8. IN ACCORDANCE WITH LAND USE PLAN: No, the Land Use Plan specifies residential uses of this area.
9. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS:

There have been three previous similar requests in this vicinity (1962, 1969, and 1971). In each instance, the Planning Commission recommended denial due to strong opposition of surrounding property owners and access problems. Dear Mr. Mann,

In response to your request, we have studied the possibility of changing the precast concrete facing for the new library to brick. As you directed, our evaluation has included not only a direct cost comparison of these materials, but also other pertinent factors such as the effect of such a change on the present bids, the effect on time schedule and the impact on the aesthetic design of the building.

Both of these are good materials which we often use. Both have their advantages and disadvantages and neither can be judged to be the best for every situation. Neither is always the cheapest nor always the most attractive for a particular design. The choice is generally based on many factors which vary for every building. Both materials are manufactured elsewhere and then erected at the site. Both materials are very durable, requiring little maintenance. Precast is less likely to crack because of its reinforcing and less likely to leak because of the smaller number of joints. They are roughly equivalent in insulating value. Brick with its masonry back-up and a furred finish is generally thicker than precast with steel stud back-up and, therefore, reduces usable floor space in the building. Brick requires more on site labor and precast uses more in the plant. Total employment provided, however, would be much the same.

Since you and the other Board members participated in the evolution of the design for this building, you know that the form of the structure grew out of its functional requirements as described in the program, the characteristics of the site, its relationship with downtown, and the premise that the new library should be a building of significant visual design, inviting in character and institutional in quality.

After the plan and general form of the building had been established, we studied a number of alternative choices for the exterior material. Although brick is normally one of the primary materials we consider and often choose in such a study, the form and character of this particular building is such that we quickly ruled it out as inappropriate. The overhanging building form cantilevering 40 feet over the plaza

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area below and the long perimeter beams would appear heavy, unstable and awkward if sheathed in brick and would require difficult and expensive techniques to accomplish. A combination of brick with another material is also visually damaging to this building design. We, therefore, restricted ourselves to sheet or slab-like materials which provide the more monolithic appearance necessary for this design. After further evaluation of Granite, Marble, Limestone and Precast Concrete, we recommended Precast Concrete as the material which provided the greatest latitude in choice of color and texture and is the most economical of the materials suitable for the design. Because it is produced in reinforced structural sections, it is more flexible in size and application than any of the other options.

Given our choice, I believe all of us would prefer to deal with local contractors. They naturally have a more personal interest in this project, we have an established working relationship with them and their involvement would have a beneficial effect on the local economy. In open bidding of a public project which includes Federal Funds, however, such a restriction is not permitted. The open bidding system does insure the lowest available price for the project. Although the low bidder's headquarters is in Birmingham, this company has maintained a permanent office in Chattanooga for four years and we have been informed that most personnel used in this project will be local.

The use of precast concrete has normally resulted in a local source of supply from a plant employing approximately 60 people. It is normally erected by local masonry contractors, who utilize local labor. In this particular case, the local supplier and local masonry contractors did, in fact, bid the job, but because of the size of the project and current market conditions, it also attracted out of town bidders, one of whom (a masonry contractor) submitted the lowest price. Even if the job had been brick, it is quite likely that out of town bidders would have participated and could just as likely have been successful. If one of the local masonry contractors had submitted the low price for precast erection, I do not believe the brick issue would have been raised.

The cost differential for changing to brick on this building is not as much as it might have been on a more conventional building of this size because of the more complex construction techniques necessary to adapt it to a design it does not naturally fit. Although a completely accurate comparison would require that all the new details be drawn, after a preliminary analysis and consultation with local masonry contractors, we estimate that the cost of the building would have been about \$185,000 less if it had been bid in brick (about a 4 1/2% reduction).

The issue at this point is not as simple as a hypothetical cost comparison, however, because the question was not raised until nearly 2 years after the project was begun and several months after the choice of materials was publically revealed. If such a change were made now, the City Attorney has advised that the best course of action would be to rebid the project. Even if we were to make only those changes to the drawings directly resulting from the conversion to brick, the design and drafting time

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plus required review by State and local officials as well as the necessary bidding period would delay the project at least three to four months during which present inflation rates could increase prices \$150,000 to \$200,000 plus the cost of changing the plans and specifications. Should the project be unduly delayed, it is conceivable that the Federal money could also be lost.

If the decision were made to change this project to brick, we would strongly recommend that it be completely re-designed using that material as a beginning premise. To make a superficial change now which so drastically alters the character of the present design of this major building in the center of our City would be a mistake we would live with for a very long time. The year's delay caused by a complete redesign, review and bidding with the accompanying increases in cost, on the other hand, is obviously not desirable.

We, therefore, feel that it would be unwise to consider any change at this late date. The building was designed within a moderate cost figure, in line with other institutional quality buildings in our City. It compares favorably in cost with the recent brick Library in Knoxville and the low bid was almost \$100,000 below our own cost estimate. The community has waited a long time for this facility and we see no advantage in delaying it further.

Judge Moore asked if there was any further business.

Mrs. Kenneth Dubke asked if this was the time for their delegation to appear before the Council. Judge Moore told her that it was not, that delegations on matters other than zoning were called for much earlier in the meeting, but that she could speak anyway. She asked if the minutes of the last meeting had been approved and was told they had been. She stated that they were a delegation from Savannah Bay area and would like to voice opposition to the last County Council's voting for Resolution 375-6. She said that she would like to present a motion. Judge Moore told her that it would not be proper for her to present a motion. She introduced Mrs. James K. (Patricia) Harris who read a statement from the delegation: "We the residents of Northeast Hamilton County would like to ask you to make a motion that the proposed application for a study of a county airport proposed by the County Council and Judge Moore be voided. The delegation went to the Tennessee Aeronautics Board in Nashville and they told us that was the next step, to have you reconsider your proposal."

Judge Moore stated that it was not his intention to reconsider the action of the Council. He said we need the study, that this County is going to grow and as it grows we are going to have a very real need, not only for additional air traffic facilities, but we will have additional needs for water transportation and land transportation. It therefore is not his intention to withdraw our request for a study. Judge Moore told the delegation that he appreciated the fact that they are opposed to this, but there are a number of people who are in favor of it. It is unfortunate that you can't please everybody; it is just not possible. It is not possible to meet the desires of everyone, or the desires that they think they may have. We will try to meet the needs of the entire community.

Mr. Jack Peck, a member of the delegation, stated that he lived right on the bay and asked that the Council consider everything they have out there. They have blue Canadian geese, muskrat, and much other natural beauty that will be completely done away with if those airplanes come in. He knows the study has to be made; he doesn't agree but knows it has to be done. But he hopes every consideration will be given to enable them to keep their envir-

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onment there just the way it is. Their homes, their environment, everything they have, is at stake. They will do everything they can to stop them but hope they won't be a nuisance.

Judge Moore said he didn't consider any of them a nuisance, that they have every right to speak out. He assured them that their position will be considered during this study and following this study if any additional action is necessary on the part of the Council. He added that there is no way to stop the growth of Hamilton County, that we hope for more business and more ways to provide jobs for those who live here.

Mrs. Harris said that Judge Moore had given them an idea of what he considers progress--growth in industry and transportation. If this county gets to be like Atlanta and New York City, there are a lot of people who will leave. She said her family moved here because of the quality of life we have here, the culture, industry, good schools, good medical facilities, etc. But an important part of this county is the grass roots. It was because of this they decided to spend their lives here. Without this the county will lose a lot of people. You can't put people in boxes and keep the kind of people they are.

Councilman Fuller asked the delegation to accept the fact that a feasibility study needs to be made. He told them that if he finds out that he thinks they are right, he will stay with them all the way. But the study needs to be made and he asked that they accept that as a starting point.

Mr. Bernard Shanks stated that he had heard there were three proposed sites and asked what they were.

Judge Moore stated that there will be three sites proposed if the feasibility study shows a need for additional runways. He said the Tennessee Airport Systems plan shows that there needs to be a parallel runway at Lovell Field. The SPEAS study shows there are also needed two additional runways, one in Northeast Hamilton County and one in Northwest Hamilton County. This study that is to be done will define the needs of Hamilton County specifically as opposed to the needs of the State of Tennessee generally.

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Mr. Shanks said that he is a pilot and that he feels the prevailing winds, heavy morning fogs, the mountains and the lake all combine to make Savannah Bay an unlikely site, that he would not want to land there, and that in bad weather it would be difficult to land.

Judge Moore said that he too was a pilot and knew this, but that this was true also of Lovell Field and many other places.

Mrs. Dubke stated that in Nashville the Tennessee Bureau of Aeronautics had been very nice and had given her a copy of the study made by SPEAS. Mrs. Dubke also read an excerpt from the County Council minutes of March 5th concerning the Council's action on the Resolution 375-6. She said the question is do we really need it?

ON MOTION of Councilman Long, seconded by Councilman Ricketts, the Meeting was adjourned. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5. Absent-0.

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

Mrs. Ed (Billie) Lane stated that she was spokeswoman for a delegation of four from the Port Serena subdivision in North Hamilton County. She stated that they had a petition to bring before the Council signed by 191 people. She read a letter which was sent last week to John Bischoff, County Road Superintendent, with copies to the County Council members. The letter stated that residents of Port Serena had been paying taxes for 10 years and that the roads were in deplorable condition and needed complete repaving. Patches on top of patches make extremely rough roads. Fairly new cars belonging to residents had had to have new shocks and new tires from driving over these rough roads just to and from grocery stores, etc. In some places it is impossible to park cars because the road is too rough. Some residents find it impossible to go to their mailboxes. Water stands in the roads in great puddles; these puddles draw mosquitos. As resident taxpayers and citizens they ask that the Council no longer shirk duties and resurface the roads in Port Serena (letter listed roads). Mrs. Lane read the petition signed by 191 names representing 120 homes on these streets. Mrs. Lane showed pictures revealing the road conditions. They have the spirit of 76 in mind and feel this is taxation without representation. They pay approximately \$15 a month in taxes and feel that they should get better roads. She said they had talked to the County Manger and he said they had no responsibility for subdivision roads. The pictures were taken March 26th and there were road crews in the neighborhood that day, patching.

Judge Moore told Mrs. Lane and the delegation that the Council was aware of the problem. He said their problem is not just in the condition of the streets, that they had paid for that type of road when they bought their houses. The county had accepted the roads when standards were not as high as they are now. The County has been considering their problem for some time and there will be survey crews in the area gathering information that will be necessary to accomplish

the engineering to give proper drainage. They will have to lower the water table. It is not possible to put in a plant mix street because the water will again lift it up and ruin it. These streets cost \$40,000 a mile. The \$15 monthly taxes does not go just for the streets; if you took the money that actually goes to the streets it would not begin to pay for this; it is a very expensive proposition. The Council sympathizes with their problem. The answer is not simply resurfacing and evidence of concern will be seen within the next few days. Engineering crews will be making a survey that will determine what type drainage will be required and how much it will cost. There is not a Council member who is not totally aware of the problem and they have talked about it.

Mrs. Lane said she had lived there for four years and all that time had heard statements like this without any action being taken. They are tired of lip service and want it put on record. She had noticed Judge Moore is clean-up chairman for 1975 for the Scenic Cities Beautiful Commission. They keep their county beautiful and ask that the government do the same with their taxes to work on the streets. They ask that the Council take the matter under advisement and that they take action on it. They don't need a new airport, they need services now for their tax money.

Judge Moore thanked Mrs. Lane and told her they are perfectly aware of it and have told her what is necessary.







- B. Both the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Regional Planning Commission Land Capabilities Study and soil survey submitted by the U. S. Dept. of Soil Conservation show that almost the entire site area is composed of soil types which are severely limiting to any type of development. 50% to 75% of the site consists of soil type 175F (Bouldin Story Loam), which is severely limiting to residential development on septic tanks because of slopes in excess of 25% and shallow depth to rock (also subject to slippage).

The second largest portion of the site is in type 96D (Hartsells Loam), which is severely limiting due to slopes of 10% to 25% and 2 ft. to 4 ft. of hard rock.

Part of the site is in type 186 (Rock outcrop - Ramsey soils), which has slopes of 25% to 75%; more than 25% of the surface has rock outcrop and the underlying rock is severely limiting to development.

Another portion of the site is comprised of type 176 (Ramsey Loam) which is severely limiting due to rock and slope.

The very small remainder of the site falls within types 93D (Allen Cobbly Loam) and 96B (a type of Hartsells Loam, both of which present moderately severe limitations to development, due to slope and rock.

Attorney John Morgan representing the Mountain Lake Estates Inc had asked that this be continued for a month to permit them to do further work and study on this.

Mr. Morgan stated he had availed himself of the public information through the Planning Commission. He had also conferred with Bob Andrews of Hopkins-Morton Engineering Firm and Bill Moffett, Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture, both of whom were present. Mr. Morgan with their help presented maps, plats and overlays showing the location of the property, the size of the tract, and a soil scenic survey. Mr. Andrews explained the legend on the aerial map: red line marks periphery of the tract, orange indicates area where slope is not too steep and percolation rate is acceptable, yellow indicates area too steep for development but contain portions which have good percolation rate and can be used for field lines. Mr. Morgan stated the entire area owned by Mountain Lake Estates contained approximately 800 acres but only 177 acres will be used--an area near the ledge. 30% of this 177 acres is suitable for development--the rest is "fit only to hold the earth together." Mr. Moffett stated he had made the soils map and has walked the area. The areas on the map marked 96B and 96D are suitable for development. That marked 171F has severe limitations for any development.

Mr. Preston of the Planning Committee explained to Mr. Morgan the danger of rezoning an entire tract of 177 acres where only a small portion of it was usable. Using density figures prescribed by the planning commission they could build as many as 2670 units. Mr. Morgan said he was sure they would not build even 1/10th that many. He understood that the difficulty was in properly describing the property and suggested they could agree to build only in the area colored orange, that Mr. David Boyd president of the group, would be more than willing to work within the confines of the Planning Committee.

Judge Moore asked Assistant County Attorney Bruce Guthrie if this could be done legally. Mr. Guthrie consulted with Planning Commission and all agreed this could be done.

Judge Moore stated the Planning Commission had recommended that the petition be denied.

Mr. Carroll stated that he was surprised at the opposition to this rezoning, that when you take a sagegrass field and invest \$100,000 for improvement you don't expect opposition. He stated there was a need for another grocery store on that road to the state park to serve the almost 1 million people who go down that road. A counter was installed, counting 240,000 cars. Part of the frontage is already zoned commercial. There are only two small stores and 7 months of the year there is an overflow from the park to get picnic supplies. There are also two new subdivisions coming in and they need a place to buy groceries. It is a dangerous two lane road with no shoulders and it is dangerous for children to walk to the store. He stated that the store will be an improvement for everybody around it and will increase the value of the property four times.

The Planning Commission showed slides of the property at the request of Councilman Long.

A delegation of four people in opposition was represented by Mrs. Jerry (Jean) Reece. She stated that they did not want or need a grocery store. Her house is directly across the road from that property. They appeared before the Planning Commission on February 10 with a petition signed by 14 property owners. Mrs. Reece stated, "they would not let us put in a miniature golf course in a field. We were told that even if a business burned, it would not be built back." Mrs. Reece stated they have an investment of about \$150,000. She stated that they do not need another store, that during the summer months there is a park store and most campers bring supplies with them. She said they have had no problems about buying groceries and they ask that the area remain residential.

Mr. Bob Beene of the delegation also spoke. He said Mr. Carroll had a \$5,000 or \$6,000 investment and was going to capitalize on them by leasing the property for another store where they would sell beer, etc. He said he has about \$75,000 in his property and if Mr. Carroll will offer him four times that he can have it tomorrow.

Jim Harris appeared concerning the proposed new airport study. He asked if members of the Council had read the study on Lovell Field done some time ago by Hensley-Schmidt. He asked to poll the members to see which ones had read it.

Judge Moore told him it would not be proper for him to poll the members.

Mr. Harris stated he wanted to go on record as having the study with him here for their inspection. Mr. Harris read two excerpts from the study, one on page 9 which stated in part: "...a city the size of Chattanooga cannot support a separate general aviation airport..." and one on page 21 which stated in part: "...under future development a separate general aviation airport is not feasible..." Mr. Harris stated that he would like to propose that the County Council get with the City of Chattanooga to have this study updated and that any new facilities should be at Lovell Field instead of spending money for a new airport in the Northeast area or any other site.

Judge Moore told Mr. Harris that that particular study was done in connection with a study of an airport in Walker County. He also stated that the parts Mr. Harris had quoted were slightly out of context. He assured Mr. Harris, however, that this study would be given consideration when a new study is made.

