of a developmental and planning nature as school was not in session during July and August.

Jerry Bentley was named project director to replace Mr. Larry Malone who was named Director of Intermediate Education for the Hamilton County Schools. Mr. Delbert Hale was also named principal to succeed Mr. Henry Colston, who is now Associate Superintendent, Hamilton County Schools. Other staff personnel remain in their previous roles: Mrs. Carolyn Edlund, Curriculum Specialist; Mrs. Carolyn Hilbert, Project Secretary; Mrs. Jean Collum, Instructional Aide.

The Title III Continuation Project was initiated for the second year with program emphases on interdisciplinary teaming, individualized program materials, integrated support services, variety in experiences, and exploratory and intramural opportunities.

Various planning sessions with the Director of Intermediate Education and other Central office personnel concerning program direction were held.

Intensive and in-depth plans were made for a workshop for the Brown and Ooltewah staffs.

An advisory committee made up of selected teachers and staff personnel met for 5 days to plan and suggest strategies and operational procedures for the year based upon first year outcomes and evaluation.

A two-week workshop with staff from the Brown and Ooltewah Middle Schools was implemented with the purpose in mind to share Brown's first year with Ooltewah staff who were beginning the same concept.

A consultant from Silver-Burdett came to Brown to explain the SPIES pilot science program to teachers.

Math consultant, Rose Kidd, gave help to math teachers in individualizing math programs.

A meeting with Bill Tomlinson of the State Title III staff was held with project staff to clarify project requests and set further directions.

Various planning meetings on project activities with Central office personnel, Ooltewah staff, and personnel from junior high schools beginning to implement some of the same concepts initiated at Brown were held.

Mrs. Shelby Watson, formerly guidance counselor at Brown, was hired to assume the Support Services Team Leader role.

Plans were initiated with the guidance counselors at middle school level to develop a program of preventive counseling through regularly scheduled guidance classes. Classes should start during the first school quarter.

A meeting was held with all support services personnel at Brown Middle School to organize and plan for the school year.

The school social worker has been involved with specific problems of children with whom she is concerned.

Planning was initiated to test students who may be creatively gifted. Also, plans are being made to start a program with the first school quarter on gifted education.

Identifications of possible exceptional children in each grade were made.

Annual Education Conference at Middle Tennessee State University at Murfreesboro was attended by the staff.

Meetings were held with various committees which were set up during the advisory committee planning week for the purpose of planning program direction and insuring that staff and students take part in the planning process.

Plans were begun on a project to use high school students as teacher and staff aides.

Plans were begun for a 6 week unit on career exploration.

Old textbooks were found to provide teachers with low-level materials.

Final approval for the Title III Continuation proposal for second year funding was received.

Testing of all 6th grade students on the Metropolitan Achievement Tests took place to provide pretest data for these students.

Dr. Kennedy of the Southern Missionary College Education Department and 5 social studies students visited Brown to observe the program.

Interdisciplinary teaming for eighth grade team and reading programs for seventh and eighth grades were planned.

Reading teachers furnished materials for exhibit at the Right to Read program.

Various materials were selected and prepared for individualization.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

Research and Project Design Section

Dr. Thelma Elliott, Director

During the quarter ending September 30, 1975, the Research and Project Design Section was involved in a number of diversified activities. Following are some of the major assignments which were completed or are in process:

1. Projected Enrollment Report for 1975-76: A report of the projected enrollment was prepared in July and copies distributed for use by Central Office staff, principals, and the Board. A conservative estimate was made with the hope that the actual enrollment would exceed the projections. The following is a comparison of the projected and actual enrollments.

<u>Regular and Special Programs</u>	<u>Projected Enrollment July, 1975</u>	<u>Actual Enrollment Sept., 1975</u>
Elementary Schools	11,120	11,213
Secondary Schools	9,374	9,922
Special Schools & Programs	<u>749</u>	<u>706</u>

While there is no statistically significant difference in these data, the actual enrollment is slightly above the projections. The one conclusion which may be drawn is that it is possible to reasonably predict the enrollment (by schools) if a critical analysis is made of the variables affecting the projections. There is some credibility in the method used to arrive at the projections, particularly in view of the changes, options, and instability of students due to annexation.

2. Prepared Proposal for Feasibility Study for New Food Services Program: The R&D and the Food Services and Nutrition staff contacted the State Department of Education personnel concerning the availability of supplemental funding to do a study of the problems related to these programs.

The development of a proposal to implement the study was encouraged by the local and State staff. A request has been made for approximately \$20,000 to employ the needed personnel to cover other costs connected with the study.

Optional methods of offering food services programs will be developed. Some of the existing problems should be directed toward improving quality, equalizing services, expediting the work load to relieve the local school staff and to reduce the overall costs. Such options may include the following: centralized purchasing, dry and cold storage, records maintenance, accounting, and management. In addition, the plan may indicate a need for an equipment maintenance staff, for delivery services, and a system-wide menu plan adaptable to local school needs.

This study should become operational during the month of October and extend through the school year with a finalized plan to be proposed by the end of this fiscal year.

3. Alternative School Plans: The proposed Alternative School Project was not funded from '75 resources. The required requests have been made for re-submitting the proposal for '76 funding. The Superintendent has requested that the program be further studied and a design prepared for initiation of the basic concepts utilizing existing resources. This study and proposal will continue to be on the priority list of plans for the immediate future.
4. Mountain School Program (Fairlyland, Lookout Mountain, Tenn./Ga.): As a representative of the Hamilton County School Board to the Mountain School Advisory Board, the monthly meetings have been attended regularly. The contract for the '75-76 year (to permit Tennessee students to attend a Georgia School) was completed and submitted to the Walker County and Hamilton County Boards for approval and submission to the Tennessee State Department of Education for final acceptance. Other tasks have been completed to offer assistance needed by the school to initiate its 1975-76 programs in the unique "air support structure" facility.
5. New Teacher Orientation Program (HCEA); Teacher Education and Professional Standards (TEPS) Committee: As Chairman of the TEPS Committee, the Director for R&D and the Committee members worked with the Programs Division staff in coordinating and presenting the HCEA programs. The HCEA hosted the luncheon for new teachers and invited guests on August 22 at McBrien Elementary School. Approximately 85 new teachers and guests were present.

It was the opinion of the staff, based upon comments made by new teachers, that the day was helpful to them in becoming acquainted with their assignments in the programs and services areas offered by the Hamilton County Department of Education (the morning session) and the benefits of the HCEA and the United Teaching Profession (the afternoon session).

6. Other Activities Included:

- A. Prepared ESEA II Project for Library resources (\$33,357) which has been approved.
- B. Prepared Project for NDEA III (\$28,348) which was returned by the State for modification. It will be revised and resubmitted at an early date.
- C. Attended a meeting held by the State Department of Human Services on Title XX which may make available resources for meeting needs of children and their families.
- D. Prepared a report for the State for facilities and for HCEA on staff ratio for minority-majority personnel assigned to classroom teaching and to administrative areas.
- E. Served as a consultant for a Conference on Alternative Use of Spaces in Areas of Declining Enrollments. The Conference was sponsored by the Educational Facilities Laboratories. Arlington Virginia Public Schools hosted the Conference and provided site visitations to facilities in their school district.
- F. Followed up on proposal submitted on Drug Education. The proposal was one of 12 submitted from Tennessee, but only four were approved which did not include the County School's proposal. The project will be resubmitted if funds become available at a later date.
- G. Studied sample job descriptions of personnel in other school systems who work in research. A tentative job description (in brief or modified form) has been prepared and presented to the Superintendent and the Board.
- H. Other Planned Activities: The Superintendent and the Director for R&D recently planned and placed priorities on jobs to be accomplished. The following order of priorities were assigned:

- 1) Study the problems and conditions related to opening the Vocational Centers. The impact on feeder schools, problems emerging from daily schedules, transportation, curriculum, costs, time, safety, staff, facilities, etc. should be anticipated and options prepared for selecting the most expedient way to operate.
- 2) Alternative programs must be studied, proposed, and presented for implementation to meet the needs of problem students, particularly for those who are suspension problems.
- 3) Twelve-Month School plans should be considered and data collected for future options.
- 4) Long-range projections on population growth or movement, facilities, programs, staff, and other needs should be outlined and placed in the hands of administration. Wise use of limited resources is more likely to be made if data are available on which to base decisions.

JULY, AUGUST, SEPTEMBER, 1975

Considerable amount of time and effort has been involved in researching records and other important details which will assist the Superintendent in presenting pertinent facts to the Board as they select an appropriate site for Ooltewah Middle School.

The renovation project of the former Ooltewah High School, which temporarily serves the Middle School, is almost completed.

The main part of the building has been re-roofed. New tile floors and drop ceiling have been installed; all painting has been done except where new windows are being installed. Delayed shipment of windows has prevented completion.

The steel construction for the Dallas Addition is completed. Plumbing and electrical work has been stubbed-in. Brick veneering of the concrete blocks on both interior and exterior walls has been done and bar joists are in place.

With specific punch-list exceptions, the new Ooltewah High School and the renovation of Snow Hill, Daisy, and Bachman have been inspected and accepted.

Maintenance work has been done at Birchwood, Red Bank Elementary, Sale Creek, J. B. Brown, White Oak, Harrison, Red Bank High, Sawyer, Red Bank Junior, Bachman, East Ridge Elementary, Spring Creek, Soddy-Daisy, Ganns-Middle Valley, Anna B. Lacey, Thrasher, East Ridge High, Falling Water, Signal Mountain Elementary, Alpine Crest, McBrien, Hamilton County Occupational Center and Summitt.

The Landfill Department has provided pick-up service for garbage collection. The Department of Education is providing dumpsters for the schools. One hundred per cent delivery of dumpsters has not as yet been obtained.

The Department of Education purchased lawn mowers.

With the cooperation of the Highway Department and Man-Power, we have been able to keep the lawn at most of the schools.

A roofing contract has been let for Soddy Elementary. Also, one has been given for the renovation of classrooms and restrooms at Bachman School.



RESOLUTION OF THE HAMILTON COUNTY QUARTERLY COURT

October 6, 1975

WHEREAS, the Hamilton County Election Commission has changed the boundary lines of the Hamilton County precincts in 1974, thus resulting in split precincts in the present Justice of the Peace districts, and

WHEREAS, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy which now exists on the Hamilton County Quarterly Court from District III, and

WHEREAS, the Hamilton County Quarterly Court wishes to avoid the voter confusion and unnecessary costs that would be involved were the election held along the old Justice of the Peace district lines, and

WHEREAS, the Quarterly Court is authorized by Section 5-111 of the Tennessee Code to reapportion itself according to population, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Hamilton County Quarterly Court that the Justice of the Peace districts shall be reapportioned as described below:

District I to consist of precincts: Valley View, Wauhatchie, Lookout Mountain, St. Elmo, Piney Woods, East Lake, Cedar Hill, East Ridge III, East Ridge V

District II to consist of precincts: Apison, Collegedale, Colteawah, Westview, East Brainerd, Concord, Tyner, Brainerd Hills, Bonny Oaks, East Ridge II

District III to consist of precincts: Airport, Eastgate, Woodmore, Brainerd, Sunnyside, Eastdale, Ridgeside, East Ridge I, East Ridge IV, Missionary Ridge

District IV to consist of precincts: Alton Park, Howard, Clifton Hills, Ridgedale, Eastside, Highland Park, City Hall, Downtown, Court House, Bushtown, Orchard Knob, Avondale, Moccasin Bend

District V to consist of precincts: Birchwood, Meadowview, Snowhill, Harrison, Hillcrest, Lake Hills, Kingspoint, East Chattanooga, Glenwood, Amnicola, Stuart Heights, Lupton City

District VI to consist of precincts: Mowbray, Falling Water, Fairmount, Signal Mountain East, Signal Mountain West, Valdeau, Mountain Creek, Red Bank I, Red Bank II, Red Bank III, Red Bank IV, Riverview, North Chattanooga, Waldens

District VII to consist of precincts: Sale Creek, Bakewell, Soddy Daisy North, Soddy Daisy South, Dallas, Lakesite, Middle Valley, Hixson, Dupont, Northgate, Northwoods

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a descriptive map of the new Hamilton County Justice of the Peace districts and a copy of this resolution shall be filed with the Secretary of the State of Tennessee, the Hamilton County Election Commission, and the Hamilton County Court Clerk.

ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Green, to amend the Resolution to put East Ridge II into District I so that East Ridge would only be split into Districts I and III. Esquire Franklin stated that East Ridge was the only community split into three districts. He stated that 10% of the school children in Hamilton County live in East Ridge. Also to shift Lookout Mtn. from District I to District II.

Judge Moore stated that it would be necessary to vote on the Amendment first.

Esquire Gardenhire showed the maps (filed) of the redistricting and explained what they had tried to do. This is an attempt to redraw the JP District Line in accordance with precinct lines. She stated that a JP District with a Court House is entitled to 3 representatives instead of 2. Esquire Gardenhire stated that they thought this was the best plan and that they needed to vote on it, that a lot of work had gone into it. The population figures are closer now than before.

Esquire Sullivan asked if these figures were based on the census.

Esquire Gardenhire said they were based on the 1970 census. She stated that these districts will stand until another reapportionment, that they were changed in 1972.

Esquire Franklin said that was when East Ridge was split into three districts.

Esquire Gardenhire stated that it was not that easy to shift districts and keep the one man-one vote.

Esquire Franklin stated that using census figures does not give one-man-one vote and he thought shifting the districts as he wanted to in his Amendment would apportion this.

Esquire Nolan stated that the next election would be in District III, that they should go ahead and adopt this and then at a later date look at the whole thing again. He said a lot of time and work had been spent, that it seems fair to him, and he would like to go ahead and take action.

The Motion to amend failed on voice vote.

The Resolution to change the JP Districts was Adopted by voice vote.

Esquire Holder stated that they had already mentioned the fact that Dr. Carter would seek reappointment as Superintendent. Esquire Holder said that the Quarterly Court has an obligation and responsibility to talk with and interview anyone seeking the office. In the next three months they will be working diligently in this regard.

Judge Moore reminded the Squires that the sunshine law requires public notice of any meetings. If the Court desires as a body to interview candidates, they could move at this meeting to call a Special Meeting for that purpose. Any committee composed of two or more members of the Court would be required by the sunshine law to give public notice. There is no time limit on the notice, simply requires "adequate notice."

Esquire Nolan asked what is considered notice?

Judge Moore said it would be to make public announcements and publish notice in legal notices.

Esquire Nolan asked if there was a candidate from out of town and there was a shortness of time in knowing he was coming, how could this be arranged?

Judge Moore stated the requirements of the sunshine law could be met in four or five days.

Esquire Duggan asked if there had to be a meeting for the Court to just talk to people about the job.

Judge Moore said that it is not allowed to have a meeting of any public body without meeting the requirements of the sunshine law. Two or more members of the Quarterly Court, the County Council, the City Commission, or the Election Commission may not deliberate. That is the law. Right or wrong. The City Commission is now in the process of seeking clarification of this law.

Esquire Green said "Speaking of notices...."

(Judge Moore apologized that the Quarterly Court members had not been sent notice of the meeting. He explained that his former secretary Kathleen Proctor had retired since the last meeting and since she had always handled all these details it was not taken care of, that it would take him quite a while to find out all the things Kathleen did.)



I. AREAS OF ACCOMPLISHMENT: JULY, 1974 - DECEMBER, 1975

A. Administrative Reorganization

1. Reorganization of all non-professional staff incorporating for the first time job descriptions, career paths and a salary schedule.

This reorganization followed an intensive study by the IBM Corporation and our own personnel of all office procedures and was implemented jointly with the initiation of Word Processing, reassessment of all salaries, workshops for all employees and a job bidding process.

2. The combining of Audio-Visual, Reproduction and Mail Services, and the establishment of a system-wide delivery service. This service has significantly increased the circulation of Audio-Visual materials and has significantly decreased the time and expense of principals' travel to and from the Central Office.
3. Initiated Data Processing for purchasing, finance and budgets, and bus and attendance reporting. This system provides cost saving through precise control of budgets and investments and reduces the burden of paper work on teachers and principals.
4. Reorganization of the professional staff to reduce top level administrative positions, to provide administrative efficiency through middle management and to provide an effective system for improving hiring practices and quality of instruction.

- I. AREAS OF ACCOMPLISHMENT: JULY, 1974 - DECEMBER, 1975 (Continued)
- B. Successful transition to Middle School concept and organization.
 - C. Improved facility maintenance
 - 1. Improved process for systematic determination of priorities
 - 2. Initiation of inspection and repair of all roofs (including one which has leaked from the time it was constructed in 1967) and the construction of covered walk-ways to all portable classrooms in the system.
 - 3. Complete remodeling of Bachman Elementary and Ooltewah Middle Schools.
 - D. Successful negotiation with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in preventing the disenrollment of hundreds of students and a reduction in force of approximately eighty teachers.
 - E. Achieved recognition and partial solution to the financial and legal problems accruing to Hamilton County Schools and tax payers as a result of the historical practice of surrendering county property through annexation without remuneration.
 - F. Improved communications with the Board of Education, the Quarterly Court and the public.
 - G. Responded positively, openly and honestly to each of the numerous problems which has emerged during my brief tenure.

II. FUTURE PLANS

A. Continued reorganization of the Operations Division

1. Centralization of Food Services
2. Establishment of a Maintenance Operation
3. Complete revision of our Transportation System

B. Development of a Student Intern Program

Operating procedures with five major colleges are near completion at this time. The objectives of this program are to provide college credits in methods courses and other courses through actual work in the laboratories of our system, to correlate more closely the actual student teaching experience with the actual teaching experience, to make the student teacher an asset rather than a liability in our classrooms and to provide realistic screening and assessment for students, colleges and employers.

C. Development of alternative programs in schools and alternative school programs.

D. Implementation of two Comprehensive Vocational Centers

serving all high school students.

This operation is expected to precipitate the most significant changes in high school organization and programming that have occurred in the past several decades. The full utilization of

these Centers will ultimately involve such changes as these:

1. Rescheduling of school starting times to allow a longer high school day.
2. Restructuring of school organization to allow more flexibility in class scheduling.
3. Restructuring of high school curriculum to provide a wider range of courses in shorter sessions with more specific objectives.
4. Extension of credit courses into community resources.
5. Extended operations into evening hours and summer months.
6. Utilization of facilities by out-of-school youth and adults.

Planning is now in progress in each of these areas. One exemplary project has been approved by the State Department of Education and two other proposals have been written and submitted in an effort to secure funds for pilot projects for work study programs in Career Education and for Gifted and Talented Students.

E. Improved Communication Procedures through a Speakers Bureau, increased Press releases, combined P.T.A. Councils in various communities and an organized program of community awareness to be conducted by staff members in each local school.

F. Development of Work Stoppage Contingency Plans

Dr. Carter stated that the first portion of this was Administrative Reorganization, which he explained in four parts. First, reorganization of all non-professional staff--initiation of word processing center and combined efforts in clerical ways. Salaries were also reassessed. Second, combining of audio-visual, reproduction and mail services, resulting in increased circulation of audio-visual materials and reduction in time and expense of administrators' traveling back and forth. Third, initiation of data processing--this has greatly reduced the burden of paper work done by teachers and principals. Four, the reorganization of the professional staff and the providing of improved systems of hiring.

The second area of accomplishment was the successful middle school transition. The middle school concept is now in its second year of operation.

Next was improved facility maintenance--including roof inspection, construction of covered walk-ways to portable buildings, etc.

Successful negotiations with Department of Health, Education and Welfare in preventing the disenrollment of hundreds of students.

Other accomplishments included improved relations among the public, the Department of Education, and the Quarterly Court, and a positive response to the problems which have emerged during Dr. Carter's tenure. Dr. Carter stated many problems have come up since his appointment and he has not sidestepped any of them.

Regarding future plans, another of the Court's questions to Dr. Carter, Dr. Carter said that there was continued reorganization of operations. The organizational chart is divided into two sections: operations and programs. Due to full cost accounting now required in cafeteria operation, there was a need to centralize food service management. The other areas of reorganization include maintenance operations and revision of the transportation system. A student intern program is being developed in cooperation with five major colleges; this program will provide a better transition from students to teachers. Dr. Carter said that there was a meeting this morning with the staff to draft final agreements with the colleges for this program.

Other future plans include development of alternative programs in schools and alternative school programs, implementation of comprehensive vocational centers (marking the most significant changes to occur in high schools in the past several decades), improved communication procedures (including a speakers bureau, increased press releases, combined PTA councils, and an effort to increase community awareness), and the development of work stoppage plans.

Dr. Carter included in his report Central Office cost comparison between June 1974 and December 1975. The people listed on this report are all those who do not report to the principals. Dr. Carter stated that the combined salaries for June 1974 were \$655,282. Adding the raises granted in July of 74 and July of 75 make the total \$759,603. The combined salaries for December 75 are \$740,556, adding 1 teacher (attendance-homebound) at a salary of \$11,100 and subtracting \$6801 as overpayment due to no salary freeze makes the total \$744,855 which makes a net decrease of \$14,748. Position changes show 17 added and 17½ reduced--net reduction of ½ position. Dr. Carter said that a great percentage of these positions are not determined by the superintendent or the Board of Education. They are determined by Title I and various other programs. Those determined by the superintendent are a relatively minor group.

Four persons listed, Mr. Crabtree at the Central Office and three at Brown School, are temporary employees hired under a special grant.

Dr. Carter stated that one of the most important factors on this page (in the last column) is that the administrative staff has been reduced by 19 and only 6 added. This makes a net decrease of \$198,675 in administrative costs. The position of assistant superintendent has been eliminated--there were five. There is now one associate superintendent. Instructional supervisors no longer exist. They are now specialists. The 14 specialists have undergone an extensive program.

Dr. Carter maintains that teaching is a skill--an art in itself. He said that there has been much criticism of the specialist program but they feel that this is one of the most positive things they have done.

Esquire Holder thanked Dr. Carter for his report and asked for questions from the Quarterly Court members.

Esquire Sullivan asked about the reduction of 19 in the administrative staff.

Dr. Carter stated that this is by the department's definition. He said the number of persons there are about the same. The instructional specialists are not considered administrative--nor do they report to the principals. This is strictly a program for instructional improvement. The position of instructional supervisor was abolished. Dr. Carter stated that they did not replace various administrative personnel who retired or left the system. Gary Land, director of fiscal affairs, stated there were 6 or 7 not replaced.

Esquire Nolan asked about the variance of salaries of the specialists. Dr. Carter said this was where that \$6800 comes in--that former supervisors still carry the salaries they had before. The specialists that have been employed as specialists or brought in from the teaching staff maintain their teachers' salaries. Dr. Carter said it was felt that a person should not be demoted after 20 years service in the system, that they did not feel it was fair to cut the salaries back.

Esquire Tate asked if Dr. Carter felt that this was fair to the specialists they are hiring now, that they are doing the same job for less money.

Dr. Carter said he did think it was fair, that they were not forcing anyone to take these positions and those who do know their options. Dr. Carter said that while it might not be exactly fair, it was the best compromise and those coming in do not have any complaints. The new ones do not have the years of service the others have. Dr. Carter said there are two alternatives: either do not reorganize or wind up with these situations. There is no problem; all understand this.

Esquire Duggan asked Dr. Carter who does the job of supervising. Dr. Carter stated that the directors do, that formerly supervisors had the responsibility of the quality of instruction but had no authority, the principals had the sole authority. Many classrooms were never visited by the supervisors. This system was designed not to work and had to be changed.

Under the new system the directors have authority--the instructional specialists carry this out. Total expenses have been reduced. Dr. Carter said, "There are more Indians and less chiefs."

Esquire Duggan asked how the supervisors previously visited in the schools. Dr. Carter said ideally all classrooms were visited; however, it usually worked out that elementary classes might be visited for ten minutes once or twice a year and high school classes not at all.

Esquire Duggan said that the previous administration felt that it took supervisors to get the job done, whereas Dr. Carter feels the specialists do it.

Dr. Carter said he did not consider the previous way effective because those people ("who were good people" and most of whom are now specialists or have been promoted to principals) had no authority. "They had the task but no authority." And they simply could not visit two grades in every school. They simply did not have the necessary administrative clout to do the job.

Esquire Duggan said if Dr. Carter feels that the specialists are what will get the job done, it seems that they should be considered part of administration.

Dr. Carter said that the directors hold this responsibility, the specialists are an arm of administration. They are master teachers to help teachers improve. They do not report to Dr. Carter but only Dr. Carter and Mr. Colston (associate superintendent) have access to their records.

Esquire Duggan said that he felt these people should be listed as administration.

Dr. Carter said that was all right, if that was Mr. Duggan's thinking. He said they were very well pleased with the whole program. The colleges feel that it is one of the best they have seen and the teachers who have been visited feel good about it.

Esquire Kennedy asked if the instructional specialists have to work through the directors and the principals.

Dr. Carter said the principals do not have access to the written records but must work with the specialists.

Esquire Green asked about the student intern program, what the five colleges involved were.

Dr. Carter listed the five colleges as UTC, UTK, Tennessee Tech, Middle Tennessee State, and Tennessee State.

Esquire Tate asked about the relationship of the director to the principal.

Dr. Carter said that the way the administrative system is set up, there is the Superintendent, the Associate Superintendent, the Directors, and the Principals. The Directors are in charge of program; they do not go in and get concerned with the actual operation of the schools, just the program. They approve teacher assignments and respond to complaints. They do not go in and talk about plant operation, cafeteria management, busing, etc.

Esquire Ball asked about transportation, if Dr. Carter felt he could straighten this out.

Dr. Carter said almost 100% yes at this time, they will have the answer Thursday night. The Board still needs to discuss a few things.

Esquire Adcock stated that some information on salary scale, ADA, etc. Mr. Adcock did not know if this information was correct or not but according to their figures there was a net gain of 6½ positions over last year even though the County had lost 5,000 students. Mr. Adcock asked Dr. Carter if these figures were accurate and how he would explain it.

Dr. Carter said the loss of 5,000 students was accurate, possibly a few more but he was not sure about the other, although it might be true. He said there was funding under #839 and if the funds were not used to hire people the money would be lost. Dr. Carter said Hamilton County had competed for some of the funds allocated for federal aid and got it. Also you get a set amount of Title I and Headstart.

Esquire Adcock asked Dr. Carter if he could foresee any additional cuts in enrollment (such as the 5,000 lost by annexation).

Dr. Carter said he did not think so. He does not see how administrative costs can be cut any more. He stated that Hamilton County is one of the lowest in administrative costs anywhere. Hamilton County has less than 2% in central office personnel, and including principals about 7%. The central

office has taken over more and more responsibilities that at one time had to be done by the individual schools; i.e., secretarial tasks, bookkeeping, cafeteria purchasing, records of teachers.

Esquire Adcock asked about Paul Starnes' salary of \$16,500, and how the time he spends in the legislature is accounted for.

Dr. Carter said that any time Mr. Starnes is away from his job on legislative business, the time is deducted from that annual salary.

Esquire Gardenhire stated that when Dr. Carter was hired 18 months ago, the problems in the central office were mentioned. She asked Dr. Carter if the problems had been resolved.

Dr. Carter stated that there had been problems--he could not discuss specifics--but there has been an almost total change. Mrs. Gardenhire asked if they were pulling together as a team and Dr. Carter said it is a central effort now and has improved 100%.

Esquire Duggan stated that most of the squires had gotten calls about how Dr. Carter is handling certain situations. It is thought that he is not too tactful.

Dr. Carter stated that he has heard this complaint but he does not accept it. He stated that he was issued a mandate--"you will be accountable." There had been new things initiated by the legislature--also one of the main things the Quarterly Court required of him was accountability. Dr. Carter stated that he had undertaken to make the changes necessary, he had initiated significant changes in schools, classrooms, and the central office. He had responded openly to matters regarding annexation, to HEW, etc. Dr. Carter said that the real problem is being either diplomatic, tactful, or blatantly honest. "When there is a conflict, I go with honesty," Dr. Carter stated this often appears to be a lack of tact. He asked the Quarterly Court members if they thought he was tactless, that they see him on many occasions and have quite a lot of contact with him. Many of these people who consider him tactless only see him on TV or read what he has said in the newspapers. His question to the Court was, "What do you think of my tact? How are these other persons to know? What is their basis of information? Under what circumstances are they drawing this conclusion? Naturally some of those affected by the reorganization are not happy about it." Dr. Carter said that perhaps he should not be so honest, that he will try to change his image, but he does not think he is tactless--he is straightforward and honest.

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Esquire McKinney stated that as a teacher himself, he heard quite a bit of comment about a speech Dr. Carter had made. They felt that it was implied that many teachers chose the teaching profession order to be off during the summer and a lot of the teachers felt that this was an attack on them. Mr. McKinney felt that Dr. Carter had made no effort to rectify this misunderstanding and there were quite a few unhappy about this.

Dr. Carter stated that this was part of that honesty. He felt that the teachers were surrendering leadership to the parent organization, that many comments referring to leadership were those expressed by Witherington. Dr. Carter felt that Witherington was "calling the shots and writing the script." Much of what was said at the Tivoli was the same language and rhetoric as Dr. Carter hears from the other teacher organizations. It was Dr. Carter's opinion that at that meeting at the Tivoli local leadership should have answered some of the comments--"doubled staff," moving more from Indians to chiefs." Dr. Carter said that he was saying the HCEA supported those statements, and the press publicized them, and the public picked it up. These statements came from Aubrey Witherington and the TEA. "It is what I said and what I meant", Dr. Carter stated. Dr. Carter said he feels teachers are not seriously underpaid, that they do need a raise and need to be paid on a par with other teachers in this area and in Tennessee, but for 10 months work it is not a bad salary.

Esquire McKinney stated that the teachers did take advice from the association, but he was not sure of the leadership.

Dr. Carter stated that those who knew better about those charges just let them stand, nobody said that is not accurate.

Esquire McKinney said these statements were made by a few individuals.

Dr. Carter said that local leadership should have put these things into focus before serious damage is done to teacher's image in Hamilton County.

Esquire McKinney asked about the figures they had seen on a financial statement that showed a balance as of June 30, 1975, of \$400,000 when there was supposed to be a 1.7 million dollar surplus.

Mr. Land stated that this was actual cash on hand, that the balance was invested and this 1.7 million that was left would be put into next year's budget. Mr. Land stated that they would be hard-pressed to have \$50,000 left.

Esquire Ball told Dr. Carter that he wanted to "go back to the future" and ask about the County school's maintaining their own maintenance department.

"What are the odds?" Esquire Ball asked.

Dr. Carter stated that the odds were good.

Esquire Ball asked what he meant, "3 to 1, 8 to 5, or what?"

Dr. Carter said that he did not want to appear critical of the present maintenance but the schools do not have sufficient control over them, that the schools are just in line with the total county priorities. The schools do not take priority even in the summer when the maintenance should be done. Dr. Carter told Mr. Ball the "odds are about 10 to 1."

Esquire Ball asked when Dr. Carter was going to be able to tell "that bunch" what ought to be done and Dr. Carter replied, "January 6th".

Esquire Ball asked how long it would take? Dr. Carter said that they would have to get it worked out but that he is very optimistic that what Esquire Ball is talking about will be accomplished shortly after the big question, "Is he going to be there?" Dr. Carter stated that all this has been quite a drain on his time but that he is now getting back into a little more normal routine. Dr. Carter stated that the job of superintendent of schools on a national average requires 70 hours a week so he doesn't expect a short working week.

Esquire Ball told Dr. Carter that the term for superintendent will be four years and that members of the Quarterly Court go out in three years. "Will the door still be open?" Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter.

Dr. Carter stated that he has not excluded anybody and their position on this Court doesn't have anything to do with it. He told Mr. Ball if he resigned from the Court, Dr. Carter's door would still be open. "If an idea has merit, I will take it; if it doesn't I will not. No matter who you are."

Esquire Green asked Dr. Carter why out of 25 teachers hired only 2 were black. Dr. Carter said there were only two black applicants. Esquire Green said that his research showed there were many more who applied than that and he did not think 2 out of 25 was very good.

There was some confusion about the figures. It was finally made clear that there were 53 teachers hired from 692 applicants. There were 25 black teachers who applied and two were hired. Dr. Carter said however that of the 25 black teachers who came in and got applications only two completed the application process and these two were hired. Dr. Carter explained that because of the annexation and the complications with HEW the schools could not plan too far in advance on hiring and did not begin hiring until about three weeks before school started.

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Dr. Carter stated that under the former superintendent only one or two black teachers were hired in the last six years. Dr. Carter stated that they had talked to people at Tennessee State (Dr. Witherspoon and Mrs. Green) and had invited them to send applicants in-- they are planning to hire blacks as they apply.

Esquire Tate said that hiring only two blacks out of 53 persons hired was not very good and they knew that more than two had applied. Dr. Carter asked if to Mr. Tate's knowledge there were more than two applicants. Mr. Green said when teachers apply with the city schools, they also come to the county. Dr. Carter asked if he knew this for sure and Mr. Green said yes. Dr. Carter said that the schools respond to the applications with two letters and give them a telephone number to call to set up an interview. Only two blacks responded and even asked for an interview and these two were hired.

Esquire Sullivan asked Dr. Carter if there is a possibility of a 12-month school year in the near future. Mrs. Sullivan stated that one teacher had voiced concern that they would be asked to teach the whole school year for the same salary.

Dr. Carter said he does not feel this is an immediate concern but that ultimately the year round school will probably happen. Year round school would cost more because of course the teachers would be paid more who worked the full year. Dr. Carter stated that some year round operations would probably be begun (on a voluntary basis) in the vocational schools. Concerning salary Dr. Carter said again that he does not feel that the salary teachers get now is all that bad for 9 months employment but he thinks teachers need to work longer periods of time--the same rate of pay but for more months. Most of the administrators get paid for 11 or 12 months.

Esquire Duggan asked Dr. Carter, "Why do you want to be superintendent?"

Dr. Carter facetiously said, "That's a good question," but said he would answer it seriously. He said, "I have worked real hard to build a nice house. I would like to move in and sit in it one day." Dr. Carter stated that the reorganization has been effective. The attitudes are turning to a productive direction towards real professional performance. He has worked real hard to lay this foundation and he has a desire to finish the job and to see the fruits of this effort. Dr. Carter said it is a waste of the taxpayers' money to go through an 18-month reorganization and then start another one. It would be a waste of tax money to abolish this program now.

"I would be derelict not to attempt to see this finished. I have put in too much work, too many long hours, to let someone else take over. Most of my programs would be changed. It is certainly not because I enjoy the hours and the pressures. I would love to enjoy my family and friends and see my boat."

Esquire Kennedy asked Dr. Carter about the kindergarten program at Ooltewah. He stated that it had come to his attention that a health problem could accrue there--that the children were put on old linoleum. Mr. Kennedy wondered if carpeting had been secured. Dr. Carter and Mr. Colston stated that carpeting was being put in kindergartens that do not have it and plastic mats as well are being secured.

Esquire Ball asked about the work stoppage contingency plans. Dr. Carter stated that with the present experience across the country, it is considered incumbent to establish contingency plans in case of work stoppage: ways of keeping facilities open. There are plans recommended by the Association of School Administrators and others that create less damage to the schools where work stoppage occurs. Dr. Carter stated that one of the associations has asked the county schools for recognition. Another organization has asked for equal rights. Any benefits given to one organization must be given to the others. One of the things in the history of strikes that has precipitated work stoppage has begun with asking for recognition. Dr. Carter said we must look at it realistically. Part of future plans is to develop procedures and programs, and lines of communication.

Esquire Ball asked if these plans would be presented to the teachers. Dr. Carter said he would hope that the teachers would participate in making the plans. "They are not enemies; they are the best teachers in Hamilton County. Our best asset is the teachers in the classroom." Dr. Carter said he believes the teachers are just as concerned as he is. He knows that quite a few of them are upset with him at this point but he hopes that they can communicate. Dr. Carter said that he is trying to meet with every faculty to develop communication lines to parents and taxpayers. They are trying to improve the lines of communication between administration and teachers and between teachers and the community. Dr. Carter stated they are not developing this plan to scare teachers.

Esquire McKinney asked if Dr. Carter was going to visit the faculties to explain some of the statements he had made.

Dr. Carter said he was not going to explain his statements, he was going to explain the economic situation. Some teachers think that these are scare tactics. There is a 2½ or 3 million dollar deficit which must be overcome. Dr. Carter said that he wants the teachers to understand what the financial picture is to encourage them to initiate this kind of communication.

Esquire McKinney stated that the teachers cannot do a good job when they are unhappy, that a month ago very little learning could occur. He thinks things are much better now. Mr. McKinney said that concerning collective bargaining--there is one in Congress now and another one coming up. He asked if Dr. Carter would be inclined to resign if he were forced to recognize this group as a bargaining agent.

Dr. Carter said no, he would not resign.

Esquire McKinney said it was felt that most of the board members seem to feel that if they recognize bargaining agents it would lead to strike.

Dr. Carter stated he did not remember any board member making that statement. Dr. Carter said they feel if they recognize a group it will lead to negotiations, not to a strike.

Mr. Dobson, a member of the school board, said that he did not recall any board member saying that this would probably lead to a strike.

Esquire Tate asked what salary increases would mean in terms of the tax rate.


Dr. Carter stated that they were talking about \$1.00 to \$1.25.

Judge Pro Tem Holder expressed to Dr. Carter the Court's appreciation for his appearance.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Tate, to Adjourn. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

County Court Clerk W. F. (Bill) Knowles called the Roll of the Quarterly County Court and the following answered to their names: Esquire Mack Franklin, Esquire A. C. Ball, Esquire Don Duggan, Esquire Mary Gardenhire, Esquire Benton Green, Esquire Walter Tate, Esquire Gene Holder, Esquire Jim McKinney, Esquire G. M. Adcock, Esquire Paul V. Nolan, Esquire Fred Johnson. Esquires Mac Pendley, T. B. Kennedy and Alma Sullivan were absent. Total present-11. Absent-3.

The invocation was given by Esquire Paul Nolan.

Judge Pro Tem Holder asked Mr. Elliott if he had any comments to make before the Court members asked him questions.

Mr. Elliott stated that he did appreciate the opportunity to come and share time with the Court this evening. He appreciated the fact that they were taking time away from their holidays to talk with him. Mr. Elliott stated that he hoped the members of the Court had received a copy of the letter he mailed to Mr. Holder submitting his application along with a resume. Mr. Elliott stated that he has been with the County school system for 25 years, --on January 3, it will be 26 years. Mr. Elliott stated that he had served in the capacity of teacher, assistant principal, principal, assistant superintendent, and is now assistant principal at Sale Creek School. He has served all these years in Hamilton County. He started at Soddy Elementary as a 5th grade teacher, then was at Elbert Long as a teacher for 7 years. Elbert Long was annexed by the city in 1957 and Mr. Elliott chose to stay with the County. He was then made assistant principal at Tyner High and when the junior high school was completed served as principal there for 8 years. He was then trans-

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ferred to the central office as Assistant Superintendent of Business Affairs and is now assistant principal at Sale Creek. As superintendent Mr. Elliott would hope to bring leadership changes to improve conditions in the Hamilton County Schools

Esquire Franklin asked Mr. Elliott if he would like to express his feelings concerning the amount of remuneration given to the County for the schools that were annexed during the time he was in the central office and was in charge of buildings and grounds.

Mr. Elliott said that he did not know the exact amount but payment was made and he feels that the City of Chattanooga does have the responsibility to pay back to the County for the school buildings and equipment of the schools that have been annexed. Mr. Elliott said he feels that it would be necessary for arrangements to be made by the County Council to ask through the County Judge or to negotiate a settlement with the City for payment.

Esquire Franklin asked how much the payment should be.

Mr. Elliott said he was not sure of the exact figure but that an amount had been computed (by his wife incidentally) and it was a sizeable amount. It would be broken down into general bonds, rural bonds, etc.

Esquire Nolan asked Mr. Elliott which areas he felt needed to have changes made.

Mr. Elliott stated that morale is of considerable concern, that he feels that the morale factor is one of the greatest needs. He also feels that some of the professional personnel could be put to greater use. He also thinks that it is important to establish a more specific and positive role for the school in its community. He also feels that the school principal and the school community should have more direct access to the superintendent.

Esquire Gardenhire asked if there would be any possibility of a conflict in Mr. Elliott's being superintendent and his wife having the position she now holds.

Mr. Elliott stated that he respected his wife's position and he thought that there would have to be (and perhaps there is now) some established policy by the Board of Education concerning two married professionals serving in the system. He stated that there is now a man and wife in the central office but he does not think they are in the same department. He did feel that it was a problem that the Board of Education would have to make some decision on.

Esquire Adcock asked Mr. Elliott to comment on the tax increase of \$1.00 to \$1.25 which Dr. Carter had said would be necessary for next year.

Mr. Elliott said that he did not know where Dr. Carter had gotten this figure but he understood from Dr. Carter's remarks that there would be a 3 million dollar deficit in this year's budget. He was not sure just how much a tax increase would be necessary to raise that amount. Mr. Elliott stated that he would take a hard look at the budget and make adjustments where necessary and request the amount necessary to operate the schools. The tax increase necessary would be the responsibility of the board.

Esquire Adcock stated that if the schools are 3 million dollars short some cuts would have to be made. Where would Mr. Elliott make these cuts?

Mr. Elliott stated that it would be necessary to make some adjustments in personnel. 80% of the budget is in instructional salaries so he would take a real hard look and reduce the personnel where necessary. He feels some reduction of the personnel in the central office is necessary. Also some of the salary increases need to be looked at and adjusted. He feels there could be some combining of jobs to get the most mileage.

Esquire McKinney stated that since reorganization causes some people to be placed in positions not utilized what changes would Mr. Elliott make.

Mr. Elliott stated that he would hope not to make a major reorganization. He feels that few upsetting changes and a more gradual approach would be better. He feels that the County schools should be put into four geographical zones of operation: East Ridge, Red Bank (including Signal Mtn), Soddy-Daisy (including all of the north end of the County), and Ooltewah-Central. The vocational-technical centers would each serve two zones: one would serve Ooltewah and East Ridge and one would serve Red Bank and Soddy-Daisy.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott what tools he would use to see that the classroom teachers did their jobs.

Mr. Elliott stated that some of the tools are mandated by law and are required of tenured and non-tenured teachers. Non-tenured teachers are evaluated more often. Mr. Elliott said that he did not see evaluation as a weapon but as a means of helping. He stated that classroom teachers are not afraid of evaluation and feel that this is a means of helping them and they welcome the help.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott how he felt about the present

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system of specialists.

Mr. Elliott said that he does not think the specialists are being used wisely. Specialists are assigned to certain schools regardless of professional background and training. Mr. Elliott feels that classroom teachers want to be supervised by people who are trained in the area of work that they are teaching. In other words a teacher of science would be supervised by a person trained in that area.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott how effective he thought these specialists were and did the classroom teachers understand their purpose.

Mr. Elliott said they did not, that at the beginning of the term there was quite a bit of concern, the teachers were fearful of what the specialists were doing and how it related to the teachers. Their purpose was not clear cut.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Elliott about the morale problem he had mentioned, and asked if they have the same budget and have to cut personnel won't that cause more of a morale problem?

Mr. Elliott stated that the school budget needs to be gone over very carefully before it is submitted to the County Council. He feels that the teachers would like to know that everything is being done to give them the proper consideration within the budget. If they know proper consideration has been given their position then morale will not be a problem.

Esquire Ball asked how he could keep the morale up if the money just is not there, that the money for the raises this year was taken from the general fund and there would not be that money next year.

Mr. Elliott said that the money for the salary increases this year was from the sale of the portable buildings to the city of Chattanooga, that it did not come from general funds.

Esquire Ball said that the teachers were now asking for a 17% raise (and said in an aside to Esquire McKinney, "That is ridiculous to start with, Jim") but even if they are given 8 or 9% and the state comes up with 4 or 5% and we must match this. How did Mr. Elliott recommend that the schools "wring it out of the County Council"?

Mr. Elliott said he certainly didn't think the County Council would support a 17% raise.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Elliott "how do you get blood out of a turnip?"

Mr. Elliott said the school board should present to the County Council a reasonable budget which could be taken to the people. The people would

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speak their opinions to the Council and then the Council would have to grant this budget. He did not think the State money could be matched by Hamilton County.

Esquire Ball said that Mr. Elliott said that 80% of the budget goes to salaries. He said that this did not figure out right in his head. And if the money is just not there for salaries wouldn't this cause a morale problem?

Mr. Elliott stated that the problems encompass all of the operation of the school system, but teacher morale should be at the top. He feels that sometimes just to make a person feel important might mean more than more money, making a person have a feeling of dignity and knowing someone really cares about what they are doing--this you don't pay off in money.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott how he would have handled the teachers' raise situation if he had been superintendent.

Mr. Elliott said that he thought the school budget was not prepared and considered carefully enough before it was presented to the County Council. Also the Council should have let the teachers know that if there was any possible way of providing the money for these raises that it would be done. A lack of understanding about the amount of funds available at the time made it difficult to ask for adequate funds for an increase. The local boards did not know what funds were to be available from state moneys and therefore had very little to build on.

Esquire Holder asked for further clarification of Mr. Elliott's feelings concerning his wife's position as Director of Research and Project Design should he be superintendent. Did Mr. Elliott think it would be a conflict of interests?

Mr. Elliott said that he did think her reporting directly to the superintendent would be a conflict of interests if he were the superintendent. He also felt that the school board would feel that the superintendent should not have his wife reporting directly to him.

Esquire Tate asked Mr. Elliott if he would have a program where qualified blacks would have the opportunity to secure positions with the school system. Esquire Tate was concerned about the demotion of the two blacks in the school system and the lack of hiring blacks for positions open.

Mr. Elliott said that qualified black persons would be given as much consideration as possible and that he would hope qualified black could be recruited for the system.

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Esquire Duggan asked if he would recruit specifically for black or for qualified personnel?

Mr. Elliott stated that he would recruit for qualified personnel regardless of color but that he would hope there would be blacks.

Esquire Tate said that the reason he made this point was that he and Mr. Green knew that there had been 20 black applicants but Dr. Carter said there had been only two. Esquire Tate said that he is the representative for the 4th downtown Chattanooga district and there is concern from this area about this matter and he is questioned about it.

Mr. Elliott said that he would hope that blacks would feel free to ask for and make application.

Esquire Gardenhire asked about the instructional specialist program. She stated that the program was new and training just completed and she felt it was a little soon for the teachers to make judgments about it. Also she knew that the specialist program was aimed at the teacher's method of teaching, not the content of what they were teaching, so the area of subject did not matter that much.

Mr. Elliott said that the program was fairly new, that the central office personnel, professional personnel, had received instruction in clinical process of supervision. Mr. Elliott said that he did not feel that this was the only way, that it was one way to help teachers. By mechanical process they would see the mistakes that are made. Another way is supervision of subject area and that which is taught and how to deal with youngsters. He feels that the teachers would like to have subject area supervision.

Esquire Nolan asked if they felt that they could not get any assistance from the people they have now.

Mr. Elliott said that they do feel that they have been helped. He stated that the people serving as specialists are well qualified, well trained individuals. But the teachers want help from persons trained in their own subject area.

Esquire Johnson asked Mr. Elliott if he considered the central office over-staffed, adequate, or under-staffed?

Mr. Elliott said that he felt that since the school system had lost some 5,000 pupils with some 7 schools involved in the last annexation there should have been some reduction in central office staff. Yet the central office staff was not reduced, there was an equal number as before annexation or maybe even more. Of course certain jobs have to be there.

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Esquire Johnson asked if there were any items specifically that could be cut down.

Mr. Elliott said that in our support services areas "we are over-staffed." He felt that money could be saved by cutting down and going to zone operation and combining of some jobs.

Esquire Franklin asked if he knew what percentage of some of these salaries was paid by 839 and other special funds.

Mr. Elliott said that he was not sure just which ones are paid by this. Some positions are required by law but he is not sure which ones.

Esquire Franklin noted that if the state supplies total funding of these, then one could not say this part was overstaffed. He asked about the HEW ruling which concerned him, that of allowing a student to continue on in the school if already there. He stated that this causes problems (to him as a school principal) since now a student can move in with a friend and submit a notarized statement and stay there. He wondered how Mr. Elliott felt about this.

Mr. Elliott stated that HEW has had a great influence on how the schools are operated. Mr. Elliott said that last fall through a misunderstanding students were permitted to attend schools in violation of a previous agreement with HEW. The Board of Education had calls about this and the situation had to be rectified. Mr. Elliott stated that he had been in negotiations with HEW before and they were always willing to sit down and look at the problems.

Esquire Tate asked about the rumor that they were going to limit the superintendent's term to two years and asked Mr. Elliott's position on this.

Mr. Elliott stated that he was not sure if he understood the law, that a state law made the superintendent's term four years and a private act limited it to two in Hamilton County. He felt that unless the local law was necessary the state law should supercede this and there should be a four year term.

Esquire Ball asked what kind of man Mr. Elliott would have as head of maintenance, what kind of man he would consider capable of looking after new buildings such as J.P. Brown and other new expensive buildings. Esquire Ball said that he was not knocking school teachers but they did not know everything.

Mr. Elliott said that it would take a sizeable outlay for the county schools to have its own maintenance department. The school maintenance now comes through the county's maintenance department.

Esquire Ball said that now \$300,000 is spent on maintenance and how close could we come having own maintenance with that much.

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Mr. Elliott said that the county did lose some schools, there are now about 41 school buildings in the county system. He stated that there would need to be a person in charge to provide the best maintenance. He said it is difficult to provide maintenance for the schools when it is necessary to go through the county's maintenance department--the schools have no control.

Esquire Ball asked if it would not be possible to have the school's own maintenance department on this \$300,000.

Mr. Elliott said no, it would take probably \$500,000 just to get the buildings, trucks, etc., needed.

Mr. Elliott said that Mr. Monroe has done a fine job in doing what he can. He has seen what Mr. Monroe has done at Sale Creek.

Esquire Ball asked about inspection of new buildings and care of them.

Mr. Elliott stated that some of the new buildings that have central aid handling and support systems built into them require persons with knowledge of that type of structures. Someone is needed to supervise the maintenance of the buildings with this type of equipment.

Esquire Duggan asked who is responsible for inspection in new buildings.

Mr. Elliott stated that when he was in that department it was his job to be with the architect when he made his inspection. The architect prepared a list which he gave to Mr. Elliott who submitted it to the board of education. It is the job of the superintendent along with a person designated by him to inspect with the architect any new building.

Esquire McKinney asked how Mr. Elliott felt about the controversy over the busing situation.

Mr. Elliott stated that he felt the bus drivers in Hamilton County were doing a good job. He felt the school principals should see that routes are properly established. There needs to be a person knowledgeable about the routes to work with the school principals. The bus operators need contracts with adequate protection for their income and their equipment. A contract system is now in operation. If you go into a county-owned system it would require a great deal of money and Mr. Elliott said he did not feel the school board could ask for this amount of money needed to purchase and maintain school buses owned by the County. Mr. Elliott said the contracts should be drawn up in such a way that a person in charge of transportation can maintain an adequate system of transportation.

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Esquire Johnson asked what Mr. Elliott would have done when the State cut the reading funds to take care of this problem.

Mr. Elliott said that he had a very high regard for reading instruction and felt that if anything could be given attention reading instruction should be considered. Reading is one of the basic tools and it is necessary to have an adequate reading program. Mr. Elliott hoped that funds could be found to provide this basic tool.

Esquire Johnson asked if Mr. Elliott would have made reading instructors a priority over specialists.

Mr. Elliott said yes.

Esquire Duggan asked if Mr. Elliott thought Superintendent McConnel's system of supervisors was better than the specialists.

Mr. Elliott said that supervisors were more what the teachers wanted, supervisors of subject areas.

Esquire Duggan asked, "And need?"

Mr. Elliott said yes. Supervision has to be tied in with the teachers, the school principal, an assistant principal or a department head. Even students should be involved. They can give information to help. Mr. Elliott explained that he did not mean that teachers should not have students telling them what to do, but information from students is necessary. Subject area supervision provides the type of supervision teachers want.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Elliott if he was familiar with the 17 law which would be in effect next year.

Mr. Elliott said he did not feel that it would be forced into operation next year, that it would require a tremendous increase. Buses that now carry 66 passengers would only be allowed to carry 44 on the secondary level, not the primary level. This is a federal law but Mr. Elliott hopes that it will not go into effect this coming year. It will make funding even more difficult.

Esquire Ball said the federal government doesn't seem to mind busing of any kind.

Esquire Holder said that Mr. Elliott's former position of Assistant Superintendent of Public Affairs and Operations seemed rather broad. He wondered if our system is such that this is a big job and is it one that one person can handle.

Mr. Elliott said the title was really a misnomer, that it was really

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operations. He was in charge of school plants, new school plants, design, maintenance, transportation, food service and custodial services. There was not a lot to do with public affairs.

Esquire Holder asked where Mr. Elliott obtained his superintendent certification.

Mr. Elliott said from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

Esquire Duggan asked what Mr. Elliott's qualifications were for the job of assistant superintendent.

Mr. Elliott stated that he had been trained in school building planning, that he was comfortable trying to work with transportation but maintenance was very frustrating, that it was very hard to sit back and see things not done. He stated it was hard to judge his performance, that he was happy with some parts of it and not others.

Esquire Ball stated that Mr. Elliott was not too happy with him (Mr. Ball) for a while.

Esquire Franklin asked Mr. Elliott how he felt the cafeterias and food services should be operated.

Mr. Elliott stated that he felt the individual schools should have authority to operate the cafeterias as they see fit. Centralized food services could be used for purchasing for the schools but cafeterias in the schools can exert some pride and community effort if public relations work is done in the proper way. To be handed a menu and told exactly how it is to be done seems a little cold to Mr. Elliott.

Esquire Johnson asked about consolidation of the school systems.

Mr. Elliott stated that consolidation of schools in Hamilton County may have to come about because annexation is gradually making Hamilton County a fragmented system. Mr. Elliott stated that it might be better to have a consolidated form of school planning and operation. It might be fairer for the people to have the schools combined so there would not be so many complications by imaginary boundaries.

Esquire Johnson stated that it is frustrating that to secure \$1, it is necessary to raise \$2.

Mr. Elliott stated that this might distribute the money a bit more fairly. All-over consolidation would bring about a saving of money.

Esquire Johnson asked what Mr. Elliott's attitude was toward HCEA and ACET.

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Mr. Elliott stated that he was now a member of HCEA and had been for 25 years. He feels that there is a very good relationship between HCEA and the Board of Education. He thinks there is a place for professional organization in our system. He feels strongly in favor of an index which is fair from the bottom to the top for all personnel in Hamilton County--a salary index which should be constructed in such a way that a person knows where he falls and knows what to expect.

Esquire Johnson asked if there was not such an index now.

Mr. Elliott stated there was not.

Esquire Duggan asked if what we have now is unfair.

Mr. Elliott stated that it was except in the top level. He stated that a secretary with a master's degree is not paid any more than one with just business training. He feels those with a greater degree of training should have more money.

Esquire Duggan asked if Mr. Elliott felt that the superintendent should be able to negotiate with the teachers.

Mr. Elliott stated that groups have presented requests to the Board of Education, that they are not meeting across the table. He would like to see this come about and he thinks it will.

Esquire Duggan asked if he meant through unions?

Mr. Elliott said through mandates of various groups. He stated that in other parts of the country there have been problems. He hopes that Hamilton County can provide the salaries to avoid interruptions of service by having the proper line of communication open between these groups and the Board of Education.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott if he felt the teachers were making a pretty decent salary now.

Mr. Elliott said of course the salaries are not as high as Oak Ridge but Chattanooga and Hamilton County and Knoxville and Knox County are about the same. Hamilton County may be slightly under Knox County. Hamilton County teachers are about average.

Esquire Duggan asked if Mr. Elliott felt public relations is important or necessary in a system this size.

Mr. Elliott stated that a public relations person could be an important position. A public relations person could impart knowledge of all types from the schools to the public. To bring about better lines of communication would be of value. This is a vital thing. "We are all public relations ex-

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perts. We have to be public relations minded." Mr. Elliot said that a person in the system handling this type of public relations would be of value.

Esquire Johnson stated that everything is of value but asked Mr. Elliott what is vital under the circumstances now.

Mr. Elliott said public relations would not be as vital as personnel, the teachers.

Esquire Duggan asked Mr. Elliott if he were superintendent and the system was going in the hole two or three million dollars, how would Mr. Elliott go about keeping unity.

Mr. Elliott said that he thinks there is a way of trying to evaluate the necessary things the school system has to have in order to function and eliminate or combine that which is necessary to save money. It is necessary to take a real hard look at why certain things are necessary. They should be extremely careful about taking away a job assignment. It is important to evaluate the positions really needed and eliminate those not needed.

Esquire Duggan asked if Mr. Elliott meant any particular subject.

Mr. Elliott said he did not mean in subject area.

Esquire Duggan asked what he did mean--sewing or what?

Mr. Elliott said no, not in areas of the programs within the schools' curriculum.

Esquire Duggan asked if he meant athletics.

Mr. Elliott said no, that much of athletics was supported by the community, that some coaches salaries are paid by the county. He would not be in favor of eliminating athletics.

Esquire Duggan asked him what he would cut.

Mr. Elliott said he would eliminate personnel that was not necessary. He said that 5,000 pupils and 7 schools were lost in annexation and some positions should be cut.

Esquire Duggan said that to make up for \$3 million a lot of positions would have to be cut.

Mr. Elliott said that he was not talking just about the central office.

Esquire Duggan said, "I don't think you have answered me."

Mr. Elliott said you can't cut \$3 million in people.

Esquire Duggan stated that 80% of the budget was in people.

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Mr. Elliott said that they could eliminate some jobs and some would retire and not be replaced. They would of course have to maintain the tenure law. But some positions could be eliminated and some combined. The tenure law says you cannot be demoted.

Esquire Duggan asked if the school board could lay people off.

Mr. Elliott said that if you don't need them you don't have to hire them.

Esquire Green asked how many assistant superintendents there were.

Mr. Elliott stated that there had been five under Dr. McConnell and now there is an associate superintendent and Mr. Rodman had been an assistant superintendent.


Esquire Tate asked why the amount of maintenance had not been cut when several buildings had been lost in annexation.

Esquire Franklin stated that he had heard that the city had five less buildings than the county but almost three times as much money is spent in maintenance.


Judge Pro Tem Holder thanked Mr. Elliott on behalf of the Quarterly Court members for his interest in the position.

Reports on the activities of the Programs Division, Research and Project Design, Food Services and Buildings and Grounds are attached. One other area of particular activity this quarter has been in the department of Pupil Transportation. A study of our transportation system conducted by the Consulting Firm, LKB Administrative Systems, Inc., indicated that considerable improvement could be effected in our contract procedures, routing, scheduling and management. They proposed to operate our system at a savings in our current budget through a lease operation under their management. Alternative proposals were submitted for management under our present system of individual contracts.

Even though it seems apparent that considerable savings are possible through more efficient management, it was my opinion and that of the Board of Education that these benefits are obtainable through internal changes in our management structure. The Board of Education, therefore, rejected all proposals for contracted management services by the LKB firm and directed the required changes in our own management. The manager of transportation was subsequently relieved of his duties and I have temporarily assumed those responsibilities while interviewing applicants for this position.

By working directly with groups of bus drivers in each cluster of schools, I will make the necessary modifications to correct overloads, late buses and major irregularities in routing. This should be completed by January 15, 1976. A schedule of activities has been determined for the new manager which will assure the collection of all information needed to completely revise routing and scheduling for next year, to rebid all routes and to provide in-service training for all drivers well ahead of school opening next September. The complete revision of scheduling is mandated not only for the purpose of efficiency, but for the accomplishment of new Federal Regulations governing Pupil Transportation and the initiation of Vocational Centers.

PROGRAMS DIVISION
MID-YEAR PROGRESS REPORT

July - December 1975

The implementation of the administrative reorganization recommended by Superintendent Carter and a committee of principals and authorized by the Board in March 1975, was initiated on July 1, 1975. During this first phase of implementation, improvements and activities in the Programs Division have been varied, exciting, and challenging.

The Associate Superintendent, Mr. Henry C. Colston, who has led in the day by day operation of the Programs Division, has assisted in the orientation of the six directors to their new roles and has conducted a number of workshops and in-service opportunities for staff.

I. Some of the Workshops for All Levels Were:

- A. Teachers' In-Service, August 26, at the Tivoli
- B. Principals' Workshops in August
 - 1. Programs and Operation Division Administrative Matters
 - 2. Instructional Supervision
 - 3. Personnel Procedures
- C. Instructional Supervision Workshops for all administrators in October-December. (two groups - five sessions each).

II. Evaluation of Workshops

- A. Evaluation of the Principals' Workshop was uniformly positive. Sample remarks are:

"This is one of the best in-service programs I have attended. The analytical approach to the program and its problems with the intended improvements proposed seem to cover all phases of our school system."

"This inservice has been the most pertinent in my experience of five years. It related to specifics that can aid principals, central office, and teachers to make the best situation possible in the classroom with the resources available."

- B. The Instructional Supervision workshops have been very effective in presenting to the specialists, principals, and directors one tool for improving instruction in the classroom. When completed 78 will have had the training, including two from Orange Grove. The first group to complete the Instructional

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Supervision training has evaluated the session; all comments were positive. The evaluation forms show that those participating considered the program very appropriate. Among the comments on this training program are the following:

"The program is very specific in things to do."

"It helps in solving some of the teachers' problems."

"The program was practical."

"The concept of Clinical Supervision allows for a better rapport between specialist and teacher."

"This has been the most helpful workshop I have attended in five years of the administration. I have finally been given something I can use in my school in helping my teachers improve instruction and curriculum."

"This is the first time in my experience to have a follow-up on something new which was presented in the summer. The help and the follow-up and the chance to practice is invaluable."

III. The Superintendent and Associate Superintendent have led the Directors and Representatives from area teacher preparation colleges in developing a student teacher intern program. This program is aimed at providing the student teacher pre-experience in a classroom setting, and an intern experience for an extended period of time under the supervision of a master teacher, and a possible post-intern period.

IV. Curriculum and Instructional Specialist

One of the most important and distinctive facets of the Programs Division approach to curriculum and instructional improvement is the work of the Curriculum and Instructional Specialists. There are 16 of these specialists working at K-6 level, Intermediate Level, and High School Level.

A. In the K-6 Elementary Level the specialist have conducted two reading workshops, one kindergarten workshop with 100 kindergarten teachers in attendance, two Social Studies Workshops and one Art Workshop. The specialists at the elementary level have:

Performed Demonstration Teaching in the Classrooms.
Helped individual teachers with classroom management.
Assisted in combination classroom (Split grades)
Assisted teachers in combining of subject areas in combination classrooms.
Participated in the Parent-Conferences, particularly relating to the combination classrooms.

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Visited all non-tenure teachers in the system.
Visited all elementary schools, with some school being visited as many as six times this fall.

This is typical of the activities of all eight elementary curriculum and instructional specialists.

The Basal Reading Program in grade 1 has been improved by the purchase of the components of the Harper & Row Program. The specialists presented this new material and explained how to use the materials to all grade K-4 teachers. Also transition books from grade to grade are now being used through grade 4. (This prevents a child from reading the book he had had the previous year and offers him new materials. Students who have not mastered skills in grades 3 and yet have been promoted to grade 4 still need help in grade 3 skills; therefore, the transition books will take care of this problem. Each grade has a set of five transition books. These books review word attack skills, comprehension skills and all reading skills.

Specialist have completed the sequence of skills taught in the Harper & Row Program and distributed copies to all elementary teachers.

The Physical Education Program has been made part of the Kindergarten Curriculum. Eleven schools are field testing a PE Guide K-6 for the State. Eight to ten schools have special playground equipment made from telephone poles to teach motor coordination which is a part of the continuum of developmental skills.

A typical program for a specialist is:

One specialist has observed all teachers in K-2 in 7 schools. She has coordinated activities at night for American Education Week at East Gate. She has participated in a Bicentennial activity at one elementary school. She has helped develop a check list for kindergarten children to be sent home to the parents. She has attended two career education workshops and has help evaluated a spelling program as well as serving on the curriculum lab committee.

- B. All the specialists at the intermediate level have helped in conducting two workshops for teachers. All of them have participated in the Instructional Supervision Workshop. Some attended the National Middle School Conference and assisted in a presentation at the conference. A typical example of the five intermediate curriculum and instructional specialists is one specialist who (in the month of October) has conferred with and assisted 54 teachers. Another specialist who is assigned to two Middle Schools has worked with teams of teachers on a daily basis. Still another has visited various intermediate schools on twelve separate occasions. One

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specialist has visited all secondary schools to distribute and work with math teachers on the newly developed mathematics curriculum guide. In each case, all specialists have focused on teachers who need help with classroom instruction as well as with discipline problems. All specialists have met regularly for a monthly staff meeting with the director to evaluate this and plan ways to meet the need for instructional improvement in the classroom.

At the beginning of the school term, all the intermediate and high school specialist visited every secondary school, they were introduced to the faculty, their roles defined and participated in a question and answer period.

- C. At the high school level one accomplishment of the curriculum and instructional specialists was to visit schools daily unless they are in a workshop. Among other areas that the intermediate and high school specialists are involved in are: teacher-parent conferences, principal-parent conferences, teacher and student relations.

V. The Directors' activities for the first school term include:

- A. Working with the Program Division Staff (Associate Superintendent, Program Directors, and Administrative Coordinator) to coordinate a variety of activities. Among these are:
1. Teacher inservice, August 26, slide presentation.
 2. Principals' Workshop, one week for elementary--one week for secondary.
 3. Instructional Supervision.
 4. Regular monthly principals' meetings.
 5. Regular weekly staff meetings.
 6. Personnel application reviews and interviews.
 7. Orientation of faculty and specialists to the role of the specialists.
 8. Consultations with architects, parents, principals, and faculties.
 9. Preparation, review, and approval of job descriptions for all staff.
 10. Work on an administrative handbook for principals and other administrative staff.
 11. Committee work on a curriculum laboratory.
 12. Work with five area colleges in setting up a student teacher intern program.
 13. A variety of activities for professional growth and staff development for all personnel.
 14. Regular reports as required by the State Department of Education.
 15. Visitation of all schools.
 16. Attendance at a variety of professional meetings. A representative has attended all local, state, regional and national meetings.

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- B. Programs are directed by Mrs. Mildred Chapman in elementary education for the twenty-eight elementary schools. During the first semester of the 1975-76 school year Mrs. Chapman has concentrated her efforts on orientation of the eight curriculum and instructional specialists to the task of improving instruction, adjusting the elementary curriculum in face of the budget cut which affected the special reading program, and coordinating eleven Hamilton County Elementary Schools who are field testing a P.E. Guide for the Tennessee State Department of Education Physical Education Task Force.
- C. In Intermediate Education, Mr. Larry Malone has directed the three full-time and the two half-time specialists in a concentrated effort to provide constant personal assistance to classroom teachers in meeting daily and long-range instructional needs.
- D. At the High School level, Mr. Jean Stephens has guided the three specialists in improvement of instruction. The Director (in November alone) personally supervised twenty-one high school teacher's classrooms.
- E. The Intermediate and High School Directors met with the faculty of every secondary school early in the term. Specialists were introduced and their role defined for the principal and teachers.
- F. Mrs. Ruth Benton directs the Child Development Program for Hamilton County Schools. ESEA Title I, OCD, and ARC funds support this program for 400 children. A staff of 64 teachers, health and social service workers, parent involvement staff and aides implement the program. Services are designed to compensate for the educational, economic and cultural deprivation of the boys and girls in the program. During this school term, Head Start has funded a program for handicapped children which provides a mobile classroom to meet the needs of this special group.
- G. Mrs. Dorothy Draper, Director, Career Education and Extended Services, during this first term of the school year has participated in all the activities and staff meetings conducted for the Programs Division Staff as well as directing and coordinating some of the following activities:
1. Construction which is in progress at the Sequoyah and Harrison Bay Vocational Education Centers.
 2. Interviewing and selection and recommendation of a Center Manager for the Sequoyah Vocational Education Center.
 3. Submission and approval of a \$52,000 Exemplary Project in Vocational Education Curriculum Design awarded by the State Department of Education.
 4. Meetings with Craft Advisory Committees and with State staff to develop equipment for the Vocational Centers.

5. A continuing program of planning of orientation and continuing education for the new vocational education teachers who will be employed for the Centers.
6. Completion of a booklet "Career Education in Hamilton County."

H. Mr. Ed Fitch, Director of Support Services has maintained the ongoing activities involved in Support Services. These activities include: preparation of budgets for the year, evaluation of programs with regard to upgrading services and revisions to meet the new organizational pattern, interviewing with regard to job placement within various programs, conferences in all areas (individual conferences and group meetings), and conferences with other directors. The director of Support Services has attended meetings of the various committees and boards on which he serves. These include: Advisory Board of Programs for the Deaf, Manpower Committee, Governor's Committee for Education of the Handicapped, and State Level meetings regarding funding of various programs.

All personnel in Support Services have been implementing programs in all schools. The director has visited various schools to assist in the solution of space needs. The director has participated in a wide range of parent conferences regarding the needs of children within Hamilton County Schools.

FUTURE PLANS

One of the outstanding features of the Programs Division during this first six months has been the excellent teamwork on the part of each Director and each specialist and the entire Programs Division staff. Future planning by the Programs Division includes an in-depth study of the philosophy, goals, and objectives of Hamilton County Department of Education. This study will involve parents, community leaders, teachers, principals, central office staff, and school board members. This planning and study will result in curriculum guides for every level and all subjects.

The writing of the guides is a long term project, extending over two or more years. Preliminary study to prepare a process for developing the philosophy, goals and objectives is already under way.

Additional plans for the Programs Division include careful review of:

1. Staff development programs
2. Personnel assignments
3. Selection and use of instructional materials and supplies
4. Student performance
5. Accountability
6. Continued attention to methods and techniques to improve instruction
7. Implementation of the Student Teacher Intern Program.

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ACTIVITIES REPORT

OCTOBER, NOVEMBER, AND DECEMBER 1975

Research and Project Design Section

Dr. Thelma Elliott, Director

The basic areas of responsibility for Research and Project Design are in research activities, in project preparation, and in related activities such as attending meetings, disseminating information, etc. A brief report of each of these three areas is given below and on the following pages.

In the area of RESEARCH some of the more significant assignments completed or are in process are as follows:

1. Completed a report of the total enrollment as of September 26, 1975 for Hamilton County Schools. This report was broken down by grade levels, by schools, etc. These data are most valuable in planning projects and programs, budgeting, and in responding to requests from community agencies, institutions, and the general public.
2. Compiled a report of total number of City residents attending County Schools and received a report from Chattanooga Public Schools on the number of County residents attending City Schools. The County has 967 students in City Schools and the City has 1,185 in County Schools. These data are important in terms of the 5-year phase-out plan approved by H.E.W. and the projections of enrollment in future years.
3. Prepared a report to the State on school facilities, school enrollment, number of teachers, principals and assistant principals, and bond indebtedness.
4. Responded to a request by Chamber of Commerce for data on buildings, enrollment, teachers, and other relevant information.
5. Communicated data researched from Federal Register to administrative personnel. This information is provided to give staff opportunities to express interest in pursuing requests for grants, special funding, etc. in areas of critical needs.
6. Prepared a report on sites, buildings, and equipment for 19 annexed schools. The initial costs, replacement costs, and remaining bond indebtedness were significant parts of the report. The initial cost for the 19 buildings was \$11,092,958 and the estimated total replacement cost is \$28,042,280.

PROJECT DESIGN ACTIVITIES: The following projects were planned, completed, or required follow-up during this quarter:

1. Food Services Feasibility Study, previously submitted has required follow-up. This project submitted to the State Department of Education is expected to be funded soon. (Budget request \$20,000 for one year)
2. The NDEA III Curriculum Laboratory Project was revised and re-submitted for final approval. The Programs Division staff completed the plan and the R&D staff prepared the copy, and Mr. Colston delivered the project to the Nashville office. (Budget approved \$28,348 for one year)
3. T.O.P.S. Project for Gifted and Talented Students (Talent-Opportunities-Programs-Services) was submitted to Washington in November. The project, if funded, will serve a select group of gifted and talented secondary students. (Budget request \$18,084 for first year)
4. C.O.E.D. Project (Career Opportunities - Exploration and Development) is a project for career education submitted to the State Department of Education in November. If funded, the project will serve Oooltawah High School students. (Budget request \$10,000 for six months)
5. Experience-Based Career Education Proposal for planning grant was submitted to Washington on December 15. This proposal, if funded, will provide the funds needed to develop a project for implementation in career clusters. High school students will have an opportunity to engage in "real live" experiences in the world of work. (Budget request \$4,984 for three-month planning period)
6. Mountain School Mott Foundation Proposal has been forwarded to Flint, Michigan. This request was made to Mott Foundation by the Mountain School Board for funding a planning grant as well as a lesser amount for implementation for instructional staff for the Mountain School on Lookout Mountain. The grant, if secured, will allow the school to broaden its services to the community for all ages and if further funds are granted will also provide a facility adequate to meet its needs. (Budget request is \$26,424 for one year)
7. Project for Indochinese Refugee Children completed December 19, has been submitted to Washington. Hamilton County Schools has a total of eight refugee children for whom H.E.W. will provide \$300 per child. These funds are available for one year only. (Budget request \$2,400)

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Activities Report

October, November, and December 1975

A total of seven proposals have been prepared this quarter by the Research and Project Design staff for a total funding request of \$110,240. In project planning and preparation, time required to prepare a project for a small budget is frequently just as great as that required for large proposals. All of these proposals are for relatively small grant requests.

MEETINGS AND OTHER RELATED ACTIVITIES: Several special meetings have been attended which relate to the work of the Research and Project Design staff's responsibilities and assignments. These include:

1. Meeting in Cleveland, Tennessee on federal funding for combining eight separate categorical programs in one program - the new Elementary and Secondary Education (Title IV, ESEA IV)
2. Meeting in Knoxville, Tennessee, In-Service Education State Task Force for continued planning and developing new or improved programs for the ten in-service days paid by the State Department of Education
3. Professional meetings, planning sessions with community representative and with staff, orientation sessions for programs and projects, task force groups, and others related to both research and to project design. Meetings of the Mountain School Board, Lookout Mountain, Tennessee, were attended monthly as a representative of Hamilton County Schools
4. Continuous investigation of the literature, reports of research, and visitation to remain aware of resources, promising practices, etc.

SUMMARY BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND MAINTENANCE ACTIVITIES

October, November, December
1975

The property for a new Ooltewah Middle School has been purchased, (subject to approval of Tennessee State Department of Education and Department of Health). It is located south of the buildings that presently serve as the Ooltewah Middle School.

Minor adjustments and replacements of defective parts in the heating system of the new Ooltewah High School have been completed. The County Penal farm helped to clearing under-growth on the acreage of the school facing expressway. The formal dedication of the school was held December 2, 1975.

The following schools have had new roofing:

Allen: Main building, auditorium and one of the "older" relocatable classrooms.

Bachman: Main building, also new guttering and downspouts.

Hamilton County Occupational Center: The annex

Red Bank Elementary: Cafeteria, main building and library.

Sale Creek: Library.

Signal Mountain Elementary: Section of classrooms.

Soddy Elementary: Auditorium, library, and several classrooms.

Westview: Section of classrooms of the original building.

Rooms at McBrien and White Oak have been renovated for office use by Supervisors and Curriculum Specialist.

In addition to some unscheduled painting needs at Lookout Mountain Elementary, Brown Middle School and the Central Office, the painting of our buildings is continuing according to plan. We are now re-painting the interior of Red Bank High School.

New science laboratory tables have been installed at Red Bank High and Soddy-Daisy High School.

A new compressor for the heating and cooling unit was installed in one of the "older" relocatable classrooms at Ganns-Middle Valley Elementary. Delivery has been made of \$7500.00 drainage tile to be used for covering a dangerous ditch on their playground site.

The following schools have had needed maintenance and repairs:

Harrison, Falling Water, East Ridge Elementary, Sawyer, Spring Creek, Daisy, Signal Mountain Junior High, Mowbray, Lacey, Snow Hill, Birchwood, Meadowview and Cnetral High School.

The architect for the Dallas Elementary School addition has promised a completion date January (beginning of the second semester) and seems that he will deliver.

* * * *

Dr. Carter stated that a copy of the report had been provided for each Court member. He said that the report is primarily a report of the various departments and directors and the various projects under way--mainly re-search and buildings and grounds. The major area of significance included in the report and not discussed at the called meeting on December 3 regards a survey conducted by LKB Administrative Systems, Inc., to determine whether potential savings and quality of management could be effected. The results of the survey show that many savings could be accrued and many improvements made in the management of the transportation system. Lease arrangements for management had been submitted but the school board rejected these. A new manager of transportation is being searched for. Several applicants have come forward. There are still a few more the Board is to interview and it is hoped that a manager will be named soon.

Esquire Johnson asked if the new manager of transportation would be announced at the next board meeting.

Dr. Carter said he was hopeful that a decision would have been reached by this next Thursday. If all the interviews have been completed the announcement would be made Thursday at the school board meeting at Birchwood School.

Esquire Ball asked if the new manager would be under a contract for a year or a certain length of time.

Dr. Carter stated no given time had yet been set but probably the contract would be for a minimum of three months.

Esquire Tate asked what was the source of the referral of this particular person.

Dr. Carter said that there was no particular person as yet, that there were many applications received from individuals who had heard about the opening--through the news, etc. There were many from this area and a few from out of town, one from Birmingham. There was no public notice of the opening put in the newspapers but of course the news itself was in the papers and a notice was circulated throughout the school system. There were 7 or 8 applications and Dr. Carter was checking on their references and planning to interview each applicant.

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Esquire Tate asked when the closing date for applicants was.

Dr. Carter said that the date given on the notice posted within the school system was already passed but they did not consider it closed.

Esquire Tate asked what the qualifications were for the position.

Dr. Carter said that they were looking for education and experience in the area of transportation. Primarily they were looking for a person with related experience. Dr. Carter said that they don't necessarily need a person with a college degree. A person is needed who has experience in this area, ability in planning and organizing and an ability to meet and deal with people on all levels. Transportation is the first line of public relations. A person is needed who has the ability to communicate with the public and who has a personality allowing him to operate under stress. Experience is primary, Dr. Carter stated.

Esquire Johnson asked if Mr. Rodman's position would be filled.

Dr. Carter said it was not his intent to replace that position. The two areas under Mr. Rodman's responsibility were personnel, which has been taken over by Miss Rudd, and finance, which is now under Mr. Land. Mr. Land has also been given the new assignment of heading up the entire operational division.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for his report.

The next item of business was election of Agricultural Extension Committee members. There were four members whose terms were expiring and they were eligible for reelection: Mr. Miller, Mrs. Brackett, Esquire Ball and Esquire Sullivan. Esquire Nolan nominated these four for reelection. Esquire Tate nominated Esquire Kennedy for the post.

Esquire Ball said that he thought each district had to have a certain number of representatives.

Esquire Franklin said that it was no longer strictly from the farm areas and he felt that Esquire Kennedy's experience highly qualified him for the position.

Esquire Ball said that if Esquire Kennedy was eligible for the post, he could have it in his place.

Esquire Nolan thought that the law stated there must be two people from the farm area and three from the court.

Esquire Johnson said if they were within the law and Esquire Ball wanted to resign, then it would save a lot of time.

Esquire Ball said he would be happy to withdraw in Mr. Kennedy's favor.

Judge Moore secured a copy of the Tennessee Code Annotated and read a portion of the law pertaining to the Agricultural Extension Committee which stated in part that the committee should consist of 7 members elected by the Quarterly Court, 3 of these members should be members of the court and four should not be--two farmmen and two farmwomen residing in different civil districts. The terms are two years--with two members representing the Quarterly Court and one farm man and one farm woman being elected in even years and the other members being elected in odd years.

Esquire Ball stated that he would support Mr. Kennedy.

Esquire Nolan stated that he would withdraw the name of Esquire Ball and nominate Mr. Miller, Mrs. Brackett, Esquire Sullivan and Esquire Kennedy.

ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquire Ball, that the nominations cease and these four be elected by acclamation. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Esquire Johnson, seconded by Esquire Green, placed the name of Esquire McKinney in nomination for the office of Judge Pro Tempore of the Quarterly Court.

ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, that the nominations cease and that Esquire McKinney be elected Judge Pro Tem by acclamation. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Esquire Duggan stated that before the election of the Superintendent, he wanted to say something. At the last Quarterly Court meeting he had asked Dr. Carter to furnish him information pertaining to the cost of administration, a breakdown of the costs of administration when Dr. Carter took over versus the costs of the present time. All the Quarterly Court members approved of this proposal. Mr. Duggan said that he was a businessman, not an educator, and he could take a list of figures and understand it. He asked for this in good faith, not to be picky, and not to indicate that he thought the figures were too high or too low, just for information. Esquire Duggan said that he had asked for this at the October meeting and on October 23 the court members got a list of salaries. He wrote Dr. Carter on October 30 and told him that he thanked him for the information but that this was not quite what he wanted, that he wanted a breakdown of everyone who worked in the central office--he had actually asked for everyone above principals but that was not exactly what he meant. He told Dr. Carter the list he had sent could not serve as a basis for comparison and asked for more information. Esquire Duggan received another letter from Dr. Carter on November 11 in which Dr. Carter stated that he felt what he had sent to Mr. Duggan was a realistic cost and the information he was now asking for would require considerable time to gather and would really have no relationship to the matter. Dr. Carter said that there were 15 instructional positions reporting to the central office and there was another group working with children and reporting to the central office. He also stated that there were complicating factors and many of these salaries are paid for or added to by 839. Dr. Carter said that he would prefer not to keep personnel overtime to compile that information. Esquire Duggan said that he had asked for the information in good faith so that he could understand the budget. He said that Dr. Carter had called him on December 2, and asked to meet with him. Esquire Duggan told Dr. Carter that the information he had been given was not complete, did not include the clerks, etc. Esquire Duggan said that at that time Dr. Carter agreed to furnish him with that information. Esquire Duggan said he had not received it, that he feels any court member ought to be able to ask for and get information he considered pertinent, and he asked if the other court members did not agree with him.

Esquire Pendley told Esquire Duggan that he had admitted that he had

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first asked for the wrong information and that he felt Dr. Carter's time should be spent more in relation to the education of the children, and that any requests should be in writing so that there would be no confusion about it.

Esquire Duggan said that he did request this in writing on October 30, and that he strongly feels that court members should be able to ask for information and get it, and he has not received the information. Esquire Duggan said that he was not ready to vote and would like to postpone the election of Superintendent until the next Quarterly Court and ask Dr. Carter for the information Esquire Duggan had requested.

Esquire Tate stated that he would like to ask for clarification from the Attorney General in terms of the possibility of a two-year term.

Esquire Franklin said that if a member did not want to vote he could abstain from voting, but he did not think the vote should be postponed.

Judge Moore stated that this was not a running debate, that the discussion should be on the motion as made and seconded.

Esquire Franklin asked if that was a second. Judge Moore said that it was.

Esquire Nolan asked if Esquire Duggan got in touch with Mr. Land to get the information. Esquire Duggan said that he did not, that he did not consider it his duty to go to the Department of Education and ask everyone. He did not think he should have to spend his time running over to the Department of Education to get the information he wants.

Esquire Johnson asked about the Private Act that Esquire Tate had been talking about. He said that according to all he had been able to find out that this particular act is valid until proved by the courts to be unconstitutional. Esquire Johnson said that he could see no reason to get the Attorney General's opinion, that they should just vote on a two-year term.

Judge Moore said that this particular law would not be applicable to Hamilton County because it relates to a population classification which no longer includes Hamilton County and has not for a number of years. The law itself may be valid but Hamilton County does not come within that population category.

Esquire Adcock said that he did not think it would hurt anything to get the Attorney General's opinion.

Judge Moore said it would certainly be all right to get another legal

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opinion. He said that the verbage in this law applies to counties of 90,000 or less. Hamilton County has not been in that class since 1944.

Esquire Franklin stated that the Attorney General had given a verbal opinion already and this is that a four year term is applicable for Hamilton County.

Judge Moore stated that this was the court's opinion as well.

Esquire Tate stated that sometimes we think we hear people say something that they don't say and he thought that this is the Attorney General's job and this should therefore be voted on.

Esquire Nolan stated that if we are going by the law that the election of the superintendent should be conducted at the first meeting of the year when the Quarterly Court met in 1956 and quadannually thereafter.

Esquire McKinney asked if any private act no longer applies to a county when the county grows out of the population figure.

Judge Moore stated that this has been the most usual situation, although in some rare instances the courts may have stated that a private act is not self-erasing. The most usual interpretation of a population classification applying to a county says that in the event a county grows out of one classification and into another the law pertaining to that classification is applicable.

Esquire Gardenhire said that with all respect to Mr. Duggan this thing has gotten to be a political football, that it is bad for the school system and Dr. Carter has not done anything to deserve this. Esquire Gardenhire said that she thought Dr. Carter should be asked if he had anything to say.

Judge Moore stated that he could not do that.

Esquire Gardenhire said then that she wanted to thank Dr. Carter for trying to answer Mr. Duggan.

Esquire Kennedy stated that he knew of at least two or three times that groups have had appointments with Dr. Carter and have not been received too courteously. He felt that this was a good place for good public relations. Esquire Kennedy stated that he is for quality education in every sense of the word but he does have this quarrel. He feels that anyone who is a citizen has a right to be received and received courteously. As a matter of fact Mr. Kennedy had had a call just this morning concerning this.

Esquire Duggan said that he did not ask for this information to be nit picky but you cannot look at part of the administration costs figures without

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looking at the others. Esquire Duggan thought that this sort of thing should be kept out of the public eye whenever possible but Dr. Carter had assured him that he would get the figures and he thought it had to be brought up.

Esquire Pendley asked Esquire Duggan if his motion passed to postpone the vote, did he have in mind to open this to other applicants?

Esquire Duggan said that this would be up to the court.

Esquire Pendley said that this would make them look wishy-washy and Esquire Duggan said that he would leave it up to the court.

ON MOTION of Esquire Nolan, seconded by Esquire Franklin, to vote to limit debate and vote on the question. The foregoing Motion was Adopted with 13 squires voting, "Aye" and Esquire Ball voting, "Nay".

ON MOTION of Esquire Duggan, seconded by Esquire Green, to delay the vote on the superintendent until the next Quarterly Court meeting. The foregoing Motion was Denied with Esquires Franklin, Pendley, Ball, Gardenhire, Green, Kennedy, Holder, Nolan and Sullivan voting, "Nay" and Esquires Duggan, Tate, McKinney, Adcock, and Johnson voting "Aye".

Esquire Holder stated that one of the most important appointments this Court makes is superintendent. Esquire Holder said that Dr. Carter was appointed 18 months ago to fill the term and he had shown integrity and leadership ability. Esquire Holder does not feel that education in Hamilton County should have continued transition. Esquire Holder said that it was with pleasure that he nominated Dr. Dale Carter for a 4-year term as superintendent of Hamilton County Schools.

Esquire Adcock nominated Carlisle Elliott for superintendent of schools but stated that he felt the question of whether the term would be two or four years should be under a separate motion.