Mr. Terry Bryant, a northeast county resident, appeared regarding fire service for that area. He stated that they had had several meetings at the Ruritan concerning fire protection and that Judge Moore and Representative Ramsey had attended the meeting they had Friday night. He said they appreciated the two of them coming to the meeting, that to his knowledge it was the first time any County official had attended a meeting in their area. He said they would like to ask the County Council to help them in erecting a fire station on County land that might be leased to them and to work with the Tri-Community people to utilize the present equipment. They understood from Judge Moore and Representative Ramsey that it would be two years before the County could participate in fire

protection and they need to work with the County to secure continued fire service.

Judge Moore expressed appreciation concerning the efforts of the Highway 58 fire department and urged citizens of that area to support that fire department. He said it will be some time before the County can provide fire service per se which makes it mandatory that the citizens get behind these volunteer agencies. He said they intend to look into the property behind Central High School which has been transferred by the school board to the County to see what the Council can work out to assist the fire department in that area.

Mr. Ed Fisher, a member of the housing committee of the Chattanooga Board of Realtors, stated that their committee of six is meeting with the County Council today and had met with the City Commission yesterday. He said their intention is to monitor meetings of the County Council, the City Commission, and the Planning Commission by one member of the housing committee and be as helpful as they can be. He said this was in no way to be critical of these groups. He introduced the following members of the committee: John Rankin, Jerry Brown, Larry Crawley, W. C. Shadden, and Stuart Bush.

Judge Moore said the Council would be glad to have them attend the meetings and offered to prepare for them the same packet of information which Council members and media people get to utilize at the meetings. He noted that about 99% of the material would be totally unrelated to their purpose but some might be helpful. Mr. Fisher thanked Judge Moore for this suggestion, said they would like to have the packet to see if it would be helpful.





LAND-FILL USE CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT made and entered into by and between HAMILTON COUNTY, TENNESSEE (hereinafter referred to as County), and the TOWN OF SIGNAL MOUNTAIN, TENNESSEE (hereinafter referred to as City), for the purpose of extending to City the right and privilege of use of the County's Sanitary Land-Fill located in the general area of Birchwood, Tennessee, and identified as the Hamilton County Sanitary Land-Fill; subject to the following stipulations:

1. The City will deliver to the Land-Fill refuse and garbage as its expense.

2. The City will pay to the County the following rates for the sanitary disposal of said refuse and garbage:

A. One and eighty hundreds dollars (\$1.80) per ton. Weight to be ascertained by scaling vehicles entering and leaving the land-fill area.

B. Upon proper permit, signed by the City Administrator of the City, private citizens of City may be allowed disposal privileges at the rate of one dollar (\$1.00) for station wagons and pick-up trucks, two dollars (\$2.00) for trucks within the one-ton class; and net weights for trucks above one-ton classification to be determined as in subparagraph A above.

3. This contract shall cover the period from July 1, 1975, through June 30, 1976.

4. The City shall pay to County the entire amount of its allocation of funds from the State of Tennessee for solid waste disposal to be credited against the total due from the City to the County computed on the tonnage rate as above set out.





If no referendum petition shall be filed with the County Court Clerk as permitted by law within 10 days after publication of said initial resolution, said bonds shall be sold to the highest bidder by the County Judge as a whole or in part from time to time as may be determined by said official, at not less than par and accrued interest at public sale after not less than 14 days advertisement thereof in The Bond Buyer, a financial newspaper published in New York, New York, and in the Chattanooga Times a newspaper having general circulation in the County. 
Mrs. English stated that she was glad to be at the meeting today and meet the County Council members and that she looked forward to working with them.

May 7, 1975

We DO NOT represent CHATTANOOGA FIRE DEPARTMENT only because a representative of the Chattanooga Fire Department was not able to attend our meeting. The chiefs of Hamilton County are willing to consider any relationship the Chattanooga Dept. wishes to propose.

The Hamilton County fire chiefs in charge of existing fire companies in Hamilton County have investigated the need for a county-wide fire protection service. We have found that such a program is necessary for the residents of this county. The advantages of a comprehensive county-wide plan include a higher level of overall fire protection, greater utilization of manpower and equipment and central coordination among departments.

A. The Fire Chiefs Association would support a plan for county-wide fire protection. We will cooperate with any agency, within the framework of a county-wide fire system. We feel that this organization can be accomplished utilizing existing volunteer fire departments in conjunction with any other type of newly formed departments.

B. Furthermore, the chiefs of Hamilton County would agree to operate under a county appointed county fire chief.

We respectfully call your attention to Public Law 5-1701 Chapter 17 titled "County-Wide Fire Department." This legislation provides for the council to establish fire districts, levy taxes in those districts to support any fire department in those districts. It also provides for the financial assistance for fire departments by contracts. This legislation also provides for the appointment of a county fire chief, appointed by the county and paid a salary out of county funds. (Here outline where, if any, this law is now in use.)

The Hamilton County fire chiefs are offering our combined skills and services in the planning and implementing a county-wide fire protection service.

1. We recommend the council using this legislation to provide this imperative service.

2. We recommend that the council submit a budget which will provide for a county appointed fire chief, who will develop an organization and submit plans and budgets for a program to begin in July 1976 during the 200th anniversary of our nation.
3. We would like the council to ask for additional funds to subsidize the two new fire departments that are just forming, namely the Highway 58 department and the Middle Valley Department, and to aid existing fire companies who have incurred debts during the past five months when the Hamilton County residents stopped buying fire protection subscriptions in anticipation of a county-wide system.
4. The chiefs recommend that the council allow representatives of the association to participate in the planning of any county-wide plan and to let us continue to fight our neighbor's fires.
5. The Hamilton County Fire Chiefs' Association will cooperate to see that the county residents receive adequate fire protection, but we wish to maintain our individual identity and administration and internal affairs.
6. In the meantime the H.C.F.C.A. would like to meet with Judge Moore and any other persons he chooses to establish an interim program based on existing services.
7. We would like to be a part of a task force that will study and make recommendations for a central dispatch system.

As the Judge knows, there are areas of Hamilton County that are virtually vulnerable, and without fire protection, and others with inadequate protection. We believe these areas can be helped by proper planning and the use of resources, through adaption and implementation of this fire protection plan.

The members of the H.C.F.C.A. will answer any questions that you may have, and we await your decisions.

* * * *

Wade Johnson, spokesman for the Hamilton County Fire Chiefs' Association, introduced the chiefs present at the meeting (see names on attached proposal.) Mr. Johnson read the attached proposal verbatim, adding only a few comments. He said the Public Law 5-1701 Chapter 17 is in use in Shelby County and they think one other county. He stated the Highway 58 department has a chief and an organization, a fire board, and some equipment but needs funds. Middle Valley has a fire chief and board but no equipment. He said the chiefs would be glad to answer any questions and they await the Council's decision.

Judge Moore stated that he had planned to present to the Council at the Budget Hearings a portion of what the fire chiefs were asking, the framework for the establishment of a fire board. He feels that you must have organization to structure the operation for a county-wide fire service. He intends to proceed on an orderly basis recognizing that the need is paramount for fire service and recognizing that people generally are not inclined to subscribe because unfortunately most people do not consider fire protection important until their house catches on fire. Judge Moore stated he personally supports most of the positions presented in the proposal. He has discussed them with various members of the Hamilton County fire departments at one time or another and he is glad to see them presented on a united front. He said it is most important when plowing new fields to be as united as we can to avoid conflicts. He told the fire chiefs he appreciated their presentation.

Judge Moore asked if there were other delegations.

Mr. J. D. Holmes of a Palisades Road address stated that he was with a "bunch of people" who were upset about a trailer being moved onto their street. The area in question is up for re-subdivision but has not appeared before the Planning Commission. He stated that Mr. Turner, County Attorney, left instructions that no building permits be issued. It seems that they are racing to get the trailer in before the new mobile home zoning which is to come up before the County Council. The group from Signal Mountain would like help.

Mr. Turner said Clyde Jobe had been advised by the Health Department that the ground would not perk and that no building permits should be issued there. He said that sometimes a building permit is issued and then later it is found that the Health Department will not approve it. A building permit can be revoked if the Health Department does not approve.

Dr. Failing of the Health Dept. stated that they were to meet a man up there today or tomorrow to inspect the land.

Mr. Turner asked Dr. Failing if the soil was not suitable and Dr. Failing stated that they would not know until the people from the Health Department meet the man up there.

Mr. Holmes stated that they would like to see the results of the study.

Mr. Turner asked Dr. Failing if a building permit was issued and Dr. Failing said yes. Mr. Preston of the Planning Commission said a building permit has been issued but an inspection has not been done yet.

Mr. Holmes asked if this trailer could be moved on before the Health Department approves. Mr. Turner said that as it stands now (but it is in the process of being changed) any tract of land that does not have deed restrictions as to what goes on it can have a trailer put on it. The Council cannot do anything but approve it if it is upgrading the property. If there is the correct number of feet and it meets subdivision laws, they can put trailers on these lots. The Planning Commission has had this under study for a long time.

Mr. Holmes asked about the re-subdivision of the property, and said

that Sam Keese is in the process of re-doing the subdivision. County Engineer Proctor said the building permit was taken out on the entire tract. Mr. Preston said the next Planning Commission meeting would be on June 9 at 1:30 in the County Council room and Mr. Keese was preparing to present it at that meeting.

Mr. Turner said that he could not sell one part of it before it is re-subdivided and it cannot be re-subdivided without going through the Planning Commission. Mr. Preston said this subdivision had been started in 1928 before the state law was passed and this is why it was never recorded.

Mr. Bill McCurley, 120 Green Gorge Road, Signal Mountain, said that originally Mr. Keese was going to sell a portion of an old platted lot. Since then Mr. Coolidge had decided to buy the entire lot as platted. The big problem as they see it is that a trailer makes an unattractive situation not only on that street but for everyone on the mountain. He knows that there are 5 or 6 people in that vicinity that have problems with sewage and field lines because the land does not perk.

Judge Moore stated that this was up to the Health Department, that if they disapprove it the trailer would have no sewage facilities. Mr. Turner said they might find a two-holer in the back yard.

Judge Moore stated the resolution establishing regulations on locations of mobile homes and the new zoning requirements would come up before the Council at the next meeting. Roger Mynatt asked if this resolution would help them and Judge Moore stated that it would be retroactive.

Judge Moore asked if there were other delegations. Mr. Terry Bryan stated that he was at the meeting last month on behalf of the northeast area fire service. He wanted to report that they had organized, now have a charter and by-laws and have purchased trucks and tankers. He wanted to go on record that they do support the efforts of the fire chiefs and want to work with them and the Council.

Judge Moore stated that this community has to support the volunteer fire departments for at least a year on a subscription basis and perhaps by that time the County will have reached a situation where we can assist

through taxes.

Mr. Cook of the Daisy-Dallas area stated that they had worked on a plan of organization for a volunteer fire department in North Hixson (same as Middle Valley), that the plan is theory but will work. They wanted to ask the Council to give serious consideration to implementing their plan in conjunction with the county-wide plan. They asked for administrative assistance. The people of North Hixson area have put money into fire protection and also time and their safety. They have experienced a failure and there are hard feelings. They will not tolerate another failure. He stated they disagreed with only one point: July of 196. They need fire protection now.

Judge Moore stated that the Planning Commission had recommended that this property be zoned for Office District.

Mr. L. B. Austin III appeared before the Council. He stated that they considered this one of the more reasonable zoning requests; that the property in question was located on East Brainerd Road, a major thoroughfare, a well travelled road. He said they had done extensive soil tests and there was no problem with the soil or sewage, that Dr. Failing of the Health Department could verify this. He stated that they have a purchaser for the property who plans to construct an office building but that the office building will not cover the entire tract of land. They feel the other part of the tract could be put to other use later and therefore would like it zoned for local business. They have asked the neighbors approve the plans. They have a petition signed by all the neighbors within the immediate vicinity indicating not only no opposition but approval of the business zoning. They feel in that area there is not enough market for office space for the entire tract, that the first building will definitely be an office building but business zoning would give them flexibility with part of the land. They were not sure what the businesses would be, possibly a convenience store. Mr. Austin stated the prospective purchasers were with him and they would be happy to answer any questions the Council would have. They request rezoning to local business, they feel this is reasonable, that they have done their homework, that this would increase the tax base of the County without increasing the school load. Judge Moore pointed out that by rezoning to local business district the ultimate use of the property would not be office use and that we might well end up with sewage disposal problems if unrestricted business use was allowed. Mr. Austin stated that Mr. McDade and Mr. Harber have done extensive soil tests and they feel that some commercial uses would produce less potential problems than office space, but they would be glad to continue to work with the Health Department, following their recommendations.



Be it Resolved, by the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee, in Session Assembled:—

WHEREAS, the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee requested that a Single Lots Mobile Home District be established and that the Hamilton County Zoning Regulations be amended to exclude mobile homes on individual lots in all other zoning districts; and

WHEREAS, the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee desires to establish this District with the intent to permit single family and duplex residential development on individual lots, including mobile homes on individual lots, provided in each case that they comply with height, density and area requirements as specified in Section 1400 of the Hamilton County Zoning Regulations, and with the purpose to permit and regulate compatible residential uses as defined in this Resolution, and for the purpose of excluding mobile homes on individual lots from all other zoning Districts; and


WHEREAS, the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Regional Planning Commission, on February 10, 1975, reviewed and approved proposed amendments to the Zoning Regulations and Subdivision Regulations of Hamilton County, to read as follows:

ZONING AMENDMENT

1. That Article II, Definitions, be amended by the addition of new subsections 127 entitled Mobile Home, and 128.1 entitled Modular Unit, in the following words and figures:

127. "Mobile Home": Any vehicle used, or so constructed as to permit its being used as a conveyance upon the public streets or highways, and constructed in such a manner as will permit occupancy thereof as a dwelling or sleeping place for one (1) or more persons, and designed for long-term occupancy and to be moved infrequently.

128.1 Modular Unit: (sectional or relocatable home): A factory-fabricated transportable building which does not meet the definition of mobile home in these regulations and is designed to be used by itself or to be incorporated with similar units at a building site into a single structure without chassis, carriage or hitch. The term is intended to apply to major assemblies and does not include prefabricated sub-elements which are to be incorporated into a structure at the site. Such units are designed as stationary construction for placement upon permanent foundation, to be connected to utilities and may consist of one or more components for purposes of these regulations, a modular unit can be considered to be a one-family dwelling.

Agricultural District Regulations, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 101.12, "detached single-family dwellings" and substituting in lieu thereof the words and figures, "detached one-family dwellings, but not including mobile homes on individual lots".

Urban Residential District Regulations, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 201.13, "One and two family dwellings" and substituting in lieu thereof the words and figures "One and two family dwellings, but not including mobile homes on individual lots".

Industrial District Regulations, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 1001.1 "any use not otherwise prohibited by law, except as provided in Article IV, Sections 1001.2 and 1001.3" and substituting in lieu thereof the words and figures, "any use not otherwise prohibited by law, but not including mobile homes on individual lots, and except as provided in Article IV, Sections 1001.2 and 1001.3".

6. That Article IV, Section 1200. R-1 Residential District Regulations, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 1201.11, "Single-Family Dwellings" and substituting in lieu thereof, the words and figures "Single-Family Dwellings, but not including mobile homes on individual lots".

7. That Article IV, Section 1300. Office District, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 1301.11, "Single-Family and two-family dwellings; and substituting in lieu thereof the words and figures "Single-Family and Two-Family Dwellings, but not including mobile homes on individual lots".

8. That Article VI, Section 101.1, Location, be amended to read as follows, "A PUD may be located in an R-1 RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, URBAN RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, RURAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT, and in the SINGLE LOTS MOBILE HOME DISTRICT, provided that the PUD plan has been reviewed by the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Regional Planning Commission and recommended for approval by the Chattanooga-Hamilton County Regional Planning Commission.

9. That Article VI, Section 100. Special Condition Permit, be amended by striking the words and figures of Section 101.21 "Single-Family Dwellings" and substituting in lieu thereof the words and figures "One-Family Dwellings, except that mobile homes are allowed only in Single Lots Mobile Home District PUD's".

10. That Article VI, Section 101.51 be amended to read as follows, "A PUD will be shown on the zoning map when the Final PUD Plan has been approved by the Planning Commission. A PUD may be located within an area zoned RURAL RESIDENTIAL, URBAN RESIDENTIAL, R-1 RESIDENTIAL, or SINGLE LOTS MOBILE HOME DISTRICT, as delineated on the zoning maps of Hamilton County".

11. That Article VI, Section 103.3 be added to said regulations in the following words and figures, "The maximum number of dwellings units in a PUD to be located in an SINGLE LOTS MOBILE HOME DISTRICT shall be computed by multiplying the gross acreage to be developed by 7.0, excluding any area to be developed as a church or school.

12. That a new Section 1400, entitled SINGLE LOTS MOBILE HOME DISTRICT, be added to said Regulations in the following words and figures:

- Section 1400. Single Lots Mobile Home District
- 1401. Purpose of the Zone.
The Single Lots Mobile Home District is established for the purpose of allowing single-family and duplex residential development on individual lots, including mobile homes on individual lots, provided in each case that they comply with height, density and area requirements as specified in Section 1400 of these Regulations, and with the purpose to permit and regulate compatible residential uses as defined in this Regulation.
- 1402. Use Regulations.
- 1402.1 Principal Uses Permitted.
- 1402.11 One-family dwellings, including mobile homes and modular units.
- 1402.12 Two-family dwellings
- 1402.13 Schools.
- 1402.14 Parks, playgrounds, and community buildings.
- 1402.15 Golf courses, except driving ranges, miniature courses, and other similar commercial operations.
- 1402.16 Fire halls and other public buildings.
- 1402.17 Churches.
- 1402.18 Accessory uses and buildings.
- 1402.19 Day care homes.
- 1402.20 Kindergartens operated by governmental units or by religious organizations.

1403 Height and Area Regulations

- 1403.1 No buildings shall exceed two and one-half stories or 35 feet in height, except that a building may exceed these requirements provided that for every foot of additional height over 35 feet the building shall be set back one additional foot from all property lines.
- 1403.2 The minimum building site area shall be 10,000 square feet for a one-family dwelling unit and 12,000 square feet for a two-family dwelling unit. The minimum frontage shall be 75 feet.

- 1403.3 There shall be a front yard of not less than 25 feet.
- 1403.4 There shall be a side yard on each side of the building of not less than 10 feet.
- 1403.5 There shall be a rear yard of not less than 25 feet.
- 1403.6 The minimum district size for any Single Lot Mobile Home District is five (5) acres.

1404. Off-Street Parking Regulations:

1404.1 Off-street parking shall be provided on the same lot as, or a lot adjacent to, the building, in accordance with the following requirements.

1404.11 One space for every dwelling unit.

1404.12 One space for every three seats in a main auditorium of churches, schools, and other public buildings.

1404.13 Parking space for all other uses shall be in the amount satisfactory to the County and approved by the County Engineer.

1405. General Provisions:

1405.1 All mobile homes shall be tied down in a manner meeting safety and performance requirements of any governmental regulations covering tie-down and anchoring devices, as specified by the Hamilton County Inspection Dept.

1405.2 All accessory buildings to the principal building (whether attached or detached) shall be subject to the same permit procedures and other regulations pertaining to dwelling units.

1406. Special Exceptions for Planned Unit Development

Flexibility in the arrangement of residential lots may be permitted by the County Council as special exceptions in any Single Lots Mobile Home District, provided that the minimum size of any tract of land sought to be used for the planned unit shall be ten (10) acres and that a desirable environment through the use of good design procedures is assured, allowing flexibility in individual yard requirements to provide for multi-family dwelling units, townhouses, two-family units, one-family units and mobile homes except that such use or uses shall require a Special Conditional Permit under the terms of ARTICLE VI of these Regulations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

Judge Moore stated that this particular Resolution brings into conformity the County zoning with a portion of the City zoning. This will require that applicants for mobile homes have lots at least 10,000 sq. ft. in a district that must consist of 5 acres or more. This will provide for clustering of mobile homes and will not prevent those persons desiring to do so to construct standard homes intermixed with the mobile homes. Mobile homes are a necessary, desirable form of residence but in some cases the location is disadvantageous to the adjoining property owners. The City Commissions passed a similar ordinance several months ago; this is an effort of the County to update their zoning.

Attorney Blake Moore was present with several residents of a community that had had problems with mobile homes and they feel this new regulation is a very good thing.







AN ACT to amend Chapter 156 of the Private Acts of 1941, as amended by Chapter 134 of the Private Acts of 1945 and Chapter 27 of the Private Acts of 1953, the same being "an Act to reorganize the government and administration of Hamilton County"; so as to provide for budgetary and appropriations flexibility in amendments to the budget and appropriations, and the reallocation of funds, and to amend the fifth paragraph of Section 17 thereof.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. Chapter 156 of the Private Acts of 1941, Section 17 as amended by Chapter 134 of the Private Acts of 1945 and Chapter 27 of the Private Acts of 1953 is amended by adding to the end of the second paragraph the following:

Provided, however, that the Council may amend such budget and appropriations from time to time as previously unbudgeted revenues and/or funds, without regard to source, become available for appropriation and/or expenditure; and provided further that the Council, upon the recommendation of the County Judge, may, in regular meeting, reallocate previously budgeted and appropriated funds, without regard to source, as may be deemed necessary for the proper operation of county government if notice of such proposed budget amendment or reallocation has been given in the previous Council meeting and if the proposed reallocation of funds involves transfers of funds between any unit or division within a department but does not involve transfers of funds between departments.

SECTION 2. Chapter 156 of the Private Acts of 1941, Section 17, as amended is further amended by deleting the last sentence of the fifth paragraph and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

At the close of the fiscal year any unencumbered balance of a general fund appropriation shall revert to the general fund.

SECTION 3. This Act shall have no effect unless it is approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the County Council of Hamilton County before September 1, 1975. Its approval or nonapproval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the County Council and certified by him to the Secretary of State.

SECTION 4. For the purpose of approving or rejecting the provisions of this Act, it shall be effective upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it. For all other purposes, it shall become effective upon being approved as provided in Section 3.

Now because of the act ratified at the last Council meeting we can amend the budget. The Summer Youth Program will be through July 1. With an additional \$250,000, we will be able to involve age 14-21 young people who meet Federal poverty guidelines in a total summer youth program, a program in which the disadvantaged may obtain employment.

IT BEING NOTED THAT THIS PROVISION IS IN CONFIRMITY WITH CHAPTER 752, PUBLIC ACTS OF 1974 WHEREIN THE PAY FOR THE COUNTY JUDGE SHALL BE AT LEAST 15% HIGHER THAN THE MAXIMUM FOR THE COUNTY TRUSTEE AS IS SET OUT IN SECTION 8-2403. THE SALARY AS SET OUT HEREIN SHALL BE ADJUSTED ON SEPTEMBER 1, 1974, TO REFLECT THE PERCENT OF CHANGE IN THE AVERAGE CONSUMER PRICE INDEX AS PUBLISHED BY THE U. S. DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, AND EACH SUCCEEDING SEPTEMBER. 1st A SIMILAR ADJUSTMENT WILL BE MADE".

Be it Resolved, by the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee, in Session Assembled:--

WHEREAS, the general law of the State of Tennessee was changed in 1974 providing reference to United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, rather than the U. S. Department of Commerce;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF HAMILTON COUNTY, TENNESSEE, IN REGULAR SESSION ASSEMBLED, that the Resolution of this body of August 21, 1974, entitled "A Resolution Fixing the Compensation of the County Judge of Hamilton County, Tennessee, at \$15,000.00 per year, for his services as Fiscal Agent, under the Authority of Section 5-613 of T. C. A., which is in addition to the Salary of \$10,000.00 per year set for the County Judge under Chapter 476, of the Private Acts of 1949, being a total of \$25,000.00 he is to receive per year. It being noted that this provision is in conformity with Chapter 752, Public Acts of 1974 wherein the pay for the County Judge shall be at least 15% higher than the maximum for the County Trustee as is set out in Section 8-2403. The salary as set out herein shall be adjusted on September 1, 1974, to reflect the percent of change in the Average Consumer Price Index as is published by the U. S. Department of Commerce, and each succeeding September. 1st a similar adjustment will be made" is hereby amended by adding the following paragraph after the present seventh paragraph of the body thereof and immediately prior to last paragraph of the body thereof:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on July 1, 1975, the total salary provided in this Resolution, as adjusted, shall be adjusted to reflect the per cent of change in the average consumer price index (all items-city average) as published by the United States department of labor, bureau of labor statistics between that figure for the calendar year 1974 and the calendar year 1973. Each succeeding July 1, a similar adjustment shall be made, based on the per cent of change in the average consumer price index between the two (2) calendar years preceding July 1 of the year in which the adjustment is made. However, no reduction shall be made by way of adjustment on account of any decrease in the average consumer price index between two (2) successive calendar years. No adjustment based on the per cent of change in the state's per capita

income from year to year shall be made after September 1, 1974."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following words contained in the second sentence of the seventh paragraph of the body thereof are hereby deleted, and the comma following the numbers "1974" is hereby changed to a period, to-wit:

"and on September 1 every year thereafter for the ensuing year commencing September 1."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.



ON MOTION of Councilman Mayfield, seconded by Councilman Ricketts, the foregoing Resolution was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5 Absent-0.

(Mr. L. B. Austin, III appeared before the Council. He stated that he was here to bring up a matter that he thought was settled at the last Council meeting - the rezoning to local business district a tract of land at the NE intersection of East Brainerd Road and Morris Hill Road (Resolution No. 575-23). He understood that the rezoning was not approved because it would take a vote of 4 Councilmen to overrule the Planning Commission recommendation and the vote for 3 and 2 "against." He was therefore asking that the property be rezoned from rural residential district to office district.

Judge Moore stated that a new resolution would be drawn to this effect.)

Mr. Windell Kelley of Title Guaranty and Trust Company appeared before the Council. Mr. Kelley stated that he was concerned that the Building Commission and the Planning Commission seem to be in conflict when people are sent to them to get building permits. He said that the zoning regulations are very clear but the Building Commission seems to bend the regulations as it sees fit. He was not critical of Mr. Jobe and thinks he is doing a good job. Mr. Kelley stated that he had suggested months ago that when an application is given, it should be turned over to the Planning Commission to check on the zoning regulations. He knows that there have been some building permits issued when the Planning Commission recommends that they not be approved. He mentioned the case of a lady who had applied for a trailer permit. She was given a long list by the Planning Commission of things she had to comply with in order to get the permit. Mr. Kelley said not many people could do all of this without having an attorney or civil engineer to help them. Mr. Kelley said if he had his way, we would not have a Planning Commission.

Judge Moore stated that he had issued a requirement to have both the Planning Commission and the Health Department approve the various applications or requests for building permits so that people will not get out on a limb with expenses and then find that they will not be able to build on a certain lot. One requirement is a lot plan but it is a simple pencil drawing that is required in the case of most of the smaller individual residences. We would not require all this information listed on the sheet Mr. Kelley had. All an applicant has to provide us is this simple drawing showing where on the lot the building will be (not a scale drawing by an engineer). This is simply to assist people so that they will not put buildings in prohibited areas, on side lines, etc. This is designed to protect people who do not know the laws and regulations of building. However, this long list is a little bit more than he had expected to find required. This will not be required in requests for the type of residential construction to which Mr. Kelley referred.

Mr. Kelley said he thought very few people (even people working for him for as long as five years) could do even the pencil drawing without the help of an attorney or at least a title company. But his main complaint is that they never know what to tell people. They tell them one thing according to regulations and then the building commission does something else.

Judge Moore stated that all building permits now have to concur with the requirements, that it is unfair to people to get their plans and spend money and then find they cannot build. He asked that if Mr. Kelley knows of any particular situations that he should let Judge Moore know.

Mr. Bill Kellis said he knew of an instance where two houses were built side by side and one house ended up on the property line.

Judge Moore stated he knew of a number of houses that were built on the wrong lots, and these were built by experienced people. We are trying to protect people that we know do not have the expertise.

Mr. Ron Stulze of the Home Builders Association appeared to endorse the County Council's adoption of amendments to the zoning regulations providing for the creation of the single lots mobile home district. He stated that as builders they must comply with the ordinances zoning R-1, R-2, and R-3, etc. They think that the new ordinance is fair and realistic and equitable to everybody concerned, and the Home Builders Assoc. endorses it.

Judge Moore stated that he felt when people get used to it they will appreciate it.

ON MOTION of Judge Moore, seconded by Councilman Mayfield, to extend the authority of the Community Development Department to continue to employ Federally Funded Personnel without the necessity of previous Council approval. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5. Absent-0.

Judge Moore stated that this is a policy that was set shortly after January 1 when the CETA Title VI program came into being. This particular summer employment program is relatively short. It permits the Federal funds of approximately \$250,000 to be expended in a 13 week period and should we have to wait for Council action on approval of employees, a great deal of the summer would be lost since the Council meets only twice a month.

ON MOTION of Judge Moore, seconded by Councilman Ricketts, to hire Richard Ezell and Jack Wright as Guards for the Penal Farm at an annual salary of \$7368. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5. Absent-0.

ON MOTION of Councilman Fuller, seconded by Councilman Mayfield, to employ Harold Christol as County Veteran's Service Officer at an annual salary of \$6,000. (Mr. Christol will replace Carl Reed who retired June 1, 1975.) The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5. Absent-0.

ON MOTION of Judge Moore, seconded by Councilman Ricketts, to terminate the employment of Dr. George McElroy as County Physician and employ Dr. William B. Findley - effective immediately. The foregoing Motion was unanimously Adopted by Acclamation. Total present-5. Absent-0.

Judge Moore stated that Dr. McElroy has served the County well for a number of years. He has become particularly well qualified in the treating of obesity and as a result has gotten to the point where he cannot devote the time necessary to continue in the position of County Physician which requires regular visits to the jail, to the penal farm, and to the women's detention unit. This requires a great deal of time which perhaps a younger doctor can more easily give. Dr. Findley has been the


Alton Park Project medical officer and a de-tox Unit physician and is willing to undertake the job as County Physician which frankly does not pay the hourly rate which a physician ordinarily makes.


Councilman Fuller asked if this would be at the same salary which Dr. McElroy had received. Judge Moore said that it would be the same, approximately \$800. per month.



AN ACT to repeal Chapter 482, Private Acts of 1953, as amended by Chapter 70, Private Acts of 1959, as amended by Chapter 363, Private Acts of 1961, as amended by Chapter 257 of Private Acts of 1967, as amended by Chapter 181, Private Acts of 1969; and to authorize the County Council in the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Tennessee to supplement compensation paid by the State of Tennessee to the District Attorney General, the Assistant Attorneys General and the Criminal Investigators in the office of such District Attorney General, and providing conditions thereon.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 482, Private Acts of 1953, as amended by Chapter 70, Private Acts of 1959, as amended by Chapter 363, Private Acts of 1961, as amended by Chapter 257, Private Acts of 1967, as amended by Chapter 181, Private Acts of 1969, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. Be it further enacted, that the County Council of the county containing the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Tennessee is hereby authorized to supplement compensation paid by the State of Tennessee to the District Attorney General, the Assistant Attorneys General and the Criminal Investigators in the office of such District Attorney General up to and including the following amounts, to wit:

- District Attorney General \$5,500.00
- Five Assistant District Attorneys General, each 3,000.00
- Three Criminal Investigators 2,400.00


However, such supplemental compensation shall not entitle any of the foregoing to participate in any pension or retirement plan established or maintained for county employees by Hamilton County, and no contributions shall be made or collected therefor, it being anticipated that such individuals are, or will be, members of a State of Tennessee retirement or pension plan.


SECTION 3. This Act shall have no effect unless it is approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the County Council of Hamilton County within sixty (60) days of its approval by the Governor. Its approval or nonapproval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the County Council and certified by him to the Secretary of State.

SECTION 4. For the purpose of approving or rejecting the provisions of this Act, it shall be effective upon becoming a law, the public welfare requiring it. For all other purposes, it shall become effective upon being approved as provided in Section 3.







AN ACT to repeal Chapter 12, Private Acts of 1959, and to repeal Chapter 160, Private Acts of 1967, as amended by Chapter 148, Private Acts of 1971; and to authorize positions of secretary-stenographer for the office of the District Attorney General for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of Tennessee and to provide for the appointment to these authorized positions, and to provide for the duties and obligations for such appointed personnel, and to authorize the County Council of the Sixth Judicial Circuit to provide compensation for such appointed personnel.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 12, Private Acts of 1959, and Chapter 160, Private Acts of 1967, as amended by Chapter 148, Private Acts of 1971, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That there is hereby authorized the positions of secretary-stenographer for the office of the District Attorney General for the Sixth Judicial Circuit of the State of Tennessee. Such secretary-stenographers shall be appointed by the County Council of Hamilton County, upon the recommendation of the District Attorney General of the said Judicial Circuit; however, the County Council of Hamilton County shall fill only such positions as it deems necessary from time to time, it being anticipated that the State of Tennessee will authorize and fund these same or similar positions at an early date. They, and each of them, shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them by the said District Attorney General, but shall be subject to all personnel policies and procedures established now or hereafter by the County Council of Hamilton County.

SECTION 3. BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the County Council of the County containing the Sixth Judicial Circuit of the State of Tennessee is hereby authorized to provide for such of said positions it deems necessary from time to time, with salaries or wages according to such limits and schedule as the County Council may establish from time to time upon the recommendation of the County Judge.

SECTION 4. This Act shall have no effect unless it is approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the County Council of Hamilton County within sixty (60) days of its approval by the Governor. Its approval or nonapproval shall be proclaimed by the presiding officer of the County Council and certified by him to the Secretary of State.