Judge Moore stated that TCA 49-222 provides for a four year term for the superintendent and this is the code section that applies to Hamilton County and is not a matter for the court members to decide if it is proper or improper.

Esquire Adcock stated that he thought the matter should be decided by the Attorney General or the vote would not be binding.

Esquire Johnson pointed out that the former superintendent had been elected for two two-year terms.

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Judge Moore said that he thought if this had been challenged at the time it would have been thrown out. He stated that it was similar to the drink tax which a number of establishments had previously been forced to pay. Then the Brass Register brought suit because they did not think the law applied to them. As long as the law remains unchallenged, it stands. This law they are talking about previously did apply to Hamilton County but it no longer does. If it had been challenged then the general law would have prevailed.

Esquire McKinney said that what he was about to say he did after thorough consideration. He stated that he had had numerous phone calls, letters and conversations with educators throughout Hamilton County. He did not feel that this should be considered as an attack on Dr. Carter but he felt that in due consideration he could not vote for either of the nominees. Esquire McKinney placed the name of G. Kenneth Wilson of Hixson in nomination for superintendent. Esquire McKinney said that Mr. Wilson had not applied at this time but there was an application on file from him from 18 months ago.

Esquire Green said that he knew that a nomination does not have to be seconded but that he would like to go on record as seconding Mr. Elliott's nomination.

ON MOTION of Esquire Nolan, seconded by Esquire Ball, that the nominations cease.

Esquire Franklin stated he felt that the court had started a very definite precedent that was somewhat dangerous. The first thing was in trying to make a two year term out of a four year term just to give the court more political heft. The second thing was the nomination of a man who had not applied for the office when the court had previously agreed that they would interview applicants and make the selection from that group. Esquire Franklin stated that he was opposed to both of these things.

Judge Moore stated that the motion before the court was to vote.

Esquire Adcock stated that since Judge Moore had allowed Esquire Franklin to speak, then he should let others speak as well.

Judge Moore pointed out that if he had known what Esquire Franklin was going to say then he would not have allowed him to speak, he would have ruled him out of order, that the debate now is to close the nominations.

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The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Judge Moore asked if there were any further statements.

Esquire Ball said that Dr. Carter had been on trial for several months, then they had had annexation problems and HEW to contend with, and he felt it was time to get down to getting the job done and cut out some of this nonsense.

Esquire Duggan said that he wanted to say that he had not brought these things out through personal animosity. He had supported Dr. Carter and was one of his prime supporters 18 months ago. Esquire Duggan stated that he wanted to go on record as saying that any public elected official should be able to ask for and receive information needed, that it might look like he had been nit picking but he had not and he did not appreciate the remarks made by some of the court members.

Esquire Johnson said that he was concerned about Esquire Franklin's statement, that he thought they should abide by the law.

Esquire McKinney stated that Mr. Wilson had been interviewed by the court 18 months ago and he didn't remember any agreement to limit this to those interviewed.

Esquire Franklin stated that he wanted to express his appreciation to Mr. Elliott, that he was in the unique position of applying for the job of his present boss. He stated that he hoped it would never get to the point that qualified people would not be able to offer themselves for a job. Esquire Franklin said he knew that it was not an easy thing to do, that Mr. Elliott is a fine school man and is doing a fine job in the school system.

Esquire Ball said that he agreed with Don (Duggan) on asking for information.

ON a Roll Call vote, those voting for Dr. Dale Carter were: Esquires, Franklin, Pendley, Ball, Gardenhire, Holder, Nolan and Sullivan. Voting for Mr. Elliott were: Esquires Green and Adcock. Voting for Mr. Wilson: Esquire McKinney. Esquires Duggan, Kennedy, Tate and Johnson-Abstained. Total votes for Dr. Carter-7. Mr. Elliott-2. Mr. Wilson -1. Abstentions-4.

Judge Moore declared that Dr. Carter was elected superintendent.

Esquire Duggan asked if it would not take 8 votes as a majority.

Judge Moore said that the way the law reads it simply says an election should be conducted in the same manner and held at the first meeting; it does not say that there must be a majority of the court or of those present.

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Esquire Johnson asked if there would be any objection to his changing his vote (he had abstained on the roll call vote.)

Esquire Holder asked if since Esquire Johnson had passed, could he not just now vote.

Esquire Duggan stated that he felt there was a question that he would be able to vote now since he had passed.

ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquires Duggan and Green, to recess the meeting until next Monday night until it could be determined if the vote should be a majority of the court.

Judge Moore asked if there were any objections to Esquire Johnson changing his vote. There were none.

Esquire Johnson changed his vote from "abstain" to Dr. Carter, making the vote: 8 for Dr. Carter, 2 for Mr. Elliott, 1 for Mr. Wilson and 3 abstentions.

Judge Moore declared that Dr. Carter was elected Superintendent.

Mr. Elliott thanked the court for hearing him and pledged his support to Dr. Carter. He expressed his appreciation to them for being so courteous to him and to his family.

Judge Moore announced that all court members were invited to the Department of Education immediately following the meeting for a reception in honor of Dr. Carter.

Esquire Tate asked Judge Moore since the County Council was first established in 1941 would the changes in population have any effect on the County Council.

Judge Moore said that it would not have any.

Esquire Tate said that he would like to get a ruling on this.

Judge Moore told Esquire Tate that he had just had one.

Esquire Tate said that he was talking about a ruling by the County's legal staff.

Judge Moore told Mr. Tate that he would request of the County Attorney that a ruling be obtained and he would provide Mr. Tate with a copy of the act concerning County Council. Judge Moore stated that it does not say anything about population.

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Dr. Carter stated that he would like to take a moment to express his appreciation to the court. Dr. Carter said he would also like to make a statement in regard to access to information. Dr. Carter said that at the time Mr. Duggan requested the information the department of education was in a real push. Dr. Carter said he did not realize the information Mr. Duggan wanted was of significance for this meeting. Dr. Carter apologized to Mr. Duggan. He also assured the Court that whatever information they might desire was readily accessible and he would try to provide it with all haste. Dr. Carter also stated that he would challenge that he had ever been discourteous to any group appearing before him. He added that delegations might not get the response they desired and if that is considered discourteous, he is sorry, but he will receive everyone courtesouly. He told the court that he would give all of his energy and would work diligently to make Hamilton County the best system.

Esquire Duggan said that he did not understand Dr. Carter's thinking that he would not want the information prior to the election, that he had told Dr. Carter he would like it within the next few days after his request.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, that the following Notaries Public as presented by County Court Clerk Bill Knowles be elected (names of persons approved as Notaries are attached). (Several names were added at the last minute to original list.) The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

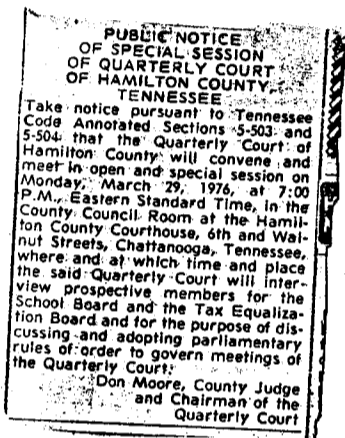

S P E C I A L C A L L M E E T I N G

WHEREAS, this Quarterly Court has not adopted Rules of Order or Procedure, we hereby adopt the following Rules of Order:

- 1 - The Quarterly Court in Tennessee, published October 1972, pages 54; 55; 56; 57 and 58, shall serve as the Rules of Order for this Court; except,
- 2 - The Court shall elect a Parliamentarian or in the absence of a Parliamentarian the Judge pro tempore shall rule on all procedural matters for the Chairman.
- 3 - This shall not preclude the Parliamentarian or the Judge pro tempore from voting on any appeal of a parliamentary ruling.

Judge Pro Tem McKinney stated that they were tonight interviewing several candidates to replace Mr. O. E. Bacon, who had resigned his position as a member of the Hamilton County School Board. Mr. McKinney said that there were ten or twelve candidates for the position and that it would not be possible to interview all of them at this meeting. Mr. McKinney said that in order to have an official meeting, notice would have to be given so the meeting could not be before Friday.

Squire Gardenhire asked if they could have each interview for 15 minutes and then recess.

Squire McKinney stated that he had arranged 30 minutes for each candidate and had asked them to come to the meeting according to the time they were to be interviewed.

Squire Gardenhire asked if one person would ask the questions of each candidate.

Squire Adcock said that it would help matters move along if one person asked all the questions.

Squire Kennedy asked who the people were to be interviewed, that he only had 5 resumes.

Squire McKinney stated that those scheduled for interview at this meeting were: Lee J. Cooper, Kenneth Scarbrough, Ron Derby, Lynah Sherill, Mrs. Hutcheson, and Paul Rich.

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Esquire Franklin asked if this meant they would have a list of questions that they would ask the candidates tonight and at any later meetings. Esquire Adcock said that was his plan. Esquire Franklin said that it seemed to him this would mean that the people to be interviewed tonight would be caught unawares and the later ones would have an advantage.

Esquire Tate said that he felt to have a specific list of questions might cause the same thing to happen as happened in the Academy. He felt it would be better to set a time limit of from 6 to 10 minutes for questions and answers and then allow the candidate 5 or 10 minutes to make other comments.

Esquire Kennedy said he thought the candidates not being interviewed tonight should be excused and notified when they would meet with the Court.

Esquire McKinney said that he knew Messers Scott, Potter, Skillern, and Duggan and perhaps two more were present.

Esquire Duggan said that he would excuse himself, that he did not feel he should sit in on the interviews and had only come for the Court's other business.

Esquire Green asked if there was a cut-off date for accepting candidates.

Esquire McKinney said that the cut-off date could be tonight and any other candidates would be considered for the vacancy that will occur in July.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Franklin, that the cut-off date be tonight.

Dr. Nolan said that they were not bound to elect someone by the next meeting. He said it was his own feeling that it would be better to give notice to people who are interested and perhaps have Wednesday as the cut-off date so that it could be announced and anyone interested might get in an application.

Esquire Holder asked what the cut-off date meant.

Esquire Ball said they would take no more applications. Mr. Ballinger stated that he was here tonight to apply, that he was not aware that he had to make a written application in advance, but he would be glad to submit an application in writing if this was required.

Esquire Gardenhire said that Mr. Ballinger had contacted her tonight by phone.

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Mr. Kennedy said that he felt they did need written applications, that he found it helpful to read them.

Esquire Gardenhire said that this would be no problem with Mr. Ballinger, that he could be interviewed at the next meeting.

Esquire Tate said that in view of the situation that had arisen, he thought it would be proper to have Wednesday as the cut-off date as this would give applicants two more days, and he would so move.

Esquire McKinney said there was a previous motion, made by Esquire Ball and seconded by Esquire Franklin, that the cut-off date be tonight. Esquire Ball withdrew his motion and Esquire Franklin his second.

ON MOTION of Esquire Tate, seconded by Esquire Franklin, that the cut-off date be Wednesday night at midnight. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Esquire Adcock suggested that the Court meet Saturday morning at 9 A.M. to consider the rest of the candidates. Several members could not be present. Esquire Ball suggested Friday night. Several members could not be present.

Esquire Franklin stated that he did not think they should rush this, that the school board could operate one member short.

Esquire Duggan said it would be possible to have an adjourned meeting from this meeting tonight, perhaps on Wednesday. Several members could not be present.

Esquire Adcock said if they could not find a time before Monday for a meeting, why could the regular meeting not be postponed until Monday, April the 12th.

Esquire Franklin asked if the Judge could appoint the member if the Quarterly Court failed to act at their appointed meeting time?

Esquire Adcock said the only instance he had found that the Judge could appoint someone to fill a post that had been vacated was the Equalization Board.

Mr. McKinney felt that postponing the meeting might complicate the granting of notary public commissions since some of the commissions would expire before the Court would meet. He suggested that they go ahead and start the interviews and decide about the meeting date after the interviews.

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LEE J. COOPER - Dr. Nolan said that he had received a letter from Mr. Cooper in which Mr. Cooper stated that he appreciated the Court's consideration of him as a prospective school board member, that he had submitted his application after the urgin of leaders in the community. However, after Mr. Cooper submitted his application another local businessman, Fred Skillern, had applied, and Mr. Cooper wished to give him his support. He asked that the Court interview Mr. Skillern in his stead.

FRED SKILLERN - Mr. Skillern stated that the only thing he wanted to say before questions by the Court was that he has become very interested in the schools in Soddy-Daisy. Mr. Skillern had met with the Superintendent and several other people and when this vacancy came up several people urged him to apply for it. Mr. Skillern said the Court members should have his resume. He stated that many years ago his grandfather was on the school board and both his mother and his father had been school teachers for short times.

Esquire Franklin told Mr. Skillern that he had had several calls in Mr. Skillern's behalf and mutual friends had spoken very highly of him. Esquire Franklin asked if Mr. Skillern would be willing to take a stand supporting a tax raise.

Mr. Skillern said he would take a public stand for money for education. He said he would also make it clear that a little more economy is needed. Mr. Skillern said that some of the frills spent at time on buildings are not really necessary. He said that an example is the gym built 8 years ago at Soddy Daisy High School. He said that it is not suitable for a gym and that it should have been built a different shape. Mr. Skillern said that after he did everything he could to encourage economy, then he would support a tax raise.

Esquire Kennedy asked if financial adjustment was needed, if Mr. Skillern would be willing to vote fairly that a particular school might receive the proper funds, that Mr. Skillern had spoken specifically of Soddy Daisy. Mr. Skillern said that anything he asked for the schools would be for all of them, but that he knows more about Soddy Daisy.

Esquire Johnson asked Mr. Skillern if his business would allow him to take the necessary time, that many of the school board members eat in 2 schools per week. Mr. Skillern said that his home and his business are within 10 minutes of 17 of the County schools and that he would have the

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necessary time.

Esquire Tate asked if Mr. Skillern had children. Mr. Skillern said that he has one child at Soddy Daisy Junior High, that his wife had graduated from Central High School but is from East Ridge and her mother and father now live in East Ridge.

Esquire Green asked Mr. Skillern what was wrong with the gym at Soddy Daisy. Mr. Skillern said that all the area is not utilized, that it is a round building and the seats don't fit right. Mr. Skillern said that the same money built a much better facility in Sale Creek.

Esquire Green said that he did not want to step on a man when he was down but he did want to mention the situation concerning Mr. Bacon. Esquire Green felt that it should be emphasized that this body did not appoint Mr. Bacon. Esquire Green said that this body had spent a lot of time screening applicants. Esquire Green asked Mr. Skillern if he was legally a resident of this County. Mr. Skillern said that he lives in Soddy and owns no other property anywhere.

Esquire Kennedy had no questions.

Esquire Nolan stated that he had "known Fred for some time." Esquire Nolan asked Mr. Skillern if he was willing to hear complaints that would be coming his way, would he be able to handle that sort of thing. Mr. Skillern said that he had given thought to this and wondered if the ratio of complaints to praise would be 99 to 1 or 900 to 1. Mr. Skillern said that he remembered well the trouble and problems his grandfather had had.

Esquire McKinney asked Mr. Skillern if he was aware of the two organizations representing teachers, HCEA and AFT, that are both asking the school board for recognition. He asked Mr. Skillern if he had any opinions concerning the recognition of a bargaining agent for the teachers. Mr. Skillern said that he knew what he read in the papers, that he knew people in his community involved in both organizations, and that he really would not be able to vote either way at this time, but that he would dig into it before he made a decision.

Esquire Adcock asked Mr. Skillern if he had any other children. Mr. Skillern said no. Mr. Adcock asked him if he would be willing to be considered for the July appointment and Mr. Skillern said he would.

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Esquire Gardenhire asked Mr. Skillern how he felt about collective bargaining and teachers' strikes. Mr. Skillern said that under the circumstances now he would not go along with a teachers' strike; however, he felt if "we" did not do our job then perhaps the teachers would have the right to strike "somewhere down the road." Mr. Skillern said that "we" should do a good enough job so they would not have a reason to strike.

Esquire Sullivan said she imagined Mr. Skillern's business experience would be helpful in working on the budget, etc. Mr. Skillern said that he had worked for DuPont for several years and had quite a bit of budget experience there. In Mr. Skillern's present business he does quite a bit of volume and is used to dealing with figures. Mr. Skillern said that his business is very seasonal and more than 60% of it is done during the time when school is not in session because that is when the tourists go to Florida. During November through February he has plenty of time.

Esquire Holder asked Mr. Skillern if he considered the term of 7 years to be too long or not long enough, and if he was elected would he stay involved for the full term. Mr. Skillern said that he certainly could serve 7 years but his own political point of view was that 4 years is long enough for any job. Esquire Holder asked him what type of work he had done at DuPont. Mr. Skillern said that he had started as a wase roller and then been an adviser for that for 8 years.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Skillern if he would be brave enough to draw up a set of plans for new school buildings, and perhaps have 4 sets of state-approved plans and cut out some of the architect's fees. Mr. Ball said that that was a sore point with him in education, that Hixson was one shape and Soddy Daisy another shape, that if you divide the number of teachers into the architectural fees, they could have a raise. Mr. Ball asked Mr. Skillern if he would try to sell them on the idea of a standard plan. Mr. Skillern said that he would certainly try, that he felt very strongly about this.

Esquire Pendley asked Mr. Skillern if he went to church or (facetiously) if he drank a little. Mr. Skillern said that he does not drink or smoke, but does overindulge in food. He stated that he had been in Soddy Methodist Church for as long as he could remember and all of his family goes there. He said that he quit DuPont in 1970, that his son was in junior high and he had coached Little League when his son was involved. Mr. Pendley asked Mr. Skillern if he would plan to ask for re-election after the expiration of

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this term of a little more than a year. Mr. Skillern said that he would know more after this year was over. Mr. Pendley asked Mr. Skillern if he would play favorites to the two members of the Court who are involved in education. Mr. Skillern said that this meant the majority of the Court was not involved in education. Esquire Franklin asked if Mr. Skillern considered the Board of Education a policy making group or an administrative one. Mr. Skillern said that it was a policy-making group but could be administrative without taking any action. He said that when a policeman is out directing traffic he is not there to stop a bank robbery but his presence would help prevent it. Mr. Skillern said the school board would not be there to go directly to the principal but his presence in the school would be partly administrative.

Esquire Nolan asked if anyone in Mr. Skillern's family was presently teaching in Hamilton County. Mr. Skillern said no.

Esquire McKinney asked if Mr. Skillern thought the \$4 a meeting or \$96 a year was adequate pay. Mr. Skillern said that did not enter into it. Esquire Holder said it paid better than the Quarterly Court.

KENNETH SCARBROUGH -

Esquire Franklin asked Mr. Scarbrough if he was elected would he be willing to take a public stand if necessary to ask for a tax raise. Mr. Scarbrough said yes if a tax raise is absolutely necessary he would take a public stand.

Esquire Johnson had no questions.

Esquire Pendley asked if Mr. Scarbrough had children. Mr. Scarbrough said no. Mr. Pendley asked him what his primary reason for concern was. Mr. Scarbrough said that he is concerned because in taling with people between 20 and 30 most of them who have pre-school children have their names on lists for private schools. Mr. Scarbrough stated that he went to the public schools and he is not ashamed of his education. He is alarmed to see people his age turning away from the public schools.

Esquire Tate asked if Mr. Scarbrough thought the city high schools were comparable to Baylor or GPS. Mr. Scarbrough said educationally yes, athletically no. Mr. Tate said that he was not concerned about athletics, that he was more concerned with the academic area. Mr. Scarbrough said definitely they are academically. Mr. Tate asked him how he felt about the problem they've had recently in terms of the budget and money.

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Mr. Scarbrough said that the budget is set up by the school board. He felt the faculties should have some type of say-so, such as do we need more money? are we being paid enough? Administration should set up the budget. Mr. Tate asked Mr. Scarbrough if he was aware of professional courtesy existing in the school system concerning a conflict between a teacher and a parent, that the principal takes the word of the teacher until the teacher is proved in error. Mr. Scarbrough said yes. Mr. Tate asked if he believed in the system that a person is innocent until proved guilty. Mr. Scarbrough said he felt evidence should be substantiated before an accusation is made.

Esquire Green had no questions.

Esquire Kennedy asked the opening and closing times of Mr. Scarbrough's pharmacy. Mr. Scarbrough said 8:30 - 7:00 but he has a relief pharmacist to help him and can be free when he chooses.

Esquire Nolan asked if there were teachers in his family. Mr. Scarbrough said that his wife teaches at Hixson Elementary. Dr. Nolan asked if Mr. Scarbrough had attended a meeting of the school board or had talked with Dr. Carter. Mr. Scarbrough said that he had not been to the school board but had talked with Dr. Carter.

Esquire McKinney asked if he was familiar with teachers' salaries and if he was in agreement with them, if teachers were adequately compensated, and also how he felt about collective bargaining. Mr. Scarbrough said he felt that in any operation he felt that you had to look at the funds available but in the light of inflation periodic raises are necessary. He said regarding collective bargaining, teachers as a group should be able to seek representation. But as far as striking, he did not feel that a person who accepts a job has the right to say he will not serve the public.

Esquire Adcock said that Mr. Scarbrough did not list any community activities on his resume and wondered if he participated in church, school, or community affairs. Mr. Scarbrough said that he had been active in the Boy Scouts and had belonged to the Church of Christ in Birmingham. but since moving to Chattanooga they were still trying to find a church suitable for both his wife and him. He also belongs to his pharmaceutical professional organizations.

Esquire Gardenhire had no questions.

Esquire Sullivan asked Mr. Scarbrough what he thought the problem was

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in the public schools. Mr. Scarbrough said that he believes it a lack of discipline, that when he was in school discipline did not harm him, that he felt a certain amount of discipline and order in a classroom is necessary to allow teachers to carry on and teach.

Esquire Holder asked Mr. Scarbrough if he has children. Mr. Scarbrough said no. Mr. Holder pointed out that if he had children, they would attend city schools and that his wife teaches in a city school. Mr. Holder wondered if he could be objective about the county schools. Mr. Scarbrough said that he was interested in the public school system as a whole to make it a better system, that he would put Hamilton County first, but that it would carry over into other schools. Esquire Holder asked if he thought a 7 year term was too long. Mr. Scarbrough said possibly it was too long, that perhaps it would be best to review after about 3½ years. Mr. Holder pointed out that they do not have any authority after the election as Mr. Tate had previously mentioned.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Scarbrough if he thought it would be a good idea to transfer principals every five years, and perhaps teachers, too. Mr. Scarbrough asked why. Mr. Ball said sometimes people get "sot" in their ways. Mr. Scarbrough said that people do become set in their ways but he thought transfer of teachers would become costly, that teachers accumulate many materials as they teach a a certain place and it would be expensive to transfer. He feels also that teachers have to have a feeling of community, and that it would not be wrong for a teacher to stay as long as he or she was performing their duties.

Esquire Johnson asked if the fact that Mr. Scarbrough lived in the city would influence his feelings about the recent suit between the city and the county over the \$5 million in school buildings. Mr. Scarbrough said that if he sold a building, he would expect to be paid for it, that certainly some reimbursement was necessary.

Esquire Green asked Mr. Scarbrough's age; he said he was 24.

Esquire Pendley asked if Mr. Scarbrough would support a principal or a teacher who had whipped a child. Mr. Scarbrough said yes. Mr. Pendley said what if the child was hurt and the board told the teacher not to do this again and he did. Mr. Scarbrough said if the teacher went against the recommendation of the board or the principal, then the teacher should be dealt with.

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Esquire Tate said he noticed Mr. Scarbrough had been born in Crossville but said he had lived in Chattanooga 24 years. Mr. Scarbrough said that he came to Chattanooga when he was three months old and had been here ever since.

Esquire Nolan asked if his parents lived here now and Mr. Scarbrough said they lived in Hixson.

RON DURBY -

Mr. Durby said that very candidly after taling with several board members he wondered why anyone would want to serve, that it is a thankless position. Mr. Durby said that he felt public education is the basis of democracy and if democracy is going to continue this is the key to democracy.

Esquire Franklin asked how Mr. Durby felt about the remuneration of \$5.12 million which the County is asking the City to pay for the schools annexed. Mr. Durby said that the City certainly owes the County some reimbursement, that it was the same situation as if the City took any other property, that it should be based on fair market value or replacement value. Mr. Durby said that he felt as others do that the City is taking some of the better facilities of the County, for instance Hixson High.

Esquire Pendley said that it might be an unfair question but if the question of bussing were left to the school board, how would Mr. Durby vote if he were on the board. Mr. Durby said that he would probably vote against it.

Esquire Tate asked Mr. Durby how as a member of the Gideons he felt about the separation of church and state. Mr. Durby said there would be no conflict between the Gideons and schools.

Mr. Tate asked how Mr. Durby would feel about compulsory Bible in schools because of the activities of the Gideons. Mr. Durby said that he could see no conflict between the Gideons and the separation of church and state.

Esquire Green asked why Mr. Durby left UTC. Mr. Durby said he left to go to law school.

Esquire Kennedy had no questions.

Esquire Nolan asked if Mr. Durby would have sufficient time for the school board, since they now have two meetings a month, and they are often long meetings, and it is necessary for the board members to go to the schools. Mr. Durby stated that he was a law partner with Clarence Shattuck

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and he is his own boss, at least when he is not required to be in court. Mr. Durby said that he was sure that he would be able to give that much time.

Esquire McKinney asked Mr. Durby what he would propose to do about cuts in the school programs, such as reading, 839 program, etc. if he would be willing to go to the County Council and ask for adequate money. Mr. Durby said that he thought it would just be a matter of time before we would be required to have the schools we want, that he had talked to Dr. Carter. Mr. Durby said that with the per pupil expenditures that the County now has, the system is declining and he feels that it will be necessary to go before the County Council and get more funds.

Esquire Adcock asked if Mr. Durby had children in school. Mr. Durby stated that he has a daughter in Alpine Crest, but who will be at Red Bank Junior High School next year and a son at Alpine Crest.

Esquire Gardenhire asked Mr. Durby's feelings on collective bargaining. Mr. Durby stated that he is definitely against teacher strikes, that he feels some people are trying to force the teachers into this position and that the teachers are against striking but don't know which way to turn.

Esquire Sullivan asked what Mr. Durby considered priorities in budgeting. Mr. Durby said at this time he felt that the facilities in the system were deteriorating, that quite a lot of maintenance should be done to bring the facilities up to standard. Mr. Durby said that after this is done then teachers' salaries should be raised to the level of any other professional person.

Esquire Holder asked Mr. Durby if he is active in any organizations other than church and the Gideons, such as a divic club. Mr. Durby said he has been a-tive in the YMCA. Esquire Holder said that since he was relatively new in the law firm could he allot sufficient time to servide and Mr. Durby said yes. Esquire Holder asked if he thought a 7 year term was too long. Mr. Durby said that his "gut reaction" was that it was too long, although experience is necessary to serve and one must go through an education process. Mr. Durby felt that the term should be long enough so that the other members were not constantly having to teach new men the responsibilities of the board members. He said that 5-7 years might not be too long to do a really efficient job and the experience would become a very favorable factor.

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Esquire Ball asked if in the case of students who habitually abuse other students and school premises Mr. Durby thought that the schools should "put the squeeze " on the parents since the law requires students to stay in school until they are 16. Mr. Durby said he thought it would be better to have vocational schools to send this type of problem to, that everyone is not college preparatory material, and that for students with no desire to go further, vocational education is preferable. Mr. Durby said that if we channel our energies to meet the needs of students we might eliminate some of the problems. Esquire Ball said that since parents are responsible according to law, how would Mr. Durby go about getting parents to be responsible. Mr. Durby said that he did not have an answer to that, if you could do that then we could do away with Juvenile Court.

Esquire Pendley asked Mr. Durby if he would be interested in re-election after serving the short term he is being considered for. Mr. Durby said that he would.

Esquire Gardenhire asked Mr. Durby if he considered the Board a policy making group or administrative. Mr. Durby said he felt the Board should set policy guidelines and that the Superintendent should be responsible for administration.

LYNAH SHERRILL -

Mr. Sherrill said that he was not really sure where we were heading but he feels very strongly about public education. He said that he has five children and feels that there are real needs in education in Hamilton County and in Tennessee. Mr. Sherrill stated that with the background he has had he feels that he can offer something to the community.

Esquire Franklin asked what schools his children attend. Mr. Sherrill said that he has one at Bachman, one at Thrasher, two at GPS, and 1 at McCallie. Esquire Franklin said that he must send his children through 6 grades of public schools and then to private schools, was that it? Mr. Sherrill said he felt if you are in a position to afford private schools, this was what you should do. Esquire Franklin asked where he thought we could better education. Mr. Sherrill said that the basic education in elementary schools is fine and parents can control the kids then but in high school this is not possible.

Esquire Pendley asked how long he had lived in Chattanooga. Mr. Sherrill said 5 years. Esquire Pendley asked how Mr. Sherrill felt about a high school

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on Signal Mountain, if it was decided they could support one up there, how would Mr. Sherrill vote if he was on the school board and would he send his children to that school. Mr. Sherrill said that he would have to wait to see what the school board is going to offer, that there were so many kids on Signal Mountain who go to private schools, but if the school was put up there he would try to support it. Esquire Pendley asked if he would vote for it. Mr. Sherrill said he probably would but living on Signal Mountain spoils the people up there.

Esquire Tate asked if Mr. Sherrill was referring to the environment. Mr. Sherrill said that he objected to what kids were exposed to in the public schools, i.e., alcohol, drugs, social things, that it was hard for parents to control kids. He stated that kids do need some exposure. Mr. Tate asked if Mr. Sherrill felt that Signal Mountain needed a certain type of school, that the county schools would not be suited to Signal Mountain. Mr. Sherrill said that they have had a lot of problems up there on the junior high level, that the junior high up there is not what he would want to have his kids exposed to. Esquire Tate said that then basically the present county schools would not meet the requirements of people who live on Signal Mountain. Mr. Sherrill said the people would not send their children to a school up there if it was like other schools in the county. Mr. Tate asked him if he would vote to give the people on Signal Mtn. preferred treatment. Mr. Sherrill said that he would not put it that way, that the whole county school system could be upgraded.

Mr. Green passed.

Esquire Kennedy asked if Mr. Sherrill would have the time for the school board, that he noticed he was in sales marketing and training. Mr. Sherrill stated that since he had left Westinghouse, he has been with the National Motor Club in Chattanooga and is only out of town a couple of nights a month. Mr. Sherrill asked how many hours a month the job would require. Mr. McKinney said board members estimated they spent about 10 hours a week. Mr. Sherrill felt he would have the time.

Dr. Nolan passed.

Esquire McKinney asked Mr. Sherrill what recommendations he would make for improvements in curriculum such as in reading. Mr. Sherrill said he did not feel that the problems were specifically in Hamilton County, that reading achievement in Hamilton County is probably no worse than all over the country.

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Esquire Adcock passed.

Esquire Gardenhire asked how Mr. Sherrill felt about teacher strikes. Mr. Sherrill said that from a parent's standpoint he felt a strike would "really goof up the kids." But objectively teachers have to make a living and they cannot sacrifice themselves.

Esquire Sullivan asked Mr. Sherrill how he felt about the length of the term and if he were elected for one year would he consider re-election. Mr. Sherrill said he felt that 7 years was a bit too long, that a person would contribute the most in the first two or three years in a job, and that a term of about 3 or 4 years would be long enough.

Esquire Holder asked if Mr. Sherrill traveled a lot in his job with the National Motor Club. Mr. Sherrill said only about two days a month. Mr. Holder asked if his job would give sufficient time to allow him to serve and Mr. Sherrill said yes. Mr. Holder asked where he lived and the number, ages and schools of his children. Mr. Sherrill gave his address as 2028 Corral Rd. stated that this was in Hamilton County, and said that he had five children from 6 to 16, one at Bachman, one at Thrasher, 2 at GPS and 1 at McCallie.

Esquire Ball said he noticed one child had gone to Signal Mountain Jr. High for one year. He asked if Mr. Sherrill could help persuade all these people on Signal Mountain to help the public schools when they send their children to private schools. Mr. Sherrill said he did not know if he could help but he would try. Mr. Ball asked the reason Mr. Sherrill's child only went to public school the one year. Mr. Sherrill said that his 13 year old girl was exposed to things during that one year that he did not feel a 13 year old girl should be exposed to.

Esquire Pendley asked Mr. Sherrill if he perhaps had an ax to grind because of what happened at Bachman. Mr. Sherrill said that there was a "screw-up" in the reconstruction this fall, that people were promised that the school would be ready on September 1 and then started the reconstruction of October 1. Mr. Sherrill said that the kindergarten room was made into a work room and the kindergarten spent the first three months in the library and the whole school was disrupted. Mr. Sherrill said they did a good job, however, and that probably the children don't remember what happened but the parents and the teachers do remember.

S P E C I A L C A L L M E E T I N G

MRS. HUTCHESON -

Esquire Franklin asked Mrs. Hutcheson how she would feel about asking the City of Chattanooga to pay \$5.2 million for the annexed schools plus a portion of the costs depending on the number of children. Mrs. Hutcheson said that on the spur of the moment she really did not know, but she thought it would be all right.

Esquire Johnson passed.

Esquire Pendley asked if Mrs. Hutcheson had children. Mrs. Hutcheson said she had one daughter who was present with her tonight and who works in insurance.

Esquire Tate stated that since Mrs. Hutcheson had taught in the Bledsoe County system from 1951 - 1963 before integration, what were her feelings regarding the integration of black students. Mrs. Hutcheson said that she accepted this.

Esquire Green asked Mrs. Hutcheson her age. Mrs. Hutcheson said that a woman never tells her age; however, since he had asked, she was not ashamed of it, she is 63.

Esquire Kennedy passed.

Esquire Nolan asked Mrs. Hutcheson if she would have adequate time to give to this, that sometimes she would be required to go to meetings twice a month that would last pretty late and she would be required to go into the schools quite a bit to visit. Esquire Nolan said that some of the present board members estimate they spend as much as 40 hours a month on the school board business and that this is quite a bit of time to spend on a non-paid job. Mrs. Hutcheson said that she would have the time to devote to it but that is a small sum of money. Mrs. Hutcheson wondered how much time was left on Mr. Bacon's term. Esquire McKinney told her 1 year and 3 months. He also asked her if she thought teacher salaries were adequate and how she thought the school board could obtain more money from the County Council for pay and to staff schools and maintain the programs. Mrs. Hutcheson answered that she did agree that teachers were underpaid, that most of them try to do the best job for the pupils that they are able, but she did not know how to supplement this pay.

Esquire Adcock asked Mrs. Hutcheson if she thought teachers had the right to strike. Mrs. Hutcheson said that she would rather not comment on that.

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Esquire Sullivan asked how she felt about the length of the term. Mrs. Hutcheson asked if it was two, four, or six years. Mrs. Sullivan told her it was 7 years. Mrs. Hutcheson said that this was a bit different from what she had been accustomed to and she did think seven years was too long.

Esquire Holder asked if Mrs. Hutcheson would be available for a full term after the expiration of Mr. Bacon's term. Mrs. Hutcheson said that that would depend on how she pleased everyone but she thought she would be interested. Esquire Holder told Mrs. Hutcheson that he hated to be blunt but that since Mrs. Hutcheson seemed somewhat upset when she found out the pay, he wondered if she thought this was more like a part-time job that paid more money. Mrs. Hutcheson said she did not really know it was so low. Mr. Holder asked if this would be a problem and Mrs. Hutcheson said not necessarily.

Esquire Ball asked Mrs. Hutcheson if she could support a raise in taxes if the Department of Education called for it. Mrs. Hutcheson said she guessed she could although it seemed that we are already taxed rather heavily. Mrs. Hutcheson asked the time and frequency of the meetings. Mr. McKinney told her twice a month and all begin at 6 o'clock.

PAUL RICH -

Mr. Rich stated that since the hour was late he would not push his luck by talking too long. He stated that he has been in this community for 18 years. He said that this community has been good to him and in appreciation he is offering himself as a candidate to serve mankind in any capacity. Mr. Rich said that the Sertoma Club believes in service to mankind and that his philosophy is that he will carry out of this world what he has done for other men.

Esquire Franklin asked how many children Mr. Rich has and what grades they are in school. Mr. Rich said that he has 2 children and 4 stepchildren and that they are all out of high school. Mr. Rich said he has no vested interest other than to serve.

Esquire Franklin said he noticed that Mr. Rich had graduated from Tennessee Temple with a degree in theology but was he no longer in that field. Mr. Rich said that his entire life had been devoted to service to mankind and that he had invested 10 years of prime time in institutions of higher learning. He said that he is employed now in a non-educational position. However, he said that he was interested in the lives of young ladies and gentlemen and

and feels that he is uniquely well suited to serve on the board. He knows some of the things youngsters need when they go on to college or go to a trade school. He could help to determine the policy and he does have a keen interest in the subject at hand.

Mr. Pendley asked about Mr. Rich. Mr. Rich said that he is in charge of work with TVA in data processing. Mr. Pendley asked if he had any desire for problems in the systems division. Mr. Rich said that if such a thing arose he could certainly be of service to institute any type of computer training in the Hamilton County Schools. Mr. Rich said that if such a thing arose he could certainly be of service but he had no prescribed program in mind at the present.

Esquire Tate and Esquire Green

Esquire Kennedy said that he had

Esquire Nolan asked if Mr. Rich would be able to get off at lunch and would be able to get off at lunch. Mr. Rich said yes, there was no question about

Esquire McKinney asked about Mr. Rich's residence. Mr. Rich said that it was off Lee Highway, that he had lived there about 8 years, but had lived much longer in the County. Mr. McKinney noted that Mr. Rich had left education for business and wondered if Mr. Rich had any solution to the problem of losing teachers to private industry and to other fields. Mr. Rich said he felt there were some teachers the system is better off without but it is a great loss to the system when qualified people find it necessary to leave, that the system and the community both suffer. Mr. Rich said that he had to be completely candid, that he felt in general the solution is money. Mr. McKinney asked if this meant Mr. Rich was in favor of asking the County Council for more money. Mr. Rich said he would have no reservations about defending the need for an appropriate amount.

Esquire Adcock asked where Mr. Rich's children had gone to school. Mr. Rich said his children had gone to Taylor High and Jr. High and his step children had gone to school in Rossville in earlier years. The children are now at Tennessee Tech, Chattanooga State Technical College, and one son is not in College.

Esquire Gardenhire passed.

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Esquire Sullivan asked if Mr. Rich was active in church. Mr. Rich stated that he was a Baptist but (facetiously) that he tried not to let that interfere with his Christianity. He said that seriously he is a believer and he is a christian. He had felt that the general tone of his remarks would reflect that.

Esquire Holder asked about Mr. Rich's job at TVA. Mr. Rich said that four major divisions come under his attention, that he is the architect of the human resources in these divisions, that he has access to all information relative to the needs of those in finance, medical services, etc. He was hired to manage the major projects.

Esquire Holder asked if he thought a 7 year term was too long. Mr. Rich said no. Mr. Holder asked if Mr. Rich would remain in Chattanooga. Mr. Rich said that he had turned down a position that would have given him much greater remuneration. He had made his decision to stay in Hamilton County. He said that he was not born here but had learned to love it, and he intends to stay here and retire and die here. "I am here to stay," he said.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Rich if he was in favor of a standard plan for schools, sets of plans for schools that are state-approved. Mr. Rich said that he felt if a standard plan would do no detriment to the academic program and a savings could be realized by this, then this would be acceptable. Esquire Ball said that they build a round one one day and a square one tomorrow and he felt that they could cut down on some of this to save money. Mr. Rich said that without engaging in lengthy circumlocution he thought it would be better to build a plan and stick to it.

Esquire Pendley asked if Mr. Rich was interested in a full 7 year term after the year and 3 months and Mr. Rich said that he was. Mr. Pendley asked if having 2 out of 7 members of the board working for TVA might be a problem. Mr. Rich said he felt this should not enter into it, but if it was a problem he would hope they could find a solution.

Esquire Nolan asked if Mr. Rich had any relatives teaching here. Mr. Rich said no, his nearest relative was in Atlanta, and he had no relatives in education. He said again he has no vested interest, that it is simply a humanitarian offer of his background and talents, that that is his only motive. He said otherwise he would not be down here keeping the Court members from the ball game.

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S P E C I A L C A L L M E E T I N G

Esquire Ball asked if Mr. Rich had attended school board meetings. Mr. Rich said he had been to city board meetings but not county.

Esquire Green asked where Mr. Rich was born. He replied in Cedartown, Ga.

Esquire McKinney stated that there were five more candidates to interview: Don Duggan, Thomas Scott, Bill Ballinger, Bill Graham, and Sam Potter.

Esquire Franklin suggested that they not panic, that he could see no reason why they couldn't meet on Monday and take care of the regular business of the Court and then complete the rest of the interviews after that.

ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Ball, to meet on Monday and conduct the business of the court and following this interview the rest of the candidates.


Esquire Pendley said that it was his understanding that if they do not act, then the County Judge can appoint a member. Esquire Adcock said not to the Board of Education, that the law only allows this for the Board of Equalization.

Esquire Nolan said that if the meeting is not adjourned then they can wait.

Discussion ensued with suggestions to meet on Saturday afternoon or Monday night or Saturday morning and several members could not meet at these times.

Reports of various directors and the proposed Budget for 1976-77 are attached. The Budget, as proposed, assumes the continuation of all present programs with no additions and a nine percent increase in salaries.

The conversion of our payroll system to County owned Data Processing Equipment has been completed and is operating very successfully. Other programs previously converted to Data Processing this first year have been bus reporting, attendance reporting, purchasing and finance. At present, Mr. Ragsdale and Mr. McDaris are compiling a student data base which can be used for the planning of transportation, scheduling, grade reporting and many other program developments.

The payment for portable buildings and equipment in the most recently annexed buildings has been received from the City of Chattanooga. Another request has been presented to the City of Chattanooga in the sum of \$5,055,370.00 for remuneration for losses incurred by residents outside the City Limits as a result of annexation. This amount is a computation of the remaining indebtedness on the most recently annexed buildings and the replacement costs of facilities needed for students who were "annexed out" of the schools they formerly attended.

The Board of Education has closed two schools for more efficient operation and better opportunities for the students involved. It was determined not to operate Mountain Creek Elementary School next year as we need this facility for other uses and we can accommodate the small number of students enrolled in other schools in the area with a considerable reduction in expenditures. The high school grades of Birchwood School were transferred to Central and Ooltewah High Schools because of the reduced enrollment at Birchwood resulting from the operation of the new Vocational Center on Mahan Gap Road. Additional elementary spaces are needed in the Birchwood - Meadowview area and it was not considered feasible to operate a quality high school program with the small enrollment at Birchwood.

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Report to County Judge, Court and Council - Page 3
April 5, 1976

The plans for the new Ooltewah Middle School were approved by the Board and are presently being studied by the State Department of Education. Bids will be prepared as soon as all approvals are gained. The two Vocational Centers are essentially complete except for equipment. Equipment for the Harrison Center is in the process of delivery, but problems still exist in the funding of equipment for the Sequoyah Center. Commissioner Ingram has taken this matter back to the Building Trades Commission and we anticipate opening on schedule in September of 1977. The anticipated operation of these Centers has required a change in the opening times of all schools. We plan to begin high schools at 7:45 a.m. with elementary schools opening in the 8:30 to 9:00 o'clock range.

Personnel and equipment have been secured toward a centralized yard maintenance program. The purchase and storage of this equipment for individual schools has been a continuing problem. A beginning maintenance crew is also in the process of establishment. A maintenance foreman has been employed and equipment has been ordered for an electrical/plumbing crew to work directly under Department of Education supervision. The expansion of this concept will depend upon an evaluation of the effectiveness of this project.

Mr. Henry Colston has maintained a vigorous schedule of visitation in County Schools, Statewide Colleges and educational agencies. He has worked with college officials in the development of a student intern program and the recruitment of teachers. Student aid guidelines have been developed and the instructional specialist program has been closely supervised.