TITLE A RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE THE CITY OF CHATTANOOGA TO OPERATE CERTAIN SCHOOLS DURING THE 1975-1976 SCHOOL YEAR, AND TO AUTHORIZE AND DIRECT THE COUNTY JUDGE TO NEGOTIATE AGREEMENTS PROVIDING HAMILTON COUNTY EQUITABLE COMPENSATION FOR THE FURTHER USE OF SUCH SCHOOL PROPERTY.

Be it Resolved, by the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee, in Session Assembled:—

WHEREAS, recent annexations by the City of Chattanooga have caused previously unincorporated areas of Hamilton County to become a part of this said municipality; and

WHEREAS, residents of Hamilton County, both within and without these annexed areas, have previously sent their children to schools now located within such annexed areas, these schools being:

1. Lookout Valley High School
2. Valley View Elementary School
3. Patten Elementary School
4. Hixson Elementary School
5. Hixson Junior High School
6. Hixson High School
7. Dupont Elementary School; and

WHEREAS, title to these aforementioned schools, as well as rights of operation and control of same schools, has not been effected, altered or changed in any legal manner by such annexation; and


WHEREAS, the previously mentioned residents have expressed great concern over the operation of these schools and the effect of same upon their children; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire and intent of this governing body to insure that essential educational processes proceed in as orderly a manner as possible under the circumstances, such continuity being recognized as an overriding need; and

WHEREAS, it is also the expressed intention of this governing body that the relinquishment of any rights and titles to said school property be made only in return for equitable and adequate consideration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THIS COUNTY COUNCIL, IN SESSION ASSEMBLED: That in order to achieve the abovementioned ends of educational continuity and valuable remuneration, we do hereby authorize the City of Chattanooga to operate these aforelisted schools, by and through its appropriate school authority, for the purposes of education only, such authorization to so operate commencing as of the date of the passage of this resolution, and terminating at the conclusion of the 1975-1976 regular school year, and

(Judge Moore stated that this particular Resolution has as its aim the solving of a problem of what is going to happen to a number of students who had heretofore attended county schools in newly annexed areas. At this particular time because of the shortness of time remaining before school reopens in the fall and our inability to reach an agreement, this is the best solution so that the reopening will not be delayed and become detrimental to the community as a whole. This will permit the City of Chattanooga's Department of Education to operate the schools for the school year 1975-76 during which time they would be required to negotiate and attempt to effect an equitable settlement of the value of the school property.

Councilman Long asked if Dr. Carter (Superintendent of County Schools) had any comments.

Dr. Carter stated that he would like to express his appreciation for the interest shown by all those in attendance representing various administration offices and schools in the school system, the ACA, Mrs. Cleaveland of the League of Women Voters, Mrs. Thomas of the PTA Council, and others. Dr. Carter said that the newspapers had erroneously reported that the school budget deficit had been reduced to \$200,000. He said that actually the amended budget is now \$19 million, which leaves a \$4 million deficit. They had asked for \$23 million. Even counting the 1.7 million in the fund balance leaves a 2.3 million deficit. If they remove from this budget all teacher and aid 8% salary increases they are still down to a 1½ million deficit. If they remove this that takes all the property outlay funds. They have been operating this current year under a serious deficit. Dr. Carter stated it had been frequently stated that if the City of Chattanooga does compensate for the schools that they would have paid twice. He said that no proposal by the Board of Education would require any citizen of Chattanooga or of Hamilton County to pay twice for anything. But the fact is that if the city does not remunerate the county for these buildings the county residents outside the city will continue to retire 100% of the debt. But of even greater concern than that is the 1000 students. It is a safe assumption that the majority if not all of the bonds would be obligation of residents outside the city limits. The County Board recommends to you that no agreement should be reached until the City agrees to some form of arbitration, some remuneration. If we do not resolve this problem and secure some agreement prior to that, we have completely overlooked this year's needs. His recommendation is that

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we not turn over these County schools to the City until an agreement is made by the City. He urged that this matter be deferred and that no agreement be made to turn the schools over to the City until some commitment is made to settle this by some impartial arbitration, so that we would have access to the bond issue. It will otherwise probably require no delay. The City could make a good faith commitment to neutral and fair dealings in this transfer. Dr. Carter said he appreciated the Council allowing him to speak.

Judge Moore stated that this proposal was presented to the school board to obtain some agreement on the part of the City. In view of the fact that the school board represents the Department of Education and the County Council represents all citizens inside the City and outside the City, and considering the lateness of the hour, this proposal is the most feasible one possible, however not as desirable.

Councilman Fuller asked Dr. Carter how long it would take the City to man the schools.

Dr. Carter stated that most of the personnel effort had been done, that this would not be a problem to the City. However, in light of the total perspective, to the problem of funding, etc., this is a relatively minor problem. The County taxpayers will be subsidizing City education. The City could agree to fair and neutral arbitration to which both sides agree.

Councilman Fuller said then the County stands to lose as much as the City.

Dr. Carter said the entire picture should be studied and there should be a fair and equitable hearing. In the end it might come out to the advantage of the City, there's no way of telling yet.

Councilman Fuller asked if the arbitration could be 30 or 60 days from now?

Judge Moore said that no such agreement has been agreed to by the City; that they have not agreed to arbitrate. He asked Dr. Carter if this was not true.

Dr. Carter said that the schools have not made an effort in this way, that they feel it is not their place to do this. They make the recommendation to the Council that the Council make this proposal to the City. They feel that this is the only fair treatment. They cannot understand why the County residents should be expected to support City education. He said this would not require any change in the City budget at this time. At no point are they asking any double payment. They say that the burden is upon the City Board of Education and the City Commission. Your burden is the financing of County Schools. You will have to ask for more taxes or we will end up with substandard schools.

Judge Moore asked if a representative of the League of Women Voters would like to be heard. Ms. Ruzha Cleaveland read a prepared statement (copy attached) stating that the League recommends to the County Council that they vote for a property tax increase to adequately cover the county school budget for the next two years.

Councilman Fuller asked that there be a roll call vote on Resolution No. 675-9.

* * * * *

My name is Ruzha Cleaveland. I am representing the League of Women Voters of Chattooga. The League is a national non-partisan organization dedicated to achieving political responsibility through informed and active public citizens. The League of Women Voters supports quality education for all children. The funding of an adequate school budget is essential in order to provide the necessary services for each child. Three important areas which require adequate funding are capital outlay, maintenance and increased teachers' salaries. Our school buildings must be safe, well constructed and properly maintained. Teachers need to be paid salary increases to offset inflation and to provide incentive for more effective teaching.

The County School Budget Director has projected a deficit for the 1975-76 and the 1976-77 school years. Therefore, the League of Women Voters of Chattooga recommends to the County Council that you vote for a property tax increase that will adequately cover the county school budget for the next two years. The League believes that every child in Hamilton County is entitled to an education appropriate to his needs. Such an education is possible only through a well financed school budget.



LANDFILL USE CONTRACT

THIS CONTRACT made and entered into by and between HAMILTON COUNTY, TENNESSEE (hereinafter referred to as County), and the CITY OF EAST RIDGE, TENNESSEE (hereinafter referred to as CITY), for the purpose of extending to City the right and privilege of use of the County's Sanitary Landfill located in the general area of Birchwood, Tennessee, and identified as the Hamilton County Sanitary Landfill; subject to the following stipulations:

1. The City will deliver to the Landfill refuse and garbage at its expense.
2. The City will pay to the County the following rates for the sanitary disposal of said refuse and garbage:
 - A. One and eighty hundreds dollars (\$1.80) per ton. Weight to be ascertained by scaling vehicles entering and leaving the landfill area.
 - B. Upon proper permit, signed by the City Administrator of the City, private citizens of City may be allowed disposal privileges at the rate of one dollar (\$1.00) for station wagons and pick-up trucks; two dollars (\$2.00) for trucks within the one-ton class; and net weights for trucks above one-ton classification to be determined as in sub-paragraph A above.
3. This contract shall cover the period from July 1, 1975, through June 30, 1976.
4. The City shall pay to County the entire amount of its allocation of funds from the State of Tennessee for solid waste disposal to be credited against the total due from the City to the County computed on the tonnage rate as above set out.


Be it Resolved, by the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee, in Session Assembled:—

(Judge Moore stated that this was \$7500 for the Chattanooga Visitors and Convention Bureau. Judge Moore asked Bob Elmore if he had anything to say and Mr. Elmore said he hoped it would not be necessary.)

J U N E T E R M 1 9 7 5

Mr. Raymond D. Payne, Jr., stated that he was president of and representing the Citizens Taxpayers Association of Hamilton County and asked to address members of the Council. He read a letter asking the Council to take pity on the poor taxpayer (copy attached). The letter also stated that a 5¢ rate increase seems small but that no tax increase would sound better, and that they would appreciate consideration of their views.

Judge Moore stated that the 5¢ increase was actually replacing the 5¢ decrease from last year, that it does come at the worst possible time, and we hope it will not be necessary. There was \$71 million in value of property annexed July 28 after the budget was adopted. The difference in taxes in the county and the city is 29¢ (\$3.25 outside the city and \$2.96 inside the city). Money we thought would be available was not and changes in economy presented us with more headaches than we want. If at all possible we will hold the line and hope we can simply replace the 5¢ from last year.



There was a slide presentation by John Preston of the Planning Commission - Land Capability Study.

Mr. Preston stated this was a report they had been working on for several years, a program they are interested in which is vital to their work. They had summer part-time help, neighborhood youth corps help, and help from TVA.

They think that it will provide a look at all of Hamilton County to limit, control and guide growth and feel that they will be able to use the presentation in many ways. They hope that it will help them understand the relationship with nature and help them do a better job of land use planning.

These maps which they now have will provide an inventory of available land in Hamilton County. They will provide information for the location of required facilities. It is the beginning of a carefully prepared environmental atlas showing where our most available land is located.

After the presentation Judge Moore stated that this would help all of us to see what goes into a ^{staff} recommendation even though we can not actually see property sought to be rezoned.

* * * *

Mr. Marion Pearson appeared representing independent Garbage Collectors, saying he represented Michael Parkson, A. J. Wilkes, Joe Clark, Oscar Rickey, and James Dodd. He stated that they feel that their business is being hurt. He said that they know the County's intention is to eliminate them from providing garbage pickup service as soon as possible. They have been doing this for a number of years. The County has provided a fine landfill which they use. They do not feel there is a need for the government to become involved in garbage collection in the County. They have no major problems with the private haulers. The private haulers provide this service for approximately 25% of the money that Judge Moore recently stated would be necessary for a year. They would pick up everything out in the County outside the city limits. Mr. Pearson stated that another part of this he had spoken to Judge Moore's assistant about last week. He said that three transfer stations had been purchased over a year ago and this equipment has set for this period of time. Part of this equipment could be used to benefit the people of Hamilton County. No one has attempted to use this equipment. They private haulers need it to eliminate problems which they have in the northeast area. They feel that they are doing a good job and they are making a living. Their only real problem is that some people do not pay. They do service the people who are willing to pay and even service some who cannot pay and others who do not pay. They would like for the Council to know that they are making a living with their business. They would like to negotiate an agreement with Hamilton County if the County wants to control it. Either way is fine with them - either the County could pay them or they could collect from individuals. They need to know something; they cannot obligate themselves by buying more trucks, etc.

Judge Moore stated that as he had told Mr. Pearson on two other occasions they are attempting to negotiate with them.



TITLE A RESOLUTION TO ADOPT A HAMILTON COUNTY GOVERNMENT PERSONNEL POLICY, INCLUDING CLASS SPECIFICATIONS, THE ALLOCATION LIST, AND THE GENERAL PAY PLAN

Be it Resolved, by the County Council of Hamilton County, Tennessee, in Session Assembled:—

WHEREAS, Hamilton County desires to establish personnel policies and procedures for all county employees and to provide standardization and practical guidelines in carrying out these personnel policies and procedures, and

WHEREAS, the Director of Personnel, the County Manager, the County Auditor, the Director of Accounts and Budgets, and the County Engineer have assisted in the preparation of this manual and the class specifications, the allocation list, and the general pay plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS COUNTY COUNCIL, IN SESSION ASSEMBLED: That the County Council hereby adopts the attached Personnel Policy Manual, Class Specifications, Allocation List, and the General Pay Plan (all of which shall constitute a part of this resolution) which shall hereafter constitute the rules and regulations governing employees and the matters contained in said aforementioned four (4) volumes, all of which shall be applicable to all Departments, Divisions, Offices, and all wholly County supported agencies and offices; any other fee office or other agency may likewise adopt these policies and procedures by appropriate procedures for such offices or agencies to provide uniformity throughout all of the governmental offices and agencies of Hamilton County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

(Councilman Fuller stated that he thought this should be carefully considered and asked that a vote be postponed until the next Council meeting. They had only had about three days to look it over, (did not receive the material until late Friday) and he felt that it could be considered two weeks from now. Councilman Ricketts stated that he had looked it over in 3½ hours on Sunday afternoon and he thought that was enough. Councilman Fuller stated again that he thought they should wait two more weeks to consider it.)

(Judge Moore stated that this was to establish personnel policies for all county employees including merit pay raises, job specifications, and the allocation of jobs for Hamilton County. This was first brought to his attention by Mr. Herb Chelton when there were some personnel problems. These policies have been tailored to the County. This manual sets out in detail the rights and obligations of County employees. It defines job requirements so that they can tell what they are supposed to do and we can tell what we are looking for. The merit pay raises are designed to reward those employees who do a better job than their fellow employees. Everyone now gets the same pay without any regard as to how well they do their job. This method actually rewards inefficiency. They are including this in the budgeting process -- a cost of living increase and funding for merit pay increases.)

The Director of Personnel and the County Manager assisted in the preparation of the manual and the rules contained were adopted by the Hamilton County Council on the 18th day of June 1975 and are a part of the rules and regulations applicable to all Departments, Divisions, Offices, and all wholly County supported agencies and offices, effective on the date of their adoption by the County Council. Any other fee office or other agency may likewise adopt these policies and procedures by appropriate procedures for such office or agency to provide uniformity throughout all of County Government.

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HAMILTON COUNTY GOVERNMENT PERSONNEL POLICY

1.0 General Provisions

- 1.1 Applicability of Policies - Hamilton County Government, together with all its departments and all wholly County supported agencies and offices, which are hereafter referred to as the County, shall employ this personnel policy.
- 1.2 Affirmative Action and Discrimination - The County will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The County will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training.

2.0 Positions

- 2.1 Classification Plan - A classification plan shall be prepared by the Director of Personnel (hereafter referred to as the Director) in cooperation with the Hamilton County Judge and the County Manager, which plan shall include all positions of employment offered by the County. A classification plan shall also be prepared by every department not included in the abovementioned plan, and by every wholly County supported agency or office, and such plans shall be filed with the Director by September 30, and shall be updated by such wholly supported agency or office by May 1 of each succeeding year.

2.2 Administration of Classification Plan

- 2.2.1 The Director is responsible for the maintenance of the County's classification plan. This responsibility shall include but not be limited to: periodic review and maintenance of up-to-date job specifications; and the preparation of job specifications on the basis of changes in duties or positions.
- 2.2.2 Job specifications shall be descriptive and explanatory and shall not be restrictive. The duties and qualifications shall be listed for each particular position.

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2.2.3 All job specifications shall include: the characteristics of the job; the duties and responsibilities thereof; and the qualifications to be required of persons occupying each position.

2.3 Occupational List of Positions

2.3.1 The Director shall prepare a list of jobs by title and shall indicate the authorized number of persons for each job. Every wholly County supported agency or office shall likewise prepare a list of jobs by title and number of persons authorized for each job and shall file said list with the Director by September 30. Said list shall be updated by such wholly County supported agency or office by May 1 of each ensuing year.

3.0 Recruitment & Selection of Employees

3.1 Employees - In filling vacancies the following procedures will apply:

- a. Advertisement by the Director to include equal opportunity clause.
- b. Applicants to submit applications to the Director, who shall conduct interviews. He is to prepare a listing of those persons rated as qualified for the various positions and forward to the County Manager who shall review the applications and the recommendations of the Director. The County Manager shall employ the best qualified applicant upon the approval of the County Judge.
- c. Applicants for administrative positions shall follow the same employment procedures as all other employees, except their employment shall be by the County Judge upon the approval of the County Council.

3.2 Selection Preference -

3.2.1 Former employees shall receive consideration for vacant positions provided they reapply in writing and are qualified and acceptable to the Director, the County Manager, and the County Judge.

3.2.2 Present employees shall receive preferential consideration for vacant positions provided they are qualified and acceptable to the Director, the County Manager, and the County Judge.

3.3 Conditions of Employment

- 3.3.1 The established work days and daily work schedules are not the same for all Departments, Divisions, Offices, or Agencies of the County. The scheduled hours of work may vary from one division or office to another within the same department, depending upon the nature of the work involved and the demand for services. For time accounting and record keeping purposes the employee's scheduled working time will be 8 hours per day and 40 hours per week.
- 3.3.2 The central offices of all County departments, divisions, offices, and agencies, as well as field offices not requiring irregular work hours or schedules shall be open for transaction of public business from 8:00 in the morning until 4:30 (or such other hours as may be set by the County Judge from time to time) in the afternoon of each day except Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays.
- 3.3.3 Any department, division, office, or agency of the county which, by nature of its work, requires irregular work schedules may vary its work hours and work days upon the approval of the County Judge; however, the normal work hours should not exceed 40 hours per week.
- 3.3.4 When it becomes necessary for a County Department, division, office, or agency to work overtime in order to accomplish its mission, the appropriate administrative head may request the Director or the County Judge to authorize overtime work in addition to the employee's regular work schedule.
- 3.3.5 There are four major conditions which may justify overtime work, namely:
 - a. An emergency involving an unusual nonrecurring work load for which plans were not made.
 - b. The recurrence of seasonal peak loads for which budget allowances were made and the requirements of the work are such that it is not deemed feasible to employ additional workers.
 - c. An extra work load created by an Act of God.

d. An extra work load created by an agency or operation not in the County service but involving County employees.

3.3.6 Pay Periods - All County employees will be paid semi-monthly on days nearest the 14th day and the 28th day of each calendar month, or bi-weekly.

3.3.7 Payroll Deductions - Deductions will not be made without written permission of the employee except for FICA and Federal Income Tax, and required pension or retirement employee contributions.

4.0 Other Provisions Relating to Employment

4.1 Inclement weather does not, alone, justify the closing of individual County offices at any time. Each employee should make personal judgment pertaining to his or her safety in traveling to and from work based on his routing and safety equipment. Tardiness and absence resulting for this reason shall be charged against the employee's annual leave. If the employee has no annual leave, then the time absent may be made up during the week in which it occurs. If leave without pay is involved and the payroll has already been prepared, the employee's check may be withheld and a corrected payroll shall be processed reflecting the deduction.

4.2 In the event, however, the County Judge directs the closing of all County offices, the foregoing procedure shall be superseded and all County employees shall receive regular and usual compensation.

4.3 Probationary Period:

4.3.1 Every person hired by Hamilton County, after the adoption of this Personnel Policy by the County Council, must successfully complete a probationary period before he obtains permanent status in his position.

4.3.2 The probationary period, which is not less than six months, provides the supervisor an opportunity to observe the new employee on the job so that a determination may be made about the capability and willingness to perform duties in a satisfactory manner.

4.3.3 The department, division, office, or agency head may request an extension of the probationary period if he feels more time is needed to decide on the new employee's qualifications for the job.

4.3.4 In any case, the maximum length of the probationary period is one year. At the close of the probationary period, the employee's qualifications and job performance will be reviewed by his supervisor and evaluated by the Director of Personnel; such review and evaluation shall be submitted to the County Manager for a final determination as to permanent status. Such employee shall thereupon either be granted permanent status or terminated.

4.3.5 At any time during the probationary period, the County Manager, after receiving substantiated facts from the Department, division, office, or agency head, may remove an employee if in the opinion of the County Manager the employee is unable or unwilling to perform the duties of the position, or that his habits and dependability do not merit his continued employment.

4.3.6 There is no appeal from dismissal during the probationary period. The employee will normally be given two weeks notice, but if a probationary employee commits an offense considered cause for disciplinary action, he may be dismissed without prior notice.

4.4 Conflict of Interest and Nepotism

4.4.1 The following rules shall be observed with respect to persons whose employment is supported by the County.

- a. No person shall hold a permanent job over which a member of his immediate family, as a County employee, has supervisory authority.
- b. For purposes of this section, a member of an immediate family shall include any of the following persons:

Husband	Wife
Father	Father-in-law
Mother	Mother-in-law
Brother	Brother-in-law
Sister	Sister-in-law
Son	Son-in-law
Daughter	Daughter-in-law

4.4.2 Employees of the County are prohibited from accepting gifts, money, and gratuities from persons receiving benefits, or services from the County.

4.5 Outside Part-time Employment

4.5.1 All permanent employees of the County shall file with the Director through their immediate supervisor, a written statement of request to engage in outside employment or to continue their present outside employment. After reviewing the request the Director shall reply in writing whether outside employment is permissible. Employees who violate the outside employment regulation are subject to disciplinary action, including termination for just cause.

4.5.2 For permissibility of outside, part-time employment the following factors shall be considered:

- a. Such employment shall not exceed four hours on any County working day.
- b. Such employment shall not interfere with the efficient performance of the employee's duties with the County.
- c. Such employment shall not conflict with the employee's duties with the County.
- d. Such employment shall not involve the performance of duties which the employee should perform as part of his employment with any County assisted program.
- e. Such employment shall not occur during the employee's regular or assigned working hours with the County, unless the employee during the entire day on which such employment occurs is on either annual leave, compensatory leave, or leave without pay.

4.6 Direct Action

Employees are not allowed to plan, participate in, or provide assistance to others in violation of Federal, State or local law.

4.7 Disloyalty to the United States

No person charged, in whole or in part, with the responsibility for the administration of County Government shall be a member of the Communist Party or other organization officially listed as subversive by the U. S. Department of Justice.

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5.0 Comprehensive Travel Regulations & Policies

5.1 Purpose - The purpose of this policy is to explain the procedure and supporting documents required for reimbursement of expenses incurred by employees while traveling on County business.

5.2 Policy - Employees who travel on County business will be reimbursed for their travel, meals, lodging and other expenses as outlined herein. The employee is expected to use discretion in his choice of mode of travel, routing, lodging and meals.

5.3 Procedure:

5.3.1 All requests for travel and/or travel advances must have the prior written recommendation of the Division, Agency, or Office Head, and the prior approval of the County Judge. The "Travel Request" form shall be used for this purpose. Employees who need a travel advance must submit the Travel Request to Accounts and Budgets at least three days in advance of departure date to allow adequate time for processing.

5.3.2 Whenever possible, receipts should be obtained for expenses incurred. Receipts are required for motel/hotel bills, air or rail tickets and any single expenditures in excess of \$10.00.

5.3.3 In order to be reimbursed, employees must complete a "Travel Expense Statement" and forward it to Accounts and Budgets for audit and approval no later than three (3) days after their return to work.

5.3.4 Actual expenses for meals and lodging will be reimbursed subject to the following limitations, unless waived by the County Judge:

MEALS: Breakfast \$2.50; Lunch \$3.50;
Dinner \$6.00

LODGING: For trip of less than two weeks duration - \$25.00 per day.
For trip of two weeks or more - \$18.50 per day.

5.4.5 Expenditures for personal entertainment are not reimbursable. Laundry and valet services during periods of extended travel will be reimbursed when copies of receipts are submitted with the Travel Expense Statement.

- 5.3.6 Meeting and conference expenses must be approved prior to travel. Long-distance and local telephone calls are allowable expenses provided:
- a. They are for official business
 - b. A record of long distance calls is submitted which includes the name of the party called, purpose, and date of the call.
- 5.3.7 Employees will be reimbursed within three days of submission of Travel Report.
- 5.3.8 Employees who travel on County business in their personal cars are reimbursed at the rate of fifteen (15) cents per mile.
- 5.3.9 An employee traveling in a County owned automobile will be reimbursed for actual expenses for fuel, oil, repairs, tolls, parking, etc., when supported by receipts.
- 5.3.10 Travel via commercial means will be reimbursed at the appropriate round-trip tourist fare. Round-trip tickets should be obtained in advance, where possible, and copies of receipts or trip tickets submitted with the Travel Expense Statement.
- 5.3.11 Local travel will be paid monthly at a rate of 15¢ per mile when submitted to Accounts and Budgets on approval of the agency, division, or office head.

6.0 Salaries and Wages

- 6.1 Guidelines for Establishing Salaries - In order to assure the recruitment and retention of personnel necessary to maintain a continued high level of service, it is the policy of the County that:
- a. Salaries shall be reasonably related to the responsibilities and scope of the position.
 - b. Salary scales shall be established with reference to prevailing practice for comparable positions in local public and/or private non-profit agencies and according to a pay plan which ensures that employees will be compensated on an equitable and consistent basis, and that employees holding positions equal in responsibility and scope will be equally treated.

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6.2 Wage Standards - Employees shall be paid at a rate no lower than the Federal minimum wage and within the budget allocated by the Hamilton County Council.

6.3 Wage Surveys - The Director shall periodically make comparative studies of factors affecting the level of salary ranges. On the basis of the information derived from said studies, recommendations for adjustments in salary ranges shall be initiated by the Director and transmitted to the County Judge and the County Council for consideration.

7.0 Salary and Wage Changes

7.1 Within Grade Merit Increases - New personnel employed may be hired at an amount less than that specified in the budget for a particular position dependent upon qualification. All pay increases, promotions and other salary actions shall be based on meritorious service and shall not be considered automatically based on length of service alone. No employee shall be eligible for a merit increase in pay or a promotion until he or she has completed a minimum of six (6) months probationary service.

7.2 Decreases Accompanying Demotion - The pay of an employee being changed to a lower job classification will be fixed within the rate of the lower grade position.

7.3 Cost of Living Increases and Merit Salary Adjustments

7.3.1 General Statement

- a. The County Judge may authorize a Merit Salary Adjustment for County employees, provided the funds therefor are within the amount of revenue appropriated for the fiscal year.
- b. Cost of Living raises, if any, shall be only in the amount or amounts established upon the recommendation of the County Judge and the approval of such amount or amounts by the County Council.

7.3.2 Base Pay - Each employee's base pay is the salary step for which the employee has been classified in their present position. Merit raises will be computed on the base pay and not on any additional raise or raises received for Cost of Living.

7.3.3 Merit Salary Adjustment - Any salary adjustments, other than Cost of Living, shall be based upon merit and may be made if the performance evaluation of the employee indicates that such

employee should be given a salary adjustment, and provided, further that the increase does not exceed the established range for that position.

- a. New employees will become eligible for a merit raise after completion of their probationary period. The raise is not automatic and must be recommended by the employee's supervisor, office or division head, and the director, who will forward these recommendations to the County Manager for his review and recommendation to the County Judge, based on the evaluation of the employee. If the merit raise is then authorized by the County Judge a new salary anniversary date will thus be established and the employee will not be eligible for another merit salary adjustment until his next salary anniversary date with Hamilton County.
- b. Employees who were employed with Hamilton County prior to the establishing of the probationary period, and have a minimum of 12 months service with Hamilton County, will be eligible for a merit salary adjustment on July 1 of each year or on the adoption of the fiscal budget by the County Council, or upon an otherwise established anniversary date. The raise is not automatic. Office or Division Heads (upon the recommendation of the employee's supervisor) must recommend merit raises for their employees to the Director, who will make a further recommendation to the County Manager and County Judge.
- c. Recommendation for a merit salary adjustment of more than one step in the employee's classification must be justified in a written request to the County Manager and County Judge, with a copy forwarded to the Director. Such an adjustment shall require the written concurrence of the Director and County Manager.

7.3.4

Reemployments and Reinstatements - An employee who is reemployed or reinstated may have their salary placed at any step in the salary range applicable to the new position to which they are employed, provided such employee is not paid at a higher rate than other employees in the same classification with a comparable

amount of service, and further provided such salary is not a higher step than that at which such employee was paid at the time of such employee's separation; such employee may be considered for a merit salary adjustment when they have served a new probationary period.

- 7.3.5 Promotional Salary Increases - Any employee who receives a promotion shall have a salary increase of at least one step, or shall receive the amount at the entrance step of the new range. Upon successful completion of the probationary period the promoted employee may be granted a merit salary adjustment, if the services rendered by the employee merits such adjustment, in the same manner as all other merit salary adjustments are made.

8.0 Employee Evaluation

- 8.1 All employees not in the probationary period shall be evaluated at least every six (6) months as prescribed by the Director. The purpose of such evaluations is to make an appraisal of the employee's value to the County as measured against the job description. Each supervisor will evaluate the employees under their supervision and each employee will complete an evaluation on himself or herself. Each employee shall sign a copy of the evaluation at the time the rating official reviews the appraisal with the employee.
- 8.2 When performance evaluation discloses that an employee has failed to meet the requirements for satisfactory performance for part or all of the rating period, the rating official will discuss the performance with the employee. The purpose of these discussions is to decide what should be done by the employee or the supervisor or both to improve the employee's performance. If the employee does not agree with the Supervisor's evaluation, the employee has the right to appeal in writing to the Director.

- 8.3 After thirty (30) days another evaluation will be completed. If the employee still has an unsatisfactory performance a warning letter will be written and signed by the immediate supervisor after which it must be reviewed, approved, and countersigned by the Director. The warning letter shall contain the standards of performance which the employee has failed to meet; how the employee may improve his or her performance; and a statement that the employee will have a reasonable opportunity to improve his or her performance and the date before which improvement must be shown.
- 8.4 During the warning period, the employee will be given reasonable opportunity and assistance by the supervisor to satisfy the job requirements. If at the end of the notice period specified in the warning letter the employee fails to meet the required standards of performance, the supervisor will complete another performance rating after which he or she will recommend reassignment to a lower job classification (provided a vacancy exists) or termination from employment.

9.0 Employee Benefits

9.1 Compensatory Leave - A supervisor may require an employee to work on holidays or at any time when emergency circumstances require overtime work. When an employee is required to work overtime, he shall be credited with compensatory leave equal to the number of hours he is required to work in excess of his standard work week, unless such employee is required to be paid overtime pay by Federal law.

9.1.1 Earned compensatory leave shall be promptly credited to employees to be used at a future date with approval of or at the direction of the supervisor.

9.1.2 Compensatory leave must be earned before it is taken and shall be creditable only if overtime work is authorized prior to the performance of such work.

9.1.3 (A supervisor may require an employee to use his earned compensatory leave at any time.) Compensatory leave shall be taken prior to use of annual leave and no pay for compensatory leave shall be made upon separation.

9.1.4 This section shall not apply to supervisory personnel.

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9.2 Holidays - The County Judge shall determine which days shall constitute legal holidays which may be observed by the closing of County Offices.

9.2.1 The following may be recognized holidays, in addition to such other days designated or to be designated by the County Judge:

New Years Day	January 1
Memorial Day	Last Monday in May
Independence Day	July 4
Labor Day	First Monday in Sept.
Thanksgiving Day	Fourth Thursday in November
Christmas (2 days)	December 25, plus 1 day

9.2.2 All other holidays will be at the discretion of the County Judge.

9.3 Leaves of Absence General Provisions

9.3.1 Absence from Duty - No employee shall absent himself from duty without authorized leave except in cases of the immediate onset of sickness, or emergency. An employee who is absent without authorized leave for two (2) consecutive working days shall be deemed to have abandoned his position and to have resigned unless he shall within a period of three (3) working days next succeeding said two (2) days prove to the satisfaction of the supervisor that such failure was excusable; provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be construed as preventing a supervisor from recommending to the Director suspension or dismissal of an employee because of unauthorized absence. All absence is considered to be without authorized leave unless annual, compensatory, administrative or sick leave is approved in advance or no later than 9:00 a.m. of the first day of absence and each day thereafter unless advance leave is granted.

9.3.2 Employees should notify his or her immediate supervisor in any event he or she expects to be absent. This should be reported within one (1) hour of such employee's expected work time.

9.3.4 Return to Duty - At the expiration of any authorized leave, an employee reporting for duty shall thereupon be returned to the position filled by him when such leave was granted except as otherwise provided in sections 9.8 and 9.9. An employee may return to duty before the expiration of this leave only with the approval of the Director. If, on the day following the expiration of leave, the employee has not returned to his position and the leave has not been extended, he shall be considered to have resigned from his position effective the close of business on the last day of his leave, unless extenuating circumstances are found to exist.

9.4 Annual Leave with Pay - Annual leave shall be earned by employees at a rate of ten (10) work days each year during the first ten (10) years of continuous service, not to exceed two (2) calendar weeks. Beginning with the eleventh (11th) year of continuous service, and each year of continuous service thereafter, annual leave shall be earned at 15 work days each year, not to exceed three (3) calendar weeks. Each employee shall turn in their annual leave requests to their supervisors (listing a first, second, and third choice) by January 1 of each year.

9.4.1 Use of Annual Leave - Use of annual leave will be used on a current basis, submitted to the supervisor in writing and subject to the approval of the supervisor. No more than ten (10) work days will be allowed, including the holidays, at one time. Earned annual leave shall be granted for the following:

Vacation

Absence due to illness of a member of the employee's family.

Absence to attend funerals other than immediate family.

Religious holidays and attendance of religious services in excess of two (2) hours.

Absence to transact personal business which cannot be conducted during off duty hours.

Such other purposes as may be approved by the supervisor.