Six staff members have been enrolled in courses at Chattanooga State Community College, five at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, and one at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES
CAREER EDUCATION EXTENDED SERVICES
MRS. DOROTHY DRAPER

January, February, March 1976

During the first quarter of 1976, the Career Education staff was increased by two members. Jim Smithson was placed in the position of Manager at the Sequoyah Vocational Education Center, and Judy Canavan was transferred temporarily from a teaching position to assist in documenting the year's accomplishments in fulfilling the objectives of the Exemplary Project. This Project has funded a large portion of Career Education activities and two staff positions.

Approval was received from the State Department of Education for partial funding of three positions: i.e., Manager, Sequoyah Center effective January 1, 1976; Manager, Harrison Bay Center, effective April 1; and, teacher of Office Machines Repair, a new vocational class at Sequoyah beginning the 2nd semester of this school year. Equipment for this class was transferred from the Chattanooga Area Vocational Technical School. Students from Red Bank and Soddy-Daisy High School are now enrolled in the course.

In this quarter, we have seen the completion of construction, with the exception of minor details, of both vocational education centers. Each is now ready for installation of instructional equipment. Numerous local citizens have donated many hours of their time to assist in the development of equipment lists and specifications. Our office has compiled a book containing the recommendations of these advisory groups and a record of the meetings. Each person contributing time and advice has received a written expression of appreciation along with a copy of the book, "Career Education in Hamilton County."

As a part of orientation to the offerings available at the Vocational Education Centers, career education staff members met with all high school sophomores and juniors in small groups. The courses to be available were explained, printed descriptive materials were distributed, and students had opportunity to ask questions.

One additional adult evening class in Office Occupations was started at East Ridge High School.

Hamilton County faculties were sent a memorandum describing teaching positions to be open at the Centers. They were given first opportunity to make application if interested and qualified.

Along with the emphasis placed on accomplishing the tasks already mentioned, time has also been spent in cooperation with the Superintendent and his Associate in working with the Director of High Schools and high school principals to develop daily schedules which will allow the most feasible operation of home schools in conjunction with the Centers.

Numerous applicants for vocational education positions have been interviewed.

While the major portion of time has been spent on implementation procedures for secondary programs, regular contacts have been made at the elementary and intermediate levels to assist in furnishing resource materials for career education activities.

Another on-going activity is the securing or development of curriculum materials for Career Education at all levels.

Elementary Level
Mildred C. Chapman, Director of Elementary Education

Enrollment in the twenty-eight elementary schools has soared in several schools and decreased in others. Consequently the system is now serving 12,149 students in the elementary level. There were very few changes in personnel this quarter.

Specialists continue to help classroom teachers. The eight elementary instructional and curriculum specialists continue to observe the teaching techniques of all non-tenured teachers using either the Flanders approach or a clinical approach. Specialists have emphasized good classroom management, individualized instruction and learning centers. Non-tenured teachers have been visited and given help when necessary.

Professional Growth

Since January 1 teachers have attended a series of workshops. Workshops were held at different schools in various areas of the County. Teachers were the program participants, sharing teacher-made materials. Other workshops were conducted in "Handwriting", "Art as Related to Learning", "How to Use Audio Visual Materials", and "Enriching the Curriculum for the Gifted".

Evaluation Study

A self-evaluation using elementary school evaluative criteria of the National Study of School Evaluation was made by the Lookout Mountain Elementary School faculty. The school has been accredited since 1966. In compliance with standards for accreditation, the staff has been constantly evaluating and attempting to improve program and facilities. The Director of Elementary Education and two instructional specialists from the Central Office have been involved. The twenty-eight elementary schools are affiliated with the Southern Association. Lookout Mountain is the only school accredited according to the standards of the Association. A school must choose to do a self-study before it becomes accredited.

Physical Education Survey

Schools participating in the field testing of the State Physical Education Guide will submit a written evaluation of the program by April 15. Kindergarten Teachers who follow the guide will also be asked to evaluate the activities.

Guides

The Hamilton County Director of Elementary Education has been appointed by the State Director of Elementary Education to work with others in the State in revising the Kindergarten Program and State Guidelines.

A general guide is now being formulated for a "Combination Class." It was necessary this year to combine grades: for example, 3 and 4, 4 and 5, etc. Therefore, a guide for instructional purposes is needed.

A sequential guide for teaching reading is being planned for 1976-77.

A teacher's guide for new teachers will be ready for orientation day in the fall of 1976.

Para-professional guidelines for classroom aides are now undergoing a revision. Copies of the revised guidelines will be distributed in the fall accompanied by an orientation session for the aides.

Maps and Globes

Maps and globes for the elementary schools have been purchased.

Reading Materials

Reading materials once used under the Title I Reading Program and later in the State Reading Program are now being used by the regular classroom teacher. Materials are checked out to the teacher following the same procedures for checking out as is followed for library books.

Placement of Student Teachers and Student Aides

Approximately twenty or twenty-five student teachers from various colleges and universities were placed in the elementary schools for the second semester.

In cooperation with Chattanooga State Technical Community College's Student Teaching Aide Program, three student teacher aides were placed - two at Spring Creek and one at Sale Creek.

Bicentennial Programs and Special Music Programs

Many schools have participated in a "Swap-out Program." For example, Lacey Elementary students performed at East Ridge Elementary and East Ridge Elementary gave their program for Lacey students.

Spring Trips

Experiences enhance the learning process, consequently, trips are approved for visiting the Coca-Cola Company, Hunter Art Museum, Burkhart Farm, Chickamauga National Park, Chattanooga Choo-Choo, local dairies, bakeries, and the U.S. Band Concert.

Research and Project Design Section

Dr. Thelma Elliott, Director

The basic areas of responsibility for Research and Project Design are in research activities, in project preparation, and in related activities such as attending meetings, disseminating information, etc. A brief report of each of these three areas is given below and on the following pages.

In the area of RESEARCH some of the more significant assignments completed or are in process are as follows:

1. Computed and prepared a report of Building Replacement Costs for Seven Annexed Area Schools. The statistics were prepared for members of the Hamilton County Board of Education and the Superintendent and released in January to City and County officials and the City School Board. This report reflects over five million dollars requested as reimbursement for the buildings which were annexed in the 1975 annexation.
2. Completed sending out and receiving Recreational Assessment Reports which we were asked to do for the Southeast Tennessee Development District and the State of Tennessee. These were completed, compiled, and sent to the Development District staff and copies placed on file in the Board of Education. This report consisted of an inventory of recreational facilities available through the Hamilton County Public Schools.
3. Completed a Programs and Facilities Inventory Report for the school system at the request of the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Regional Planning Commission.
4. Completed an interpretation and summary of an analysis of the County Technical Assistance Service Report and an addendum of the tax structure and assessment of property tax, revenue sources, and the amounts of money spent for general school purposes by school districts across the State of Tennessee. The technical report was prepared by The Institute for Public Service, The University of Tennessee and The Tennessee County Services Association. Other information assembled in the report was secured from various sources in the local area. The conclusion shown in the report indicated Hamilton County is among the wealthier counties but has a lower tax rate than many others.

5. Reported announcements from the Federal Register to various administrative personnel in the Central Office. This information is provided to give staff opportunities to express interest in pursuing requests for grants, special funding, or resources to meet areas of critical need.
6. Planned with various staff members the process for making a Needs Assessment and developed a form which could be used by the local schools and County-wide staff. These priority needs will be used in establishing the budget for Hamilton County and for allocating funds to the various schools after a budget has been approved. These forms were prepared and organized so that Directors at various grade levels could work with the principals in recording their needs. At a later date these reports will be assembled into a summary report for use by the staff.
7. Prepared an inventory of ESEA Title II materials for the State Department of Education. This report has to be submitted once each year and it reflects an accumulation of all materials and equipment purchased from ESEA Title II, Library Resources.
8. Assisted in organizing the data for the Superintendent from the Budget Priorities Survey sent from his office to the teachers and local school staffs. The report consisted of a tabulation of the thirteen priorities which were ranked by teachers and local school staff and returned to the Superintendent. These rankings reflected the "vote" of the local schools concerning budget reductions in the thirteen areas reflected by the questions.
9. Prepared a projected enrollment report for use by various agencies within the community and for the staff. Several agencies had requested enrollment projections for a five-year period. Many variables make projecting difficult, however we do expect a net increase by 1980-81 of approximately 2,500 students.
10. Prepared a detailed report for the federal office of Equal Opportunity Employment, for the Office of Civil Rights, and for the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This annual report reflects staffing patterns for Hamilton County Board of Education including the employment and assignments by male, female, Black, and White. Information concerning placement in various categories from administration to the service personnel in the school system was requested.

11. Conducted an up-dated survey of City students enrolled in County Schools under the H.E.W. 5-year Phase-Out Plan. This information is needed in planning for next year.
12. Gathered information on Title IX which is the federal regulation prohibiting sex discrimination in education. The school system must make a self-study and develop a plan for elimination of sex discrimination in the local schools as well as in employment practices. This office is preparing information to assist the staff and the local schools in self evaluation in relation to the guidelines of Title IX.
13. Responded to a request from the Superintendent to do an Administrative Costs Analysis comparing this school district with other school districts across the State and within the Region. Information has been gathered and the staff is in process of preparing the report.
14. Requested information concerning pupil transportation in other school districts of a similar size in Tennessee. Requests were made of Nashville, Knox County, Shelby County, Sullivan County and Greene County to determine the program and plan of transportation in these counties, particularly those that are serving Vocational Education Centers. Responses have been received and transmitted to the Manager of Transportation.

PROJECT DESIGN ACTIVITIES: The following projects were planned, completed, or required follow-up during this quarter:

1. Prepared a project and transmitted to the Tennessee Arts Commission, Nashville, Tennessee in which funds were requested to provide performing arts programs for elementary and secondary schools during 1976-77.
2. Completed a project for maps and globes and transmitted it to the State Deptment of Education. This project included NDEA Title III funds for the '76 school year. The project was approved and the funds released for purchasing the materials.
3. Transmitted a request to H.E.W. for funds for Indochinese Refugee Children enrolled in Hamilton County Schools. From a survey made in December, it was determined that eight children qualified for refugee children's funding of \$300 per child. An up-date was made to determine whether additional children were enrolled in the system but no others were reported.

4. Organized a meeting and initiated a preliminary discussion on a Community Education Program. A meeting has recently been held to receive orientation from the staffs of the State Department of Education and the University of Tennessee - Nashville who work in the area of Community Education. If such a program is developed, the facilities in the school system will be utilized for all community residents.
5. Assisted in the preparation of a project for ESEA Title IV which combines several categorical funds. ESEA Title IV-B, Library Resources and Learning Center Materials will be completed and transmitted in the early part of April.
6. Received notice that two grant requests were not funded. One project was for a planning grant for Gifted and Talented Students which was not approved by H.E.W. as a planning grant, however it may be further developed and transmitted as a fully developed project by June, 1977.

Also, the State Department of Education notified the Superintendent that they could not fund a feasibility study in the Food Services area. This notification was received recently following our having made an application in the fall for assistance in the feasibility study area.

A project for Vocational Career Opportunities developed for Ooltewah High School was not funded. One project was selected for each Development District (10 county area) and the one selected for our district was awarded Sequatchie County.

7. Transmitted a preliminary proposal for consideration for a grant of \$5,000 for NDEA III, special funding for instructional materials and supplies.

Dr. Carter pointed out that the County had received \$267,000 from the sale of the portable buildings and equipment therein and were asking for another \$5,550,370 from the City of Chattanooga for the main property of the schools annexed. Dr. Carter stated that the Board of Education has decided to close Birchwood High School and also Mountain Creek Elementary, that there are very few children in that area.

The budget for 1976-77 is \$23, 789, 972. Revenue expected will come to about \$19 million which will leave the schools over \$4 million short. Dr. Carter pointed out that the \$1,700,00 needed this past year to operate was placed in the budget from reserves and these funds will not be available this next year. This budget is calling for a 9% increase in teachers' salaries. Dr. Carter stated that the figure for transportation is a very rough estimate \$504,000. He said that about one half of this amount will be needed to provide transportation to the vocational centers. Most of the other half will be required by Standard 17, the law which reduced the number of students riding on a bus. Dr. Carter said this figure could vary one or two hundred thousand. Dr. Carter said that the money from the State for transportation comes to the County for County and City and part of the money is passed to the city on the basis of ADA. Dr. Carter said that \$2.3 million is needed for this year added to the \$1.7 million they did not receive last year.

Esquire Kennedy asked Dr. Carter if this increase was across the board, did it include instructional specialists. Dr. Carter said it was for all personnel. Esquire Kennedy asked what visitation Mr. Colston had done. Dr. Carter said that Mr. Colston was out of town right now but that he had visited five major colleges in this area recruiting for the student intern program.

Esquire Holder asked if this 9% increase applied to all personnel. Dr. Carter said yes. Esquire Holder pointed out that the director of transportation's salary for 1976 was \$14,770 but in 1977 would be \$17,028, and that worked out to 12 or 13%. Dr. Carter said that the 9% increase is on base salaries but with step increases in some cases it would amount to as much as 12%.

Dr. Carter said that they hoped to put it on a scale to increase on each step. Esquire Tate asked what the step increases were based on. Dr. Carter said that it was based on time. Esquire Tate asked if the members of the Court could get information on step increases as they are connected with degrees. Dr. Carter said that the salary schedule has step increases for every year up to 15 years for each degree. Dr. Carter said that they would mail a salary schedule to each Court member.

Esquire Johnson asked Dr. Carter about the \$20,000 decrease under administrative salaries from last year. Dr. Carter stated that this was due to Jack Rodman's death for the most part, although the other administrative positions of Mrs. Cooper and Mr. Monroe had both had reductions in salaries. Esquire Johnson asked if the school board did not receive a budget that was broken down more than the one presented to the Court. Dr. Carter said they received the same one.

Esquire Adcock asked if a more complete one was not prepared for the State. Dr. Carter said that there are computer printouts prepared monthly for the board and that any member of the Court could come by the Department of Education and see these monthly printouts.

Esquire Johnson asked about the research that Dr. Elliott had done relating to the questionnaire sent out to the teachers concerning priorities. Dr. Carter said that due to a misunderstanding the data collected did not give the kind of information they had wanted. Dr. Elliott explained that the questionnaire had been designed to reflect the "vote" of the local schools concerning priorities for budget reductions in 13 areas. The teachers were asked to rate the areas from 1 to 5 but some checked the top 5 and some took only 5 and the results were contradictory. Dr. Elliott said that the highest priority was budget reduction was to reduce instructional specialists, 2nd was mandatory retirement at 65, and 3rd was transportation cuts. Most were directed at central office personnel, Dr. Elliott stated. Dr. Carter said that it was hard to reduce these questionnaire to statistical certainties, but there was no question that teachers would prefer that the reductions be made in ways that did not directly affect them, that the attitude was "cut everybody but me." Dr. Carter said that this material was at the central office if members of the Court would like to see.

Esquire Nolan said salary increase for principals was \$176,000; he asked how many principals there were. Dr. Carter said at present there are

51 and that this increase reflects the same % increase at base as for teachers. Dr. Carter said these figures did include an increase in summer work for junior high and elementary principals although this has not been decided for sure and cannot until the budget is approved. Dr. Nolan asked how much the principals do work. Dr. Carter said that high school principals work 12 months, junior high will be increased from 11½ to 12, and elementary increased from 11 to 11½, and all of these include 2 weeks vacation.

Esquire Holder asked if the priority survey just pitted the various elements one against the other. Dr. Carter said that he would not want to put it that way, but that people are concerned about the areas where they work. Dr. Elliott said that she wanted to make a statement of explanation. She said that she should have prepared the questionnaires more carefully, that the instructions were not made clear. She stated that after they got the results they found that they did not ask what they thought they were asking and what they wanted to know and she could not defend the way the survey was done.

Esquire Tate asked about Dr. Elliott's report for the federal office of Equal Opportunity Employment and Civil Rights and for HEW concerning employment and assignments by male and female and black and white. Dr. Carter said that there was nothing to submit as yet, that this requires self-evaluation in schools to be submitted by May 20 and then will be summarized and distributed and published in the press.

Esquire Kennedy asked if the immunizations will include the flu shots. Dr. Carter said the program will not include the flu shots, only smallpox, diphtheria and whopping cough. Esquire Kennedy said he understood the flu vaccine would be distributed nationally. Dr. Carter said that he would have to check with the Health Department but that it might be expensive. Esquire Kennedy said that he thought the national government would take care of it. Esquire Franklin said problems arose when you let the federal government do it. He said that this past year the government had decided that on the lunch program any students 19 or over have to pay 75¢ for the same lunch an 18½ can get for 55¢. Mr. Franklin said that even internal revenue allows a son or daughter to be counted as a dependent until age 25 as long as they are students. Mr. Franklin said that it's getting to the point that the red tape involved in federal programs take more time than it's worth and he wouldn't

recommend getting the government involved in immunization programs.

Dr. Carter added that this thing on the 19 year old had only come up about a month ago and that it was made retroactive for the whole year and involved quite a bit of work although there are not too many 19 year olds in the schools.

Esquire Ball suggested that when the government brings something like that out why don't we just say we don't have time and see what will happen.

Dr. Nolan asked what percentage of the budget was actually federal government funds. Gary Land of the Department of Education said only a little over 1% although with Mrs. Benton's salary added it might be 3½ to 4%. Dr. Nolan suggested that maybe we ought to cut them off. Dr. Carter said of course the principals are not paid any more to do this. He added Dr. Henry had recently said that federal funds were up 7% and regulations were up 50%. Dr. Carter said that it is getting to be quite a burden but it must be done and that the principals respond very well.

Esquire Pendley asked if the schools opening and closing times would change with the time change. Dr. Carter said no, but the schools will open 30 minutes earlier next year by having the high schools begin an hour earlier than they have in the past but the time will stay the same all year. He said they felt the problem of high school students going before daylight was not as dangerous as the elementary school beginning earlier.

Esquire McKinney asked where the \$1.5 million in capitol outlay funds would go. Dr. Carter stated that the cafeterias at Harrison and Red Bank are inadequate and there will be 4 additional classrooms at Soddy Daisy Junior High. He said that they don't have sufficient classroom space at Harrison and the 5th grade will be moved to Brown. Dr. Carter said that another elementary school is needed in the Hwy 58 area and additional space is needed at Soddy Daisy Junior High. Also some schools need new boilers and several buildings have had new roofs. The renovation program needs to continue.

Esquire Tate asked under what Title the Headstart program comes. Dr. Elliott said this actually comes through Human Services.

Judge Moore stated that it had been suggested that Items 5, 7 and 8 needed to be considered further and that this meeting of the Quarterly Court should be adjourned until 7:00 P.M. on Monday, April 12.

Dr. Nolan stated that several of those applying for school board member were present for interview and that he wanted to move that the Court go ahead at this meeting and interview those here.

ON MOTION of Esquire Nolan, seconded by Esquire Ball, that those present desiring interviews for the school board member's position be interviewed at this time and then the Court recess until 7:00 P. M. next Monday, April 12, when the Court will choose the school board member and members of the Equalization Board.

Esquire Franklin stated that he would like the Court polled to see if they could not elect the Equalization Board at this meeting. Dr. Nolan stated that because of the number of school board candidates that had been interviewed and were still to be, they had almost completely neglected the Equalization Board and he felt they needed more time to evaluate this.

Esquire Franklin pointed out that the Court had had notice two weeks ago that the Equalization Board was to be elected at this meeting and he felt they had had ample time to consider these and did not feel they should delay action on this just because some individuals had not taken the time to consider these.

Esquire Adcock said that he would second Dr. Nolan's motion to interview the candidates today and then recess until 7 P.M. April 12 for the rest of the agenda. Esquire Franklin asked that the motion be amended to consider Item 5 (Equalization Board) at this time.

ON MOTION of Esquire Franklin, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, to amend Dr. Nolan's motion to consider Item 5 now.

The foregoing Motion was denied with approximately 4 Esquires voting "Aye" and the remainder voting "no."

Clerk Knowles asked the Court if they would agree to considering names of additional candidates for Notary Public commissions who apply between now and April 12 at the meeting on the 12th. Mr. Knowles explained that the County Court Clerk's office always has a number of persons whose commissions are expiring and who did not know of the meeting of the Quarterly Court and it would be a great service to the business community if the Court could consider these names at that time.

Dr. Nolan stated that he would include this in his motion.

Esquire Franklin asked what the status of the Equalization Board would be since the terms had actually already expired.

Judge Moore stated that the Equalization Board would continue to function until their successors had been elected. Judge Moore stated that it had been suggested that if the Quarterly Court does not elect then it would be up to the County Judge to make the appointments. Judge Moore stated that he had no desire to make those appointments and that the Court's motion to recess until the following Monday would meet the legal responsibility.

Esquire Adcock said that the Equalization Board would not meet until May. Esquire Kennedy stated that in regard to the Board Mr. Key would be delighted to serve another term.

The Motion to interview applicants for the school board at this meeting then recess until Monday, April 12, at 7 P.M. in the County Council room to vote on the Equalization Board members, additional Notaries Public, and the school board vacancy was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Esquire Tate complimented County Court Clerk Bill Knowles on the information sheet his office has compiled for notaries.

Judge Moore stated that there are a number of excellent officials in Hamilton County of which Mr. Knowles is one.

7. DON DUGGAN

Esquire Franklin asked Mr. Duggan what his position as a school board member would be concerning a raise in taxes since the superintendent in his report had given a budget with an increase of \$4 million. Mr. Duggan said that he certainly is not against an increase in taxes for education, but at this point it is not clear where all the money has gone. He feels that it should be made clear if the schools have used the money they have gotten efficiently, if the money has been used to the best advantage. Esquire Franklin asked him if he thought they probably had enough money but were not using it wisely. Mr. Duggan said he was not sure they were using it efficiently. Mr. Duggan said that he supposed it would be more popular just to say yes he was for it.

Esquire McKinney said that time was a problem at this meeting and he suggested that the court members keep the questions as brief as possible. Esquire Johnson suggested that other board member applicants who were present might respond to questions (when it is their turn to be interviewed) that have been asked to other applicants.

Esquire Pendley asked Mr. Duggan if he felt that being a member of the Quarterly Court was an advantage or if it might be a conflict of interest. Mr. Duggan said he did not feel it was an advantage. Esquire Pendley asked if the fact that Mr. Duggan had been opposed to Dr. Carter as superintendent might create a problem. Mr. Duggan said he did not think it would make a problem.

Esquire Green said that he knew Mr. Duggan had once run for County Council and asked if he would be seeking another position before his term was up for school board member. Mr. Duggan said he would not be seeking another office for this year term.

Esquire Kennedy passed.

Esquire Gardenhire asked Mr. Duggan what he thought qualified him for the job better than the others applying. Mr. Duggan stated that he is a businessman, and he feels that in appointing someone to fill this one-year term it should be someone who knows what is going on and that he has attended a good many of the school board meetings and has a pretty good concept of what is going on.

Esquire Nolan said that in the past Mr. Duggan's views on the school budget had been in the newspaper and Mr. Nolan was told by a teacher to be careful about voting for Duggan because he said he did not want a raise for teachers. Mr. Duggan said that he felt that anyone in any occupation should be paid well if he does his job and should be given cost of living increases.

Esquire McKinney said since there is no provision for merit raises now would Mr. Duggan be in favor of giving all the teachers raise. Mr. Duggan asked what kind of raise. Mr. McKinney said 9% increases. Mr. Duggan said he thought it would be wiser to wait and see how much money the County Council appropriates for the schools but he thought that in general a 9% raise should be given. Mr. McKinney asked if Mr. Duggan would go with Dr. Carter to the County Council and say this is what is needed and Mr. Duggan said he would if this was justified.

Esquires Adcock and Sullivan passed.

Esquire Holder asked Mr. Duggan's position on tenure. Mr. Duggan said that he did not like it too well but did not really know what could be done about it. He feels that generally speaking people should be paid according to the quality of the job they do and he had rather see incentive raises given.

Esquire Johnson asked Mr. Duggan if he would vote on the election of the school board member. Mr. Duggan said that he thought by law he could but that he would not. Mr. Johnson asked him why after spending the time to get elected to the Quarterly Court he would give up that job for a job on the school board of just one year. Mr. Duggan said that he would have two years left on the Court but he felt that he would be more productive in the year on the school board.

Esquire Ball asked Mr. Duggan if he was thinking about re-election after that one year was up. Mr. Duggan said at this time he was just going with the one-year term, but after that one year he might ask for another term. He said that he felt 7 years was a little too long, that he would like to see it cut to maybe 4 years.

Esquire Pendley pointed out that when Mr. Duggan was elected to the Quarterly Court he assumed the responsibility of electing school board members as needed and now he says he will not vote on this. He asked if Mr. Duggan were elected to the school board and a matter came up involving perhaps his next door neighbor and the school board, would he refuse to vote? Mr. Duggan said that if it concerned anyone but himself he would vote but that he could not be impartial where he himself was concerned.

Esquire Gardenhire asked him if he meant that he would rather not vote for himself. Mr. Duggan said that he could not be impartial where he was concerned.

Esquire Franklin asked if Mr. Duggan considered the school board or the superintendent as policy making or administrative. Mr. Duggan said that he felt the biggest responsibility of a board member was to set policies, that he felt if the teachers wanted to blame someone when they don't like something they should blame the board and not the superintendent. He said that he did feel the school board members should know about the school system and should get out and visit in the schools.

Mr. Duggan said that he appreciated the Quarterly Court members listening to him and that he would do his best if he was elected.

HAL A GRAHAM, SR.

Question by Esquire Franklin: What are the ages of your children and where are they in school?

Ans.: I have a son who is a senior at Knoxville and a daughter at Cleveland State. They attended schools in this County, jr. high at Tyner and senior high at Central.

Question by Esquire Pendley: What could you add to the school board since you do not have children still in the system?

Ans.: I am interested in the improvement of Hamilton County Schools. I suppose you would have more of a working interest while your children were in school; however, after they are out people should be able to contribute a little more when they have more time. While the children are in school PTA, etc., take extra time.

Question by Esquire Kennedy: The school board will meet for two meetings monthly and for special meetings. You are involved in many other activities. Will you have the necessary time to devote to this?

Ans.: Yes, compared to what I have done in the best, I have time right now. I am active in the steering committee and that meets once a month for lunch. My other work for the college is strictly a counseling service with the seniors in the surrounding counties three or four times a year.

Question by Esquire Tate: What involvement do you have as a member of the steering committee of the Citizens' Committee for Better Schools?

Ans.: I have been on this committee for about 3 years and I cannot think of anything we have taken action on during that time that would conflict with anything done by the school board. We do make recommendations, but this would not affect the way I feel.

Question by Esquire Tate: You would vote your convictions instead of how the steering committee felt?

Ans.: Yes

Question by Esquire Gardenrhie: How do you feel about teacher's strikes?

Ans.: My background is labor and personnel. I am not too much in favor of unions when it comes to teachers. They are educated and should be able to represent themselves.

Question by Esquire McKinney: Do you think teachers are adequately paid and if not do you consider a 9% raise reasonable?

Ans.: 9% is reasonable since they did not get much last time. Some are overpaid and some are underpaid. This gets down to individuals and what they contribute. If we could divide hours into time spent and money paid, some are overpaid and some underpaid.

Question by Esquire McKinney: Could you devise a system of award?

Ans: I would try it; I would see how much time is spent.

Question by Esquire Adcock: I am not familiar with the Citizens' Committee. Could you give me some background, members, officers, etc.?

Ans: The steering committee does not have a lot of contact with the whole committee. The steering committee meets once a month, the whole committee once a year. Harry McKeldin is chairman.

Question by Esquire Adcock: What is their particular philosophy?

Ans: The committee was organized to promote activities to give better schools for the city and county. I don't know how many are in the entire committee; the steering committee has 12 - 13 members.

Question by Esquire Sullivan: You say you are interested in improving the schools. Do you have a feeling of certain needs for improvement?

Ans.: No, not specifically. I don't know the "insides" of the school board.

Question by Esquire Holder: Your address is Route 3, Ooltewah. Are you considered a legal resident of Hamilton County?

Ans: Yes, this is between Ooltewah and Summitt.

Question by Esquire Adcock: What street?

Ans: Apison Pike.

Question by Esquire Johnson: You have probably read in the papers of the suit against the city for annexed schools. Do you feel we should or should not do this?

Ans: That's kind of a hard question. There should be some sort of remuneration because of the split when the bond issue came up. The city got 50%. Now the city should give some of that 50% back. How much, I don't know.

Esquire Ball: You've already answered my question.

Tate: How is the committee made up.

Ans: I don't really know the history of it back when it started. I was asked to be on the committee when the principal of Harrison School asked me to serve.

Tate: Is the committee appointed by districts or what?

Ans: I think somewhat by districts.

Tate: I wondered if the committee is representative of the people how it is formed.

Ans: I was just asked to serve.

Pendley: Has the committee taken a stand on bussing?

Ans: No.

Pendley: How do you feel personally?

Ans: I believe schools should be community type schools. When you bus someone across town anything like the PTA is out, any community activity and that is what builds schools.

Nolan: Are you related to anyone in the school system?

Ans: No.

Ball: You are associated with teachers. What do you think about discipline? As a board member you might be able to exert some effort in this area.

Ans: I do know there are problems. We need to have some discipline by the principals.

Kennedy: You said you are against bussing. The County schools have recently established two vocational centers and without bussing it would not be possible for most pupils to get to these schools.

Ans: That is a different type of thing. Vocational schools are teaching a specialization and I was not taking into consideration the technical schools.

Pendley: You have been associated with Mr. Millsaps. Would it be possible for you to be on the school board and not lean toward Central.

Ans: I'm from Marion County and we always hated Central anyway.

Esquire Gardenhire: Bussing is a moot question.

Esquire Pendley: You will never have the privilege of voting on it.

Graham: You Court members have the responsibility to select the best applicant. I do not feel this is a political appointment or a popularity contest. I will not call anyone. I simply ask you, if I am the best qualified, vote for me. If I am not, don't vote for me.

RONALD COX

I attended schools in this County through the 9th grade, and then private schools 10 - 12 grades, and then attended UT. I have some knowledge of this area and have an interest in it. Because of my interest in the school system here and in education and the quality of education and with my experience, I should be able to make a contribution to the board. I am willing to try to do so. I feel that the primary function of the board is setting policy. I feel that it is very important that you understand what you are trying to do in education and to provide tools. The budget for the schools is pressing. I have been involved in trying to make budgetary decisions. I do think teachers as a general group would be deserving of a pay increase. 9% is not out of line. I would agree that some teachers deserve a greater increase and some not as much. This entire matter is one in which the board can exert interest if not authority by the proper evaluation of teachers. I would recommend trying to reward them on a merit basis. This is difficult in this system.

Franklin: Do your three children go to private schools? You said that you were educated in private schools.

Ans: I went to Sunnyside Elem., Brainerd Jr. and then to McCallie for the 10 through 12th grades. Then to UT and Rice University. I have three children, 2 girls aged 6 and 1 and a son aged 4. My daughter is in Signal Mountain Elementary kindergarten. I expect that they will all attend public schools. Possibly at the high school level they might attend private schools. I have no criticism of the public school system. It was a tough decision for me when I was trying to decide to go to McCallie.

Pendley: Since you live on Signal Mountain, what about a high school. One group wants one there and one does not. Would you be pressured by your neighbors?

Ans: I would have pressure both ways. I would want to look at all the factors and not act under pressure.

Kennedy: I wonder if time might not be a factor for you in serving on the school board. The board meetings do take quite a bit of time.

Ans: Time is always a consideration. I have given this thought. It would be unfair to say that I could always be there whenever a meeting was called. I would be available for the two meetings a month and would always try to attend the special called meetings. There is a possibility that I could have conflicts.

Tate: According to your resume I find that your total experience has been on the management level. How would you relate to the poor and the have-nots. Basically you have been associated with big industry. Have you had any association with people in lower areas of income?

Ans: If you go back in my background, you will see that I did not come from the upper level. I would have no problem in associated with any person regardless of status.

RONALD COX (cont'd.)

Johnson: How do you feel about the suit concerning the recovery of money from the city schools for the annexed schools?

Ans: I would need to study all the factors involved and then decide on the basis of the number of students, debt retirement, and the over-all economic picture. The County should have some compensation; how much I don't know.

Sullivan: Are you a member of a particular church?

Ans. I am a member of Signal Mountain Baptist Church.

Holder: As director of AutoSee, with all the activities you are involved in, would time to serve not be a problem?

Ans: I have given considerable thought to this and I do think I would have the time to devote and do a good job.

Holder: Do you have any thoughts on tenure?

Ans: There are some good points to it and some bad points. Tenure is the recognition of a person's performance. In that sense it is good. The burden in particular areas rests on administration. The board should be concerned with evaluation of teachers and administration carry out review and award tenure. The benefits of tenure are minimal.

Gardenhire: Do you have any family related to the city or county school system?

Ans: No.

Nolan: Would you tell the Court where your family lives?

Ans: I grew up in Brainerd and then moved to Murray Hills. My parents now live in Murray Hills. I live on Signal Mountain.

Johnson: Why do you give green stamps at AutoSee?

Ans: In an effort to insure that certain information is sent back. These simply encourage people to keep certain data. The stamps are relatively inexpensive and provide an incentive.

Franklin: AutoSee is a federally funded program. Do you feel that your stay in Chattanooga is permanent or could you serve at least this year?

Ans: I am employed by UT on special assignment. There is a possibility that I could move but I do not anticipate this.

Pendley: Would you ask for re-election after one year?

Ans: I would look at it from a one-year standpoint. See how I perform and let others see my performance.

Ball: Do you think 7 years is too long for a term?

Ans: Yes.

LARRY HOENIG (Hā-nig)

Hoening: I am coming with open mind and willing hands to apply for the school board position.

Franklin: I would like to get your reaction to a problem of money dispute. 57% goes to the city based on ADA. Bonds on the annexed schools have not been retired. This leaves the County with a debt. Do you feel this lawsuit is our only recourse?

Ans: I have not given this a lot of thought. I would like to look into this and rectify it if possible--it doesn't seem fair that Hamilton County schools only get a minor portion of the money that is raised. The city should have to remunerate the county in some way for the schools that were taken.

Pendley: You have two boys in college at Georgia Tech. Did they go to high school here?

Ans: They went to Red Bank Junior High and then one to City and one to Red Bank High Schools.

Pendley: You used Dr. Henry and Comm. Franklin as references. Why do you want to be on the County school board?

Ans: I have been through the County schools and active in the PTA. I know their problems. I know a lot of the teachers. You mentioned Dr. Henry and Comm. Franklin. I know them because I have had boys in the Chattanooga Boys Choir.

Green: Referring to the fact that you are a supervisor at Combustion. I am an employee at Combustion. I did not know you. I feel that you should have tried to get in touch with me. I am serious about that. I have been at Combustion for 10 years; I am on first shift in Bay 31.

Ans: That is one of my favorite hang-outs in nuclear engineering. I do know quite a few there but I guess our paths did not cross. I would like to look you up. I am not a politician.

Adcock: There's some question about Benton (Green).

Kennedy: What is your attitude about teacher tenure and salaries?

Ans: Since I heard that question the first time I have been trying to figure out what to say. Teachers are professionals the same as engineers, lawyers, etc. They should be willing to display ability and get compensation commensurate with this ability.

Tate: Checking through your resume I fail to see an area of involvement with poor people. Do you have direct contact with poor people.

Ans: In the Boys Choir.

Tate: There would not be many poor boys there.

Ans: We do have boys in the Boys Choir on scholarships. Some of the boys come from families too poor to pay the \$7 a month needed for this.

Tate: Basically what relationship have you had directly with poor people?

Ans: We also relate to the entire family in the Boys Choir. The whole family joins and the parents do come in. We work closely with them. I sometimes go on tour with the boys and live with them.

Adcock: Do you live inside the city?

Ans: Yes, I was in Hixson, am now in Chattanooga.

Adcock: Will your work at Combustion allow you to serve? Are you aware of the amount of time involved?

Ans: Yes, I am aware of the time. I have talked with Mr. McKinney and also with Bob Proctor, who serves on the City School Board. I know that there are two meetings a month plus special meetings. Evening meetings would not conflict with my work at Combustion. I have discussed this with my immediate supervisor and he felt that it would be satisfactory for me to be involved in meetings during the day. In the past I have been in the Engineers Club and they met once a week at noon, usually for about 1 hour and 15 minutes. This went on for over four years and there was no problem about taking the time off. There were also executive committee meetings. The company looks favorably on participation in community affairs as long as you get your job done.

Nolan: Are any members of your family in the Hamilton County school system?

Ans: No.

Holder: The school board meets on the first and third Thursdays. Would this be a conflict with the Boys Choir?

Ans: No. My executive committee meetings are as I schedule them.

Holder: The term is 7 years. Do you consider that too long?

Ans: That is too long. I have been in the Boys Choir about 12 years.

Gardenhire: In what respect do you know Dr. Henry, Comm. Franklin, and Larry Malone?

Ans: Malone was principal at DuPont when my children were first there. Then he moved to Red Bank Jr. High School. I knew him working in PTA, etc., and I think he is one of the finest principals in the County. Comm. Franklin had boys in the Choir and as I said we work with the whole family. Dr. Henry was principal at Chattanooga High School when my son were there and then his son Mark joined the Boys Choir.

Ball: Sometimes the board meetings last from 6 p.m. until 12 or later. I know you engineers like to mull things over before you make a decision.

Ans. But the decision is good when it is made.

Ball: How will all you engineers together ever make a decision?

Ans: It depends on the urgency of the matter. If you have to decide right away you go with the information you have. It would bother me if I had to make a decision without the facts. Chemical engineers are a little different breed. They can go with less data.

THOMAS SCOTT

I have a wife and three children. I feel that each person owes something to his community. I feel that a person should make himself available or should not have complaints when the office is not carried out right. I think that I can help the school board.

Franklin: Are you children in school?

Ans.: My oldest daughter is a freshman at UTC, my second child is at Brainerd High School, and my third is in the 8th grade at Brainerd Jr. High.

Pendley: With children in the city schools what is your interest in the Hamilton County school board?

Ans: It is a point of objectivity. My background with various organization make me objective to problems facing the Hamilton County board. I am not a native of Tennessee; I am a native of Georgia. I have gone through different academic procedures. My objectivity would be better for this situation.

Kennedy: Do you feel that you would be able to make a specific contribution to the board?

Ans: I could only contribute or help. Other board members would have the expertise. I would have the objectivity to help pull the board together.

Adcock: Do you feel the County should have reimbursement for annexed schools that the city took?

Ans: I don't know about "took" but I feel the buildings should be paid for.

Sullivan: Do you own a home in the city?

Ans: Yes, in Brainerd.

Holder: As you know, you would be filling the unexpired term of 1 year and 3 months. Would you be willing to make yourself available for a full 7 year term?

Ans: I think so. That's a little far off.

Holder: Do you think 7 years is too long?

Ans: Slightly long.

Gardenhire: Do you have any family teaching in the school system.

Ans: No.

Ball: You probably heard Mac Franklin's discussion about the federal lunch program concerning those 19 having to pay the full price for lunch. Would you be willing to tell the government that we don't have time to keep all these records?

Ans: Unless a child is retarded, why would he still be in school at 19?

Franklin: That is only one year behind.

Ans: I feel that each pupil in the system should have the same benefits.

Pendley: How do you feel about bussing?

Ans: This is not a current issue. It is a matter of who is being bussed.

Holder: What do you mean by "who is being bussed."

Ans: When I was a boy, I walked to school. When anyone is inconvenienced, bussing is the culprit. Bussing is not really a factor, it is just for getting from one place to another.

Franklin: I assume you mean that you walked to a neighborhood school. Are you in favor of breaking up the neighborhood schools?

Ans: If you are saying that students should get their education as close to home as possible. But setting up exclusive neighborhoods is not good. The school system as it once was was pretty bad. It's just a matter of naming bussing as the culprit, or open housing, or setting up a community and isolating it.

Franklin: Have you described the Hamilton County schools or the city schools?

Ans: I am describing it as I see it. Bussing is not the problem.

Franklin: What is quality education?

Ans: To develop an individual according to the highest potential that can be reached. Much can be done in this particular school system.

Nolan: The highest potential should be to make a worthwhile contribution to family, community, and country. Highest potential can mean different things. Al Capone developed to his highest potential.

Kennedy: Bussing does not concern the school board. We are laying too much stress on bussing and overlooking the highest goal which is quality education.

Green: Is there any other information about yourself not included on your resume? I know a lot of good things about him.

Ans: I have experience with Boy Scouting.

Kennedy: I think highly of Mr. Scott; he is a fraternity brother of mine.

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BILL BALLINGER - 4846 GlenMar Circle, Chattanooga 37416
(at the end of Murray Hills Drive - in the city)

Ballinger: The reason I am here is at the insistence of my neighbors and friends. I have been in Hamilton County since 1911. I believe in serving my fellow man.

Franklin: I know him well. There is no need to ask any questions.

Pendley: Do you have children in school.

Ans: I have grandchildren in school. I have a grandchild in special education. He is bussed 16 miles from Hixson to Sunnyside. My other grandchild is in kindergarten in a Hamilton County school.

Pendley: What would you consider your strong point?

Ans: I have been interested in schools since I graduated from high school, both academics and sports.

Adcock: I have known Bill Ballinger for years.

Johnson: You are a Methodist; what is your church affiliation?

Ans: For 48 years we were members of St. Andrews but when we moved we transferred our membership to a young church. We have two daughters who are adopted and we were foster parents before that.

McKinney: How do you feel about teachers' salaries?

Ans: I am interested in teachers' salaries. My judgment would be limited to law and I would make a decision based on law. I heard some other remarks made. Some of these have merit but this would be limited by law.

Nolan: What about your children?

Ans: I have one daughter who lives in the Hixson area. She is Mrs. Carol B. Hubbuch; her husband is at Combustion. They have two children. Their son is 6½ and is deaf but has had special education and is beginning to hear and even beginning to speak. My wife died December 4. My other daughter has one child and lives with me. Concerning the questions about "poor," who can call whom poor. My mother was widowed in 1918 with 7 boys. When she died she had the home paid for and in her name. This is a result of what you can do regardless of being poor if you have ingenuity and perseverance.

Sullivan: With you experience in schools do you see any great changes in the county schools?

Ans: I think things have been taken out of perspective. We do too much for the retarded and too much for the gifted and are not taking care of the majority. Holder: Are you retired now?

Ans: Yes, I was with Chattanooga Glass Co and am now retired and have plenty of time.

Holder: Are you interested in serving both this partial term and the full 7 year term.

Gardenhire: Do you know Dr. Carter and could you work with him?

Ans: I would disagree with him sometime but can work with him. I've never net anyone I could agree with full time. I received a life time pin in PTA and it happened to come about at the time we were celebrating our 50 year reunion of graduating from high school. I graduated in 1927.

Gardenhire: Would you be interested in a 7 year term?

Ans: I am not pursuing this application but I would serve.

Ball: Do you think 7 years is too long?

Ans: That is an extremely long time but I might change my mind after serving.

Ball: Would you have any thoughts about asking the Legislature to cut the term down to 4 years?

Ans: You wouldn't want to lose a good person when you had them.

Kennedy: Do you think the program of the superintendent is a good program?

Ans: I don't know what his program is. I do think that schools *per se* are neglected. The school grounds at all schools need work. You would have to see if the money was available to make a decision on what to do.

Kennedy: Capital outlay was part of his program.

Green: Are you in good health?

Ans: At this time, yes sir. I have just returned from a 10-day trip to the Holy Land. I feel very good.

Franklin: You are closely aligned with Central. Some decisions might change some situations at Central regarding teachers-pupil ratio, etc. Can you make decisions that might go against people you know?

Ans: I would make the decision at the time it was asked for. All my activities have been outside the school board. The school board had no control over the decisions in it.

Franklin: I was not criticizing what you have done.

You have a very difficult task choosing a school board member from the gentlemen I have seen today. As you only have one opening it is unfortunate for those not elected that there is not some way of providing an outlet for these people. I did not submit a resume, but I could mail one to you. I graduated from the University of South Florida College of Engineering. I have been involved in all aspects of the education process. I have been an instructor in private institution in Long Island. I have been in coaching. And in industrial education at Combustion. I have been involved with youth in scouting and in jr. achievement. My office is at Combustion Federal Credit Union. I live in Daisy at 126 Hatlin Drive, telephone 332-4795.

McKinney: I will give you a list of the Quarterly Court members and you can mail a resume to the members.

Coffeen: I am married with two children who are pre-schoolers, one attends nursery school at Daisy.

Franklin: Will you send your children to public schools?

Ans: I plan to send them through public schools. Private schools offer something that may not be in public schools. I was a mathematics instructor at a private high school in New York and I see some advantages to that type of education. Green: What is your age?

Ans: 29. I plan to be around for the next 7 years. I go to the Y after working. I support the Y.

Adcock: How do you feel about teachers' unions and their right to strike?

Ans: I am not for teachers' unions. Teachers are professional people. They should be able to bargain for themselves. I do believe in merit increases. It is nice to have cost of living increases as well.

McKinney: I am a teacher and I am a member of the union. Could you work toward recognition of one of the organizations if the teachers in Soddy Daisy wanted it?

Ans: I would like to hear teachers viewpoint. I don't think unions are for the good of all. Teachers are capable as professional people and should represent themselves. I don't understand exactly how school unions are set up.

Sullivan: You have been in Daisy for 3 years. Where are you from?

Ans: I came here from Long Island, N. Y., but I was raised in South Florida.

Sullivan: What is your reason for wanting to serve on the school board?

Ball: How would you go about providing merit raises? There are over 1,000 teachers. How would you determine who was deserving?

Ball: There you have a finished product.

Ans: You are building a product. We are building people in the school system. Each teacher is contributing and can be encouraged to do a better job.

Pendley: Did you like the school system you went to and why?

Ans: I attended Hialeah High School; they are doing progressive things.

Franklin: Have you visited other high schools?

Ans: As a wrestling coach I have been in other schools.

JACK DIXON

After following most of the applicants I find that the way they answered your questions I might be a little backward. This is my first encounter. I live at 308 Bass Road, telephone 892.6602. I am 40 years of age and was born in Haversham County in north-east Georgia. I came to Chattanooga 12 years ago. I am married with two daughters entering high school next year. My wife is a professional classroom teacher in Catoosa County schools, has been there 9 years. I am with Selmon T. Franklin Associates. My daughters attend school in Georgia but will be going to the Hamilton County or city schools next year. I do own property in the county at Ooltewah.

Franklin: Do you feel that working for an architect would be a conflict of interest?

Ans: No, I do not feel it would be a conflict of interest. I have been in construction all my life. My father and brothers are in construction. I am employed as a construction administrator. Prior to that I was with a construction co.; I came here from San Juan. My father-in-law is a Methodist minister. My mother and father are Baptists. My wife did not want to go back to the Virgin Islands so we chose to stay in Chattanooga. I have been associated with the construction of several of the large buildings in the Chattanooga area. I know where all the schools are. I have been associated with the remodeling of several of the school buildings over the last 10 years. I know the problems of the buildings. Franklin Associates do not know I am here right now; I may not have a job when they find out that I was here. I'll be honest. I went to a Catoosa County school board meeting. I was concerned at the way this meeting was conducted. I mean no reflection on their procedures. I just felt there were things I could contribute.

Franklin: Have you been to Hamilton County school board meetings?

Ans: No.

I have three sisters all three of whom are teachers. I have a brother who is an instructor at a North Georgia trade school. I would like a chance to serve and do whatever I can for the community.

Pendley: Are you a church member?

Ans: My father-in-law is the pastor of Newman Springs Methodist Church. I was Presbyterian and my mother and father were both Baptists. When I married my wife, I became a Methodist. I have been on various boards in church and have been chairman of the finance committee. I am very active in church.

Holder: We appreciate your sitting for 3 or 3½ hours through this meeting.





ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Adcock, that the following Notaries Public as presented by County Court Clerk W. F. (Bill) Knowles be elected (names of persons approved as Notaries are attached). This was a list of additions to the original list which was presented and approved at the April 5th Quarterly Court meeting. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Clerk Knowles told the Court that the election of Notaries was a real problem since the names are only approved every three months at the Court meetings. He explained that when a business has someone who quits or possibly dies, there is the problem of replacing them immediately since many businesses cannot operate well without the services of a Notary Public. Mr. Knowles said that in the case of a real emergency, he had been polling the members of the Court by phone for their approval of a certain person.

ON MOTION of Esquire Adcock, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, that Mr. Knowles check with the State Attorney General's Office to see if he can be authorized to poll the members of the Court by telephone to elect Notaries between Quarterly Court meetings in the case of an emergency.

Esquire Nolan asked Mr. Knowles if this would help, or wasn't that what he was doing now?

Mr. Knowles said that is what he is doing now, but only at the Courts' agreement and only in emergency situations.

Esquire Adcock said that could be done once every two weeks or once a month. Mr. Knowles said that he did not want to take advantage of the situation. Esquire Nolan said it would be all right any way and if there were any objections they could be voiced at the next meeting.

Esquire Johnson asked if it was possible to appoint these people subject to approval at the next Court meeting.

Mr. Knowles said it is a formality but once a Notary is elected there would be difficulty rescinding it.

Esquire Franklin suggested that a limit be set on the time. If there is less than a month remaining until the next meeting, then the person would have to wait.

Esquire Nolan asked if anyone had not been approved by the Court. He said he remembered once quite a while ago there was someone, but out of the thousands in the last 10 years, he didn't remember anyone who was not approved. Mr. Knowles said that there had been no one not given approval since he had been in office.

Esquire Johnson asked Mr. Knowles if he had any suggestions as to how to do this. Esquire Johnson said if it was agreeable to the Court, they could give Mr. Knowles some latitude to act in emergency situations. Esquire Adcock said he felt it would be agreeable to all of them but he questioned the legality of this. He said that was why he had suggested getting an opinion from the Attorney General, that the Code says that the Quarterly Court should elect Notaries Public.

Esquire Pendley pointed out that it would not be necessary for Mr. Knowles to contact everyone, that once he got a majority of the Court to approve a name, then he could quit.

Mr. Knowles suggested that he devise a form on which the Court members could indicate their approval or disapproval of an applicant and then simply mail back in to the Clerk's office. He stated that he would not abuse the privilege of getting approval in this manner and would only send them the form when absolutely necessary.

Esquire Holder stated that they had the responsibility of filling an unexpired term and they felt it important to appoint someone with the knowledge of the working of the school board.

Esquire Holder nominated Don Duggan for school board member.

Esquire Kennedy nominated Thomas L. Scott for school board member. Esquire Kennedy stated that Mr. Scott is an insurance man who has been a citizen for 25 years and has children in the schools here.

Esquire Sullivan nominated Fred Skillern from Soddy as school board member.

ON MOTION of Esquire Tate, seconded by Esquire Ball, that the nominations cease, the foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Total absent-0.

Esquire Tate asked what number of votes would be required to elect.

Parliamentarian Adcock stated that election would require a majority of existing Court Members, which would be seven (7) votes out of thirteen (13).

On the first Roll Call ballot, the vote was as follows:

Esquire Adcock suggested that they pass a resolution thanking these fine citizens who had applied for the job and submitted themselves for interviews.

Esquire Ball said that those of the candidates who were interested in the term coming up in July would not have to submit another resume and he said that it should be noted that they will also accept others.

Esquire Nolan suggested that all these people be contacted by Esquire McKinney or someone on the Court to tell them that they would be considered if they so desired and find out for sure if they want to be considered. When consideration begins, they could start with those who have already applied and then consider others who wish to be considered.

Esquire Tate suggested that Mr. Duggan be extended the congratulations of the Court for his being appointed to the school board position.

Esquire Nolan stated that the Court should also express appreciation to Mr. Duggan for having served as a member of the Quarterly Court.

Esquire McKinney suggested that it be made perfectly clear that the Court is not eliminating new candidates for the school board, that there were probably some people who had not been interested in the short term that would be interested in applying for the full 7-year term.

Esquire Franklin stated that he thought the Court has agreed, at least in principal, to try to be sure that each section of Hamilton County was represented. Esquire Franklin said that the action they had just taken left out one area, the largest area. He said he would not want East Ridge left out.

Esquire Tate said that he felt that the central area had been practically eliminated from everything as well.

Esquire Franklin pointed out that the central area had nothing to do with the County schools.

Esquire Tate said that was his point, that the central was a part of the County and should be considered.

It was pointed out that 3 or 4 of the school board members came from within the city limits.

Esquire Tate asked which civil districts they represented.

Esquire Adcock said Mr. Peeples was from the First Civil District.

Esquire Tate said that he was not from the First Civil District, that it did not extend to Washington Heights. Esquire Tate said that Booker T. Washington is part of the Second Civil District.

Esquire Nolan asked how many civil districts there were.

Esquire Tate said there were three.

Esquire Nolan said he felt the second civil district had been sadly neglected.

Esquire Adcock said that by code the First Civil District is the corporate limits of the City of Chattanooga.

Esquire Pendley asked if everytime the city annexed property did the lines of the district move?

Esquire Adcock said yes.

Esquire McKinney asked Esquire Tate to discuss the authority of the Quarterly Court.

Esquire Tate said that they have done research in Shelby County and in 1941 a City Council was set up. Esquire Tate said that as a constitutional office the Quarterly Court cannot be abolished. He said that the Court has been deprived of its rights and authority.

Esquire McKinney suggested that it should be possible to have this on the agenda for the July 5 meeting.





Present and presiding, the Honorable Don Moore, County Judge and Chairman of the County Court.

The invocation was given by Esquire Mack Franklin.

County Court Clerk W. F. (Bill) Knowles called the Roll of the Quarterly County Court and the following answered to their names: Esquire Mack Franklin, Esquire S. M. Pendley, Esquire A. C. Ball, Esquire Mary Gardenhire, Esquire Benton Green, Esquire T. B. Kennedy, Esquire Walter Tate, Esquire Gene Holder, Esquire Jim McKinney, Esquire G. M. Adcock, Esquire Paul V. Nolan, Esquire Fred Johnson and Esquire Alma Sullivan. (Esquire H. D. Duggan resigned April 12, 1976.) Total present-13. Total absent-0.

ON MOTION of Esquire Tate, seconded by Esquire Green, to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, treat same as read, approved, made a matter of record, and filed. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Total absent-0.

Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of the Hamilton County Schools, presented the report from the Department of Education (copy attached), said report being received by the Court and filed.

Dr. Carter stated that they had reduced the budget by approximately 1½ million dollars. He said that this had come primarily from transportation and capital outlay. Dr. Carter said that the budget had been approved by the Board but they were very concerned about the reduction in capital outlay. Dr. Carter said that they did plan to add money through reductions in personnel. He said that they would not cut any programs of significance but there would be reductions at all levels. He said that they had already made reductions in the central office that would provide some more money. Dr. Carter asked that the Court note the ground-breaking for the addition to Sequoyah. Dr. Carter said that both technical centers are expected to be operating by September. He said that some equipment has been installed and other is arriving daily at Harrison and some is beginning to come in at Sequoyah and that they hope to have sufficient equipment to begin the next school term. Dr. Carter said that Dr. Elliott has been appointed coordinator of the Title IX Compliance Program and has done a tremendous amount of work for the central office and for all the schools. Dr. Carter said that Dr. Elliott has prepared policies as required by law and has given this preliminary report to the Board.

Dr. Carter said that Mr. Medaris has completed the transportation routes and has added six to ten routes for the vocational centers. Dr. Carter said that Mr. Medaris had been asked for recommendations on savings possible by expanding the bus pick-up radius around schools a mile or a mile and a half.

Dr. Carter said that they have added an accountant in food services, that they are centralizing the bookkeeping services for school cafeterias.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter about the personnel cuts, if these were teachers?

Dr. Carter said that 40 positions across the county will be reduced in the schools, that 7 have already been done in the central office. Dr. Carter said that they know that they cannot operate with only \$266,000 in capital

outlay, that formerly more than that has been spent just for equipment. Dr. Carter said that there are two cafeterias that need re-equiping and there is a need for six classrooms at Soddy Daisy Jr. High.

Esquire Adcock said that he noticed an increase in clerk's of 15% and Dr. Carter said that this reflects raises in salaries, that all personnel received 9%. Dr. Carter asked Gary Land to explain the difference. Mr. Land said that one position was moved from purchasing to another department and the 9% raise takes care of the rest. Mr. Land said that one position was not budgeted this past year.

Esquire Adcock said he noticed an amount of \$200,000 in miscellaneous maintenance. He said that he questioned such a large amount in miscellaneous.

Mr. Land said at the time the budget was made up the Board had not approved the guidelines for maintenance since the schools were now doing their own maintenance. Dr. Carter said that it was just a matter of waiting for approval and the money would be budgeted to specific maintenance items. Dr. Carter said that they were very pleased with the new maintenance system, that it is much more efficient to be able to schedule the work and direct priorities.

Esquire McKinney asked what portion of the \$700,000 balance has been obligated. Dr. Carter said that nearly all of it has been obligated. Mr. Land said of that amount only \$41,000 is not obligated, that \$187,000 was for group health insurance reserve, \$280,000 for capital outlay (new boilers), etc.

Esquire Adcock asked about the ad in the newspapers for an accountant which specified that applicants must be employees of the Hamilton County School System.

Dr. Carter said that he did not know the exact wording but because of agreements with the teachers' organizations, first opportunity for employment is given to those within the system. Dr. Carter said that when they are advertising for teachers they are not actually soliciting any more applicants because there are already 1,024 applications on file. Dr. Carter said in this

instance, in the job for accountant they preferred to give first opportunity to someone within the system who is qualified and if there is no one within the system who is qualified and who wants the position, then they advertise outside the system. Dr. Carter said they did not locate anyone within the system for purchasing agent and advertised outside the system and this is the same process they would have followed for an accountant if they had not found one within the system.

Esquire Adcock said it seemed to him that a good accountant would not be teaching school. He said that it seemed a waste of money to advertise in the newspaper when they only wanted people from within the system and it also seemed an insult to accountants outside the system.

Dr. Carter said he did not agree that it is not reasonable to expect a good accountant to be teaching school, that the one who was hired had direct experience with the schools and they could not have found anyone more highly qualified. Dr. Carter said this person had a good education and good experience and also has familiarity with the program. Dr. Carter also said they felt it was right and responsible to give some priority to those in the system, and they did not consider it an insult to anyone.

Dr. Nolan asked if there was not some way to communicate within the schools. Dr. Carter said there was not in the summer.

Esquire Green asked if this advertising within the system was Board policy? Dr. Carter said that it was, that it was adopted in practice but may not be in the policy book. Dr. Carter said it was in the minutes, that they first did this only with teachers but now it is done with all positions.

Esquire Tate asked if this was not contrary to labor laws, to advertise but give preference to people within the system. Esquire Tate said that under this condition they would have a bunch of people closed out even though they were qualified.

Dr. Carter said that it was possible that they could improve the wording. Dr. Carter said that hiring for a position by seniority was standard practice within labor.

Esquire Tate said that this is open advertising and the wording would have the tendency to create the impression with the general public that it is closed.

Dr. Carter said that they have processed 1,024 applications since January. He said that there are many people out of work and it is rather difficult to go through the process of applications before they see if there is a qualified person within the system. If there is not, then the position is open to everyone.

Esquire Tate asked if there were any federal funds involved in any of these positions.

Dr. Carter said that there were some State Funds in the Accountant's job, but no Federal Funds. Esquire Tate said that sometimes Federal Funds are broken down to the State and then to the County.

Esquire Pendley asked if this was in agreement with the teachers' organizations? Dr. Carter said he did not know if this was actually in the minutes but they had told these organizations that they would advertise through the publications of the organizations and through the schools during the school year, and in the summer through the newspapers and the bulletin boards at the central office. Dr. Carter said this is probably not in the policy handbook, but was communicated.

Esquire Pendley said he could see the problem they would have in the summer.

Esquire Holder asked if they had cut 12 positions in the central office? Dr. Carter said they had cut 7: 2 professional and 5 clerical. Mr. Land said two were actually not cut but were a change of job status.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for the report.

The final Budget for the 1976-77 school term is enclosed. The activities of this past quarter have revolved around the many questions related to the determination of this Budget. Every program had to be reevaluated and priorities established in terms of various funding levels. Procedures for a potential reduction in force had to be established and all action on personnel assignments had to be postponed until after the setting of the Budget. Paradoxically, this planning for reduction was accomplished simultaneously with the processing of approximately 1024 new applications.

This final Budget reflects a reduction of one and one-half million dollars in three line items. The instructional line was reduced \$45,000, which was originally budgeted for increased time for principals. The transportation line was reduced \$250,000 and the Capital Outlay line was reduced by approximately \$1.2 million dollars. Because of the interest expressed by the entire community in the various educational programs and the very favorable response by the County Council in allowing the maximum possible increase in property taxes for education, it was decided to retain present levels of programming and to take the large cut in Capital Outlay. Some relief for Capital needs will be accomplished by efficiency cuts in all areas of programs and we have hopes for additional Capital funding through other sources than the property tax. It seems very appropriate for the County Council to provide sufficient funds from the property tax to provide the operational needs of education and to provide the more variable needs of Capital Outlay through Bonds or other sources. Commendations are due all members of the administrative and teaching staffs for their efforts in informing the public about the needs of education.

Ground was broken this quarter for an addition to the Sequoyah Technical Vocational School near Daisy, Tennessee. Equipment is being placed in both the Sequoyah and Harrison Centers in preparation for operation in September. Students have been enrolled, teachers are being employed and considerable efforts are continuing in the development of the curriculum in the Centers and the high schools which will be served by these Centers. Vocational Programs across the nation have been studied and plans are being finalized for all transitions required for full utilization of these facilities over the next three years.

Another major activity of this past quarter has been the initiation of Title IX Compliance. Dr. Thelma Elliott was appointed to coordinate this effort which included the development of policies for the Board of Education and a self-evaluation of all schools in the system and the Central Office with respect to practices of discrimination based upon a person's sex. Grievance procedures and plans for bringing into compliance any deficiencies noted by the self study are presently being developed.

New transportation routes have been developed for all schools providing substantial compliance with the Federal requirement known as "Standard 17." This was accomplished with a reduction of four contracts and a mileage reduction in many of the remaining contracts. Ten additional contracts will be required to accommodate the Vocational Centers.

An accountant was added to the Food Services Department to provide centralization of cafeteria reports and bookkeeping. It is hoped that the majority of these functions can be placed on the computer provided by the County.



BE IT REMEMBERED, That on this the 4th day of October, 1976, a Regular Meeting of the Quarterly County Court was held at the Hamilton County Court-house in the City of Chattanooga, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:-

Present and presiding, the Honorable Don Moore, County Judge and Chairman of the County Court.

The invocation was given by Rev. Al Daniel, Central Baptist Church.

County Court Clerk W. F. (Bill) Knowles called the Roll of the Quarterly County Court and the following answered to their names: Esquire Mack Franklin, Esquire S. M. Pendley, Esquire Rachel Atchley, Esquire A. C. Ball, Esquire Joan Lockaby, Esquire Benton Green, Esquire Walter Tate, Esquire Gene Holder, Esquire Jim McKinney, Esquire Paul V. Nolan, Esquire Fred Johnson, and Esquire Alma Sullivan. Esquire Mary Gardenhire and Esquire T. B. Kennedy were absent. (Esquire Rachel Atchley and Esquire Joan Lockaby are newly elected. Esquire G. M. Adcock resigned August 26, 1976). Total present-12. Total absent-2.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Franklin, to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, treat same as read, approved, made a matter of record, and filed. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-12. Total absent-2.

O C T O B E R T E R M 1 9 7 6

Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of the Hamilton County Schools, presented the report from the Department of Education (copy attached), said report being received by the Court and filed.

Dr. Carter stated that school was off to a very good start this year, that there had been a few problems as indicated in the report. Dr. Carter said that school enrollment showed a net increase of 126 students, that by allowing the City to take over Mountain Creek School, enrollment had been reduced by 165, which meant a total increase of 291 students. Dr. Carter said the Department of Education was especially pleased with the response to the vocational centers, that these centers were the biggest change in education this year. Dr. Carter said the two vocational centers make vocational education available to all high school students. He said that the distance traveled transporting students to the centers ranged from a very short distance for students at Soddy Daisy up to 21 miles for students from East Ridge. Dr. Carter said there are 1,012 students in the vocational centers. He said Sequoyah will get full State funding, that the funding is based on enrollment, and it is hoped the other center will get full funding as well. Dr. Carter said they felt that in a new year and with the lateness of the equipment's arrival, there has been tremendous response. Dr. Carter said it is hoped that the schools will be fully equipped within the next few weeks. He said that Sequoyah is less than 5% equipped, that the teachers and staff had worked very hard with the business and community leaders and had begged, borrowed, (and maybe even stolen, although he certainly hoped not) (facetiously) equipment to be used until the new equipment comes.

Dr. Carter stated that the Department of Education did not get full funding on the budget, that it was 1½ million dollars less than requested. Dr. Carter said that cuts were made in all areas across the system so that they did not have to cut out any single program. He said that by trying to cut personnel across the system, they are trying to transfer funds from personnel back to capital outlay.

Dr. Carter said that transportation problems have been significant because of the extended day. Dr. Carter said that the length of the high school day must be 7 hours this year, whereas last year it was 6½ hours, but with all the transporting that must be done this year it has to be longer. Also the elementary students must have a full 6½ hour day. Last year elementary students were taken home after 5½ hours with the kindergarten children, but a wavier to allow Hamilton County to do this again this year was not granted so they must go a full 6½ hour day and transportation time must come beyond this. Elementary and vocational students are delivered together. Dr. Carter said the transportation was another thing that was to be provided by the State but it was not, so 13 buses must also deliver vocational students. Dr. Carter said that this makes a 10-hour day for the buses, that they start picking up at 6:30 and deliver the last load of elementary students by 4:30. Dr. Carter said this is a very long day but that it is not unique, that Nashville begins bus runs at 6:00 and delivers the last students about 5 o'clock in the evening. Dr. Carter said such a long day for elementary students is not good, that the younger students are not productive in the late afternoon but this year the high schools are starting first so that the elementary students do not have to be picked up before daylight. Dr. Carter said that 7 buses have been approved by the School board and when these 7 are in use they hope first pick-up will not have to be until 7 a.m.

Dr. Carter invited Court members to attend the groundbreaking for the new Ooltewah Middle School this morning at 11:30. He stated that the site for the new school is beautiful.

Esquire Pendley asked Dr. Carter if the time change at the end of October would affect the schedule? Dr. Carter said that it would not.

Esquire Holder asked why the State had failed to get the equipment for Sequoyah in time for the school year to begin? Dr. Carter stated that all equipment for the vocational schools is handled by the State by purchase orders. Dr. Carter said the local system has little information

about the purchases until they arrive at the door. Dr. Carter said this was quite an undertaking at State level and it had been a little complicated. The State did not have sufficient staff and the schools sent some of their purchasing staff over to work on the orders. Dr. Carter said there was an additional problem at Sequoyah, that the school had been funded by Hamilton County and the Appalachian Regional Council and the equipment was to be funded as part of this grant. At the end of the 3 year phase the ARC requested to get out, and the State approved this and was to take over the equipment phase. However, this agreement was not clear cut at the State level and there was no funding for this. The final solution was that money which was allocated for the Sequoyah annex was transferred to the main structure but it was not quite enough. Also the equipment was ordered late, was not on the original purchase order. ARC has agreed to pay as much as 48% of the replacement for the annex. Dr. Carter said that it is a highly complex and difficult problem trying to rush these orders. He said that a decision whether or not to go on had to be made at the time teachers were to be hired.

Esquire Holder asked when the rest of the equipment would be in? Dr. Carter said that they really don't know a lot more than they knew before, that they had met with officials last week, however, and the officials did give them a lot of encouragement. Mr. Henry Colston of the Department of Education said that the purchase orders had been received so they knew the ordering was in process. Mr. Colston said that usually the equipment follows about two weeks after the purchase orders are received.

Dr. Carter said probably within 6 to 8 weeks all should be in. He did state, however, that the machine shop will not be in operation this year but an arrangement was made with Chattanooga Tech on Amnicola Highway for students from the County vocational schools to take machine shop there.

Esquire Sullivan said that she had been asked by quite a few people if adult classes would be held at the vocational schools.

Dr. Carter said that it is hoped there will be a full adult program. He said it had not been started yet because the necessary equipment had not come in. He said that with the County students they are approaching the

classes from theory since the equipment is not yet available but the adults would have to have the equipment. Dr. Carter said that it would be necessary to charge for these adult classes to pay for the teachers, that there were no local funds to pay for them.

Esquire Ball asked about the County curriculum as it pertained to English grammar. He said that his own two sons had had trouble with English grammar when they went to college so he had asked other Ooltewah High School students about it and found that they did have trouble at MTSU and UTC, and these were students from the top 10 to 15% of the classes. Esquire Ball said he wondered if the problem is at Ooltewah High or if it is a county-wide problem.

Dr. Carter said this was a common problem that had been with educators for many years. He said that Freshman English is very difficult and many students have problems with it. He said that the average grade was "D" even 15 years ago. Dr. Carter said this was true of all systems, not just Hamilton County. He also said it was true that students' grades are dropping, especially in English. He said Hamilton County high schools have a fairly good program, that East Ridge High School had led off with a new concept in high school English. Dr. Carter said nation-wide there is an increasing movement from the basics, but that Hamilton County schools do still require four (4) years of high school English, although many systems no longer do. Dr. Carter said he would try to get some results from Hamilton County students at MTSU, UTC, and various other colleges to try to determine if the problem was worse in this system.

Esquire Ball asked if there was a completion date available on the new Ooltewah Middle School. Dr. Carter said the original completion date was November of 1978, but since there had been a month's delay in starting, it would probably be completed in January of 1979.

The total enrollment for the 1976-77 term is 21,464 as compared to 21,338 at this same time last year. This increase of 126 students, in addition to the 165 students lost due to the annexation of Mountain Creek School, represents an actual increase of 291 students in the schools operated by the Hamilton County Department of Education.

Two new Vocational Centers were opened this fall serving all high schools in the County. The first year enrollment in these new facilities is 1,012. The Sequoyah Center (Daisy, Tennessee) has already achieved an enrollment sufficient to warrant full state funding for all assigned teachers. This enrollment reflects the exemplary performance of all guidance, administrative and teaching personnel in our high school and vocational programs. The implementation of the Vocational Centers required many changes in personnel assignments and in regular school programming. Both Center managers report a very successful beginning although handicapped severely by the lack of equipment. Most of the equipment at the Harrison Bay Center has been received at this time, but the Sequoyah Center has received less than five percent of the equipment requisitioned by the State.

The failure to receive full funding of the requested budget has resulted in reductions in staff, capital outlay and transportation. The reduction in personnel was accomplished by efficiency cuts throughout the system, including the Central Office and all programs in most all schools. No specific programs were singled out for major reductions. Even though we had an increase in enrollment, the net reductions in personnel were 15 in the elementary schools, 32 1/2 in secondary schools, 4 county-wide professional positions and 9 non-professional positions. Approximately half of the high school cuts were caused by the vocational schools rather than by the budget. A total of 39 new positions were added at the two Vocational Centers. A breakdown of teacher assignments for secondary schools and Vocational Centers showing state and county funding is attached. These calculations indicate a net reduction of high school positions of 15.8 teachers. We had earlier projected that such a reduction would necessitate combining many of our elementary grades, but fortunately these cuts were effected with a total of 13 combination classes, an increase of only three over that of last year.

Transportation problems have been magnified this year by several factors. The high school day is necessarily increased in length by the half day attendance of high school students at the Vocational Centers. We are presently operating on a minimum of seven hours. The elementary school day is also lengthened by our inability to secure a waiver for the dismissal of first and second grade students after five and one-half hours and by the fact that the number of buses available to the elementary schools has been reduced by the concurrent transportation of vocational students. Because of these conditions, we decided to follow the pattern of most other systems and begin high schools first. In order to get elementary students home by 4:30 in the afternoon, which is well past the productive time for this age student, we must begin buses at 6:30 a.m. Our only alternative to this scheduling arrangement would be to deliver high school students after sundown. It is hoped that this long day may be reduced by some thirty to forty-five minutes by the action of the Board in its last meeting of adding seven new bus contracts to the fleet.

Ground breaking for the new Ooltewah Middle School is scheduled immediately following the Quarterly Court Meeting on Monday, October 4, 1976. We hope to begin these ceremonies at approximately 11:30 a.m. and certainly hope that many of you will be able to attend. After some lengthy consideration, the Board of Education approved the bid of T & C Construction Company in the amount of \$2,125,500. This bid represents \$28.00 per square foot, including the open space under the gymnasium, and was considered by the Board to be an excellent price. It is well below the cost of other school buildings in Tennessee at the present time even though it includes such extra features as energy saving plastic windows and a sprinkler system.



Esquire Rachel Atchley, Esquire T. B. Kennedy, Esquire Walter Tate, Esquire Clyde R. Baker, and Esquire Alma Sullivan were absent. (Esquire Clyde R. Baker is newly elected.) Total present-10. Total absent-5.

Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of the Hamilton County Schools, distributed printed copies of the report from the Department of Education (copy attached), and reviewed highlights of the report after which he was questioned by several members of the Court.

Esquire Franklin asked Dr. Carter if the budget was running pretty well to plan. Dr. Carter apologized for the fact that Gary Land of the Accounting Staff was unable to be present at the meeting because of the snow. He said that he had discussed the budget with Mr. Land and they were happy to report that they were doing well and still within line items. However, Dr. Carter did report that \$305,000 had been transferred from personnel to capital outlay. Even with this Dr. Carter said that capital outlay needs have far exceeded available funds.

Esquire Franklin asked Dr. Carter about adult education and Dr. Carter said that they were still planning it for this year, that some schools already have it. Dr. Carter said that they hope to use funds primarily for this type training through centers, mostly during the second half of the school year and in the summer. He said that he did not have a detailed analysis at this point.

Esquire Pendley asked how many positions had been eliminated in the economy move. Dr. Carter stated that one director's position was eliminated. Esquire Pendley asked Dr. Carter if he felt the students suffered from certain job combinations. Dr. Carter indicated that they did because of the position vacancies within their school structure. Dr. Carter said that these vacancies did limit service to the students. He said he personally believes that the operation of the schools should be done as economically and as efficiently as possible. Esquire Pendley asked the status of Associate Superintendent Henry Colston. Dr. Carter responded by saying that Dr. Colston's position was being phased out over a three-month period at the School Board's direction, and that his service in this position would end on January 28, 1977.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter how the maintenance crew was shaping up. Dr. Carter praised the staff and stated that all reports at this point were positive and that he was getting good reports from principals. He also said the maintenance staff is cost conscious. Dr. Carter said that he was not in a position just now to give a cost comparison but would hope to be able to by the end of the year. He said that this particular operation was also limited because of budget problems.

Esquire Johnson stated that he had read an article in the Chattanooga Times which stated that superintendent Carter had problems with the Squires in his appointments of principals. Dr. Carter responded that he was not familiar with that article, but he had had some pressure from the court on appointments of principals as well as teachers.

Esquire Pendley asked if the Squires' comments were derogatory or complimentary in regards to principals? Dr. Carter said that most of them were expressions of preference for one person or another for a certain position.

Esquire Ball said that he read into the article that "we the Court" had been critical. Esquire Ball said that he had not been critical and viewed himself as more vocal than most of the members. Dr. Carter said that he did not recall any particular criticism on any of the appointments. Esquire Ball suggested that the press was trying to pit the Court against the Superintendent and said that they all needed to work together.

Esquire Nolan commented that he was "getting sick of irresponsible reporting of what is going on between us and the County School Superintendent" and that he was "disgusted to see things develop as a partisan political thing".

Although hindered by early operating hours, personnel reductions forced by an inadequate budget, differences with the Board over personnel, and the shifting of programs and personnel to poorly equipped vocational centers, the 1976-77 school year has been exceptionally smooth and productive. Secondary principals consistently report that even the literal dark cloud of 6:30 a.m. busing has its silver lining in the reduction of tardiness, absenteeism and disciplinary problems. This schedule is still considered unacceptable, however, and every effort will be made to find better alternatives next year.

The equipment in our vocational centers is now nearly complete and the enrollment in these programs has surpassed every expectation. Since funding of vocational education is dependent upon the enrollment in specific programs, it was expected that the first year's operation would be a further burden to the local budget. To the contrary, however, the enrollment in both centers has allowed near 100% claim on state allocations. The combined efforts of the staffs of our regular secondary schools and the vocational centers have been outstanding in every regard. In response to the interest expressed by the Chamber of Commerce, efforts have been initiated to provide a more efficient system of coordination between our programs of instruction and the related business or industry.

Prompted by the ever increasing demands of the Federal Government in maintaining accountability in our food services department, the Central Office has assumed the responsibility for bookkeeping for approximately half of the County Schools. The other half will be brought into the system at the beginning of next school year. This process is being mandated by the complexity of reports and the anticipated requirement of a double entry system of bookkeeping next year. Mr. Ralph Dunn, under Mr. Gary Land's direction, has accomplished this rather difficult transition with a minimum distraction to the schools. Mr. Land has also accomplished the full transition of payroll, purchasing and budgets along with attendance and bus reporting to the County computer. We have also added an optical mark reader which makes it possible for us to process our own standardized tests and to score teacher-made tests. This service will provide a cost reduction in addition to considerable increases in flexibility for many additional services to the schools. Mr. Land has recently presented our computerized finance and budget program to a group called together by the County Technical Advisory Service with the prospect of establishing a standardized accounting system for computer users.

Following an extended vacancy, the position of Director of Support Services was filled by the transfer of Mrs. Mildred Chapman from the position of Director of Elementary Education. Mr. Larry Malone assumed the position vacated by Mrs. Chapman and Mr. Jean Stephens added Mr. Malone's junior high responsibilities to his previous high school assignment. This reduction of a Director's position was cited by Mr. Dobson as the real reason behind his motion to abolish the position of the Associate Superintendent, although the motion stated the reason as cost reduction. After accomplishing the economy and the reduction of the Director's position, the Board still refused to reinstate Mr. Colston adding the additional mandates via the statements of individual members that Mr. Colston be removed from the chain of command and that I delegate "full" authority for school administration to the directors. These requests are, in my opinion, unreasonable and illegal and I have not complied. In another personnel conflict, the Board of Education has taken the unprecedented action of drafting job descriptions and transferring personnel without the concurrence of the Superintendent. These are prohibited by Tennessee Law (TCA 49-1411) and have been referred to the Commissioner of Education for his action or guidance.

Mrs. Chapman was introduced very quickly to the responsibilities of the school system under the Handicapped Act. The first hearing under this law in our system was conducted Monday, December 13, by the Right to Education Office in response to the complaint of Mr. and Mrs. David Morgan that the services being provided their child were inappropriate and insufficient. This Law provides for payment by the Department of Education for services provided handicapped children by individuals or agencies outside of public education. The decision of the hearing officer has not been announced at the time of this writing.

A report from the Director of Research and Project Design is attached.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF ACTIVITIES
OCTOBER, NOVEMBER, DECEMBER, 1976

Dr. Thelma S. Elliott

Listed below are a few of the more significant activities completed by R&D. These assignments require research, developing, reporting, disseminating information, preparing communications, projects, and other documents.

1. DENTAL HEALTH DEMONSTRATION PROJECT (Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Grant): A preliminary proposal for a Dental Health Project was submitted by four cooperating agencies, County Schools, City Schools, County Government, and the Health Department. Our pre-application was selected from 111 submitted from across the nation. We were invited to prepare a fully developed proposal which was submitted in November. The Health Department was named as primary sponsor (fiscal agent and manager) and County Schools, City Schools, and County Government serving as co-sponsors.

While the selection for final project approval is competitive, our proposal remains "in the running", and we are now informed we are one of two in our classification (fluoridated water supply) from which the final choice will be made by March, 1977.

The project is funded by a private source, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (Johnson & Johnson, Inc.) for a three year period in the amount of \$300,000. If the project is approved, four County Schools and four City Schools will participate. In the County, Ganns-Middle Valley, Alpine Crest, Red Bank and White Oak Elementary Schools will participate. Children in grades 1, 2, and 5 will be involved (with parental approval) in the three-year follow-through program. All participating schools have been briefed as to the nature of the project and each has provided written endorsement of the project.

The program will provide dental treatment and maintenance, nutritional education and materials and supplies for teacher use. Centers for dental examination and services, materials, supplies, etc., will be located in each school. Dental staff will visit the school on a pre-arranged scheduled and school staff will be responsible for the instructional component and for maintaining records.

If approved, the Project Director will be Dr. William A. Johnson, DDS of the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Health Department who will be responsible for project management, including staff and funds. No matching funds are required. The project (a total of 10 in the nation) will be 100% funded by the Foundation. The project data will be used to compare the effect of fluoridated versus non-fluoridated water on the teeth of children.

2. ENROLLMENT PROJECTIONS FOR HAMILTON COUNTY SCHOOLS: A comprehensive report to be used as a planning tool was prepared for use by the staff and Board. A report (34 page document) included detailed information in the following areas:
 - (a) General Population Projections. The population movement which resulted in growth or decline was projected. The data were shown by planning districts, maps, and tables. This information provided a basis for projecting the need for new facilities in areas of increasing population or to utilize vacant spaces in areas of declining enrollment.
 - (b) Changes in Student Population by Schools for Years 1971-72/1975-76. The net change over a five-year period was reported for all schools (40). Variables were presented which probably affected the enrollment changes. The data were also reported in a table showing the loss-gain for each school.
 - (c) Analyses of Enrollment Data for School Years 1974-75/1975-76. These statistics were recorded to compare changes in enrollment within the year 1975-76 for each local school. The enrollment was also compared between September 1, 1974 and September 1, 1975. This analysis shows the trend as well as specific changes in each school or community.
 - (d) Summary and Other Data. A status report of City students enrolled in County schools under the HEW approved plan has been prepared. A report of a five-year projected enrollment by years from 1975-76 to 1980-81 was also prepared. The projected enrollment was included for this year. The projection was 21,724 and the Attendance Report for November 1, 1976 shows an enrollment of 21,818.

3. PROPOSAL FOR PARENT-CHILD CENTER FOR TEENAGE STUDENTS: Public Law 839 (Weldon Bill) requires services for handicapped students. The program formerly known as the Pregnant Girls Program was redesigned and a proposal presented in December to the Board. The Board felt the project was too costly and returned it for further study. At the present time, very few services are available to this handicapped group of students who qualify under 839. Further study will be made of a program for these students.

4. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAWS:
 - (a) Policy for Privacy Rights of Students and Parents. A policy was prepared and presented for adoption by the Board. While the policy meets the requirements of the law, the R&D staff is in the process of reviewing and simplifying it.
 - (b) Title IX. Further work has been done in meeting Title IX requirements (prohibiting sex discrimination in education). Compliance statements have been secured from most of the community agencies offering services, programs, or activities to our schools.

5. EE05 REPORT, EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY COMMISSION: The staff composition of Hamilton County Schools is itemized on the EE05 Report. A total of 1,646 persons are employed. These employees are grouped by sex, race, job classification, full-time/part time and whether hired between July and September of this year. EEOC requires a rather detailed report of the staffing patterns for the entire school system.

The grievance document has not been completed. The suggested policy and procedure is under review.

Esquire McKinney nominated Mrs. J. C. Lee of Snowhill Road as Farm Woman from the Second District. Mrs. Lee was Elected by Acclamation with no opposition.

Esquire Johnson nominated Mr. Raymond Gross as Farm Man from the Third District. Mr. Gross was Elected by Acclamation with no opposition.

Esquire Gardenhire nominated Esquire Nolan as Member from the Quarterly Court. Esquire Nolan was Elected by Acclamation with no opposition.

All three of these terms are for two years, to expire January, 1979.

Esquire Holder nominated Esquire Gardenhire for Judge Pro Tempore. Esquire Gardenhire was Elected by Acclamation with no opposition.

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Discussion of Medical Examiner.

Judge Moore noted that the coroner had not been reappointed as required by law. However, he said that this was not a problem inasmuch as the coroner serves until his successor is elected. Judge Moore further noted that presently Dr. George Beckman serves as coroner and medical examiner having been appointed coroner by the Court and medical examiner by the County Council. Esquire Gardenhire stated that it had come to the attention of certain members of the Court that some communities have pathologists in this position. This she said has proved to be of assistance to law enforcement agencies in court convictions. Esquire Gardenhire went on to say that the County must do the best it can with the money available.

Esquire Pendley asked Judge Moore what the qualifications were for the position of coroner. Judge Moore stated there were no qualifications per se and that the coroner did not have to be a physician. Judge Moore reviewed the history of the coroner and medical examiner and the appointment of Dr. Beckman. He praised Dr. Beckman for his service and for the vital role he plays in County law enforcement. Judge Moore informed the Court that Dr. Beckman would continue to serve as medical examiner regardless of whom the Court appointed as coroner. Esquire Gardenhire reported that police agencies have a great deal of respect for Dr. Beckman but some feel that a pathologist would be better in this position.

Esquire Pendley asked if the coroner, under the law, has the power to call in other doctors. Judge Moore said that he did.

Esquire Franklin nominated Dr. George Beckman to be reappointed as County Coroner and Dr. Beckman was Elected unanimously by Acclamation without opposition. Total present-10. Total absent-5.

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Esquire Ball stated that he wished to nominate a person to serve as deputy coroner and Judge Moore informed the Court that deputy coroners are appointed by the coroner, not the Court.

Esquire Nolan asked about the bond for the coroner. Judge Moore said that a \$2500 bond is required.

Esquire Nolan asked Judge Moore to explain the role of the County physician. Judge Moore stated that the County physician had resigned about a year ago and he (Judge Moore) requested a nominee from the area medical society. The society was unable to identify a physician willing to serve. Therefore the County Council had to integrate the duties of the County physician into the Health Department structure.

In regard to a coliseum presently being discussed, Esquire Ball asked if the people were getting rooked into this thing and how much it was going to cost. At this point much discussion ensued both pro and con regarding the coliseum complex. Judge Moore stated that he had been trying to get new business into the County and that when he talks to prospective management leaders one of the things they want to know about is the cultural and athletic facilities. Judge Moore also reported that the County had a net loss of 1700 jobs in the past year and noted that if this continues the tax base will erode. Judge Moore stated that 3 or 4 studies have shown that a coliseum is not just desirable but necessary for continued growth. He said he thought some facility should be provided either by UTC or otherwise.

Esquire Lockaby stated that at least one State representative was on record that if such a facility was built on the campus of UTC it would have to be made available to the total community.

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
Judge Moore said that the coliseum problem is one that needs to be solved and that hopefully all factors can get together pointing in a common direction. He said only a study will determine our needs.

Esquire Pendley stated that we need to consider more than just UTC, that there are other educational institutions in the area. Judge Moore agreed that the total community must be considered.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Johnson, to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, treat same as read, approved, made a matter of record, and filed. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-2.

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Judge Moore stated that the next item on the agenda was the date of next quarter's meeting. Since the first Monday falls on July 4th, the meeting should be changed, perhaps to the 11th.