9.5 Accumulation of Annual Leave - Accumulated annual leave shall be used within the year in which credited.

9.6 Entitlement Upon Separation, Dismissal, or Retirement -

- 9.6.1 Resignations - For the provisions relating to resignation, see paragraph 9.11.

- 9.6.2 General Statement - Upon separation from the County service, except for disciplinary reasons, an employee shall be eligible to receive pay for the unused portion of his annual leave accumulation, which is hereby designated terminal leave.

- 9.6.3 Effect of Termination for Disciplinary Reasons - Any employee removed or terminated from the County service for disciplinary reasons shall not be entitled to collect terminal or annual leave compensation.

- 9.6.4 Employees Subject to County Retirement - All retiring County employees who are members of the County Retirement System and who are entitled to terminal leave must be compensated for their terminal leave prior to the effective date of their retirement, unless such retirement is taken in connection with disciplinary action imposed against such employee, in which event such employee shall not be entitled to terminal leave compensation.

- 9.6.5 In Case of Death - Any terminal leave entitlement due to an employee shall, upon death, be paid to the employee's estate.

- 9.6.6 Termination of Benefits - During the period of terminal leave for which an employee is paid, he shall:
 - a. Cease to be in a leave-earning status on the date terminal leave begins. An employee on terminal leave does not accumulate annual or sick leave.
 - b. Cease to be eligible to take sick leave on the date terminal leave begins.
 - c. Cease to be eligible for salary increases or salary adjustments during the period of terminal leave. The salary rate in effect on the last day worked shall be used in determining terminal payment.

9.6.7 Accounting for Terminal Leave

- a. Beginning of Terminal Leave Period -
Terminal leave begins the next workday following the last full workday or date of death.
- b. Determining End of Terminal Leave Period -
When an employee is terminated the last day of terminal leave shall be the official date of termination, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls.

9.7 Sick Leave With Pay- All County employees become eligible for sick leave after one year of employment and have 10 work days sick leave at that time. Employees also accrue 10 work days sick leave upon their second anniversary of employment with Hamilton County.

9.7.1 The following sick leave policy will be in effect for employees after three years of employment.

Thereafter, each County employee will accrue sick leave at the rate of one (1) work day per month of additional continuous employment, with a maximum accumulation of one hundred twenty (120) work days at full pay (plus any unused accumulated half-pay weeks,).

9.7.2 Sick leave benefits may be utilized by an eligible employee for personal illness and disability due to accident, whether or not job connected. However, to prevent abuse of the sick leave privilege, the Personnel Director must satisfy himself that the employee is genuinely ill or injured before authorizing payment of sick leave. The Personnel Director may require such medical reports and/or certificates as he deems necessary for such determination from time to time.

9.7.3 Sick leave may not be used as terminal leave. Upon separation from County employment, an employee may not be paid for any unused portion of his sick leave accumulation.

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9.7.4 Sick leave may not be advanced.

9.7.5 Sick Leave Transferable - Any employee who is transferred or otherwise changed from one department, division, office, or agency of the County to that of another shall take with him the unused balance of his accumulated sick leave.

9.7.6 Use of Sick Leave - At his discretion, the Personnel Director, upon the recommendation of the Division, office, or agency head, may grant an eligible employee sick leave if she or he is absent for any of the following reasons:

- a. Exposure to contagious disease
- b. Illness or death of one of the following members of the immediate family:
 - (1) Spouse
 - (2) Children
 - (3) Parents, foster parents and parents-in-law
 - (4) Other members of the family who reside within the home of the employee
 - (5) Others who at the discretion of the Personnel Director, have a relationship with the employee which merits similar consideration.
- c. Death of one of his following relatives:
 - (1) Brothers and Sisters
 - (2) Grandparents
 - (3) Grandchildren
 - (4) Daughter-in-law
 - (5) Sons-in-law
 - (6) Sisters-in-law
 - (7) Brothers-in-law
 - (8) Foster Brothers and Sisters
- d. In instances of death, the use of sick leave is limited to one work day except for the following members of the employee's immediate family:
 - (1) Spouse
 - (2) Children
 - (3) Parents, foster parents and parents-in-law
 - (4) Brothers and sisters

For these, the granting of sick leave is limited to three calendar days, although only the appropriate missed work days will be charged against accrued sick leave.

- e. Medical and dental appointments requiring an absence from work may be charged to sick leave, provided prior approval of the Personnel Director is obtained.

9.7.7 Reinstatement of Unused Accumulated Sick Leave.
An employee who is laid off because of lack of funds or curtailment of work and who returns to the County service within a period of three (3) months from the effective date of his separation shall be credited with all sick leave to which he was entitled at the time of his separation. This privilege is afforded only to those employees who were laid off and whose records on file in the Personnel Office are so designated. Employees who resigned or who were dismissed have no right under this provision.

9.7.8 Accounting for Sick Leave.

- a. Minimum Leave to be Reported. - Monthly leave reports shall be prepared at the end of the month during which the leave was taken, or accumulated or cancelled.
- b. Saturdays, Sundays, and Official Holidays. Only scheduled workdays shall be charged in calculating the amount of sick leave used. Thus, Saturdays, Sundays, and official holidays falling within a sick leave period shall not be charged as leave unless such days are considered work days for the employee in his particular assignment.
- c. Sick Leave Charged as Annual or Special Leave. In applicable instances, where the employee has no sick leave, such absence may be charged to annual leave, if available. If neither sick nor annual leave is available, such absence will be charged as leave without pay.

9.7.9 Doctor's Certificate and Other Testimonials. - Any employee may be required to present evidence in the form of personal affidavits, physician's certificates, and/or other testimonials, at the request of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency Head, or the Director of Personnel, to support the reason for any absence during the time for which sick leave was taken.

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- 9.7.10 Sick Leave Shall not be Used as Maternity Leave. Whenever an employee shall become pregnant, she shall furnish the Director of Personnel with a certificate from her physician stating the expected date of delivery within the first three months of pregnancy. Failure to furnish such certificate within the prescribed period may be a basis for denying a leave of absence hereunder. The separation date shall be determined by the Director of Personnel, subject to the approval of the County Judge. Maternity Leave may be granted for a period not to exceed six (6) weeks after date of delivery. Upon returning from a Maternity Leave, the employee will be given the first opportunity to a position for which she is qualified.
- 9.7.11 Sick Leave Requests. - The employee shall have the responsibility of notifying his supervisor of any illness or disability no later than 9:00 a. m. of the day of absence. Written requests for sick leave shall be submitted to the supervisor promptly upon return to duty. Use of sick leave on false claim of illness, injury, exposure to contagious disease, or falsification of proof to justify such sick leave shall be cause for dismissal. Employees who take any sick leave may be required to provide a doctor's statement.
- 9.8 Special Leave with Pay - Special leave granted under this section shall not be charged against the employee's accumulated leave. Such leave granted shall be recorded on the employee's Attendance and Leave Record.
- 9.8.1 Military Leave of Absence - General Statement - Leave of absence shall be granted all officers and employees of Hamilton County who are, or who may become, members of the Tennessee National Guard or any reserve component of the armed forces of the United States, including the Army Reserve, Naval Reserve, Marine Corps Reserve, Air Force Reserve, or the Coast Guard Reserve, for all periods of military service during which they are engaged in the performance of duty or field training in the service of the State of Tennessee or of the United States under competent orders, up to and including a maximum of fifteen (15) work days per year.
- 9.8.2 Eligible Employees - The military leave herein provided for members of the reserve components shall apply to all County employees whether part-time or full-time, whether emergency, temporary, or permanent, whether hourly, daily, or monthly paid, and shall be unaffected by the

date of employment or length of service and shall have no effect on military compensation.

9.8.3 Employee's Responsibility - The employee must present a Certificate of Military Leave to his Unit Commander for Completion. After the certificate has been prepared and signed, in duplicate, both copies should be forwarded to the County Personnel Director.

9.8.4 Employer's Responsibility. - It shall be the responsibility of the Personnel Director to determine that the employee has met all of the requirements pertaining to military leave with pay and to require him to submit a completed Certificate of Military Leave in duplicate. One copy shall be maintained by the County Personnel Office attached to appropriate leave forms. This certificate takes the place of military orders.

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- 9.8.6 Instruction for Preparation of Certificate of Military Leave. - Certificate of Military Leave will be prepared and signed in duplicate and both copies presented to The County Personnel Office. Duplicate copy will be placed in the employee's personnel folder.
- LINE 1 - Name of individual using Military Leave.
- LINE 2 - Social Security Number
- LINE 3 - Unit to which individual is assigned, i.e., 130TH MP CO, 118TH MIL AIRLIFT WING
- LINE 4 - Indicate organization by placing an "X" on the appropriate blank line.
- LINE 5 - The Paragraph, Order Number, Date of Order, and the Headquarters calling individual to duty.
- EXAMPLE: PAR 5, SO 118, DATED 18 AUG 69, HQS. TENN MIL DEPT
- LINE 6 - Place where duty is performed.
- LINE 7 - Inclusive dates of active duty
- LINE 8 - Both copies to be signed by Commanding Officer

- 9.8.7 Retention and Continuation of Benefits. - During the period of approved military leave of absence with pay a County employee shall incur no loss of service time, regular leave, or vacation accumulation, sick leave accumulation, impairment of efficiency rating, or any other rights or benefits to which otherwise entitled. He shall continue to earn and accumulate annual and sick leave, earn time toward his next salary increase and receive any promotion for which he might otherwise be eligible.

- 9.8.8 Active State Duty (Tennessee National Guard).
- a. The Governor shall have the power, in case of invasion, disaster, insurrection, riot, attack, or combination to oppose the enforcement of the law by force and violence, or imminent danger thereof, or other grave emergency, to order into the active service of the state, for such period, to such extent and in such manner as he may deem necessary, all or any part of the Tennessee National Guard.

- b. Duty performed in connection with the above requirement shall not count against any other leave provided by law, regulation, policy, or practice of Hamilton County.

9.8.9 Court. - An employee who is summoned to appear as a witness shall be granted leave with pay upon presentation of a summons. When a County employee is requested by the Office of the County Attorney to appear in court on behalf of the County, he shall have the same benefits as though he were subpoenaed. When an employee has been granted leave for court attendance, and is excused by proper court authority, he shall report back to his official place of duty. Leave with pay for court attendance shall not be granted when the employee is the defendant or is engaged in personal litigation, except when such attendance is required as a part of his official duties; however, annual leave may be granted for such purposes.

9.8.10 Jury Leave. - Jury leave shall be granted to employees who are accepted to serve as a member of a Federal or State jury. The employee shall present proof of such duty to his or her supervisor who shall insure that the attendance report shall be posted accordingly. Employees serving on a jury are required to return to work each day when dismissed from jury service if prior to end of normal work day. For the period such employee thus renders jury service, such employee shall be entitled to the difference between his regular compensation and the amount of compensation received for jury duty. Jury leave shall not be charged as annual leave. However, if the employee elects to use their annual leave rather than jury leave, such employee may do so and retain all compensation or fees received as a juror.

9.8.11 Meetings. - Whenever it is deemed to be for the best interest of the County, an employee may be granted leave with pay to attend professional and technical institutes or conferences or such other meetings as may contribute to the effectiveness of his service to the County upon his return to duty. Requests for such leave must be directed to the Director.

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9.8.12 Administrative Leave. - At his discretion, Director may grant administrative leave not to exceed 3 days in any one (1) calendar year to employees without charging the employee with annual leave, sick leave or compensatory leave. This provision is designed for unusual occurrences, and the Director will insure that it is not abused.

9.9 Leaves of Absence Without Pay. - It is against the general policy of the County to grant leaves of absence. However, when it is deemed to be in the best interest of the County, leaves of absence without pay may be granted. Employees shall be required to use all earned compensatory and annual leave prior to granting leave without pay. This must be authorized in advance by the Director, upon the approval of the County Judge.

9.10 Employee Complaints. - Employee complaints against non-supervisory and nonadministrative fellow employees shall be given prompt and fair consideration. An employee having a complaint against another such employee may initiate a formal complaint by submitting a written statement containing the facts surrounding the complaint to his immediate supervisor. The supervisor shall immediately make a copy of the complaint available to the Director and to the party or parties involved.

The Director, after investigating the complaint, will set a time and place for all parties to meet in an effort to obtain orderly consideration and disposition thereof. A signed statement by all parties agreeing to a settlement will terminate the matter.

Should the Director be unable to resolve the complaint, either party may request in writing a hearing before the County Manager, whose decision shall be final.

9.11 Resignation. - Supervisory level employees & those earning \$10,000 and above should provide the County with two (2) calendar weeks advance notice prior to resignation. Other employees should provide one (1) calendar week notification. Failure to provide adequate notice may preclude reemployment of employees who resign without proper notification. Waiver of notice may be granted by the Director and must be in writing to become a part of the personnel file. Resignations which have been accepted may not be withdrawn without the written approval of the County Manager upon the recommendation of the Director.

- 9.12 Reduction in Force. - Personnel actions to terminate employees due to a shortage of funds, organizational changes, or other similar reasons, will be initiated by the County Manager at the direction of the County Judge. If practical, employees will be given two (2) weeks notification. If possible, assistance in locating other employment will be rendered by the County. Wherever possible, reduction in force should be achieved by normal attrition.
- 9.13 Lateral Transfer. - The County Manager, upon the approval of the County Judge, may transfer laterally an employee to another job classification at such time and under such conditions he deems such a transfer to be in the best interest of the County in accomplishing the County's purposes.
- 9.14 Promotions. - Persons selected for promotion will be selected on the basis of merit, qualifications and prior performance. Those persons wishing to be considered for a vacant higher position must apply in writing to the appropriate supervisor.
- 9.15 Demotion. - Demotion of an employee for cause may be initiated by the employee's supervisor, or the Head of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency, or the Director, in writing, giving full details and supporting evidence. The Director will review the evidence and employee personnel file as well as interview the employee prior to final action. The Director will report his findings to the County Manager who will take such action as is appropriate, upon the approval of the County Judge. If demotion is approved, the demoted employee has the right of the grievance procedure hereinafter stated when such grievance is requested in writing, stating the reasons why such demotion should not be effected.
- 9.16 Suspension and Dismissal. - Suspension without pay will be in accordance with offenses enumerated hereinafter or when considered in the best interest of the County. If the request for suspension is initiated by the Supervisor of the employee, it shall be in writing giving full details and supporting evidence. The Supervisor will simultaneously verbally require the employee to leave his/her post pending action by the Director. The Director will review the evidence and employee personnel file as well as interview the employee prior to recommending final action. If suspension is disapproved pay will be restored and the suspended employee returned to duty. If suspension is approved, employee has the right of the grievance procedure hereinafter stated when such appeal is requested in writing. Dismissal in every case will be preceded by the suspension procedure, that is suspension by the Director pending an investigation by the Director.

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9.17 County Property. - All county property such as ID cards, badges, keys, etc., will be turned in to the supervisor on termination from the County.

9.18 Offenses & Penalties. - The following list of offenses and penalties is designed to assure like penalties for like offenses and will not meet the demands of all situations. The fact that a specific offense is not listed does not mean that a penalty cannot be imposed if the offense is committed.

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9.18.1 The following causes relating to the performance of duties are representative of those considered to be additional grounds for official written reprimand, suspension, or termination.

- a. Inefficiency or incompetency in the performance of duties.
- b. Negligence in the performance of duties.
- c. Careless, negligent, or improper use of County property or equipment.
- d. Failure to maintain satisfactory and harmonious working relationships with the public and employees.
- e. Improper use of sick leave privileges.
- f. Failure to report for duty at the assigned time and place.
- g. Failure to obtain or maintain a current license or certificate required by law as a condition for performing the job.

9.18.2 The following causes relating to personal conduct are representative of those considered to be additional grounds for official written reprimand, suspension, or termination:

- a. Conviction of a felony (required dismissal).
- b. Participation in immoral conduct or a criminal act.

- c. Willful abuse or misappropriation of County funds, materials, property or equipment.
- d. Participation in any action that would in any way seriously disrupt or disturb the normal operation of the department or any other segment of County government.
- e. Trespassing on the property of any County employee or any resident of the County, for the purpose of harassing or forcing dialogue or discussion from the occupants.
- f. Willful damage or destruction of County property.
- g. Willful acts that would endanger the lives and property of others.
- h. Possession of unauthorized fire arms or lethal weapons on the job.
- i. Brutality in the performance of duties.
- j. Betrayal of confidential information from official records.
- k. Taking part in political activities or in political campaigns in a place or manner prohibited by law.