ON MOTION of Esquire Kennedy, seconded by Esquire Lockaby, to have the July Quarterly Court meeting on the second Monday in July, July 11th. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Esquire Tate asked if any action taken by Judge Moore or the County Council on legislation pertaining to Hamilton County could be submitted to Quarterly Court members in order to keep them informed and able to pass information on to their constituents. Esquire Tate said that they are close to the people and are often asked about these things. He asked if this courtesy could be extended to Quarterly Court members.

Judge Moore said that often some of these bills are not in shape to be presented, that they could not be understood.

Esquire Tate said that some of them are familiar with the process and would like to be familiar with the bills so that they would know whether or not they would want to lobby for them. Esquire Tate asked if Judge Moore would simply make a copy available so they could come in and at their own expense obtain copies of these bills so they could be knowledgeable about what is being done.

Judge Moore said that he would see if they could do this in his office, have a file for them to read.

Esquire Tate said that he has had people from the Chamber of Commerce call him with more knowledge about some legislation than he had.

Judge Moore said that there were more than 900 bills introduced.

Esquire Tate said that he was interested in those that were local; he thought there were only 6.

Esquire Tate asked that the record reflect that he had made this request of Judge Moore.

Clerk Knowles told Mr. Tate that it's already in there.

Since Dr. Carter had returned Judge Moore requested that he now present the report from the Department of Education.

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Dr. Carter apologized for his lateness and told Court members that he would shortly have for them copies of the report. He said that he had brought copies for them but these had somehow been mislaid while he was in Court upstairs, and that Mr. Land was now running more copies.

Dr. Carter noted that the enrollment at the end of 6 months was 22,671 and the ADA was 19,006. Concerning the balance sheet Dr. Carter said that expenditures were in alignment with projections, and that most budget items would be expended by the end of the year. Dr. Carter said that the proposed budget for 1977-78 is being prepared and will be submitted prior to May 15. He said that revenues are expected to remain unchanged except for increases by inflation. Dr. Carter said that reports from all divisions are positive for the past quarter with the exception of three factors: the severe weather, the fuel shortage, and near epidemic sickness. Dr. Carter said that 9 days were missed by the entire system and in addition to this 5 days were missed by the north county schools and 7 days missed by the mountain schools. He said that these would be made up with Saturday school, in-service days, and spring vacation days, and school would end on June 11. Dr. Carter noted that attendance has been below normal.

Dr. Carter mentioned the hearing by the Right to Education Office. He said that the decision was that all services needed were provided by the Hamilton County Schools personnel but we were cautioned to sharpen our procedures for determining needs and scheduling appropriate services, and workshops are anticipated. Reports of approval have been received from the Right to Education Office and some parents. Dr. Carter said that a letter from Mr. Tripps, director of the office, was attached.

Esquire Pendley asked if the additional time school will be in session will cost more? Dr. Carter said salaries would run no more, because the teachers were not paid when they were out due to weather or fuel shortage. He said that it would cost more in terms of maintenance because the schools were heated some during those very cold days that they were closed, but other than the utilities and added maintenance there would be no other additional costs. Esquire Pendley asked if it would cost enough more to affect the budget. Dr. Carter said not due to lost days, but the severe weather would affect the budget. He said that there would be a substantial loss of revenue in terms of lowered attendance, that attendance had been running 90% and was normally 95%. Dr. Carter said that the city schools had sickness

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but were not closed because the weather as much as the county schools were. Dr. Carter said there would also be repairs because of burst pipes, etc.

Esquire Pendley asked if the Saturdays and days made up would count on ADA. Dr. Carter said they will count but the attendance was lower so the ADA will still be lower. Esquire Franklin said attendance will also be lower during the week of spring break. Dr. Carter said the division with city schools is based on full attendance for a year and asked Mr. Land if he could estimate yet how it would affect the county. Mr. Land said that for the first 6 months were two/tenths of 1% off compared to the city, that the city has also gone down. Mr. Land said that it looks now as if we are running in line with the revised budget.

Esquire Tate asked Dr. Carter about his statement that everything a child needs could be contracted in the county. Dr. Carter said that his statement was made in connection with one case, that this specific child had requested counseling and other services (special tests by optometrist), and the ruling was that this county could provide the training and special education classes and counseling needed. That was the court officer's decision on this particular case.

Esquire Tate said that he had read a statement made by Bill Knowles concerning license tags. Mr. Tate said that he had noticed some county school buses with 57 prefix license tags. Mr. Tate asked Dr. Carter why they would go to another county to buy license tags if they are people working for this county. Dr. Carter said that he had thought at first that Mr. Tate meant the buses had a 1957 tag on them, but he realized what he meant and he did not realize that any of the buses were carrying tags with a 57 prefix. Mr. Tate assured Dr. Carter that this does exist, that he could give Dr. Carter information about the buses if he wanted it. Mr. Tate said that this upsets him because he feels that we are wasting our resources, if people living in this county go outside the county for things like license plates when they are making their living in this county. Mr. Tate said that one of the functions of government is to deliver services. Dr. Carter said that he did not know where these people live, that bus service is provided by contract, and perhaps some of these live outside this county. Dr. Carter said that he would say first that anyone employed by this county should follow the law.

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Esquire Tate noted that the law is flexible and he said that he felt that we ought to have some type of policy that would ensure that first choice of jobs should go to Hamilton County residents. Mr. Tate said concerning the license tags bought out of county, as the County Court Clerk pointed out this county loses revenue.

Dr. Carter said that this had not been brought to his attention before. Esquire Franklin said it should be brought to the attention of the city as well, that it is usually to avoid buying the city sticker that people go out of this county to buy tags. Esquire Tate said this is one reason our taxes are high. Esquire Tate said that he felt that the people who use the streets should pay, the people who are making their livings in the city. Esquire Pendley said we could have a County sticker. Judge Moore said we don't want a County sticker. Clerk Knowles said his office didn't want to collect that. Esquire Tate said he didn't mean to "open up a can of worms." Clerk Knowles facetiously told Esquire Tate that if that law passes, he (Tate) can come down and collect for the sticker. Dr. Carter said that he would refer the matter of the school buses' out of county tags to the board.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter how the county is doing on maintenance. Dr. Carter said that he felt with our sources of revenue the maintenance was doing a very fine job, however, he could not say that the county has adequate maintenance in the county schools, that there are still many needs to bring the county schools up to the level we require. Dr. Carter said that Lookout Mountain Elementary needs major renovations and there are many heating problems at Central and Browns Middle School. Dr. Carter said that pipes are wearing out in many schools and that boilers can be replaced but that is only 80% of the cost and when they start repairing pipes there is nothing to repair. Dr. Carter said that many of these needs would have to be considered capital outlay, not just maintenance. Dr. Carter said that he did not want to leave the impression that maintenance was not doing a good job because they are. Esquire Ball said that he knew a lot of schools pick up things they need at surplus sales and wondered why we could not do this. Mr. Ball said the government just throws these things away, that since we have already paid for them once, instead of wasting them we should use them. Dr. Carter said the County often sends people to these surplus sales but when you go you just take "pot luck," that sometimes you get a good take-home load but sometimes nothing. Dr. Carter said that the department of education has not had the

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opportunity to send people frequently. Dr. Carter said that if anyone has access to information on surplus items, that he would like it. Esquire Ball said that they are tearing down Camp Benning. Dr. Carter said that they had been in touch with Camp Benning but they just don't seem to find what they need when they need it, but they would like to take advantage of any information they can get.

Esquire Tate suggested that Dr. Carter be given the address of Mr. J. Pope Dyer's son in Miami, Fla. Mr. Tate said that Mr. Dyer's son was very good at this and had put out a catalog containing information of this sort. He told Mr. Dyer (who was present at the meeting) that he hoped he didn't mind his mentioning this to the superintendent. Mr. Dyer said that he would be happy to give the superintendent his son's address.

Esquire Johnson asked Dr. Carter if he was familiar with the new TEA bill. Dr. Carter said that the new bill had not been available before he left to attend a meeting and asked Mr. Starnes about this. Mr. Starnes said that the bill was presented last Monday to the State Legislature. Dr. Carter said that he did not know if the new bill was any different from the last bill, that the previous bill was not needed in Tennessee. Esquire Johnson asked if the bill had not been presented to our local Board of Education. Dr. Carter said that the bill referred to does not go through the Board, that it goes to the State Legislature. If passed, it will mandate some kind of negotiations with the teachers. Mr. Starnes said that the bill was much weaker than the one last year. Dr. Carter said that any input board members might have would be the same as the court members would have, that they should voice desires and opinions to the State Legislators. Dr. Carter said that his own opinion was that they do not need any type no matter how weak.

Esquire Ball asked if there was a no-strike clause in the bill? Dr. Carter said he thought there was, that even the first one had one. Esquire Ball said if the teacher signs a contract and then strikes, is he not automatically fired? Dr. Carter said no. Esquire Ball said that he is a union man, but he feels it should be this way. Dr. Carter said he felt everyone interested in education should look very carefully at any legislation that would require public employee bargaining, and should let his opinion be known to the State Legislature. Dr. Carter said that he did not feel it was needed, that it is not beneficial to the students or to the citizens of Hamilton County.

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Esquire Johnson said that he had asked Mr. Starnes if he would speak for the bill but he said he would rather not. Mr. Starnes said the bill had been handled in the House for 2 different years. This year they agreed that the House would not handle it until the Senate passes it. Mr. Starnes said that the bill went to the Labor Committee in the Senate, and the House will not get it until after the Senate. Mr. Starnes said that it may not even get to the House. He said the bill is much weaker, that there is a no-strike clause.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for his report.

Esquire Gardenhire said that on May 26th the Quarterly Court may meet with the school board. Mrs. Gardenhire said that she had talked with the chairman and this will be contingent on whether the rest of the board agrees. She said that she noticed the budget will be presented to the court no later than May 15. She said that this will be the first time this court has had this opportunity, that there will be a work session from 5:00 until 6:30 and the court members will be able to sit down and have the budget explained.

Mrs. Gardenhire read the attached Resolution expressing appreciation to Registrar Tom Moore.

ON MOTION of Esquire Gardenhire, seconded by Esquire Johnson, to adopt the foregoing Resolution. The foregoing Resolution was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation.

Judge Moore asked that these things should be scheduled for the agenda before the agenda is prepared.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Gardenhire, that the Quarterly Court go on record opposing the recent change of control of the election commissions to the Democratic party.

Judge Moore asked if he was talking about the bill that had already been passed. Judge Moore said that he did not think this was a proper matter to be considered by this body.

Esquire Ball said that he had made a motion and she (Mrs. Gardenhire) seconded it, that Judge Moore knew how they felt.

Esquire Gardenhire told Judge Moore that she felt this Court should feel free to bring up anything they want at these meetings and she did not think it is in line for the Judge to prevent them from bringing something up or acting like it's ridiculous to bring it up. Judge Moore told Mrs. Gardenhire that he felt they should consider those duties to which they were elected and this was not one of them. He said if they don't like the law they should talk to the Legislators. Esquire Gardenhire told Judge Moore that there was a place for new business. Esquire Lockaby said that the Court sometimes liked to go on public record and they feel this is an opportunity for them to do this. Judge Moore said that they had gone on record.

The balances shown on the attached expenditure report are calculated to be exactly in alignment with our expenditures and are projected to be totally, or near totally, expended by the end of this Budget year. The proposed Budget for next year is still being prepared and will be submitted to the members of the Quarterly Court prior to May 15, 1977. With no tax increases expected at the local or state levels, it is anticipated that our revenues will remain unchanged except for a slight increase as reflected by inflation and the general improvement in the economy. Although the Legislature is expected to adopt a new formula for funding the Minimum Foundation Program, it is not calculated at present to make any significant effect on the allocation to Hamilton County. Under these conditions, it looks as though our funding level for next year will be approximately the same as this current year, or slightly lower, as inflation and salary increases will probably affect our expenditures more adversely than they will enhance our revenues.

Reports from all divisions during this past quarter have been very positive with the exception of three factors beyond our control. The combined effects of the severe weather, the fuel shortage and near epidemic sickness have made this one of the most difficult winters for education that most of us can remember. Nine days of school were missed by the entire system in addition to five days missed by the north county schools and seven days missed by the mountain schools. All days missed will be made up by each school through the use of Saturdays, in-service days, spring vacation days and the extension of the term through June 11, 1977. As a result of operating schools in marginal weather, rescheduling school days and the extreme sickness, our attendance has been considerably below normal.

In my last report, I indicated that our first hearing by the Right to Education Office had been conducted. The decision of the Hearing Officer was that all services needed to be provided by Hamilton County School Personnel and that we were not obligated to pay outside agencies in this particular case. At the same time, we were admonished to sharpen our procedures for determining needs and scheduling appropriate services. Since this hearing, we have conducted numerous workshops with principals, counselors and resource teachers to emphasize and clarify the details of the Handicapped Law, and have increased significantly the use of Multi-Disciplinary Teams. Reports of approval regarding the effectiveness of this renewed emphasis have been received from the Right to Education Office and from parents. A letter from Mr. Robert Tipps is attached.



INTERVIEW - DR. WILLIAM J. ROBERTSON

Dr. Robertson read the attached resume.

FRANKLIN: Will you make a statement as to why you wish to serve?

This is one of my reasons. I am not an educator. I have no background in education; however, I feel I have something to contribute.

PENDLEY: I have taken a greater interest in the schools because of my children. Since your son is through school do you feel you would have as much to offer?

ANSWER: I believe I would have something to offer; perhaps not in the same manner as if I had children in school. However, I could make a very valuable contribution due to my age. I am not a young squirt.

GREEN: Did you decide you would like to become a member of the school board or did someone urge you to seek the position? Do you have the backing of any group?

ANSWER: It was my own idea. The only connection I had in any way was that Mr. Swift gave me the name of Mrs. Gardenhire and I called her and submitted my name. Mr. (Curtis) Swift said he thought it was a good idea. I have no backing. I really do not have any political ambitions. I have often made the statement that all I wanted to be was mayor, then governor, then president. I feel that any red-blooded American should have some goals in life.

TATE: Your son went to TMI--he is a product of private schools?

ANSWER: Not entirely, he was in Brainerd a couple of years and then went to TMI. He was under-achieving at Brainerd and we felt he needed this.

TATE: Did you feel this was due to the school system itself?

ANSWER: No, due to the individual. He was not applying himself or getting the benefits of the public school system. I object to private school because I feel very strongly about public schools. However, my wife wanted this; sometimes you have pressure.

LOCKABY: If the County schools had a need for textbooks and there was also a need for personnel at the administrative level, which would you consider most important?

ANSWER: What priorities would I place? Sacrificing administration or even monies? I believe I would opt for the textbooks rather than the administrative personnel. Our children must have a good foundation. Then maybe when there is more money I would work on that. But the textbooks would be of greater importance. Maybe I would not give as large a raise.

NOLAN: I imagine you are aware that the school board meetings are long and often. Also school board members like to visit the school. Do you feel it will strain your schedule to do these things and earn a living too?

ANSWER: I know it will strain me. However, being president-elect of the Third District Dental Society is not a full-time job and I believe I am capable of meeting with the school board on Thursday and when they meet without interfering with my work. It will be a strain to practice all day and then go down there from 5 until quite late. I have been there a few times because I am very dedicated about nutrition.

NOLAN: And you obviously are willing to put those hours in.

GARDENHIRE: How do you feel about the advisability of having teacher unions? We seem to be moving toward this.

ANSWER: I really have not given this a lot of thought. In years past I have been very pro-union because I felt they needed to be. I thought the balance was in the range of management. However, the balance has changed. I would not want unions to affect the ability to teach. I would hate for strikes to keep the children at home. That is one of the things that would guide me. It would take a lot of reflection to become pro or against. I have not made a decision on that particular question.

BAKER: You say you are not an educator. What is your philosophy of education?

ANSWER: Basically my philosophy is founded on the public school system. I am a strong believer in the public school system. I believe that any of our children should be able to attend a public school system and achieve to the extent that they are capable. I don't believe that every student should be the holder of a degree, but should be encouraged and have the possibility to achieve their potential.

McKINNEY: We have an education association for 90+% of the teachers. We also have a teachers union - ALF-CIO. The HCWA this year asked for negotiations in the State Legislature. This bill had the majority of supporters but failed in one community. The bill did include a no-strike clause. Would you be in favor of sitting down with a representative group of teachers and drawing up a master contract.

ANSWER: I feel that negotiations would be indicated. I am not opposed to negotiating with organized labor. I feel that this is one of our strong points in this country and we get strength from organization. I would not be opposed to sitting down and listening

ATCHLEY: In the case of rumors or gossip pertaining to individual employees, would you consider hearsay evidence or would you be willing to go to the person for the real story?

ANSWER: I am a strong believer in eye to eye. I want to hear it from the horse's mouth. I would go to the individual to hear it.

JOHNSON: You said you had attended some school board meetings in the interest of nutrition. So you probably know of the trouble between the Superintendent and the Board. Do you feel you could get some peace in the family?

ANSWER: That is asking a lot of me. I would hope to be able to spread oil on troubled waters. One slight depression: my wife said don't go down there and make them think you want the job or they are liable to give it to you. But since I am interested, if I want it, I am going after it wholeheartedly. I think we have a group of honorable people. I have watched them operate. I am

impressed. They seem to be bickering but someone will come up with a positive motion and get support from the whole group. Mr. Peoples will sit there and listen and then come up with a most knowledgeable motion after the squabbling and he will bring the thing together. If I could work with that man I could learn and contribute and help eliminate some of that friction. But I did not see a lot of friction.

JOHNSON: Do you know Dr. Carter?

ANSWER: No. Through the Third District Dental Society, I am interested in food service and we are interested in a good nutritional type of thing and not the soda pop, confection type of thing or sandwiches coming out of machines. When I saw the notice in the paper about the school board vacancy, I thought I might think about that and here I am.

HOLDER: You expressed an interest in nutrition and are aware of the board's discussion of food service. Would you like to expand on this.

ANSWER: At this point in time I have not drawn any thorough conclusion. I believe Coca-Cola is presenting a food service program. I would like to see a central service operated by our own school board to keep this management money from going out of the community. Whether this could be done or not I do not know. We have wonderful people here in the Krystal Company. I think they could help train our food serving people rather than bring in SAGA or McDonalds. Coca-Cola may be very good people but I don't know how good at serving food. I would like to see if kept here rather than have the management money go to Atlanta. If you just asked me to vote, I would have to do a lot of soulsearching. There are good people in the cafeterias. Of course, the food service people say that they will use our people. But the money must come from somewhere. The extra money they say they will give back to us.

HOLDER: Do you think a centralized program is better than each cafeteria having its own?

ANSWER: Yes. It will help with food purchasing by being able to buy by the carload. If we could do this and centralize, then we could economize. A centralized type of thing having each cafeteria its own boss would be best.

BALL: On the matter of discipline, I don't know how many schools you visited and talked to, but a lot of teachers say the principal will back them, then the principal says the superintendent won't back him. There is not a lot of discipline. How would you put teeth in this?

ANSWER: I am a strong believer in discipline. You have to have cooperation and some discipline. I am a believer in spanking. I hate to say that but I honestly believe someone has to be spanked. The crime must fit the punishment. As to how to put teeth in it they must be equipped with the rules. If a child needs to be punished, the principal is supposed to mete this out. I think the punishment should be given when the wrong is done, not after a child has forgotten what he did. The teacher should be able to administer some discipline at the time of the crime. It is like punishing a dog. You can't wait 30 minutes or the dog has forgotten; you have to catch the dog when he has killed the chicken.

BALL: A lot of the teachers are afraid to; it should be something to come through the board.

ANSWER: My recommendation would be that this teacher should be immune to legal action from parents and parents should even file a paper saying when children are in school we will be responsible for discipline. If they won't accept this then they should find another school.

TATE: Sometime ago I did research and found that some of our County school buses were bearing tags without the County prefix "4." This concerned me that they would go to "57" and purchase tags for County school buses. Would you have any suggestions that would eliminate this? Bill (Knowles) can tell you the importance of the money for this County.

ANSWER: I would demand that every school bus possess a "4" on its license. I would require that they buy license tag in the County where they earn their living. I don't like this going to other place to get out of city stickers, etc., because some of this money benefits me.

FRANKLIN: You might be put in a unique position. You live in Chattanooga and are primarily interest in the City schools. Yet you might be faced with the problem of what to do about annexed schools. How would you feel about this?

ANSWER: I do live in the city; however the city has encompassed me. This is very pertinent. East Brainerd was a County school and Elbert Long was a County school. Brainerd was city but my son always attended county schools. I feel they were very good schools. I don't have any background to give a complete answer but my feelings would be that the County should be remunerated when the City comes out and takes over. Some compensation should be made. This has been County money establishing schools. I am not going to move outside the City limits just to be in the County. I do feel the County should be remunerated when the City takes over a plant.

PENDLEY: You seem to feel strongly about nutrition. Do you have enough feeling about it if it required an increase in the budget you would present it to the Judge and ask for a tax increase. Is it that important?

ANSWER: Do you mean to have a centralized system?

PENDLEY: To accomplish the nutritional program you think best would you be willing to ask for a tax increase for a good nutritional program?

ANSWER: Yes sir, I would.

PENDLEY: That's a strong statement.

ANSWER: They should have a really good nutritional diet and most do now. My concern is that they not have soda pop and confections. When I say nutritional requirements, these food service people have to meet these requirements are they can't be certified.

PENDLEY: Can this be accomplished with the same amount of money we are now spending?

ANSWER: Some claim they can and have indicated that they possibly can even say money and return this money to the school board. What they charge for each meal is what their profit comes from. They buy in car load lots. Why can't we do this and save this money and make some choice in Hamilton County. I don't think it will cost more.

GREEN: What is your position on central office as far as staff is concerned? It was heavy. Are there any jobs that should be abolished?

ANSWER: I really have not look at this aspect. I really did not feel I was ready to make a survey of that nature. If I did and found excess baggage I would trim this for the school's advantage. I realize we have to have administration but I am opposed to excess baggage. I would not want to say if I am elected this one or that one would be put out. I had rather go on record as being able to look over the situation and see if there were any that needed to go. I would not hesitate if so. I am not familiar enough with the central office or the recent removal of Mr. Starnes.

LOCKABY: We all live in Hamilton County. Some support the County and the County school system. If there comes a time of consolidation, how would you feel about that?

ANSWER: I am very much in favor of consolidation. I think it has merits that we need. Our system is passe. It's time to consolidate.

NOLAN: What would you say is the biggest problem facing the school system. Don't list them all.

ANSWER: I don't know that I know. Mr. Ball touched on one of the things: discipline. We do need discipline and we need teachers able to discipline. That was one of the reasons I took my son out of Brainerd; he was doing more playing than studying. Discipline we need. If we need organization of strong teachers, there is a possibility a union might be necessary. I have not given that a lot of thought. We need strong organization. We need some strong recreational areas. Tyner has done well with the tennis courts. Children should have a place to play tennis and run during the summer. There are a lot more problems.

JOHNSON: You mentioned excess baggage and said you would not hesitate if you saw this. Do you think the Board has that right?

ANSWER: I should think the Board should. The Superintendent might be the one to swing the ax, but the Board should have this in their realm. I am not sure if the Superintendent has this power or not. The school board should be involved.

HOLDER: Could you be objective to the needs of Soddy Daisy or Lookout Mountain or Birchwood. Most of your connection has been in Brainerd and East Brainerd. Would you be objective enough to think about the County in general?

ANSWER: I think I could. The entire County should be considered.

Mrs. Gardenhire thanked Dr. Robertson for coming down, and Dr. Robertson thanked the Court for allowing him to be interviewed and for giving him this time.

MRS. BRITTON: I apologize to Mr. Tate for the fact that my resume reached him late but I did not have the correct address. Maybe my resume made me seem older. I am 52. Since Mr. Franklin started with why did you apply, I have been involved with education for quite a long time. I started to school at 5, then skipped a grade, and have been in education just about all my life. My children are now grown and not at home. We were able to see them through college. I have had experience. Education is something that has been part of my life. It's a natural instinct that I read everything in the newspapers about education. I am still interested and involved even though I don't have children in school. It is very dear to my heart.

BALL: (Mr. Ball's wife and Mrs. Britton have been in PTA together.) Do you really think you want this. Do you have time to visit the schools.

ANSWER: I have visited just about all the schools in the County. I have a very capable chauffeur (indicated husband), my better half. He finds the schools for me. There aren't too many I have not visited. I am sorry that I have missed Ooltewah but I've been to most of the others. I have been in this thing a long time. 24 years.

BALL: After seeing what you have seen, what do you think about the conditions in the schools? What are you impressed with and what are you not impressed with?

ANSWER: There are problems. How can we solve some of our problems? The biggest way is to have public support for solving them. Public support comes from many areas. You should work with the PTA. I am now active in PTA now but I have seen bond issues passed because of public support and defeated because of non-support. Metro was defeated because the public did not want it. I have seen money acquired simply because parents were interested and involved. This is the key to solving our problems. I believe most problems can be solved by public interest. I think that is one of the problems we have had: people not interested enough. The public is going to have to become aware of what problems we do have.

HOLDER: I won't hold it against you that your husband is in the paper business. If you should be elected I would encourage you to visit the schools in the day time to get him off the streets. Concerning the food service situation, what are some of your thoughts?

ANSWER: I have been living in East Ridge and three cafeterias I am familiar with are very good but unfortunately some are not that well off. I really don't know about the cost. If it can be done as they say then I think it bears looking into. This is something I am not qualified to answer. There would be advantages in centralizing purchasing and storing. The principal needs to be involved because he is closest to it. I can't really give you a definite yes or no.

HOLDER: Would you consider autonomy an advantage?

ANSWER: If you talking about autonomy of the principal administering the school and the cafeteria.

JOHNSON: You have been to quite a few board meetings. What do you see is wrong?

ANSWER: They just don't get along. I have been trying to find out why. I have tried to get to the source of rumors. I was at the court hearing. I thought I would learn something. I did learn something and am still in the process of finding out. I am so concerned because I feel the children and the teachers are suffering. There has to be a change someway. If my face is what will start it, it will help.

JOHNSON: How will you solve the problem?

ANSWER: Public interest. The public is going to have to see for themselves and work it from that angle. Like the court decision today. Problems like this should be solved by discussion. I believe in democracy--government of the people and by the people. It has to be in order to have the right kind of schools. We have many problems. We should start attending school board meetings. It takes a lot of doing.

JOHNSON: I wish you luck if you're elected.

ATCHLEY: Could we have your opinion as to how you feel about an elected school board?

ANSWER: I understand I was credited for that. We've heard about an elected school board for years. I do commend this group for this screening committee. This is great. If we had an elected school board we would lose this selectivity. But school board members would be more answerable to the public. I have never felt that an elected school board was the right thing. At this point however I don't know. A lot hangs on your decision. There is a movement going for an elected school board. They have tried to do it through the PTA. There was a community study on the feasibility of this. No action was taken. I did not have anything to do with it. I am no longer active in the PTA.

MCKINNEY: Would you comment on teachers' organizations?

ANSWER: I am not quite sure what they involve. The school board said they did not want that. I read in the paper this week about the NEA and some of their suggestions. I will say this: I have worked with Dr. Solly and Julian Brewer in my PTA work and I respect TEA principles. Many times the legislative programs were the same. TEA is more professional than PTA. PTA is the only organization with a vested interest. I do think TEA has some very good principles and ways of getting things done. Can I plead ignorance?

MCKINNEY: Dr. Solly has retired.

BAKER: Why did you decide to become a candidate? Was it your own decision?

ANSWER: Do you mean the PTA? PTA does not back candidates. I would be running on my own. I would pay my expenses.

GARDENHIRE: I really appreciate the interest of all of you. I know you have strong feelings on this conflict. What do you see as the principal role for the board and the superintendent. What function should each serve?

ANSWER: The Superintendent is the educational leader; he is the person that provides the motivation for your leaders. I see the Board as the representative group of all citizens. They have to pay for what the superintendent wants. They would be the ones who reflect what the community wants and what they would support. They need to advocate for public education in this case.

GARDENHIRE: The Superintendent administrates and the Board makes the policy. They do overlap. Where should the ultimate authority lie?

ANSWER: With the Board. The Board is the representative group of citizens. They hold the pocketbook. Again this is the ideal situation. We do have problems but I don't know where they are. Dr. Robertson might not be abrasive and perhaps could be oil soothing troubled waters. I am not above slapping someone's hands.

NOLAN: One brief comment. I feel that you are entirely right in that the board should be representative of the citizens. One of the problems is a 7-year term, sort of like for life. Seems like it when someone is on it who is not doing what you want him to do. Public involvement is a real key to most of those problems. How would you believe you could get people involved?

ANSWER: Public understanding is what I would want. I see doing a lot of good things: talking to neighbors; talking to friends; having small meetings. PTA is ideal. Unfortunately not all members are there. This does not mean they are not interested.

NOLAN: Do you feel the school board members should go into the community?

ANSWER: There is a feeling for and against the school board. I believe the first thing I would want to do would be to talk to my friends. Start where I was and work out.

NOLAN: You have to crack the ice somewhere.

ANSWER: Summer is a bad time. During this past November a comment was made that caused people to think. Right now it is gaining ground. It is because of this that PTA members are coming to board meeting and observing. Interest is being generated and I believe it is picking up momentum. We need support and should read the newspapers and talk to the people in the community. I've been surprised that people say to me "I'm glad you're running for the school board." It shows people pay attention. I believe in the community and I believe in planning and organizing. I want to organize this. I am sure there are ways to go. The bond issue passed and we got our money. Maybe we can do it again; I believe it can be done.

LOCKABY: As a wife and mother you probably know about budgets; probably balance your checkbook. In education if the board has the final authority, we do you put priorities on where the money is spent?

ANSWER: It has to get to the child. That is what it is all about. This point was brought out in the court case. One member of the Board was quoted as saying that he would hope to see the day when there was nobody in the superintendent's office but the superintendent, a secretary, and an answering service. We need to motivate teachers. If a teacher is not qualified, then we are wasting tax dollars on that teacher. This leads me to the thought that discipline, effective discipline, makes a child a contributing citizen. You have got to have guidance, leadership, motivation, everything pointing toward the child. You can take all the money in the world in the classroom, but if the teacher is not teaching you're wasting money.

LOCKABY: If you had to make a cut, where would you make it?

ANSWER: (Facetiously) Ear to ear.

LOCKABY: If cuts were needed, do you think you would leave the administrative people or do you think administration should continue as heavy?

ANSWER: I think it is top heavy. I would love to see an organization chart. I think this would bear studying. There are of course forms to fill out and monthly reports but administration can overlap. Classroom needs are more important.

TATE: I would like to ask Dr. Robertson more about his position in reference to discipline. He said if a parent refuses to sign a statement, then the child should find another school. This smacks of professionalism. I have done a little police work. What is your position in terms of professional courtesy? What is your position concerning professional educators and parents regarding discipline.

ANSWER: Dr. Robertson thought teachers should be able to spend children without repercussion. I don't agree with this. I think teachers have to have a way of discipline. It should be the same for all children. The principal should stand up for the teacher; then he can take care of the teacher later if there is a disagreement.

TATE: I feel there is an element involving humanism. Teachers can be wrong. We should not set the procedure that the teacher is automatically right.

ANSWER: Teachers can be wrong. They should not be automatically exempt. Things should be judged on individual merit. I have seen teachers who ought to be strung up by their toenails. I have seen one case where I would have preferred charges.

PENDLEY: As a resident of East Ridge I am aware of the services contributed by the PTA in the schools. Now that both your daughters are out of school and you are not active in PTA, do you feel your interest in school affairs and the school board will continue although you have no direct interest.

ANSWER: Someone said school board members should have a child in school. When I had children in school, I didn't have time to give this service. Every case should be judged on its own merit. My interest will continue. It is something I am born with.

PENDLEY: Other than being a wife and mother, you are also a part-time secretary at church. Are you hours flexible? Would there be a problem?

ANSWER: No problem.

FRANKLIN: Do you have any strong feelings about ladies on the Board of Education. We now have one.

ANSWER: Sure I have strong feelings. You men can't be mothers. We mothers have got a good understanding of education. I think it start when a child is born. I do think women's viewpoints should be represented. I think I think like a woman.

JOHNSON: One thing you said troubles me. You mentioned something about the Council's decision hanging on what this Court did.

ANSWER: I did not mean to say that. There is no pressure from anyone. I do think that will color their decision. I think that if they think you as Quarterly Court members are trying to do your part and if this is what you choose to do, maybe changing faces might change a balance or a position that exists, then I think this would be an act of good faith.

JOHNSON: Are they supporting another candidate?

ANSWER: The PTA cannot do this legally. I don't say they would support me. They would like to have this problem resolved. They cannot support a person, just an issue. I don't think there would be any pressure.

ATHCLEY: If a teacher was not qualified, who would make this decision?

ANSWER: For a long time I have advocated merit pay. I think it is a good idea. As far as determining if a person is qualified, that is a big keg of worms. I believe there are standards set. Sometimes a teacher is eliminated before tenure begins. After they have tenure there are legal ways to do this. There are some in the classrooms that are not qualified.

PENDLEY: You keep referring to it as "this" problem. Does "this" problem have the superintendent opposing all the board members or are the board members divided up.

ANSWER: At board meetings there are comments about "Dr. Carter's side" and "my side." I don't know how they feel. I can't speak for the PTA. We recognize there are two sides. But I don't know how they are divided.

MR. DUGGAN: I appreciate the process you are going through. Certainly the last 13 or 14 months have been an experience. It has been somewhat different than I envisioned. I am proud to serve on the board.

FRANKLIN: What do you think can be done to ease the situation?

ANSWER: If we can come to a meeting of the minds, get to the point where we can sit down and talk about things in a constructive way and not be too stubborn about certain areas. I don't know what can be done. Several members have tried to see what can be done.

FRANKLIN: Is the board aware of the general disruption that has taken place in the last 7 or 8 months?

ANSWER: Very much aware of this and very concerned. Some of the problems have existed in the past. Some are decisions that have been made. I don't know how you can change the way a person thinks unless you sit down and try to talk things out. You can't go into the meeting with the attitude "I am right all the time." You have to meet a happy medium. I don't know how you solve this problem. We hope to get this ironed out.

PENDLEY: What is the score? 7 to 1? How is it divided? How many on your side?

ANSWER: All vote differently on different questions. It is usually about 5-2; the minutes will reflect that. This is on my side.

PENDLEY: Since the decision made today came out those on the majority side have lost. It is hard to be a loser. Do you think you could be an effective board member after going through this and losing?

ANSWER: I don't know that we have lost. This was straightened out by the court. One point that was proven was that the Board has the ultimate authority. The personnel part does not bother me; you have to look at both sides.

PENDLEY: Can you accept that decision and go on?

ANSWER: When a judge rules what is right you have to accept it. I accept things every day that I don't agree with but I accept them and go on.

TATE: My concern is that this Court appoints both the school board members and the superintendent. For seven years the board members can do anything they want to and the Court can't do anything and neither can the Council. The same applies to the superintendent. Do you have any suggestions in terms of a remedy for this? What is your position?

ANSWER: I think that anytime you are appointed by a body you are a representative of the people. I think the Board ought to work with the Quarterly Court. They hear a lot that goes on in the community. Everybody ought to work together.

TATE: Do you have any positive suggestion as a remedy. I see a blind spot. I see the Council appropriate money. I see the Court

appoint a board. I see the superintendent appointed. But the situation now present is that nobody has the power to say you have to stop or we will get rid of you. Somewhere there is a need for a break.

ANSWER: I have served on both. I don't see how it can be changed except by a change in the law. In some other systems in Tennessee there is an elected school board. The board is representative of the people. I don't know how you solve this problem?

GREEN: Have you ever put any politics into the board since you have been on it? When the Democrats took over the Election Commission it was you that was accused of getting back at Paul Starnes.
ANS: Could you go on record on this?

ANSWER: There was no politics concerned. The first time I heard about it was when the Council brought it up. I don't think the school board should look at any other governmental body. There were no politics involved. It was what was best for the school system and the children.

LOCKABY: In your experience, has this given you any feel for a different type of selection of school board members. Elected as opposed to appointed?

ANSWER: No, I think I am not for an elected school board. I don't think you can get qualified people. Counties with elected school board don't like it.

LOCKABY: How many people do you think have used the conflicts that have been made public to say that it would be good to have an elected school board?

ANSWER: I guess in the last three months I have gotten two negative calls on action the board has taken. I don't think the general public calls school board members to express opinions. I don't think an elected school board is the way to go. I think a lot of the problems are not really problems. They are blown out of contact.

LOCKABY: Some elements do use this as a springboard.

NOLAN: I have been very frustrated with what is going on. If I had it within my power I would fire the whole bunch. In line with what we were saying about the court being helpless after making an appointment--if the court adopted a policy, would you agree that if appointed you would sign a letter of resignation and submit it to us. I believe that's the way the President operates. That is not a fair question.

ANSWER: No it is not.

NOLAN: I mean everybody would; not just you.

ANSWER: You have one advantage. You can always pick up the telephone and talk to the people you appoint. Mutual understanding can go a long way.

NOLAN: All I have gotten is words when I have tried to do that.

ANSWER: If any Court member has problems, pick up the phone. I haven't gotten too many calls. It would help understanding. I think a lot of the trouble is a lack of understanding.

NOLAN: ...and maturity and willingness to set down and solve problems.

GARDENHIRE: Do you think one of the problems is that previously the Superintendent had problems but without the Sunshine Law we just didn't know about all of them. Do you think loss of face publicly is a problem?

ANSWER: I think anybody can work out conflicts without the public looking at you. In a private meeting you can iron things out. In business you do things in private.

GARDENHIRE: Sometimes I have gotten the feeling that people are performing and would not want to back down. Do you think the best way is to start putting new faces on the Board? Do you think you can go on from here?

ANSWER: I do not have any doubts. The things you hear about are when the board members do not agree. If things came out where we agree, you would find we often do. I don't know where the superintendent stands. This is a problem. Only the controversial things come out. Too much gets in the paper. The board tries to be on an even keel.

BAKER: You have served 18 months already. Why go back for full measure?

ANSWER: I think during the last 18 months I have gotten experience. It takes about 1½ years to get your feet on the ground. It was an advantage being a court member before. I have an interest in serving on board. I have a child in school. One graduated this year. I think I can contribute.

MCKINNEY: Do you plan to serve the full seven years if appointed?

ANSWER: It is my intention to serve. I will not say that some problems might come up that will change this.

JOHNSON: Who is going to pick up the tab for the law suits and how much will it be?

ANSWER: I don't know the amount. The taxpayers will pay for it. Dr. Carter will pay for his attorney. The board will pay for our lawyer and for Mr. Colston's. We have not gotten the bill but it's about \$50 a hour.

JOHNSON: How many more law suits are to come?

ANSWER: I have no idea.

HOLDER: I think most of my questions have been answered. I would like to ask you to evaluate your progress and tell what you consider to be your major contribution to the board.

ANSWER: Trying to solve the problem of where to put money. We have a lot of decisions which are judgmental. Sometimes it is hard to try to sift out what is tangible. We try to look at both sides and try to weigh this. I hope I have contributed. I feel like I have.

HOLDER: What do you see as priorities? What would you like for your contribution to be in the future? Peacemaker?

ANSWER: I would like for anyone to be a peacemaker. As far as priorities are concerned, I would like to see that the kids get the best education for the money involved. Money is a problem. We should provide books and cut personnel.

BALL: Some of these job descriptions--who does them?

ANSWER: Administration.

BALL: You've got some job and don't have people with sense enough to draw them up. Are they the ones? For instance, maintenance man. I got credited with firing Key. Is he going to draw up a job description for maintenance man? Dr. Carter said he knows nothing about it.

ANSWER: Most of them are drawn up by the superintendent. Board members have certain areas where they know more. I had problems with maintenance.

BALL: You don't go into this over night. Are they really going to look at experience. I have been in PTA. I still don't understand that bunch of people. They are people who think just because they are educated they are qualified. That's a bunch of hogwash. You've got people riding a horse who are not a jockey. Who will draw the job descriptions to fit the job.

ANSWER: It is the responsibility of administration to draw these up and then the board approves them. If they're wrong, then it's the board's fault. Anyone over maintenance should know something about buildings, etc. They should participate in the planning of schools. These are the kind of things we're worrying about. We can't look at the individual involved. We look at the job description and specifications. The Board should set the specifications and then hire someone who meets these.

PENDLEY: Concerning school appointments since I have been on the court, we have appointed 4 people to the school board. In every case but 1 the person asked to be reappointed and in every case we put in a new person. What is one reason we ought to re-appoint you?

ANSWER: I would like to think that the months I have been on the board have made me knowledgeable. I have served 15 months. That's about 15% of a 7 year term. It takes about 1½ years to get your feet on the ground. I think I can contribute more.

PENDLEY: After 7 year would you asked for reappointment?

ANSWER: I doubt it.

FRANKLIN: On this business of nutrition--would you comment on your feelings on this?

ANSWER: I don't think there are problems as to what it will cost. I am not bothered by the profit motive. Then they will produce. I have talked with gentlemen here with schools that have this and he said they produce. The board sets limits as to what they expect. I think East Ridge has a good system if it could be worked out throughout the system.

FRANKLIN: Is the only advantage to centralizing bulk buying?
If the board wanted to help the cafeterias operate they could build a facility for storage and then purchase from a central location and keep the money here.

ANSWER: Yours in a unique school.

FRANKLIN: We operate at a reasonable price. I don't want federal money. If I can do it it can be done everywhere. We don't have to have these outside companies come in.

ANSWER: They do it for profit of course. They do more than bulk buying. We need to look at the figures and talk with the principals. I don't know how it will go. I don't know all the prospects until I look at the money. It would be hard to provide money to build storage. We will try to get more this year from the County Council.

HOLDER: The system would have to pay for expertise?

ANSWER: Right, but is it better to pay a company to perform a service or fully centralize and put people in charge who don't have the incentive to produce. The profit motive does not bother me.

JOHNSON: Are you doing a cost analysis?

ANSWER: We have not yet. Right now it would be like comparing apples and oranges. We don't know the figures yet. Dr. Carter is going to work out an estimate.

FRANKLIN: We've got a lot of uneasy people in cafeterias.

BALL: Maybe it would help if people who have problems would call a Quarterly Court member near them and they could bring the problems to us. I bring them to you but if more people would call and bring problems to each member.

ANSWER: That would help. If the board members would listen. You could call the board member you are upset with.

BALL: Signal Mountain could call Doc, etc.

NOLAN: You can do that in Ooltewah if you want to but on Signal Mountain they can call the board member concerned.

ANSWER: The best way is to go to the board members and ask questions. Don't just get mad and stay mad.

INTERVIEW - ROBERT CECIL MILDRAM

DR. MILDRAM: I would like to make a brief statement. It is very natural to ask why am I here? I read in the newspaper that there were only 3 candidates so I thought I would stick my head out. I have a lot to offer: (1) I have spent my whole adult life in education. (2) I educated 3 children in public schools. (3) (These next two are negatives.) I am unhappy with what I read about the conflict between the superintendent and the school board. The reason I feel unhappy about this is that it affects the children and it affects the kind of education they are getting. (4) It has bothered me when I hear and notice the conflict between Chattanooga and Hamilton County schools. It is always with the idea that Hamilton County schools are not quite as good. They say, "Hamilton County--humph." That is why I am here. (Resume attached.)

BALL: I don't know enough to talk to him yet.

HOLDER: Your children were educated in public schools?

ANSWER: Hamilton County schools. We live on Signal Mountain.

HOLDER: Concerning food service. Maybe you are aware of the board discussion in regard to food management versus the present program. Could you share some of your thoughts on the pros and cons as you see them.