9.19 Discipline for Wage Garnishments

- 9.19.1 Current law concerning the subject is a federal law that took effect on July 1, 1970 and provides that "no employer may discharge any employee by reason of the fact that his earnings have been subjected to garnishment for any one indebtedness." This has been interpreted to mean that an employee may not be discharged due to any number of garnishments received from a single creditor, but may be discharged if he receives garnishments from more than one creditor.
- 9.19.2 The policy of disciplining employees for excessive wage garnishments, under normal circumstances, is that the employee be given a written warning for the first offense; a suspension of one (1) day for the second offense, which is a garnishment by a second creditor; and discharge for the third offense, which is a garnishment by a third creditor.

9.19.3 Investigation of the circumstances of the garnishment should be made to determine that the employee is actually at fault, and that there are no extenuating circumstances such as the expiration of one full year since the last garnishment, discharge of the debt through bankruptcy, speedily lifting the debt prior to action being taken against the employee, lack of knowledge of the debt, a good work record, or loss of income caused by a previous lay-off or period of unemployment, should be considered in determining the penalty or variation in the severity of a penalty. For example, under unusual circumstances, an oral warning might be given for the first offense, a written warning for the second offense, a one to three day suspension for the third offense and discharge for the fourth offense.

9.19.4 Grooming. - All County employees are expected to dress in an appropriate and suitable manner to perform their respective job duties, and shall be required to maintain their personal appearance, including length and style of hair and beard, as well as their personal cleanliness, and style, neatness, and cleanliness of clothing, so as not to bring discredit upon the County nor to adversely reflect upon the public image of the County, remembering always that the County is a public body and must present an appropriately high image to the public.

10.0 On-The-Job-Injuries:

10.1 The following procedure is to be followed when employees are injured on the job:

10.1.1 If it is a serious injury the employee is to be taken to the emergency room at Erlanger Hospital. If the injury is not serious, but requires medical attention, the employee is to be taken, or referred, to: County Physician Dr. William B. Findley, 8142-C East Brainerd Road, Chattanooga, Tennessee 37421.

10.1.2 An accident report form shall be filled out in duplicate as soon as possible by the injured employee and signed by the immediate supervisor, verifying that the injury was job related. One copy is to be retained in the Department, Division, Office or Agency files and the other forwarded to the Personnel Office.

10.1.3 In compliance with the Tennessee Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1972, the TOSHA form 101 PS is also to be filled out by the supervisor within 24 hours of the accident. One copy is to be retained in the Department, Division, Office, or Agency files, one copy forwarded to the Personnel Office, and one copy forwarded to Hamilton County O.S.H.A. Compliance Officer, 1110 Dayton Boulevard.

10.2 County accident report forms and TOSHA forms 101PS have been provided all departments. Additional forms may be obtained by contacting the Director.

10.3 In the event the Tennessee General Assembly should terminate the supervision by the State of the Occupational Safety and Health Act, the County O.S.H.A. Compliance Officer will provide the appropriate Federal forms in lieu of the no longer required Tennessee forms, and the County Compliance Officer will become the County Safety Officer, or the Federal counterpart of the Compliance Officer, as the case may be.

11.0 Compensation for Time Off for On-The-Job Injury

11.1 Employees who are injured while performing their assigned duties in the course of their official employment and must miss work because of injury will be compensated at their regular rate of pay, without change, for up to ninety (90) days from the time of such injury, but not beyond such time as the injured employee is released by the County Physician, or the treating physician on the staff at Erlanger Hospital, to return to duty, or the injured employee becomes eligible for Social Security Disability benefits, or retirement benefits under the County retirement program.

11.2 The following procedure is to be followed by employees injured on the job:

11.2.1 Employee will contact his immediate supervisor once each week, while under the County Physician's (or the treating physician on the Erlanger Hospital's staff) care, and report his health status and the County (or Erlanger Hospital's) Physician's prognosis regarding his/her expected return to work.

11.2.2 Following a release to return to duty by the County Physician or the Erlanger Hospital staff physician the employee may be returned to his/her former position. However, if the injury has been such that the employee is not capable of performing his/her previous job duties he/she may be reassigned and his/her salary adjusted to conform with other employees in the same position.

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11.2.3 Any such employee who fails to report to his/her former position, or a newly assigned position as provided above, when released to return to duty as provided above, shall be automatically terminated from County service.

11.3 In the event the injured employee is, in the opinion of the County Physician, unable to return to work of any nature at the end of the ninety (90) day period, such injured employee's situation will be reviewed by the Director who will report his findings thereon together with his recommendations to the County Manager. The County Manager shall, subject to the approval of the County Judge, determine the amount of salary, if any (but not to exceed sixty-five (65%) percent of the injured employee's average wages per pay period) to be paid for additional periods of time not to exceed sixty days at any one time; however, in the event the County Physician or the said Erlanger Hospital treating physician should determine that the injury will, in said physician's opinion, permanently prevent the injured employee from returning to County employment, the County Manager shall determine how much, if any, sick leave the injured employee then has available, and no further periods of extension shall be authorized until the accrued and available sick leave shall have been exhausted; and provided further that such extensions shall not be granted beyond the period of time required for such injured employee to become eligible for Social Security Disability benefits (the injured employee being required to promptly make application for such Social Security Disability benefits as soon as it is apparent that the injuries are permanently disabling) or retirement benefits under the County retirement program; and further provided that the payment of any sums in lieu of salary or earnings hereunder shall not total more than those provided in the Tennessee Workmen's Compensation law for similarly injured employees covered by that law.

12.0 Hospital and Medical Insurance

- 12.1 The monthly premium for County employees hospital and medical insurance will be paid by the County and becomes effective the first of the month following 30 days of employment. However, so long as the County utilizes the Blue Cross - Blue Shield program, if an employee is transferred from another Blue Cross plan, the effective date is the first day of employment with Hamilton County.
- 12.2 Each employee will receive a hospital and medical insurance company identification card and a pamphlet, explaining the coverage, on his/her effective date.

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12.3 This benefit is not provided for temporary, seasonal, or part-time employees.

13.0 Life Insurance. - Hamilton County provides \$2,000 Group Term Life Insurance for each employee. In addition, the employee may contribute \$2.60 each month for the purchase of Paid-Up Life Insurance. The amount of insurance varies with the age of the employee. The policy builds a cash value at least equal to the employee's cumulative contributions. The employee has the option to choose the cash value of paid-up insurance only upon termination.

14.0 Retirement

14.1 Hamilton County provides a compulsory retirement system for employees with a maximum retirement benefit of \$300 per month and a minimum benefit of \$100 per month. The system is funded by a 5% contribution from employees and a 6.5% contribution from the County on the first \$600 of each employee's monthly earnings. Retirement benefits are provided because of age and length of service, or disability. Employees hired prior to July 1, 1969 may retire after 20 years of service if they have reached the age of 55 or after 24 years of service regardless of age. The amount of the monthly benefit for these employees is 50% of the average Base Salary (maximum \$600) for the highest four years. Employees hired after July 1, 1969 may retire at age 65 provided they have at least 20 years of service. The amount of the benefit for these employees is 50% of the average base salary for the highest four years if the employee has 24 years of service and 40% of the average Base Salary if the employee has between 20 and 24 years of service. An employee may retire on disability provided he has at least 10 years of service and is declared disabled by the Social Security Administration. The benefit for disability retirees is 30% of the average Base Salary for any four years with 10 years service, 40% with 15 years service, and 50% with 20 years service. Age and service retirees may elect to accept an actuarially determined reduced benefit in order to provide for a surviving spouse. Payments to the employee, spouse and estate of either must at least equal the employees cumulative contributions to the system.

14.2 If an employee is terminated prior to retirement, he may withdraw his cumulative contributions or leave them in the system, subject to any credit union lien agreements. If rehired, the employee will receive credit for his prior service if his contributions have remained in the system, or if he repays his withdrawn contributions plus 6% annual interest for the unemployed period within 90 days of the date he was rehired. The provisions of

Sections 14.1 and 14.2, however, shall be subject to the actual provisions of the Hamilton County law providing for pension and retirement benefits, it being the purpose of these two sections to set out in lay language some of the general provisions of the law rather than to set out the law itself or an actual interpretation of such law. The employee's attention is directed to the law itself for an actual interpretation of its provisions.

14.3 Subject to the conditions and qualifications hereinafter specified, an employee of the County (as defined in Par. 1.1 above) who attains sixty-five (65) years of age shall be retired:

14.3.1 Provided, however, at the request of the Head of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency of the County in which such employee is employed, such employee may remain in service until the last day of the fiscal year during which he attains sixty-five (65) years of age.

14.3.2 And provided further that at the request of the Head of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency of the County in which such employee is employed, approved by the Director and concurred in by the County Manager, such service may be extended year-by-year and following the same procedure each year, until such employee's attainment of seventy (70) years of age. In the event such extension is granted, but not renewed, such employee shall be retired at the end of the last yearly extension period, which shall occur on such employee's birthdate anniversary following the date of the last yearly extension.

15.0 Grievance Procedure

15.1 Purpose

15.1.2 To provide a clear, orderly and uniform method for all regular or permanent employees of Hamilton County to file and process their complaints or grievances with no fear of reprisal. This policy and procedure, properly administered and applied, will affect a higher degree of efficiency, raise the employees' morale and create a more harmonious relationship between all employees of the County.

15.1.3 Because grievances and misunderstandings inevitably arise in almost all work situations, it follows that the initiation of a grievance should not be considered as a reflection on the grieving employee, the employee's supervisor, or on the management of the department or the County.

15.2 Policy

15.2.1 It is the policy of Hamilton County that regular or permanent employees be given every opportunity, through established steps and procedures, to resolve complaints or grievances concerning matters which may adversely affect their employment or working conditions as County employees. It is also the policy of this County that every effort shall be made to settle complaints or grievances at the lowest possible step in the grievance procedure.

15.2.2 Regular or permanent employees shall have the right to present their complaints or grievances under the provisions of this grievance procedure free of fear, restraint, interference, coercion, discrimination or reprisal, and any violations of this right will subject the violator to disciplinary action and should be reported to the County Manager and County Personnel Director.

15.3 Definitions

15.3.1 Grievance. - Any matter which a regular or permanent employee or group of employees feel adversely affects their employment or position, and which is within the administrative discretion or control of the Head of a Department, Division, Office, or Agency.

15.4 Basic Standards

15.4.1 The following standards shall be applicable to all departments, divisions, offices, or agencies:

- a. Grievances shall not be considered valid unless they have been presented within five (5) workdays after the cause of the grievance has arisen.
- b. Employees should be given every reasonable opportunity to present grie-

vances during business hours with no fear of reprisal.

- c. Grievance forms will be made available to each department, division, office, or agency by the Personnel Office.
- d. Employees may submit only bona fide grievances which must be expressed in temperate, reasonable terms, must contain the basis for their grievances and corrective actions desired, and should contain sufficient information upon which to base decisions.

15.5 Procedures

15.5.1 Procedures shall not be more than five steps to finality as follows:

- a. Step I (informal). The grievance is to be discussed with the immediate supervisor in an informal manner. The supervisor will conduct an investigation or obtain any advice necessary to make a decision based upon full and fair consideration of all the facts and should be certain the decision is clearly communicated to, and understood by, the grievant. The initial grievance is not to be more than five (5) workdays old and the immediate supervisor shall provide an answer within 2 workdays.
- b. Step II - Within 2 workdays of the receipt of an answer from Step I, the grievant, if still dissatisfied, may submit the grievance in writing to the Head of the Department, Division, Office or Agency in which the employee is assigned. The Head of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency shall provide a hearing for the grievance within 2 workdays and render a written decision within 2 workdays of the hearing. The hearing will be conducted in an informal manner by the Head of the Department, Division, Office or Agency, with ample opportunity for both sides to be presented.

- c. Step III - Within 2 workdays of the receipt of an answer from Step II, the grievant, if still dissatisfied, may submit the grievance in writing to the Director who shall provide for hearing the grievance within 2 workdays and render a written decision within 2 workdays of the hearing. The hearing will be conducted in an informal manner, with ample opportunity for both sides to be presented. Witnesses may be called and documentary proof may be presented.
- d. Step IV - Within 2 workdays of the receipt of an answer at Step III, the grievant, if still dissatisfied, may submit a copy of the written statement of grievance, which was submitted to the Director with a copy of the Step III answer attached, to the County Manager who shall consider the grievance and discuss it with the employee within 2 workdays, and render a written decision within 2 workdays thereafter.
- d. Step V - Within 2 workdays of the receipt of an answer at Step IV, the grievant, if still dissatisfied, may submit a copy of the written statement of grievance, together with the various written decisions, to the County Judge, requesting a hearing before the County Council. The grievant will be notified by letter of the time, and date, for the hearing. The ruling by the County Council will be final and shall not be subject to further review.

15.5.2 Upon mutual agreement by the employee and the supervisor or administrative officer at each step, the time limits may be extended. Such agreement shall be in writing. If such agreement is not made and the aggrieved does not receive an answer within the prescribed time limits, the grievance may be appealed directly to the next step. Supervisors who do not respond to grievances within the time limits prescribed may be subject to reprimand and/or disciplinary action.

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15.6 Exceptions and Grievable Matters

- 15.6.1 Exceptions. - The grievance procedure does not apply to the specific categories of employees and actions listed below:
- a. Actions caused by reductions in force.
 - b. Actions which affect an employee who is serving in a temporary, seasonal, or a part-time job, or a probationary employee.
 - c. A non-selection for promotion when the sole basis for the grievance is an allegation by the employee that the employee is better qualified than the person selected.
 - d. Written warnings, or verbal warnings, or official written reprimand.
 - e. Some additional items which are not grievable are: rate of pay, performance ratings and performance warnings, merit salary adjustments, employee complaints, (Par. 9.10), position classifications, and lateral transfers.
- 15.6.2 Grievable Matters. - Matters not specifically excluded in the aforementioned exceptions and which are within the administrative discretion or control of the head of a department, division, office, or agency may be grievable.
- 15.6.3 If there is a dispute concerning whether or not a particular matter is grievable under this Grievance Procedure, a ruling may be obtained by writing the involved head of any department, division, office or agency of the County. If the involved head of any department, division, office or agency of the County does not have sufficient information regarding laws, policies and procedures, etc., available to him on which to base a ruling, he may obtain a decision by contacting the Director.

16.0 Hamilton County Occupational Safety and Health Program

16.1 General Statement -

- 16.1.1 The Tennessee Occupational Safety & Health Act of 1972 provides job safety and Health

protection for Tennessee's workers through the promotion of safe and healthful working conditions. Under a plan approved by the Tennessee Department of Labor, Hamilton County is responsible for administering the Act to the employees of the County. The County issues safety and health guides and its compliance officer(s) conducts jobsite inspections to insure compliance with the Act.

- 16.1.2 The County shall furnish to each of its employees conditions of employment and a place of employment free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious injury or harm to employees.
- 16.1.3 Each employee shall comply with occupational safety and health standards and all rules, regulations, and orders issued pursuant to this program which are applicable to his or her own actions and conduct.
- 16.1.4 Each employee shall be notified by the placing upon bulletin boards or other places of common passage of any application for a temporary order granting a variance from any standard or regulation.
- 16.1.5 Each employee shall be given the opportunity to participate in any hearing which concerns an application for a variance from a standard.
- 16.1.6 Any employee who may be adversely affected by a standard or variance issued pursuant to this program may file a petition with the County Compliance Officer, 1110 Dayton Blvd., Chattanooga, Tennessee, 37405.
- 16.1.7 Any employee who has been exposed or is being exposed to toxic materials or harmful physical agents in concentrations or at levels in excess of that provided for by an applicable standard shall be notified by the County and informed of such exposure and corrective action being taken.
- 16.1.8 Subject to regulations issued pursuant to this program, any employee or authorized representatives of employees shall be given the right to request an inspection.
- 16.1.9 No employee shall be discharged or discriminated against because such employee has filed any complaint or instituted or caused to be

instituted any proceedings or inspection under, or relating to, this program, unless such employee is guilty of filing knowingly frivolous or groundless complaints, or file groundless or frivolous complaints to harrass a superior.

16.1.10 Any employee who believes he or she has been discriminated against or discharged in violation of these sections may, within thirty (30) days after such violation occurs, have an opportunity to appear in a hearing before the County Judge for assistance in obtaining relief.

16.1.11 A copy of the county's occupational safety and health program is available for inspection by any employee at these locations. Room 215, Hamilton County Court House, Supt. of Education 317 Oak Street, OSHA Office 1110 Dayton Blvd., during regular office hours.

16.2 The following instructions for completing TOSHA form 101PS correspond to number items on that form:

- (1) Name of city, county, state agency, etc.
- (2) Number and street, city or town, zip code.
- (3) First, middle and last name of employee.
- (4) Number and street, city or town, zip code.
- (5) Age.
- (6) Sex.
- (7) Regular job title, not specific activity being performed at the time of the injury.
- (8) Enter name of the Department, Division, Office or Agency in which the injured person is regularly employed, even though he might have been temporarily working in another Department, Division, Office, or Agency at the time of the injury.
- (9) Name of building or location where accident occurred.
- (10) Date.
- (11) Be specific, if he was using tools or equipment or handling material, name them and tell what he was doing with them. Describe fully the events which resulted in injury or illness. Tell what happened and how it happened. Name any objects or substances involved and tell how they were involved.