ANSWER: I will share my ideas. I am not sure it will work with SAGA and private companies. My own inclination would be for the Hamilton County schools to carral into one whole system, that they would be better of to do it themselves. There would be problems but I had rather run that road. I don't know much about it but what I read in the papers.

HOLDER: Would your job at UTC permit the time to visit schools and are you involved in night classes?

ANSWER: I am old enough not to have to do that much. I would have time.

BALL: I'm ready now. After reading all that's been in the papers, do you have any remedy between the board and the superintendent?

ANSWER: I guess we're not on the same wave length.

BALL: Have you not read in the papers that they don't get along?

ANSWER: I would define the jobs better and sharper. The roles should be defined more clearly. Dr. Carter said he had the right to do these things by law. Somewhere along the line the Board has to define the roles.

ATCHLEY: Are you familiar with the school transportation in Hamilton County?

ANSWER: They go by my house.

ATCHLEY: The people who drive the buses are hired by contract. Would you prefer that this be done by contract or would it be more feasible for the County to own the buses and hire the drivers

ANSWER: My proposal would be that the county school board own the buses. I am bothered with the idea of responsibility.

ATCHLEY: Do you feel the person driving does not just own the equipment but has the responsibility?

ANSWER: Should have. This is just ordinary responsibility.

MCKINNEY: How do you feel about teachers' unions?

ANSWER: You can almost guess my answer. People have to band together so that their voice can be heard. I don't see any difference with the school system. I am unhappy with some things I hear from NEA, TEA, CEA. Was it not Mrs. Britton who made the comment concerning merit? We have it at the University. It is a terribly difficult thing to do. If you get a raise based on years of service--in Mr. Ball's words "hogwash!" We're talking about relationship. We don't have a good association at the University. You ought to have a spokesman to talk in your fight.

BAKER: If you were elected to serve, how would you define the roles between the superintendent and the board?

ANSWER: I had not thought about that until tonight. I think it should be done through the board.

GARDENHIRE: How do you feel about an elected school board?

ANSWER: I am for an elected school board. I know it has limitations but I think it would be better for the community.

GARDENHIRE: Do you think it would be more representative?

ANSWER: I hope this would be true. But I am not sure. Tonight I counted 8 people who were here other than the people who had to be here. That is one of the reasons I am sticking my neck out.

LOCKABY: I am impressed by your credentials. Not too long ago I lived in a small community with an elected school board. You have lived in other communities. Did any of these have elected school boards?

ANSWER: Some did and some did not.

LOCKABY: I thought maybe you had had this experience. I lived in a small town for two years. In one year they had 4 elections. 20,000 people lived there. 90% of them voted in the school board election. It was very bitter. Only 45% of the people voted in the presidential election. In a small community more interest is shown. If you were to run for the school board, would you run on your philosophy of education or on your ability to serve the community.

ANSWER: It's difficult to say. I would say both. My philosophy of education would be paramount within a desire to serve the community

GREEN: I'll pass.

ANSWER: Scared you!

GREEN: Well, just back up a minute. You were born in 1913.

ANSWER: That makes me 63.

GREEN: This is a 7-year term. You would be 70 when it was finished.

ANSWER: With one foot in the grave.

PENDLEY: He's a young man; has children 18, 21, and 23.

GREEN: Would you be physically able to spend that type of time that is required by the school board meetings, etc., at that age?

ANSWER: The very fact that I have reached this age allows me to cut down on peripheral activities at the University. I have been on the governing board. My major job now is teaching; I am carrying a full load but these other peripheral things I do not have. Barring an act of God I shall continue.

PENDLEY: I tend to be in favor of a person with children in school. With that in mind how could you convince me to vote for you.

ANSWER: I disagree. My principal is fairness. It does not make any difference -- whether I have children in school, where I live, whether I'm black or white. One principal is to be fair--fair to all in my philosophy of education. I think you would tend to be more biased with kids in schools. I would not have wanted to run for the school board when Dr. Carter was principal of the Signal Mountain School.

FRANKLIN: We have pretty well selected a school board that is non-education-oriented. If you were elected, you would have a lot of input of philosophy. Where does the open classroom come?

ANSWER: By open classroom do you mean where everybody participates?

FRANKLIN: I mean where each moves at his own rate, in an open area, on an individual program.

ANSWER: I think this is extremely effective. I like the idea. But you need teachers and equipment. I would love to expand on that idea. I tried it myself; it is very effective in terms of the times. You would have to weigh it with the budget. It is great if you have the facilities, equipment, and money.

JOHNSON: I am concerned about the board and the superintendent. You indicated you have read the newspapers. What do you think is the problem?

ANSWER: I have a strong feeling that both the board and the superintendent are encroaching on the other's territory, partly because they don't know their own role. One of the jobs is to define the roles. I don't know if I could help but I think I could. That is one of the ways to go.

JOHNSON: If you were on the board and had problems with the credibility of the superintendent, how would you react?

ANSWER: I would go straight to him. Personally. I did this on Signal Mountain and have done it at the University.

ATCHLEY: Have you ever attended school board meetings?

ANSWER: Not recently. I was afraid my blood pressure would go up. I remember I did go a lot when Dixie Smith was chairman of the school board.

ATCHLEY: What would your blood pressure do if you were on the board?

GARDENHIRE: What about your philosophy of education? Give us ideas.

Do you favor a more or less innovative approach or would you stick to the basics? Experimental? Or less frills?

ANSWER: Let me dodge the question this way. You have got to be innovative in education. This demands innovative teachers and there are a great man at every level that are plodders. You can't really innovate with plodders. It seems that what we want to do is to be as innovative as we can but at this moment I am worried. I would guess that a great many, better than 50%, of my students can't read or write. If I had to lean, I guess I would lean toward basic education. The sad thing is that this demands almost as good teacher as innovative education.

BALL: I guess this means that I will have to take one of my boys out of your school up there.

ANSWER: I'll get my whip ready.

MR. WITHERSPOON: (Resume attached) I am not a professional educator. I have no qualifications from that standpoint. My interest in being here is a strong interest in the system as a user and a taxpayer. I think I can make a positive contribution as a member and improve the quality of education, the efficiency of the system, and presenting its cause to the community. I am not presumptuous enough to say one can solve all the problems but I would hope to be part of the solution, not a problem.

FRANKLIN: You have 2 children at Red Bank. Do you plan to continue in public schools.

ANSWER: Yes.

PENDLEY: You certainly fit my qualifications for having children in school. Other than that what is a qualification you have for serving on the school board.

ANSWER: Could I mention two? (1) I think I have good judgment, good common sense judgment. All of my working life I have been in judgmental type jobs. I am reasonably objective about the County school system. I have no particular axe to grind. (2) I have been a resident of Hamilton County almost all my life. I have lived in 5 different places in this county. I now live on Signal Mountain. I have friends in all parts of the county, on all economic levels. I have a good feel for what the county taxpayers and patrons expect of the school and what their desires are and I think I can balance all of these concerns and assist in arriving at decisions.

GREEN: Are you coming to us with the support of any group or on your own?

ANSWER: I have had ½ dozen people either ask if I would consider serving or encouraging me to go ahead. I represent individuals. I have no backing from any organization of any kind.

LOCKABY: After having seen some of the other candidates did this cause other people to encourage you to come in later as a candidate?

ANSWER: I have considered serving two previous times, many years ago and several years ago. I have been thinking about it since early this year. But I did not make my decision until the next to the last day. One reason I postponed my decision was that I am aware of the commitment of time involves. There were two or three things I had to do first in order to give this commitment and have ample time.

GARDENHIRE: Do you have any particular feelings about teachers' unions?

ANSWER: I am very opposed to all unions of public employees. I am not opposed to teachers belonging to professional organizations. I will not change my mind.

MCKINNEY: You are employed by Provident. If you should be asked as a board member to vote on a contract for insurance, how would you feel about voting?

ANSWER: That was one of the things I had to work out. At one time Provident did provide group insurance for the schools. I probably would not be here tonight if they still did. It might come up. I would simply remove myself from any role if Provident was

ATCHLEY: Would you be in favor of an appointed school board or an elected one?

ANSWER: I was strongly against an elected school board. For the last couple of years and now I am in favor of an elected school board in Hamilton County as the lesser of two evils.

ATCHLEY: If elected would you campaign for your position?

ANSWER: I had not thought of this. I don't know. I feel that I am open minded on this and would consider running for an elected school board.

ATCHLEY: Do you know Dr. Carter?

ANSWER: I have known him a little for over 20 years. Our wives worked together at TVA and I know them both. We are not close friends. We might go for three or four years without seeing each other. I don't have any particular bias one way or another. He was not principal while my children were in the school.

JOHNSON: What do you think the problem is?

ANSWER: I have read about it in the paper. I have not been to a school board meeting during this current dispute. I don't believe everything I read in the paper. But where there's that much smoke, there must be a little fire. I disagree with Dr. Mildram --it is not a problem of knowing responsibilities. First of all, the way it is set up you have the potential for conflict built in. You're going to have problems with the superintendent not accountable to the school board and the school board not accountable to anybody. My feeling is that what needs to be done is to keep the conflicts related to issues and not personalities. Now they not only have conflicts over issues but it is so much a personal thing that the issues get crowded with personalities. If I am on the school board I will not be able to immediately change this. I don't have a solution. I hope I would not add to the problem.

JOHNSON: Can you compromise?

ANSWER: I have spent most of my life compromising--with wife, etc. It does require compromise. In the present climate it would be difficult to compromise. There will be a difficult time for the next two years. It can't get any worse. The school system is suffering very badly in this situation. The morale of the people working in the system has got to be bitter. The patrons are getting disenchanted. If I were on the County Council I would be fed up to the teeth. It has got to get better.

HOLDER: I did not get a copy of your resume. What is your job at Provident?

ANSWER: Vice president of Marketing Services for the last 10-12 years.

HOLDER: Would your job permit the necessary time for the school board?

ANSWER: Yes, there would be no problem with my job interfering. I do have enough time that I can arrange to be gone. I don't travel now very much.

HOLDER: You spoke of an elected school board versus an appointed one. You said you were for an appointed board but now feel an elected one would be better. Could you tell us why you feel an elected board would be better?

ANSWER: I think times have changed. I don't think citizens in general are comfortable with appointed school boards. I no longer am. It creates a situation where no one is responsible. The people in the county in general are pretty fed up. Neither the superintendent or the board have to account. Seven years is too long to serve and not have to account to anybody. I could go on the school board and quit and there would be nothing you can do. With an elected school board you don't get that problem. There are others though.

BALL: The board and the superintendent have lots of problems. Do you have any idea what can be done to straighten them out? There is no way to do what we would like to do.

KNOWLES: For the record, what do you mean?

BALL: If you can't work together, resign. Do you have any better suggestions?

ANSWER: I have no better suggestions.

BALL: Do a lot of people feel like you do?

JOHNSON: What about the survey that was run. 58% of the people did feel the school board was responsible. The Times elaborated on this.

ANSWER: I believe the Chamber did a survey.

NOLAN: It was of the people in the community.

MRS. CLIFTON CLEAVELAND: There was a survey of 620 households, using 5's from area telephone exchanges in several counties surrounding this area.

PENDLEY: You brought up something that is bothering me. Since you changed your mind about an elected school board, do this mean we have done a bad job? Have we picked the wrong people?

ANSWER: My understanding is that for the past several years the County Court has very carefully evaluated candidates and advertised for them. What has gone on tonight indicates that you are conscientious.

PENDLEY: I think that in the past we had a school board that did not have anything to do but say yes. Now we have people who will speak up and say what they want.

ANSWER: I don't want to be a rubber stamp. My comments about an elected school board are not related to the current situation. It had nothing to do with this specific county situation. It is the lesser of two evils. I don't expect to go out and raise my voice about an elected school board.

PENDLEY: You agree that 7 years is too long a term. Would you want reappointment.

ANSWER: I doubt it.

NOLAN: It is a difficult question--we are talking about our system we have now. 7 years is too long and have no recourse, and we are comparing our present system with a nebulous elected school board. We don't know what we're talking about. If we could change to 4 year terms it might improve our system. And have some recourse. Get a signed resignation.

PENDLEY: If it was every 4 years to elect and it took a year to get your feet wet, that wouldn't leave much time.

BALL. I think you would have problems anyway.

ANSWER: I am not trying to sell an elected school board. I don't expect to conduct a campaign.

PENDLEY: You're not opposed to it.

LOCKABY: We are trying to ask everyone tonight to see if the present situation is causing different view.

ANSWER: I do not think you can have a good school system in the county unless the people have confidence in the school system. They are not going to want to do things without confidence. It seems to me that the school system has to be representative to their ideas of the school system. Everybody has different ideas. I think that there has been a loss of confidence in the Hamilton County school system. I don't think this group is to blame for that. I don't think we have a disaster.

FRANKLIN: What part do you think the Sunshine Law has played in this?

ANSWER: I have got views on the Sunshine Law. The kind of questioning you do tonight ought to be public. The whole community has a right to know. On the other hand if you are sitting here discussing the candidates I don't see how that can operate efficiently.

JOHNSON: What about a consolidated school system?

ANSWER: I am not for it. I don't think it will work right now. I am not going on the school board with the idea of working for it. If at sometime in the future there are changes and it would be feasible then I am not opposed to it. I don't think there is support in the city or the county for a consolidated school system now.

LOCKABY: Certain actions by the federal government.

ANSWER: That is part of it. I don't think the climate is such that there is the possibility of that happening.

LOCKABY: Given the opportunity to operate without intervention from "big brother" government, would it be feasible?

ANSWER: Then. I am not an expert. This area is probably large enough to operate two systems.



REPORT FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION - DR. DALE CARTER

Dr. Carter discussed various aspects of the attached report. He stated that the County Council had approved the budget on the day following the last school board meeting so the budget has not been finalized. He said that the total approved budget of \$23,281,885.00 is \$730,000.00 less than was requested so cuts will need to be made.

Dr. Carter said at the last Board meeting the curriculum was discussed. He said that a committee composed of teachers, administrators, and parents has met this year and an attempt has been made to involve the public as much as possible. The schools are seeking ways to understand the philosophy the public would like to have. A draft of philosophy and objectives is being developed and will be ready for publication soon after the next school year begins

Our program for handicapped students received a favorable report from a monitoring team from the State Department of Education. A written report has not yet been received but the verbal description given to the staff was very commendable, with words of commendation about the involvement of parents and those outside the schools as well as principals.

The State Department team also visited the vocational schools, said Dr. Carter, where the outlook for next year is very good. Dr. Carter said that the County schools have received a grant which will enable us to hire six rather than four people for the vocational schools next year.

A curriculum laboratory has been begun and although it is far from what we anticipate, it is all that our space and equipment will allow at this time. Dr. Carter said that many of the larger school systems have well-developed teacher learning centers. He said that we hope to proceed along this line as money becomes available.

Dr. Carter said that much time has been spent by the Board investigating cafeteria management and this will be discussed at the Board meeting on Thursday. He said he does not know how the Board will go on this.

Dr. Carter said that shortly after the last Board meeting it was decided that arbitration will be required regarding the annexed property and they are waiting now on a decision from Appeals Court.

Esquire McKinney said that he did not intend to make it seem like he was putting the teachers against the principals but he had noticed in the budget that there was a 10.4% increase for principals but only 6.6% for teachers. Dr. Carter said this does not represent just salary increases, that part of this is because the Board had decided that all principals are on 12-month service which means elementary and junior high principals will have additional time. He said another thing included in this is the position of assistant principal at Brown Middle School. Dr. Carter said that for the last three years a federal program had provided a middle school director but the funds for this were now exhausted so the County was reinstating that position. Dr. Carter said that another thing this represents is that the County is going to a salary schedule with equal increases across all years, as the HCEA has requested. If this new schedule is approved, it will provide a higher increase at upper levels since principals and administrators normally are in higher experience brackets. He said the increases range from 4.7% to 9.5%, with newer teachers receiving the 4.7% and teachers and principals with more experience receiving the higher percentages. He pointed out that naturally you don't have any beginning principals. He said that this 4% represents many things.

Esquire McKinney asked why the increase for teachers was 6.6% instead of 7%. Dr. Carter said the total salary increase was 7% of the total budget which was distributed on the new index with increases ranging from 4.7% to 9.5%. Gary Land stated that there was an adjustment in the teachers' salaries of about 6 less teachers which is reflected in this total. Dr. Carter said that going to this new index is going to create a greater range of salaries, with the lower side being among teachers because you don't have administration people without experience. Dr. Carter said this makes it look as though administration people are getting more and teachers less but actually those with 15 years or more experience are on the higher side. Mr. McKinney said that those getting a 4.7% increase are actually getting only 1.7 more than they would normally get. Mr. Land said that the base salary was increased 1.9%. Mr. McKinney said that three-year teachers would have gotten 3% with no increase and are getting 4.7% now so that would only be 1.7%. Dr. Carter and Mr. Land pointed out that the scale was developed to give increases for those with 20 and 25 years experience which has not been done before and this means the same amount of money distributed across this new index.

Dr. Carter said this seemed to be what was desired by almost everybody.

Esquire Franklin asked if Dr. Carter meant there would be 6 less teaching positions. Mr. Colston said that they had tried to equalize the schools. Dr. Carter said this would be subject to final adjustments on the new enrollment figures this fall.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Carter how much time and money the students have lost concerning these court suits, on Bob Lee, etc. Dr. Carter said that he did not know of anything that it has cost the students. Mr. Ball asked how much money it has cost the Board and the schools. Dr. Carter said that it has not cost the students any time but it has cost him personally considerable time. Dr. Carter said that loss of these positions would have penalized students beyond measure. Dr. Carter said he has received no bills as yet. He said that a law allowing the Board to employ an attorney was passed.

Mr. Pendley asked Dr. Carter if he might have to pay. Dr. Carter said that he knew he would have to pay his part but there is a question as to whether or not the Board can use public funds.

Judge Moore thanked Dr. Carter for his report.

The enrollment and average daily attendance in the Hamilton County Schools for the 1976-77 scholastic term were as follows:

<u>Total Enrollment</u>	<u>Average Daily Attendance</u>
23,290	19,755

The budget for the 1977-78 school term has not yet been finalized. The proposed budget which was submitted to you on May 15, 1977 was not approved by the County Council. The manner of reducing the proposed budget to the approved total of \$23,281,885 will be determined by the Board of Education at the next regularly scheduled meeting. This figure represents no change from the previous budget in local revenue. The expected State Revenue is based on the new funding formula. The projection of revenue earned on the new funding formula is not significantly different from that which would be earned on the previous formula.

Activities during this last quarter have included the completion of several handbooks and curriculum guides. Teacher handbooks in metric education and techniques for modifying problem behaviors have been developed and published along with middle school curriculum guides in most subject areas. The industrial arts teachers have been meeting regularly during this quarter with Mr. Colston and a consultant in a system analysis and redevelopment of the industrial arts curriculum. Their efforts will be published in the near future. Much work has also been accomplished in the area of career education. Materials have been developed to assist teachers in all grades in addition to a very thorough course development for grades eight, nine and ten in the fifteen career clusters identified by the U. S. Office of Education.

A curriculum advisory committee composed of teachers, administrators and parents has met regularly this year under the direction of Mr. Colston to examine the philosophy, objectives and total curriculum of the school system. A preliminary draft of philosophy and objectives has been prepared, but the committee recognizes the need for much additional work and a greatly expanded representation from persons outside the educational system. Another advisory committee for vocational education will also be established as required under the new Federal Funding Program.

The administration of our program for handicapped students has received very favorable comments from a monitoring team of the State Department of Education. In a preliminary verbal report, the three members of this team expressed very strong commendations of the total program emphasizing the concern and the performance of teachers and the involvement of principals and parents in the programming of handicapped students. We are presently serving all of the 3094 students verified as handicapped.

Another favorable report from the State Department of Education was given following an inspection of our Vocational Centers. The first year of operation of these Centers was very successful and productive following a very uncertain beginning due to the lack of equipment and teaching supplies. Most of the students enrolled in these courses have expressed a desire to continue and it appears that the second year will begin at near capacity. These students will be greatly assisted by four additional staff members employed to work with the academically disadvantaged at Soddy-Daisy and Ooltewah High

Schools. This will provide individual or small group instruction for these students and was made possible through a grant of \$62,547.00 obtained through an application by Mr. Colston for Federal VIP Funds (Vocational Improvement Program).


A small beginning was made in the establishment of a curriculum laboratory for the use of teachers in developing materials and lesson plans for classroom use. This facility is located at the Special Education Media Center in Harrison. Most of our teachers have already completed an orientation session at the lab to inspect the available equipment and to become familiar with its use. We hope to expand this concept to a well developed teacher learning center which would serve all teachers in the improvement of our in-service training and instructional improvement programs.

The Board of Education has recently invested considerable time in the investigation of changes in our cafeteria management. They have received proposals from four organizations desiring to provide vending machines and/or management services. No response has been made at this time to any of these proposals.

The suit filed by the Superintendent alleging inappropriate action by the Board of Education regarding personnel matters was heard on June 6, 1977. The Court reinstated Mr. Colston as Associate Superintendent and retained Mr. Bob Lee in the position assigned to him by the Board of Education. The latter decision was referred back to the Court on a motion to reconsider.

The suit filed by the City of Chattanooga requesting a declaratory judgment regarding the disposition of annexed school properties was heard on April 26, 1977. The Court ruled that arbitration was required in this dispute and this decision is now under appeal.



Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent of Hamilton County Schools, presented the report from the Department of Education. (copy attached). Dr. Carter noted that the total enrollment for the new year was 21,425. He stated that this represented an increase of 105 students. The small increase being the continuing effect of the phase-out period for the annexed areas.

Dr. Carter further reported that declining school population in some areas had forced a shift of students from Dallas Elementary to Alpine Crest, from East Ridge Elementary to Lacey Elementary and from Westview Elementary to Ooltewah Elementary Schools.

One item in the report which he said may not be understood is that approximately fifteen new teaching positions were established. This was done in the attempt to reduce the number of waivers required by classes with more than twenty-five students in the kindergarten and grades one thru three. Also, additional music and library positions were added to provide a County-wide rotation that would assure equitable opportunities in both of the above areas regardless of the size of school attended.

Four high school teachers were also employed under a special project named the Vocational Improvement Program Placement (VIP). An additional Vocational/Placement Counselor and a Supervisor of Counseling and Psychological Services was also added to the staff. In conclusion Dr. Carter said that the school system had had an exceptionally smooth beginning this year. (Dr. Carter's written report attached.)

Esquire Pendley raised the question about split classes. Dr. Carter indicated that it was being done throughout the County. The continuance of this practice will be determined by enrollment. (Last year 11 such split classes.) Another alternative, according to Dr. Carter, would be to pair students in the same grade level with an adjacent school.

Esquire Kennedy raised the question about the transfer of students from Westview School. Dr. Carter indicated that some kindergarten students had been transferred. Dr. Carter felt that the problem could be solved if the restrictions against using a near-by church room is waived.

Esquire Fred Johnson asked how the school lunch program was progressing this year. Dr. Carter said that it was a little early to determine but while reports were mixed, most reports were good.

He said that this early evaluation was made after talking with both students and teachers.

In response to a question from Esquire Pendley, Dr. Carter said that the upcoming time change would not affect the school schedule.

Esquire Tate inquired about legislation in Nashville regarding gifted children. He wanted to know if it would affect Hamilton County. Dr. Carter said that he knew of none. Dr. Carter asked his assistant, State Rep. Paul Starnes if there was anything pending in this area. Rep. Starnes said that SB 730 is now under consideration. He said a public hearing would be held in Chattanooga later this week on the proposed legislation. Mr. Starnes indicated a change in the law would affect the present structure.

Esquire Atchley asked Dr. Carter if he favored an elected school board. He said that while he had mixed emotions, he did favor an elected board.

Esquire Holder inquired as to the progress of the vocational education program. Dr. Carter said that comparisons with centers across the State revealed that the Hamilton County program is doing extremely well. He praised their Advisory Committee, the Chamber of Commerce and other community groups for assisting in the project.

Esquire Sullivan asked when the Sequoyah Center would be open. Dr. Carter reported it would be open in September, 1978.

Esquire Kennedy stated that the Court would miss Esquire Mary Gardenhire who is resigning. He praised her as a devoted Court member.

Esquire Gardenhire read a prepared statement, submitting her resignation effective October 9, 1977. (Copy attached.) Judge Moore then accepted the resignation. Because of the effective date, Judge Moore ruled that a new Judge Pro Tempore could not be elected at the meeting. Mrs. Gardenhire was given a standing ovation by her fellow Court members.

I find it necessary to tender my resignation from the Hamilton County Quarterly Court, effective October 9, 1977, due to a change in residence. My husband and I have purchased a home in the Highway 58 area, which is not in the Third J.P. District from which I was elected.

With only nine months left in a six year term, I regret very much the necessity for this action. In this case, I felt the needs of my family had to take priority over anything else.

It has been a pleasure to serve with each of you during these past years. I know that this Court has made every effort to promote more citizen participation in the county educational system. Our appointments have been made in an open and fair manner. We initiated open advertising for appointments to be filled and spent many hours in selecting what we felt at the time were the best qualified candidates. Under this Court, the black community has received its first representation on the county Tax Equalization Board and Agricultural Extension Committee. Many Court members have attended school board meetings in order to make informed decisions. Our votes have rarely been along partisan lines. I am satisfied that we have worked together better than most governmental bodies.

I know that remarks have been made which belittle serving on the Quarterly Court, because it no longer holds the power it once did. However, I look at it differently. What makes our system of government work is the opportunity for involvement of many everyday citizens from all walks of life. Serving on the Quarterly Court allows average people to run for office without the necessity for a great deal of financial backing. Perhaps this is why this Court has been able to retain its independence, responsible only to the voters of Hamilton County.

Serving on this Court has been an enriching and highly educational experience. I am deeply appreciative of the opportunity to represent the citizens of my district, and I wish each of you well in the future.

The total enrollment this term is presently 21,425. This figure will show some slight adjustment with the first monthly report which will be compiled later this week. The present figure reflects an increase of approximately 105 students over the first monthly report of last year.


This small increase reflects the continuing effect of the phase-out period for annexed areas. Individual school enrollments show much more variation than is indicated in this apparently stable total figure. While some areas are declining in school population, others are experiencing rapid growth. As a result, we have been forced to shift students from Dallas Elementary to Alpine Crest, from East Ridge Elementary to Lacey Elementary and from Westview Elementary to Ooltewah Elementary Schools. Similar shifts would have been required from Falling Water Elementary and Ganns-Middle Valley Elementary Schools, but were prevented by the moving of portable buildings. Harrison Elementary remains overcrowded because we had no available portables and no place to move these students. We had already moved the fourth and fifth grades to Brown Middle School. These present overcrowded conditions and the increased construction activity in each of these communities indicate the urgency for immediate school construction.

The budget figure approved by the Hamilton County Council was \$23,281,885. This budget has been amended and resubmitted as shown on the first page. The revenue for the approximate \$750,000 increase will come from surplus funds which resulted primarily from a carry-over of unencumbered funds from the previous budget which had been set aside for the renovation of Lookout Mountain Elementary and Falling Water Elementary Schools. Other contributions to this surplus were a better than expected percentage on the ADA division with the City and a higher than expected sales tax collection in the last quarter.

Approximately fifteen new teaching positions were established for various reasons. Several elementary positions were added in an attempt to reduce the number of waivers required by classes with more than twenty-five students in kindergartens and grades one through three. Additional music and library positions were added to provide a county-wide rotation that would assure equitable opportunities in both of these areas for all students in the county regardless of the size of school attended. Four high school teachers were employed under a special Federal project named the Vocational Improvement Program (VIP) designed to give special assistance to vocational students who are having difficulty in basic academics. One additional vocational/placement counselor was added to provide one such position for each vocational center. Dr. Rodney Fitzgerald was also added to the staff as Supervisor of Counseling and Psychological Services.

With the exception of inadequate facilities and the uprooting of teachers caused by the shifting populations, this school year had an exceptionally smooth beginning. The continuing dedication and cooperation of principals, teachers and all supporting staff members have made the very best out of every situation and have given assurance to the people of Hamilton County that the best education possible will result from whatever resources are provided.

A delegation of patrons from the Westview Elementary School headed by Mr. David Brooks appeared in opposition to some forty kindergarten students being bused to Ooltewah. Mr. Brooks stated that he had previously discussed the matter with Dr. Carter and the school board. He commended Dr. Carter for working on the problem as outlined earlier in the meeting.

Mr. Brooks also voiced concern at the overcrowded condition that faces the Westview community next year. He pleaded for funds to help correct the problem. Mr. Brooks stated that they were forming a citizen's group to stay abreast with the situation. The group announced plans to meet at the school, October 6, 1977, at 7:30 P.M.

Esquire Pendley inquired as to the possibility of using portable classrooms at Westview. Dr. Carter said that it costs about \$10,00 to move a portable classroom from one school to another. He indicated that it would be more economical to build a new one instead of moving from one location to another.

Dr. Carter also in response to a question said that the City of Chattanooga had paid the County for some portable classrooms, but sued to recover the cost.

Judge Moore explained that the County Council funds both city and county schools. The question was raised regarding consolidation of systems and Judge Moore said that parents and the community would have to answer that question.

A discussion was also conducted regarding the State's distribution of funds between the City and County schools. Dr. Carter suggested that a special committee could be formed to recommend a more equitable way of distributing bond funds.

REPORT FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION - DR. DALE CARTER

Dr. Dale Carter reported that the schools had operated very smoothly and routinely. The exception being the ice this date which closed schools on Signal and Mowbray Mountains.

He revealed that an alternate transportation plan had been published outlining the various bus routes on days when the weather is a factor in school transportation.

Dr. Carter also highlighted the following items which were contained in his written report which is attached.

- a. School Population - Present overcrowding conditions as well as projected conditions continue to be of concern . A study of space needs and various options for accommodating future enrollments is included in the written report.
- b. Vocational Improvement Program - This program which provides individualized instructions for vocational students who need special help in their regular subjects, has been expanded to include all County high schools.
- c. Community Education Program - Steps were initiated during the past quarter toward a Community Education Program and an expansion of Adult Basic Education (ABE) opportunities. Two additional staff members have been added to further develop procedures and opportunities.

At the conclusion of Dr. Carter's report, Esquire Kennedy congratulated the Superintendent for a good report. He particularly commented on the options offered regarding the population conditions.

Esquire Ball inquired as to the status of the school maintenance program. Dr. Carter responded by stating that he was pleased with the program, but that some expansion was needed. He expressed hope that more budget could be devoted to this area.

Esquire Holder asked for more information on the \$3,000,000 bond issue referred to in the Superintendent's report. Dr. Carter stated that the School Board would consider the bond question at their January 12, 1978 meeting. He predicted Board approval after which he will seek County Council approval.

The major concern of this past quarter has been the present and projected overcrowding of schools. The shifting of students reported in the October Report and the obvious necessity of extending this process next year caused many expressions of deep concern from various school and community groups. A study of space needs and various options for accommodating future enrollments is attached. The County Council has indicated the availability of approximately \$3,000,000 in rural bonds to be offered when the Board of Education finalizes the priority list of requests.

The Vocational Improvement Program, which provides individualized instructions for Vocational students who need special help in their regular subjects, has been expanded to include all high schools. The funding of these additional teachers was made possible through the assistance of the County Government in the allocation of CETA (Comprehensive Employment and Training Act) funds. Approval was also received this past week on a proposal submitted by Mr. Henry Colston to the State Department of Education for special funding to operate a Summer Pre-Vocational Program for tenth grade students. This program is designed to promote better understanding of various career opportunities to those students who will be devoting a major portion of their high school career in these directions.

Some very significant steps were initiated during this quarter toward a Community Education Program and an expansion of Adult Basic Education opportunities. By securing the approval of the State Department of Education to act as our own fiscal agent in the operation of an ABE Program and the help of another CETA Grant, it was possible to employ Miss Elizabeth Abernathy to devote full time to the development of educational opportunities for adults through the use of school facilities. Another ABE Grant of \$15,000 was secured through a special project written by Dr. Thelma Elliott to develop a process for the full utilization of all community services for ABE students. Mrs. Connie Walton was employed to develop the training procedures made possible by this project. Another project was submitted this past week for Federal funds which could assist in the development of the Community Education Program.

RESOLUTION COMMENDING SHERIFF PITTS AND HAMILTON COUNTY POLICE DEPARTMENT

Esquire Ball read the attached resolution commending Sheriff Jerry Pitts and the Hamilton County Police Department for their professionalism.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Kennedy, to adopt the resolution. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-1.

RESOLUTION

Whereas the Hamilton County Police Department has increased its visible patrol, and

Whereas the Hamilton County Police Department has established a substation in Coltewah and is planning to establish one in Middle Valley, and

Whereas the officers of the Hamilton County Police Department display a friendly and polite attitude toward the community, and

Whereas this attitude creates community support of the police and community help in investigating crime, and

Whereas the crime rate in Hamilton County for the first three quarters of 1977 has decreased 27% and traffic fatalities have decreased, now

Therefore be it resolved that the Hamilton County Quarterly Court commends Sheriff Pitts and the officers and employees of the Hamilton County Police Department for their professional actions and their role in this crime reduction and the reduction in fatalities.

After the formal agenda, Judge Moore asked if anyone was present who wished to address the Court. Mr. Robert Gallion of Dallas Hollow Road, Soddy, Tn. requested that he be heard. His request was granted.

Mr. Gallion said his father, who died December 12, 1977, of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound, lay on the floor of his home for three hours and at Erlanger Hospital for another eight hours. He stated that to his knowledge the Coroner's office never responded to a call to make an investigation. He said he knew of other cases when the Coroner's office did not respond to calls. He requested the Court "to appoint someone who would come when they are called".

The Reverend Sam Youngblood, a Church of God minister in the Soddy area supported Mr. Gallion in his criticism of the Coroner's office. He stated that the Coroner did not respond to calls when Victor Mysinger and Eva Mae Kennedy died.

Esquire Ball asked if the Court had any authority over the Coroner after they (the Court) made the appointment. Esquire Ball further stated that it appeared the Coroner was not doing his job.

Esquire Nolan asked Judge Moore to brief the Court on how the Coroner's office operates.

Judge Moore proceeded to outline the duties in general terms, stating that the law was somewhat vague as it relates to the Medical Examiner and the Coroner. He reported that in Hamilton County the two offices have been combined. He stated this arrangement should provide more efficiency. Judge Moore also reported that the Coroner is empowered to appoint deputies to assist him in the investigation of deaths surrounded by suspicion.

Esquire Pendley inquired as to the possibility of removing the Coroner if reports reveal that funds had been disbursed for investigating the Gallion death when in fact an investigation was not conducted. Judge Moore stated that he did not know what the law provided for removing a Coroner from office. Esquire Pendley suggested that an investigation be made to determine if payment was made in the Gallion case.

Judge Moore asked Clerk Knowles to report on the purpose of the meeting and his correspondence with Coroner Beckman.

Clerk Knowles said the meeting was a follow-up to the Court's regular meeting of January, 1978 at which time certain information from the Coroner was mandated. He revealed that Dr. Beckman had suggested a dinner meeting to discuss the matters raised at the January meeting. Clerk Knowles said that he polled the members of the Court and that seven preferred the dinner meeting and four preferred a meeting conducted at the Courthouse. He said that three of the four who preferred the Courthouse meeting voluntarily signed their preference sheet. They were Esquires Johnson, Holder and Franklin. Three members did not respond to the poll. Clerk Knowles also reported the Esquire Franklin and Kennedy had informed him that they had conflicts and would not be able to attend the dinner meeting.

Judge Moore then introduced Coroner Beckmann. Dr. Beckmann introduced his two deputy coroners, Bobby Hudson and Frank E. Walker. Also present was pathologist, Dr. Orhan Gork.

Dr. Beckmann distributed a brochure entitle, "The Tennessee Medical Examiner System" and a copy of Tennessee Department of Public Health Form Number 143. (Attached.)

Dr. Beckmann explained his duties as Coroner and Medical Examiner for Hamilton County. He said all deaths occurring in Hamilton County resulting from homicide, suicide, accidental death, death in prison from any cause or a death where a doctor was not in attendance of the deceased must be investigated.

He reported that his office investigates approximately one thousand (1,000) deaths each year. He reminded the Court that when a death occurs one of the area police departments receives the first call. His office is then called to investigate. Some investigations are done at the scene even though eventually all bodies are taken to Erlanger Hospital for examination (x-rays, lab work, etc.).

He reported that his deputies rotate, being on duty twenty-four hours and off twenty-four hours. Dr. Beckmann is on call twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

above outlined circumstances. When an autopsy is properly authorized, the county medical examiner shall notify the area pathologist that an autopsy is imminent. The county medical examiner shall arrange transportation to the laboratory of the area pathologist.

Reports

All reports prepared under this system are filed with the office of the Chief Medical Examiner and certified copies may be obtained by all authorized persons by directing the request to this office.

It is the moral obligation of every citizen to support law enforcement; and it is the purpose of the Medical Examiner System that justice be rendered not only in our courts but also in the accurate clarification of unnatural deaths. It is to this end that we solicit the cooperation and assistance of all persons in Tennessee.

THE TENNESSEE MEDICAL EXAMINER SYSTEM

In July of 1961 a state law was enacted in Tennessee which was entitled the Post Mortem Examination Act. This bill provides that certain types of death must be reported to the medical examiner of the county in which the death occurs and prescribes certain investigations which must ensue following this reporting. The purposes of this act are as follows:

1. To detect unsuspected homicides.
2. To protect the health of the community.
3. To clarify workmen compensation claims.
4. To provide more accurate vital statistics.
5. To facilitate closer cooperation between medicine and the law in the administration of justice.

This act provides for the appointment of a Chief Medical Examiner for the State and for the appointment of a physician in each county to perform the duties of county medical examiner. It also provides the means whereby autopsies may be ordered in certain cases. Each county medical examiner is appointed by the County Court following the submission of a list of eligible persons by the County Medical Society.

Reportable Deaths

The wording of Section 38-708 is, in part, as follows:

"Any physician, undertaker, law enforcement officer, or other person having knowledge of the death of any person from sudden violence or by casualty, or by suicide, or suddenly when in apparent health, or when found dead, or in prison, or in any suspicious, unusual or unnatural manner, or where the body is to be cremated shall immediately notify the county coroner and the county medical examiner or the district attorney general, the local police, or the county sheriff, who in turn shall notify

the county medical examiner." The wording of this law is clear, concise, and covers deaths of many types. Whenever a death occurs which in any way appears not to be from natural causes or when the cause and manner of death is unknown, the county medical examiner should be notified. The methods of this notification and the administration of this law will vary somewhat from county to county but either directly or through law enforcement agencies the county medical examiner must be notified.

The types of death to be reported include but are not limited to the following:

Suicides	Drownings
Homicides	Electrocutions and
Traffic	Lightning
Home and Industrial	Falls
Accidents	Burns and Scalds
Poisonings	Freezings or Exposure
Deaths in Prison	Suddenly when No Obvious
or Jails	Serious Disease Present
Airplane	Septic Abortion
Therapeutic Misadventure	Anesthetic Deaths

It should be emphasized that if a death is due to trauma in any form it is reportable, regardless of the time between injury and death.

When Autopsies are Authorized

Whenever a death occurs as is outlined by this act, the medical examiner shall make an investigation of the circumstances of the death which should include an examination of the body. The body may not be moved from its location, except to preserve the body or to maintain the flow of traffic, nor may it be embalmed without authorization by the county coroner and the county medical examiner. In those cases which are homicides or suspected homicides the county coroner and the county medical examiner may recommend that an autopsy be authorized by the district attorney general. The district attorney general in turn is given authority to authorize such autopsy under the

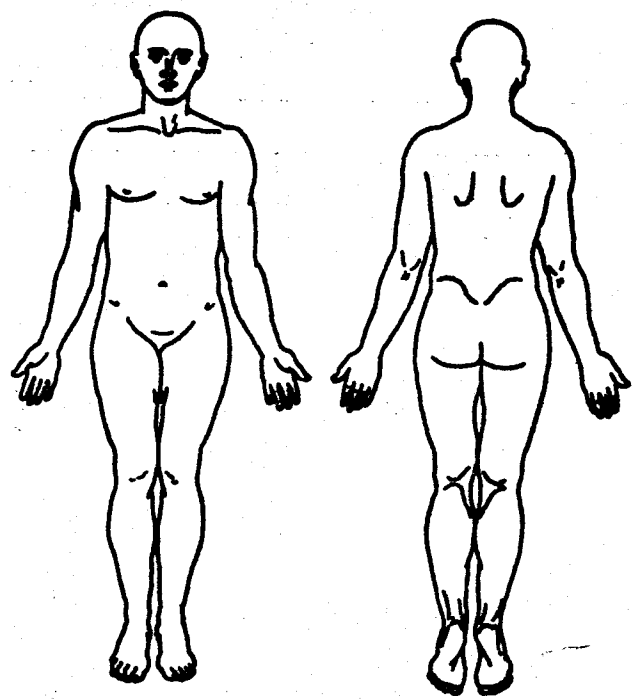

NARRATIVE SUMMARY OF CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING DEATH:

Dr. Beckmann reported Hamilton County has approximately 35 murders a year and that his office performs approximately 80 autopsies a year. Autopsies are done on all homicides, deaths thought to be homicides, all prisoners who die in jail and occasionally on persons who die in industrial accidents, or in automobile accidents to determine the exact cause of death.

Dr. Beckmann said that his county salary was \$14,000. annually and that he expends approximately \$4,000. of this amount to pay office and travel expenses. His secretary receives a county supplement to her salary. Deputy coroners are paid at the rate of \$10. per case and a travel allowance of 15¢ per mile while on official duty. Dr. Gork is paid \$75. per case.

He said that copies of his reports are sent to the State Medical Examiner and to the District Attorney General.

After this explanation of his duties, Dr. Beckmann read from his report concerning the death of Ernest Gallion, Soddy, Tn., who died of an apparent self-inflicted wound on December 12, 1977. He reported that the Hamilton County Police Department was notified of the Gallion death at approximately 7:15 A.M. on the above date. His office was called and after the investigation by the police was completed the body was moved to Erlanger Hospital with Deputy Coroner Hudson in charge. He further reported that Mr. Gallion's body arrived at the hospital at 9:30 A.M.

Deputy Coroner Hudson, during his lunch hour, went to Erlanger and discovered that the wound was a contact wound which indicated it was self-inflicted. The body was released at 2:00 P.M. on the December 12th, 1977 date. Dr. Beckmann said that was the last he had heard of the case until questions were raised at the Court's January 9th meeting.

Dr. Beckmann then invited questions from the floor.

Esquire Pendley wanted to know if his deputy was paid mileage to the Soddy residence on December 12th.

Dr. Beckmann said no, that his staff did not go to the Gallion home and that their investigative work was done at the hospital. Dr. Beckmann said that the body was ordered taken to the hospital by telephone. He said the time delay involved in this case was normal because of the regular employment responsibilities of his deputies and their inability to answer calls speedily. According to Dr. Beckmann, a number of investigations are done at lunch and at night.

S P E C I A L C A L L M E E T I N G

Esquire Johnson asked where the deputies reside.

It was reported that Deputy Walker lives in East Ridge; Deputy Hudson in Lookout Valley and Dr. Beckmann resides in East Brainerd. Dr. Beckmann said that in years past the late Jack Jenkins served as a deputy coroner in North Hamilton County. A replacement was named, but the person employed did not work out. In response to a comment, he said that he was of the opinion that a funeral director should not be appointed as a deputy because it suggested a conflict of interest.

Esquire Pendley inquired as to the requirements of a deputy coroner.

Dr. Beckmann said, "the job is learned by book learning and leg work. No schooling is required". However, Dr. Beckman did point out that Deputy Walker was a firearm expert and Deputy Hudson was chief of a rescue unit.

Esquire Lockaby wanted to know under what circumstances the Coroner was called in by the police.

Dr. Beckmann responded by saying that where suspicion exists when the initial police investigation is made.

Mr. Robert Gallion, a son of the deceased, stated that Funeral Director Jimmy Williamson made two trips to Erlanger to pick up the deceased and that it was after 6 P.M. on December 12th before the body was released.

Dr. Beckmann said Mr. Williamson got there the first time before the body did and that his office had not had an opportunity to complete their investigation. He reiterated that the Coroner's Office released the body at 2 P.M. However, he said that on occasion his office maintains custody of a body for as long as two days. He said he had no control as to when the hospital calls a funeral home to pick up a body.

Mr. Gallion again expressed the desire to have a deputy coroner in their area.

Dr. Beckmann invited Mr. Gallion to submit names of persons interested in serving.

Mrs. Shirley Gallion, a daughter-in-law of the deceased, pointed out another situation where the body of an acquaintance went directly to the funeral home. She said the acquaintance died of natural causes.

Dr. Beckmann said that this could be the case under natural causes, but that Mr. Gallion's death was not by natural causes. Dr. Beckmann apologized for the distress caused the family but that he had to do his job.

Mr. Bill Kennedy, Route 2, Soddy, Tn., said that his mother died of natural causes and that her body was taken to Erlanger.

S P E C I A L C A L L M E E T I N G

Dr. Beckmann said that in cases where a doctor was not attending the deceased he demanded their body be examined by his office at Erlanger. He said he was only trying to do his job and that he did not want to miss a suicide, homicide, etc.

Dr. Beckmann said that a deputy coroner in North Hamilton County would not always speed up funeral arrangements. When required the body would still be sent to Erlanger Hospital for examination.

The Reverend Sam Youngblood stated that he had knowledge of three different death situations involving the Coroner's Office. Rev. Youngblood said he didn't think the Coroner wasn't doing his job, but rather his concern was over the time a family had to wait for the body to be removed from the home.

Dr. Beckmann agreed with this concern, but said that if he was not called he couldn't take action.

Mr. Gallion said that the police gave them the impression that a body cannot be removed without the Coroner's permission.

Dr. Beckmann said that this is only true when a "coroner's case" is involved.

Esquire Ball asked if a deputy coroner had been in North Hamilton County could the Gallion case have been handled quicker.

Dr. Beckmann said that he did not believe it would have helped.

In responding to a question from Esquire Green, Dr. Beckmann said that he was not understaffed. Esquire Green suggested that Dr. Beckmann advertise when employing new deputies.

Esquire Johnson suggested that recruits be selected from the rescue squad. Esquire Johnson said that he wanted to go on record urging Dr. Beckmann to employ a deputy for North Hamilton County.

Esquire Nolan asked Dr. Beckmann if he and his deputies frequently visit the scene.

Dr. Beckmann indicated that they did about half of the time.

Esquire Pendley wanted to know what a deputy could earn serving in that area of the County.

Dr. Beckmann said that considering the \$10. per case fee a person should earn about \$150. per year.

Esquire Tate said that since the members of the Court did not earn but \$60.00 a year they may be interested.

Esquire Holder commended Dr. Bekcman for the manner in which he

answered the questions raised at the meeting. Esquire Holder inquired as to the occupation of the deputy coroners and their length of service. It was reported that Mr. Walker, a firearm expert, was a jeweler employed by Fischer-Evans. Mr. Hudson, chief of a rescue squad, is an executive with Velsicol Chemical Company. Mr. Walker has ten years service while Mr. Hudson has been a deputy coroner for nine years.

Esquire Lockaby asked Dr. Beckmann how long he had been in office.

Dr. Beckmann revealed that it would be eleven years April 1, 1978.

Esquire Pendley wanted to know if a deputy was appointed for the north county if he would be required to come to East Ridge to investigate a case.

Dr. Beckmann said he would not.

Mrs. Gallion asked Mr. Hudson how many miles he claimed when investigating Mr. Gallion's death.

Mr. Hudson said he believe it was 20 miles.

Esquire Tate inquired as to the length of term for the coroners.

Dr. Beckmann said that the term was for a two year period.

Mr. Melvin Kennedy observed that when his grandfather died, the Coroner's Office had to release his body before the funeral home could pick up the body. He thought that citizens had to wait too long for the coroner to act and that this was proof that a deputy was needed for their area.

Esquire Ball asked Dr. Beckmann if he thought anyone else in the medical profession would be interested in his job.

Dr. Beckmann said, "At this moment, no".

Esquire Johnson asked if Dr. Beckman did general practice.

Dr. Beckman informed the Court that he was in urology surgery.

Mr. B. F. Jones stated that he was a "good one" too.

Esquire Tate asked the Soddy delegation if the appointment of a deputy in their area would solve the problem. They indicated that it would.

Channel 9, Newsman Mike James wanted to know what the chances were of an additional deputy being appointed.

Dr. Beckmann responded that he did not know, but that money was available to fund the position.

In resonse to Esquire Johnson, Dr. Beckmann said that he would make a concentrated effort to fill the position.

Esquire Nolan observed that you couldn't pick up just anyone, that interest and judgment was required in serving as a deputy coroner.

Mr. Glen Atchley asked Dr. Beckman if he was present when the Court appointed him to his last term.

Dr. Beckman said that he was not.

Mr. Atchley also wanted to know if this absence was any indication that he was not interested in the job.

Dr. Beckmann said that he was told that it was not necessary for him to attend.

Dr. Beckmann under further questions from Mr. Atchley expressed a vital interest in the Coroner's job and stated that he thought he had done a good job for the past eleven years.

Esquire Pendley stated that he planned to pay for his meal tonight.

Dr. Beckmann in arranging the dinner said he was only trying to be a gentleman since he had never met the members of the Court.

Esquire Johnson said that he felt sorry for the delegation sitting through the dinner.

Esquire Lockaby said that she welcomed the opportunity to meet at night, since she worked during the day.

The Reverend Youngblood expressed his appreciation to Dr. Beckmann for the invitation for their delegation to eat, but that they had already eaten.

Esquire Tate inquired as to who told Dr. Beckmann that he did not need to appear before the Court when he was appointed.

Dr. Beckmann said he had been recommended by the Medical Society and that Judge Frost told him that he (Frost) would handle it.

Esquire Atchley said that she did not tell a news reporter that he (Beckman) was trying to mollify the Court by sponsoring a dinner meeting. She said sometimes things are taken out of context.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, seconded by Esquire Lockaby that Dr. Beckmann be given a vote of confidence. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-9. Absent-5.

Esquire Green complimented the group for their participation in the meeting.

ON MOTION of Esquire Nolan, seconded by Esquire Ball to adjourn.

Another extreme winter has once again caused disruption to our schools, but there were no school closings this year due to fuel shortages. Seven days were missed by the total system and up to four additional days were missed by schools in the north county area and on the mountains. These days have been rescheduled on in-service and conference days and on Saturdays. It will also be necessary to extend the length of days for one week and to extend the school term three days through Saturday, June 10, 1978.

Information is not yet available for projecting revenue for next year on the current funding formula. Budget planning has been initiated, but is too primary to discuss at this time. The Hamilton County Education Association has requested a salary increase of 14 1/2 percent. Plans for salary increases at the State level have not been announced at the time of this writing.

Major Board activity during this period has centered around the space needs and maintenance requirements over the next several years. Priorities for new building construction were finalized and presented to the County Council on February 15, 1978. The first phase of this request included a new thirty classroom elementary school in the Daisy-Dallas Area and an eight room addition to the Westview Elementary School. Phase two includes a new high school for Soddy-Daisy and Phase three requests two new elementary schools in the Harrison and Ooltewah-Westview communities. The total cost for these projects is estimated at slightly over twelve million dollars. This figure does not include capital needs for renovation and maintenance of present facilities. For improved maintenance services, the Board is in the process of employing an engineer to direct the work of this department.

Two new projects were approved for implementation. A competitive State funded project will begin operation this summer which is designed to prepare students to make vocational choices. It will provide orientation to the entire range of vocational offerings in addition to "hands-on" experience in selected vocations. Another project proposed jointly by Chattanooga State Community College and the Hamilton County Board of Education, if approved by the Commissioner, will provide first year college classes in the high school setting. This program would be limited to students who could qualify for accelerated work and joint high school and college credit would be received. Participating students would pay for their college courses and there would be no cost to the school system.



Esquire Holder said that since Representative Paul Starnes was present and his being a member of an important committee, that he might be able to fill the Court in or give an update of some of the County Government changes.

Rep. Starnes stated that there were two or three things that he would mention. He said that the recommendations that the Court had read or heard about, are the recommendations of a Committee of ten people. Five from the House and five from the Senate. It will go to the full House and the full Senate on the 24th or 25th of April. What the status is at this point is that there are two or three things that have been placed in form of motions and voted upon by the Committee and will go to the House. The bigger items are yet to be considered. One of these is that the County Executive as interpreted by the Attorney General, Everett Falk, does not have to be elected at this time for a four year term.

Rep. Starnes said that he did not agree with the Attorney General in this regard but none the less that was the case. The provision says that this person shall be elected. Rep. Starnes said he felt "shall" was a mandate and that the people should vote on this particular individual.

Rep. Starnes made a motion to that effect before the Committee. Clyde Webb from McMinn County tabled his motion and by a five to three vote his motion was sustained. Then a motion was made that applied to the counties of the 2nd class such as Knox and Hamilton and that motion did pass by a vote 8 to 0 from the Committee. What will happen in other counties based on this recommendation is that the County Judge will assume the title and position of County Executive and he will serve in this capacity for four years and then in four years be elected for a four year term that will put him on the schedule as the constitutional provision so states.

Another point that created discussion was on the districts as far as the legislative body is concerned. The constitutional provision states that 25 maximum and there has been a recommendation that there be a minimum of nine. This will go to the House and Senate. There will be no districts at large in this particular arrangement. If, in fact more than one person is running from a particular district, the Committee recommends that each seat be designated.

Rep. Starnes pointed out that another point discussed but not decided is the designation of the County Legislative body. In most counties, it is the Quarterly Court. In Hamilton, Polk, McMinn and Knox, it is vested in another body and so in those cases, based on what the Attorney General has told the Committee, and with the vote of the people that was abolished and the Quarterly Court is statutory. We cannot have two legislative bodies and so the County Legislative body would supersede any other bodies and the power then that would presently be in the Quarterly Court will be vested in the new County Legislative body. None of these recommendations have been decided. They will be submitted to the House, debated, and ultimately voted on.

Esquire Franklin asked if there would be some action this year and what was the status of this year's election.

Rep. Starnes said that it appeared that the Attorney General was going to say that those individuals who have qualified for a position as far as a May 2 deadline and all others with the exception of County Executive and County Legislative bodies would proceed on that particular time table for Primary and General elections and then possibly the second week of June there will be a special Primary election for the County Executive and the County Legislative body. That has not been decided nor has the Committee voted on it yet.

Esquire Tate asked if we were still going along with the one man, one vote concept in reference to these districts.

Rep. Starnes said the Attorney General informed the Committee that the one man one vote question is not pertinent in the case of the County Legislative body. That it was not a federal question.

Esquire Johnson asked why it was not a federal question now when it was before.

Rep. Starnes said he thought earlier probably other circumstances that he did not understand and he did not agree with the Attorney General on that point, but did say that it was not a federal issue and the one man one vote issue was not pertinent in this case.

Rep. Starnes said as he understood it, the law before spoke to Justice of the Peace Districts, whereas now the law speaks to County Legislative bodies.

Esquire Johnson asked if the re-districting would ultimately end up in the Legislature's hands.

Judge Moore said that when the Legislature gets through with setting whatever provisions that will be applicable to this community and they pass the law, then the County Council will by necessity have to geographically describe the districts and at least that has been the concensus of everyone concerned with the problem.

ELECTION OF NOTARIES PUBLIC

Esquire Franklin stated that the Court had made provisions for late applicants for notaries but he felt that it had become a burden on Mr. Knowles's office to handle these requests. Some of the requests seem to have pretty lame excuses for not getting their name on the list. Esquire Franklin felt that by making this provision available that the Court was encouraging more and more to fool around and come up with their request late.

Esquire Nolan asked Mr. Knowles about the people who submit their applications late. Who bears the expense of the letters, replies and secretarial work?

Mr. Knowles stated that his office did.

Esquire Nolan stated that he felt that it was considerable expense.

Mr. Knowles said his office reproduces the letters, encloses a self-addressed stamped envelope plus the mailing fee for the letters.

Esquire Nolan stated that he was in agreement with Esquire Franklin.

Esquire Franklin said that the notary applicant should at least pay the postage.

Mr. Knowles stated that his office could only charge fees that are set out in the code. It is just really a service to the business community. When they have these excuses, we try to accommodate them.

Esquire Tate said that due to the lateness of the Court's term and

since the Court had been doing it for close to six years that they should continue it for the next meeting. The Court has only one more meeting and he did not think that at this late date they could say they would not do something because the money spent in the interest of those people had already been spent.

Esquire Lockaby wanted to know if Mr. Knowles was responsible for the notices concerning the notaries being in the newspapers.

Mr. Knowles said that his office was responsible for the notices. They had started this procedure several terms ago. Mr. Knowles said that his office had quite a bit of response to the notices. If the notices had not been in the papers, the Court would probably have more special request to approve.

Mr. Knowles stated that his office did not encourage the request and that the Court did not get all the requests that came into his office.

Esquire Franklin said that the Court Clerk should let the applicant mail the letters.

Esquire Nolan stated that if Mr. Knowles was filtering the applicants that the Court continue the practice.

Esquire Franklin said that he wanted to withdraw his request.

ON MOTION of Esquire Kennedy, seconded by Esquire Johnson, that the following Notaries Public as presented by County Court Clerk Bill Knowles be elected (names of persons approved as Notaries are attached.) The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-11. Absent-2.

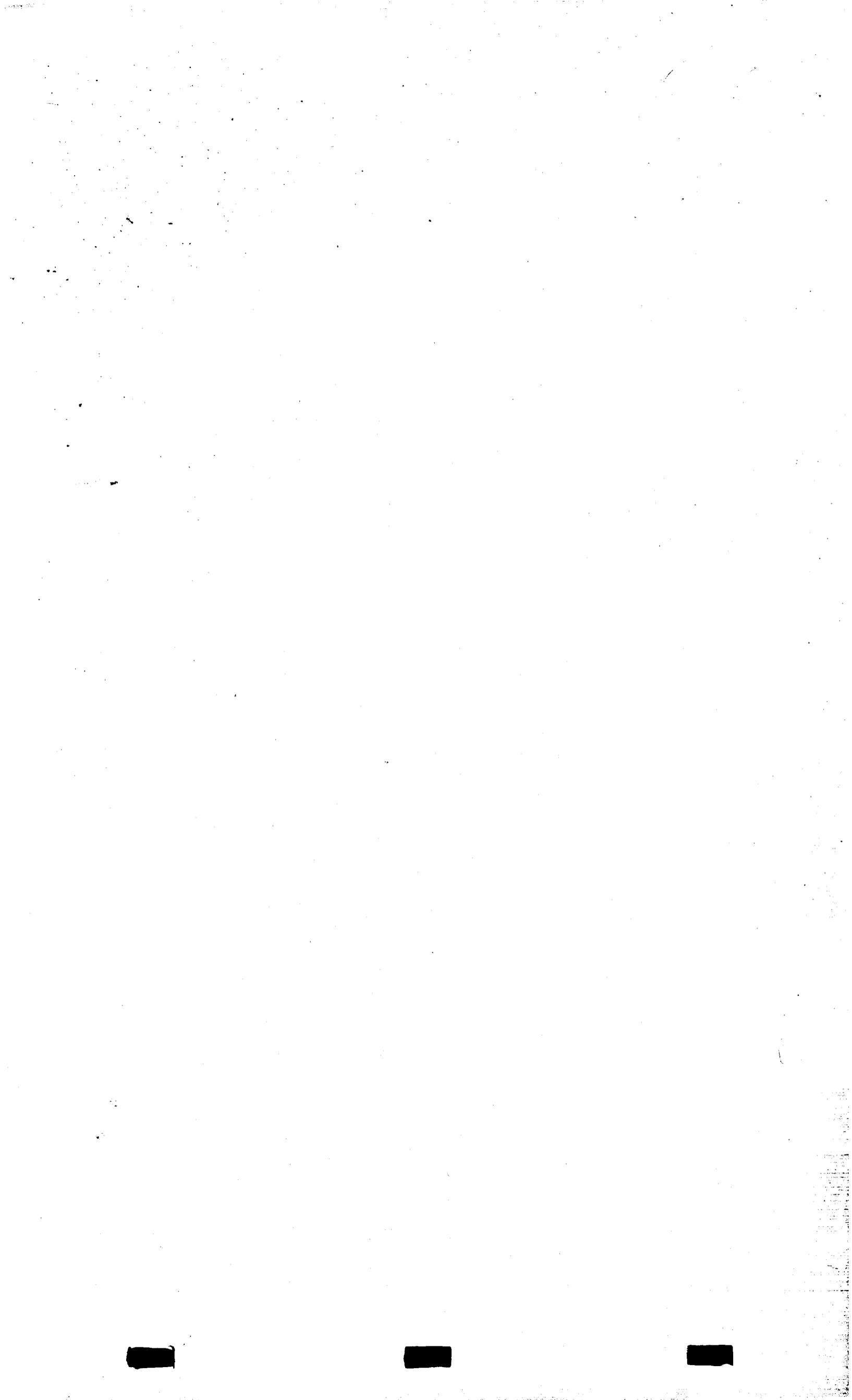

The report from the Department of Education was given by Dr. Dale Carter, Superintendent. (Copy of report attached).

Dr. Carter reported that the budget submitted to the County Council was returned \$800,000 less than requested. This included a \$675,000 amount that had been requested beyond the projected revenue plus another \$125,000 reduction as a result of anticipated reduction in revenue from the utility companies. This leaves the school board \$800,000 under the amount that was sent to the Court earlier. The Board of Education has not had an opportunity to meet to determine exactly how that reduction will be handled in the final allocation of the budget. The Board was pleased in terms of the capital outlay request. The County Council did provide through an approval of school bonds and through some provision of revenue sharing monies, an amount totaling 4.3 million for these capital improvements and new facilities that have been recently announced in the Daisy-Dallas community and in the Ooltewah-Westview community. All of these will be able to continue as planned with some additional facilities possibly in the Ganns and Dallas area. These additional facilities beyond the initial \$3,000,000 projection will also have to be discussed and approved at the next meeting of the Board.

Proficiency test from the State have been administered and the results of Hamilton County's were favorable as compared with the State, but still in terms of actual scores show some room for improvement. The results of the test are being utilized to adjust the curriculum in the areas indicated on the report. All the test have been analyzed in terms of the fifty objectives set forth by the State Department. These tests have been determined in respect to specific areas or geographic areas in the county. In-service has been established to orient the administration and individual staff members in these schools of the difficult areas with planning in terms of adjustments needed in the scheduling of the courses in each of these areas. Scheduling of the courses will be made by the Fall.

The addition to the Sequoyah Center will be in operation this Fall and the Board is very pleased with the response they are getting. The Board anticipates that the building will be near capacity when it first opens. Hixson High School will utilize this as was intended in the original planning. The response that has been received from the students and administrators of the city schools has been very pleasing. The Sequoyah Center will have all

the students from Hixson that they can accommodate in the very first enrollment.

Dr. Carter included a report from the Adult Basic Education courses that have been offered in the school system. Dr. Carter stated the reason it is included is that the Board had this year undertaken to manage Adult Basic Education in the county schools separate from those in the city schools. Dr. Carter said that he anticipated having somewhere around 40 to 50 classes in the next general school year.

Dr. Carter said this concluded his report and he would be glad to answer any questions from the Court.

Esquire Lockaby asked Dr. Carter if the proficiency test that are given the County students, the same type test that will be required by our State for graduation from high school in 1979 and 1980.

Dr. Carter said yes, it would not be this same test but it is this type of test. This test was drafted for this particular purpose by the State Department of Personnel. Drawing some particulars from other areas such as Denver where the proficiency testing got its strongest momentum some ten or twelve years ago. Dr. Carter said this was adapted for our own 8th grade students. He said that there are committees working on this test now. These committees include about 40 people from the State Department. The committees are made up of teachers, administrators and superintendents from across the state. He said they are working out the details of this directive and will soon be establishing the criteria for the test. Dr. Carter said it would be testing of the basics such as reading, language, spelling and math.

Esquire Lockaby stated that this is a tremendous concern of most of the parents in the county and city school system.

Dr. Carter stated that it was. There had been some question about the legality of proficiency testing. Dr. Carter said he felt the general feeling in the total educational community is that proficiency testing is a real grass roots movement that came from the community, the parents, and the teachers. He said it would be a benefit to the total school system. Dr. Carter said that it was not without its problems. He said that it will cost some more money and that it will require more testing at all grade levels. He said that it would require some individual programs for high school students and some alternative type of educational programs, but the direction that it will go is one that will be beneficial to all the people.

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Esquire Lockaby stated that a time when we worry about our tax money we would like to see our educational dollars spent so that our students would be able to pass a test in order to get along in the world.

Judge Pro Tem Tate thanked Dr. Carter for his report.

The enrollment and average daily attendance in the Hamilton County Schools for the 1977-78 scholastic term were as follows:

The budget submitted to the County Council for the 1978-79 school term is attached. This budget would require approximately \$800,000 above the projected revenue on the present tax base. Specific areas of reduction, if required, have not yet been determined by the Board of Education.

Planning is being continued on the construction of a new elementary school in the Daisy/Dallas area and for additions to the Westview and Ooltewah Elementary Schools. Even though no funds have been provided for these projects at the time of this writing, the County Council has responded very favorably to the request and it is anticipated that school bonds will be issued for this construction and may possibly be issued by the time this report is presented. The population growth in these communities have made the need for additional spaces critical. We also need additional spaces at Ganns-Middle Valley, Dallas Elementary Schools and additional spaces for secondary students in the Soddy-Daisy community.

Proficiency tests were administered to eighth grade students by the State Department of Education during this quarter. Hamilton County students scored well above the state averages in all four areas of testing, and ranked twenty-fourth among the one hundred and forty-three school systems tested. Although these results are commendable, they still leave considerable room for improvement. State and local scores are listed below:

The weaknesses evidenced by this testing among the fifty objectives of these tests have been analyzed, by school, and plans are under way for the complete dissemination of these results among the appropriate members of the staff. Curriculum changes and in-service training will follow the analysis of these results.

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of our students enroll with competency scores in either math or reading (or both) below the eighth grade level. Scores are particularly low in math (near the fourth or fifth grade levels).

The reference for that is Chapter 128 of the Public Acts of 1977.

ELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER.

Judge Pro Tem Tate stated that the next order of business was the election of a school board member. The term of Erskine Peoples expired.

Esquire Kennedy stated that it had been quite a privilege for him to have been associated with the various Esquires. Esquire Kennedy said the candidate that he would like to nominate was a combination of educator, businessman, and a gentleman. Esquire Kennedy said he was efficient, dependable and he always stood for those ideals which had brought progress to county education. Esquire Kennedy said he felt that most of our people would want representation for all people in the community to ensure justice. The Vocational Technical Centers at Sequoyah and Harrison continue to operate at near maximum potential. Placement of graduates has been excellent and enrollment for next term is near capacity in all areas with waiting lists in some. The new addition at the Sequoyah Center will be ready next fall and our initial response from Hixson High School students exceeded all expectations. A summer Prevocational Program has enabled us to provide orientation and experience in several vocational areas for ninth and tenth grade students.

The transfer of Adult Basic Education to our own supervision rather than continuing under the City administration has proven to be successful. A report of this program and future planning is attached.

SUMMARY

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION PROPOSAL
July 1, 1978 - June 30, 1979

June 19, 1978

We are now completing the first nine months of the Adult Basic Education program as a function of the Hamilton County Schools. The enrollment has exceeded 500 students during this school year. The regular program will continue through June 30 and other students will have been added before the close of the month. We feel our efforts have been successful.

Our holding power has been better than average. In an ABE Program, the retention rate is generally 50 percent or less, however, we have retained about 375-400 students for 12 or more class hours which qualifies them for enrollment purposes. Our retention rate has been about 65-70 percent.

Of those who have remained with us, we expect about 50 to have received their high school equivalency diplomas. At the end of May we had an active enrollment of 329 with an average per class of 11.5 students. A class of ten students in average daily attendance is considered to be adequate because of the individualized instruction required.

SUMMER ABE PROGRAMS

T.V. General Education Development (G.E.D.) Preparatory Program, Channel 45: An innovative program offered by Channel 45 for preparing advanced students to take the G.E.D. test will begin on July 17 and end September 14. Books for the series will be available through the County and City Schools. The students purchase their own books (\$9 for the set) and at that time they are enrolled in our ABE program. Based on the enrollment, we will receive 100 percent funding from the State for supervision and clerical services which will help cover our staff costs.

Regular Program, July 5 - September 15, 1978: We propose to continue, during the summer, 16 of the 23 classes which were operational during the 1977-78 school year. Six of these classes are offered at special requests and for selected groups. Three classes are in operation for State inmates at the County Jail, one is for the Silverdale Women's Detention Unit, and two others are available to the employees of the Alexian Brothers Home on Signal Mountain. All others will meet in our regular school facilities.

FALL ABE PROGRAM

Regular School Program, September 15, 1978 - June 30, 1978: The 16 classes carried through the summer will be continued, and others will be phased-in soon after school opens. We hope to have enrolled at least 600 students in 30-40 classes by late fall. We know there is a need for the classes, and we believe with sufficient advertising and recruitment, we will establish the demand and subsequent enrollment. Over 90 percent

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Judge Pro Tem Tate asked Mr. Witherspoon if he would like to make a statement.

Mr. Witherspoon said he would like to re-emphasize the things he had said when he appeared before the Court a year ago. Mr. Witherspoon said he had a deep personal interest in the public school system. He said that he was not an expert educator, but as a layman thought he could make a positive contribution to the Hamilton County School program. Mr. Witherspoon said that there were two areas where he could make a specific contribution. He said he thought there needed to be more done to develop public support for the Hamilton County School System and public education. He said he felt that he could make a contribution. Mr. Witherspoon stated that in order to do this, the people of this community must be assured that the Board is operating with the resources that they have available the very best system. Mr. Witherspoon said he would certainly work to that end. He said he would devote himself in both time and energy to carry out this responsibility. Mr. Witherspoon said if there were any questions, he would be happy to answer them.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked the Court if there were any questions. There were none. He thanked Mr. Witherspoon.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked Mr. Peoples if he would like to make a statement.

Mr. Peoples stated that it was a privilege to stand before the Court and attempt to make a statement. Mr. Peoples said he had been privileged by the Court to have served on the Hamilton County School Board for a period of ten years. However, he felt like as result of the experiences that he had received while serving on the School Board had been a benefit to him. Mr. Peoples stated that he had gained from those experiences much more than he had been able to give to the children of Hamilton County. He said that the children had always been his first goal. He said that having taught about twelve years in the Hamilton County School System placed him in a unique position to understand some of the problems in the classroom. Some of the problems of trying to do a job without the equipment that you need. Mr. Peoples stated that it certainly did give him the experience and opportunity of looking at a child and seeing that elation in his eyes when he asked did I do that right and you pat him on the shoulder and say yes, you did. Mr. Peoples said that those are the kind of things that money cannot buy.

He said that money was important but it could not buy the sense of satisfaction that you get from being privileged to touch the lives of young people. Mr. Peoples said he had done those things that he felt like were in the best interest of the system and the children. Mr. Peoples stated that he felt a person was really crazy to submit himself to a term on the Board of Education. He said he felt that he could say that because he had served for ten years. He said that his interest in education, children and this community makes him feel like he is indebted to offer to do whatever he might do in the best interest of the community. Mr. Peoples stated that his position and attitude is that if the Court should appoint him, he would do his best to live up to that vote of confidence, to offer all the service that he could. He said he would be cooperative, as prudent and as concerned with those Hamilton County dollars as he is with those dollars that he pays his light bill with. Mr. Peoples also said that if the Court should appoint Mr. Witherspoon he would have his blessings and his concurrence.

Mr. Peoples stated that he had not met Mr. Witherspoon, but he was not antagonistic toward him. Mr. Peoples said that he felt that Mr. Witherspoon could make a real meaningful and tremendous contribution to the Board. He said he felt that the Board needed new ideals, new energies and harmonious attitudes. Mr. Peoples said it had been his privilege to have served and he is thankful and indebted to the Court for the privilege and opportunity to have had the experience to serve on the Board of Education. Mr. Peoples stated that if the Court appoints him for another term, he would gladly do his best to make a good member of the Hamilton County School Board.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked the Court if they had any questions for Mr. Peoples. There were none.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked if there was any discussion in reference to the two candidates for the school board.

Esquire Franklin said he would like to speak to the Court. He stated that as all members of the Court knew, they were ending six years of service on the Court. He said that in the initial stages the Court had a mutual agreement that the Court wanted to do what was best for Hamilton County, particularly in the area of schools. Esquire Franklin stated that one of the basic premise of democracy was to have people representation for all people. He said that the Court agreed that they needed to keep people representation on the Board of Education and that those people should be those who used our school system.

Esquire Franklin said that for some time the Court had held pretty close to that, but then they begin to make decisions that were not in agreement with that anymore, so that at the present time, the Court now has three people representing the same district on the school board.

Esquire Franklin stated that he had told Mr. Witherspoon this. He said that it was not anything personal. He said he thought that Mr. Witherspoon a very fine gentleman and would serve well if elected. Esquire Franklin said that the Board of Education would have two members from the Red Bank and Signal Mountain area if they were to elect Mr. Witherspoon. He said that there would no longer be any representation from the black community on the Board of Education. Esquire Franklin said that approximately 20% of our students are black. He said he was not concerned about this in that he is not one that believes in quotas but in quality people. Esquire Franklin said that he thought Erskine Peoples was a quality person, therefore, he wanted to urge each member of the Court to put aside all political considerations and do what was best for the school system.

Judge Pro Tem Tate thanked Esquire Franklin and asked if there were any other comments.

Esquire Nolan stated that he would certainly respect what Esquire Franklin had said and that he had a high regard for Erskine Peoples. Esquire Nolan said he thought Mr. Peoples a very fine gentleman and he had done a tremendous job. Esquire Nolan said he had the utmost respect for him.

Esquire Nolan stated that he would not have placed in nomination the name of anyone that he did not think would represent all the people. Esquire Nolan said he felt that John Witherspoon would represent all the people. Esquire Nolan said he thought Mr. Witherspoon was that sort of fellow or else he would not have nominated him or encouraged support for him. Esquire Nolan said he felt that Mr. Witherspoon would represent all the people, no matter where they lived, no matter what their race, or what their status in life.

Esquire Johnson said in response to Esquire Franklin and Esquire Nolan that what Esquire Franklin had said was basically true but he thought it had been the concensus of the Court and the school personnel about seven year terms for school board members. He said that without question everybody had been totally in agreement that seven years was enough. Esquire Johnson

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stated that in fact the Court had tried to make some moves to the Legislature to eliminate that and try and work out a four year term. Esquire Johnson said that keeping with that tradition, he felt very strongly that seventeen years on the Board demands a whole lot of a person.

Esquire Johnson stated that he wanted to bring that to the attention of the Court.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked if there were any other comments.

Mr. George McCoy stated that in the six years that he served as principal and Erskine Peoples was on the school board, never was there a time when he did not have time to talk to him about the welfare of his children.

Esquire Lockaby stated that she wanted Mr. Peoples to know that she thought he was one of the most sensitive educators that the Court had ever had serving but her vote was going to go to Mr. Witherspoon but it had nothing to do with her regard for the honorable job Mr. Peoples had done on the School Board. Esquire Lockaby said she wanted to thank Mr. Peoples.

Judge Pro Tem Tate asked if there were any further comments.

VOTING FOR SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER:

On a Roll Call vote, those voting for Mr. Erskine Peoples were: Esquires Franklin, Pendley, Kennedy, McKinney. Total votes-4.

On a Roll Call vote, those voting for Mr. John Witherspoon were: Esquires Ball, Lockaby, Holder, Baker, Nolan, Johnson, Sullivan. Esquire Rachel Atchley- Passed. Total votes-7.

Judge Pro Tem Tate stated that John Witherspoon, Jr. was duly elected as School Board Member to serve a 7-year term.

Judge Pro Tem Tate said that he would like to extend to Mr. Peoples the Courts total appreciation for the time, energy, and effort that he personally knew that Mr. Peoples had spent during his time on the School Board. He said he wanted to commend Mr. Peoples on a very good job.

Mr. Peoples stated that he would like to thank the Court again. He said that Mr. Witherspoon certainly had his support.

Mr. Witherspoon said he would like to thank the Court for the confidence that they had shown in him and he assured the Court that he would do his utmost over the next 7-years in justifying that confidence.

Esquire Nolan said that this was one occasion when he was in a unique position of having to choose between two of the best candidates that he knew of. He said it was his regret that they could not have both of them. He

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said a lot of things had gone into the influencing of his vote.

Esquire Nolan said that he wanted to sincerely express his deepest appreciation to Erskine Peoples for the fine job he had done. He said that Mr. Peoples had his deepest respect and certainly his friendship. He wished for John Witherspoon success in his job.

Esquire Holder stated that there had been quite a few complimentary words spoken about Mr. Peoples' service on the School Board. He said that he wanted to echo those same sentiments. He said that he thought Erskine Peoples had been an excellent School Board member and had served well. Esquire Holder said that Mr. Peoples had been very dedicated to the task in the ten years that he had served on the School Board.

ON MOTION of Esquire Holder, seconded by Esquire Nolan, that the Court go on record as recognizing Mr. Peoples for his ten years of loyal, dedicated service and direct the Clerk to indicate that by sending Mr. Peoples a letter of accommodation on behalf of the Court. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-1.

Judge Pro Tem Tate stated that the Court had come to the end of the agenda. He asked if there was any more business.

ON MOTION of Esquire Ball, that the Court ask for the resignation of Dr. Carter as School Superintendent.

There was no second on the Motion.

Judge Pro Tem Tate said that due to a lack of second on Esquire Ball's motion, the motion was dead.

ON MOTION of Esquire Johnson, seconded by Esquire Ball, to have an adjourned session of the Court for August 10, 1978 for the purpose of calling for a referendum.

Esquire Johnson said that there was going to be a referendum on August 3 relating to three questions on the School Board situation. The three questions are: Whether to have an elected School Board and an appointed Superintendent; whether to have an elected School Board and an elected Superintendent; or to keep things as they are with an appointed School Board and an appointed Superintendent.

Esquire Johnson said the thing that was puzzling to him was that he had not seen a lot of attention called to this particular referendum. Secondly, it seemed that it was more of a questionnaire that the Legislature would take into consideration. He said he could see a lot of deliberation when the Legis-

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lature would take into consideration. He said he could see a lot of deliberation when the Legislature goes back into session as far as setting out a private act relating to Hamilton County.

Esquire Johnson said that he would like to have time to study the referendum and then come back on the 10th and discuss it and call for a specific referendum in November.

Esquire Pendley asked Esquire Johnson if the Court were to meet on the 10th would it be so that the Court could decide what they as a group would recommend or what is the purpose of the meeting.

Esquire Johnson said that his understanding was that the Quarterly Court did have the authority to call for referendum. He said the Court could do this based on the sentiment of the August 3rd referendum. He said to go to the people and let them decide what form of Board of Education they want or what type they want without having to go to the Legislature to discuss the three questions that the people voted on.

Esquire Johnson said that estimates of the vote on August 3rd goes as high as 60,000 and above, but he said he was willing to bet that 3,000 would not cast a ballot on that particular issue because it had not been called to their attention.

Esquire Pendley asked Esquire Johnson why the meeting on the 10th when the election was on the 3rd?

Esquire Johnson said he meant November 3rd.

Esquire Lockaby asked what the specific wording was?

Esquire Johnson stated that he did not know the exact wording, but basically it says do you desire an elected School Board, an elected Superintendent; do you desire an elected School Board, an appointed Superintendent; or do you desire to keep it the same as it is.

Esquire Lockaby asked Esquire Johnson if it was not in the form of a referendum?

Esquire Johnson said that it was and it wasn't. He said it was not a mandate from the people. He said that the Court needed to let the people of Hamilton County know what is going on.

Esquire Johnson stated that he could see a hassle among the Legislators. A political hassle using the three questions to justify anything. He said he was not saying that the Legislature would not do a good job, but that he had rather have a mandate from the people.

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Esquire Lockaby stated that using section 2 and 3, this act shall have no effect unless it is approved by 2/3 vote of the County Council of Hamilton County. Its approval or non-approval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the Council and certified by the Secretary of State. Section 3 says for the purpose of approving this act as provide by section 2, it shall take effect upon becoming a law.

Esquire Johnson said that this particular referendum was presented to the County Council and was called by the County Council.

Judge Pro Tem Tate said he thought what Esquire Johnson was saying was that he felt that the Court would have an effect on the action of the Legislature after having gathered the information in the various districts.

Esquire Pendley asked if the Court had the authority to call a referendum.

Esquire Lockaby asked Rep. Paul Starnes if he had any comments to make as to the effect of the law to the referendum.

Rep. Starnes stated that he thought the real question was where the responsibility and authority lies in calling for a referendum. He said that the Court would have to go back to the Private Acts of Hamilton County of 1941 when the Council was first established and look at what authority was vested in that Council versus the Quarterly Court. He said he was not sure that because it applied to McMinn County that it would apply in Hamilton County. He said that it might be that Hamilton County was so structured that the County Council would have to call for that particular move. Rep. Starnes said he was not sure enough himself as to what it is to say what the case may be.

Rep. Starnes said he did think that the three questions that will appear on the August ballot will get some votes. He said that the Court would hear a voice. He said he was not sure how loud the voice would be. He said he was not sure how many people would pay any particular attention to that question but he said he did think the Court would get some director from the populace on August 3rd.

Esquire Ball stated that he hoped that this discussion would not turn in to where the Court is endorsing an elected School Board.

Judge Pro Tem Tate stated that he thought the Court was trying to arrive at a position. He said that this was not a stated position as such, but merely to evaluate in terms of these questions.

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Judge Pro Tem Tate asked the Court if they were ready to vote on the Motion before the Court. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-13. Absent-0.

Esquire Sullivan said that to her this was an historical occasion since it was the last meeting of the Quarterly Court . She said that as far as her knowledge went, that Mary Gardenhire and herself were the only women ever elected to a Quarterly Court.

Esquire Sullivan said it had been a very rewarding experience to her. She said she had come to respect the members of the Court and had enjoyed working with them. She said the County could not find finer people.

Judge Pro Tem Tate read a letter from County Judge Don Moore.

Judge Moore's letter read that he would be out of town on July 10th and would therefore be unable to preside at the Quarterly Court meeting. Since this is the last meeting of the Quarterly Court, he had hoped to be able to be present, but due to a conflict that had existed for several months as a result of a prior commitment, he would be unable to attend. He asked that Judge Pro Tem Tate convey his best wishes to the members of the Quarterly Court and convey to them his appreciation for their service to the total community.

Judge Pro Tem Tate said he thought the Court would be interested in the letter.


Esquire Lockaby said she would like to add to what Esquire Sullivan had said with one addition. She said that on September 1st, the people have chosen to have a new form of government for our county. She said it took the power of the County Council which is considerable and it takes the power of the Quarterly Court. She said it was like an old building that is solidly built. Mr. Knowles asked Judge Pro Tem Tate if he wanted the Clerk's office to submit Notary Public applicants at the August 10th meeting.


Judge Pro Tem Tate said he thought it would be a little out of order. He said that a called meeting was for a specific purpose.

County Court Clerk W. F. (Bill) Knowles called the Roll of the Quarterly Court and the following answered to their names: Esquires Pendley, Atchley, Baker, Nolan and Johnson. Absent were Esquires Franklin, Ball, Lockaby, Kennedy, Tate, Holder, McKinney, and Sullivan. Total present-5. Absent-8.

Judge Moore stated that due to a lack of a quorum the Court would not be able to pass on any business.

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Esquire Nolan stated that he would like to make a comment in reference to the position of a county coroner. He stated that the Court did not elect a coroner at the July meeting because of a misunderstanding of the law. He stated that he had a letter from the County Technical Assistance which gave him an opinion in regard to the position of coroner. He stated that the County should have both a coroner and a medical examiner. He stated that each office had different duties which they perform but in some areas the duties were the same. He stated that Dr. John Adams, Jr. presently served as the medical examiner but should also be appointed as coroner.

Esquire Nolan stated the office of coroner was not a constitutional office. He stated that T. C. A. 80-901 requires the County Court to elect the coroner and T. C. A. 38-704 requires the County Court to elect the medical examiner. Each of these are mandatory.

Esquire Nolan stated that he had hoped that the Court could have elected the coroner at today's meeting but that it would have to wait until the new County Commission met. He stated that he hoped that this would be one of the first orders of business.

Judge Moore stated that he thought it would be appropriate to elect the medical examiner to the office of coroner. He stated that most of their duties were the same with the exception that the coroner has the authority to call for an inquest but the medical examiner does not. He also stated that the medical examiner and not the coroner could conduct a post mortem investigation. He also stated that the coroner could discharge the duties of the sheriff if that office were vacated.

County Court Clerk Bill Knowles asked Esquire Nolan if he would like for the Clerk's Office to transmit this letter and information concerning the coroner to the new governing body for their action.

Esquire Nolan stated that he would appreciate it and he hoped that this would be one of the first items on the agenda.

Judge Moore stated that this was appropriate and would be helpful to the new Commission.

Clerk Knowles said that he had 60 notary applicants waiting on the Court for approval but would now have to wait until the commission met

to be passed on because there was not a quorum present.

Esquire Johnson stated that the Court asked for the adjourned meeting for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of a November referendum for a different type of selection for school board and superintendent based on what might have come out of the August referendum.

Esquire Johnson stated that after looking at the August referendum he was still a little bit convinced that people were confused because there were three questions to answer. He stated that since that time the city of Chattanooga has proposed a referendum for November for an elected school board for the city.

Esquire Johnson stated that in talking with some of the people from the city and Rep. Paul Starnes he said it seemed that the Court would not be able to get a referendum. He stated that there was a question of whether the Court had the authority to call for a referendum.

Esquire Johnson stated that if the Court did not have the authority for a referendum they would have passed their desires for a referendum on to the County Council. He stated that if they were to call for a November referendum for purpose of an elected school board then this would be on the ballot with the city's referendum and he felt this would lead to more confusion.

Esquire Johnson stated that what the Court really had in mind is what took place in McMinn County. He stated that the question on their ballot was very simply "Shall we have an elected school board and appointed superintendent?" He stated that the referendum carried by a 4 to 1 margin.

Esquire Johnson suggested that the people talk with their legislature because it looked like it was going to get back to a legislative situation and recommend that we have an elected school board and an appointed superintendent.

Esquire Nolan stated that the way the questions were put on the ballot were very confusing to him. He stated that he had to ask someone to help him in order to figure out what he was suppose to do.

Esquire Johnson stated that the total vote came out with the fact that the people wanted an elected school board and an elected superintendent. He stated that he felt that this would not be any more workable than the situation we have now with everyone being appointed.

He said he was in faovr of an elected school board and an appointed superintendent.

Esquire Pendley stated that he had a question concerning Justice of the Peace and marriage ceremonies. He wanted to know what the Justice of the Peace situation would be for performing weddings. He also asked if the County Commission would perform marriage ceremonies.

Judge Moore stated that the Justice of the Peace would no longer be in existence and the County Commissioners would perform marriages.

ON MOTION of Esquire Pendley, seconded by Esquire Johnson, to adjourn.