Give full details on all factors which led or contributed to the accident. Use separate sheet for additional space if required.

- (12) e.g.; Amputation of right index finger at second joint, fracture of ribs, lead poisoning dermatitis of left hand, etc.
- (13) Be specific, "Instructed employee to be more careful" is not an acceptable response to this question.
- (14) Reference TOSHA standards if covered or common sense rules violated, if any.

16.3 All Heads of Departments, Divisions, Offices and Agencies have been provided with form 101PS.

17.0 Personnel Classification Policy and Guidelines

17.1 General Definitions Relating to Positions.

- 17.1.1 The position is a composite of the duties and responsibilities officially assigned or delegated to be performed by one employee. The position must be considered as an entity separate and apart from the employee. A position may be part-time, seasonal or full-time, filled or vacant, temporary or permanent, allocated or not allocated, budgeted but not established, or established (budgeted and allocated).
- 17.1.2 A Budgeted Position is an item in the budget of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency listed as a "position" under personal services which has been funded, or budgeted, by the County Council. Budgeted positions may not be filled until the duties and responsibilities to be assigned the position are actually decided upon by the employing Department, Division, Office, or Agency, and the position has been allocated to the proper position class by the County Manager upon the approval of the County Judge.
- 17.1.3 An Allocated Position is a composite of duties and responsibilities which have been studied and assigned to the appropriate class of positions (i.e., allocated) by the County Manager upon the approval of the County Judge.

- 17.1.4 An Established Position is a composite of duties and responsibilities which have been both allocated by the County Manager, upon the approval of the County Judge, and officially budgeted by the County Council. A Department's, Division's, Office's or Agency's complement of positions which may be filled shall consist only of established positions. No position may be filled unless it is an established position and the present need for filling or re-filling such position has been approved by the County Judge.
- 17.1.5 The abolishment of a position is the deletion of a position from the authorized staffing pattern.
- 17.1.6 The Position Classification Plan consists of the classes of positions described in the official class specifications with rules of administration for its installation and continuous administration.
- 17.1.7 Position Description is a written record of the specific duties and responsibilities assigned to a particular position or job. In addition it may contain statements listing the special skills, abilities, and equipment necessary to perform the job successfully.
- 17.1.8 Position Reclassification is a change of position classification brought about by a basic change in the type and/or level of the duties and/or responsibilities normally assigned to the position or a correction of an earlier classification.
- 17.1.9 Position Title is the title of that class to which a position has been allocated. All official personnel records, official communications, and payrolls must bear the official class title.
- 17.1.10 Lateral Transfer is the intra-County employment movement of a position without a change in position classification.
- 17.1.11 A Temporary Position is a position established for a specific period of time (not to exceed one year).
- 17.1.12 A Seasonal Position is a position which is occupied full-time for only a fractional part of a fiscal year, generally described as a season.

18.0 Personnel Classification and Guidelines

- 18.1 Purpose. - The purpose of this outline is to explain the policies and procedures used in determining position classifications, to illustrate the uses and format of class specifications, and the standard procedures pertaining to position changes and the preparation of class specifications.
- 18.2 Definition of Position Classification. - The process of classification involves examining for distinguishing features, and sorting and labeling the subject matter of the classification. Position classification is an orderly arrangement of positions as a basis for administrative action. The most useful grouping of positions has been found to be that in which the basis of grouping is the similarity of tasks performed, and the degree of authority and responsibility borne. Each group, or class, is labeled with a descriptive title indicating the nature of the duties and responsibilities involved.
- 18.3 Position Classification as it Relates to Personnel Management. - Position classification provides standard titles and a common language in personnel actions and in budgeting, and is the basis for such essential phases of personnel administration as the establishment of a compensation plan, recruitment, systematic transfer and promotion, service rating, and budget preparation and review. It is an important adjunct to organizational and procedural study and planning. It does not accomplish these latter personnel objectives by itself, but provides by analysis of positions and their relationships, a practical basis for proper personnel management.
- 18.3.1 Compensation Plan. - A properly prepared and maintained plan for compensation of County employees relating compensation to the employees duties and responsibilities in an effort to approach the axiom of "equal pay for equal work" throughout the County.
- 18.3.2 Recruitment. - Advance knowledge of the duties and responsibilities and of the educational and experience requirements of the various classes of positions is essential and experience requirements of the various classes of positions is essential to intelligent recruitment of personnel. Accurately prepared class specifications make it possible to construct practical tests to measure necessary knowledges, skills, and abilities for the various types of positions. These specifications may be quoted or summarized in the recruitment announcement and are points of reference for the rating of education and experience.

- 18.3.3 Transfer and Promotion. - The knowledge of the duties and needed qualifications of positions gained by Department, Division, Office, or Agency heads through the classification process facilitates intelligent transfer of employees and permits the defining of lines of promotion. A classification plan formulated through position analysis enables employees to understand their own and related functions and to appreciate the promotional opportunities within the County.
- 18.3.4 Budget Preparation and Review. - The standard titles and rates of pay resulting from a classification and compensation plan make possible simpler preparation and presentation of the personal service items in budgets. The standard class titles have a definite meaning in terms of the tasks, responsibilities, and ranges of pay of the budgeted positions. Intelligent and accurate review of the personnel sections of the budgets is therefore facilitated.
- 18.3.5 Organization Planning:
- a. The problems of planning organization structure can be approached through the techniques employed in the classification of positions. The analysis of duties of positions and their relationships to one another may be used as a basis for determining the organizational structure. Conflicts or gaps in authority and duplication of work may be discovered through the classification process, and clearer lines of authority and coordination of functions may be suggested and may be achieved through changes in the assignments of duties and responsibilities.
 - b. The classification process does not, however, of itself effect any changes in organization. A classification plan, it should also be pointed out, does not interfere in any way with administrative authority over the assignment of duties to various positions, the establishment of new positions, or the discontinuance of existing positions within the organization. Such organizational changes may,

of course, necessitate changes in the classification plan, but the plan itself never restricts organizational changes. In other words, the classification plan, if currently maintained, presents a picture of various jobs as they exist within the organization framework at any one time. The compensation of the picture is a matter of administrative discretion.

- 18.3.6 Service Ratings. - In administering any program of employee service ratings, it is essential that the factors upon which the employees are rated be directly related to the type of work they are performing and that the efficiency of employees be judged in light of the efficiency of other employees filling positions in the same class, as well as by other standards of performance which may be developed for the particular job. For these reasons, a classification plan is essential to fair administration of service ratings.

18.4 Basic Tools of Position Classification

- 18.4.1 Job Analysis. - Job analysis is a study of the actual duties and responsibilities assigned to a particular position, its location in the organization, and the education, experience, knowledge, abilities, and skills necessary to successfully perform those duties and responsibilities.
- 18.4.2 Class Specifications. - Class specifications are written descriptions of classes of positions which outline duties and responsibilities typically assigned; the education, experience, and skills necessary to perform the assigned duties; and the examination requirements for appointment. They serve as pre-established standards that can be used to determine to which class a particular position should be assigned.
- 18.4.3 Organizational Charts. - Organizational charts are graphic illustrations of the staffing of organizations reflecting the reporting relationships of all positions.
- 18.4.4 Comparability File. - The comparability file is a collection by class titles of all prior classification questionnaires. They serve as references in allocation positions to the proper classes.

- 18.4.5 Questionnaire Audit. - A questionnaire audit is a study of a position conducted by review of written answers to designated questions completed by the incumbent of the position, the immediate supervisor, and the appointing authority.
- 18.4.6 Desk Audit. - A desk audit is a study of a position conducted by a personal interview with the incumbent, his supervisor, the Department, Division, Office or Agency Head, and the Personnel Director. The primary difference between a questionnaire audit and a desk audit is the element of a personal interview by the Personnel Director.
- 18.5 General Statement of Classification Factors. - Classification factors are simply guidelines for systematic position analysis. They are used in sets. A set of classification factors is a means of identifying for detailed consideration those characteristics of positions which are important in determining the kind and level of work performed and the qualifications required for that performance. There is no one-and-only correct set of classification factors. Any one of several valid sets of classification factors will, in one way or another, point out the same characteristics of a given position.
- 18.6 The Five-Basic Classification Factors.
- 18.6.1 There are five factors that are often referred to as the basic or ultimate classification factors. They identify the five broad elements which may exist in varying degrees in positions, and which must be considered in arriving at proper classification of positions. These factors are:
- a. Subject matter, function, profession, or occupation represented;
 - b. Difficulty and complexity of duties;
 - c. Non-supervisory responsibilities;
 - d. Supervisory responsibilities;
 - e. Qualification requirements.
- 18.6.2 As is true of most ultimate or basic elements, they are too broad and too general to be of much real value in actual position analysis. A more detailed and specific set of factors encompassing the above five factors is necessary.

18.7 The Eight-Factor Classification Pattern. - The eight-factor pattern represents a subdivision and rearrangement of the five basic classification factors into a set of eight designed to facilitate position analysis. These factors are:

- a. Nature and Variety of Work. - This factor embraces both the nature and the variety of the subject matter. "Nature" includes the kind of work performed, as shown by each element, as the subject matter, function, profession, or occupation involved; the mental or physical process utilized in performing the work; and the skills, knowledges and techniques applied. "Variety" as applied to a position, considers the range of work, and the inherently different kinds of work included in the position. As applied to a class, "variety" reflects the kinds of work and skills which are included in the class.
- b. Nature of Supervision Received by the Incumbent. This factor includes the nature and extent of deliberate, planned supervisory control exercised over the incumbent of the position being classified (or, in relation to a class, typically exercised over incumbents in a class of positions) which limits the scope of work, the independence with which it is performed, and the nature and finally of decisions. Included, for example, are such items as the basis for selection of work assignments; the nature of direct instructions or advice from a supervisor which the encumbent receives; and the extent and degree to which actions and decisions are limited by review. This review may be of all actions and decisions or of a selected few only, or of the overall program for effectiveness or conformity with policy.
- c. Nature of Available Guidelines for Performance Or Work. - This factor relates to those guides which control or influence performance of the work, i.e., the extent to which performance of work is guided by rules, regulations, manuals, procedures, prescribed work practices, principles, policies, or other written instruction or methods.
- d. Originality Required. - This factor embraces the degree of inventiveness, imagination, and ability to innovate or create that which is required in the work. Important is the extent to which the work requires that new approaches or previously

unused methods be developed, or that deviations be made from standard work practices. The resourcefulness or ingenuity required in the solving of new problems or the solving of old problems in new ways is the crux of this matter.

- e. Purpose and Nature of Person-to-Person Work Relationships. - These relationships may be for giving or securing information, for rendering personal service, for performing administrative services, for explaining policies or methods, for interpreting programs, plans, or individual actions, or for maintaining coordination, securing cooperation, or settling controversies by means of personal contact. Here are included the what, why, how, when, and with whom of relations maintained with other persons (not in the supervisory chain) within Department, Division, Office, or Agency.
- f. Nature and Scope of Recommendations, Decisions Commitments, and Conclusions. - Under these factors are considered the questions, problems, or types of cases in which the employee makes recommendations, decisions, commitments, or conclusions which affect operations, plans, programs, methods or policies; and the degree of finality in such judgments or actions as measured by such criteria as instructions, delegated authority, and review of supervisors, or by applicable rules, regulations, statutes, or precedents.
- g. Nature and Extent of Supervision Exercised Over Work of Other Employees. - "Nature" of supervision exercised includes supervisory and/or administrative responsibilities for such matters as establishing objectives; planning, organizing and establishing work flow; making assignments and reviewing work; and rating performance of employees. "Extent" is defined as the degree of independence and responsibility with which these responsibilities are performed, and includes the scope of performance as reflected in the difficulty of work, the size and complexity of the organization, and the variety of functions.
- h. Qualifications Required. - This factor includes knowledges, skills, abilities, and other qualifications required for full performance of the work. The qualifications required should be reflected in the other seven factors.

18.8 Supervisory and Administrative Responsibilities. - The eight classification factors include the duties and the nonsupervisory responsibilities of a position. There may be, however, certain other characteristics of a position that would effect its proper classification. These are generally referred to as the supervisory and/or administrative responsibilities of a position. These are not to be confused with the responsibility of "review". Both supervisory review and non-supervisory review may involve power to reject, revise, and modify the product. Supervisory review, however, also includes the authority to plan, assign, and reassign work, and to instruct those whose work it reviews; and it also involves an operating or management responsibility for the work of those supervised. Those functions which are most commonly spoken of as supervisory and/or administrative responsibilities are objectives, planning, flow of work, housekeeping management, assignments, work methods, coordination, production and results.

18.8.1 Establishing Policies. - Policies represent the general principles and guidelines which are used to determine the general course of conduct for the operation of the County. The means of establishing policies varies from the adoption by the County Council to the interpretation of the policies to the employees by their supervisors.

18.8.2 Establishing Objectives. - Objectives represent certain tasks and goals which are set forth in a work plan to be achieved over a specific period of time. An objective may define broad limits of work, set goals for complete work programs, or determine the purposes and characteristics of tasks to be performed by individual workers.

18.8.3 Planning. - Planning represents formalized methods and procedures set forth to accomplish desired objectives. Planning may involve the projection of organizational structures, the provision for personnel and equipment, or the determination of details and precise techniques to be used at the lowest work level.

18.8.4 Organizing and Establishing Flow of Work. - This is the means of arranging work along functional lines so that it is processed with efficiency and expedition from its inception to its completion. The most important factors in this case are the determination of the proper sequence of the various County operations and the formulation of the

necessary routines to be performed by each individual employee so that individual work output may be productive.

- 18.8.5 Housekeeping Management. - Housekeeping management includes recruitment, training, performance, discipline, leave, expenditures, procurement, supplies, equipment, space requirements and other related functions necessary to maintain County operations. Authority concerning matters of housekeeping management can be widely distributed in the organization. More important questions may be administered by the Head of a Department, Division, Office, or Agency so that general rules and regulations may be promulgated, whereas lower level supervisors may make initial recommendations and minor decisions.
- 18.8.6 Making Work Assignments. - This is the process by which individual employees are given instruction as to what they are expected to do and also given definite priorities concerning basic work assignments. The Department, Division, Office, or Agency Heads must use sound judgment in selecting employees for particular assignments so the talents of each employee will be utilized to the maximum. Supervisors with somewhat more limited authority may make decisions in distributing work assignments in order to expedite work and equalize the work load.
- 18.8.7 Work Methods. - The work method represents a set form or procedure for accomplishing the various tasks assigned to each job. Appropriate techniques must be used to accomplish the established objective. The establishment of work methods is a variable factor since the type of work operation determines what methods are necessary. For example, certain operations which involve the use of mechanical apparatus would require work methods which are standard everywhere and hence, the supervisor's control of this aspect would be negligible. However, in other fields of endeavor the Department, Division, Office, or Agency Head acts as a specialist in a defined professional area may prescribe definite work methods. Control over work methods may vary from determination by the Department, Division, Office or Agency Heads to examination by the supervisor to see that approved methods are followed.

18.8.8 Coordination. - Coordination is the process of bringing the varied functions and tasks of the County operation into common action so that all work tasks are executed in an efficient manner together. Department, Division, Office, or Agency Heads may exercise the function of coordination ranging from the aspect of overall planning and development of mechanisms to the examination by the supervisor to see that all approved methods are followed.

18.9 Effects of Staffing on Classification. - Before a position can be allocated to a specific class, the effect which its allocation would cause relative to the organizational structure must be considered. At this point it is necessary to review the organizational chart of the Department, Division, Office, or Agency involved. This chart should show all positions in the Department, Division, Office or Agency and should reflect an efficient staffing pattern. Positions should be utilized in the most efficient manner in order to accomplish the task at hand. It is the responsibility of the County Manager to recommend to the County Judge not to allocate to a specific classification when the utilization and economy of the staffing pattern are being abused. When abuse of this type has been revealed, the County Manager should recommend corrective action to the Personnel Office, upon the approval of the County Judge, in the form of a more economical and efficient way to organize.

18.10 Mixed Positions.

18.10.1 A mixed position results when duties and responsibilities of varying levels from two or more related classifications are combined in varying periods and percentages of time to make up one position. The mixed position might be illustrated by a custodian who cleans offices in the early evening for a certain period of time and then later at night performs watchman duties to complete the job. In a mixed position a variation of duties may occur periodically on a daily, weekly, or monthly basis. Since it would not be practicable to reclassify the position from time to time to conform with the variations, it becomes necessary to establish a rule for allocating mixed positions.

a. Periodic Mixed Positions. - A periodic mixed position may be defined as one in which the duties recur at regular stated times with a definite certainty. Admin-

istrative action would have little effect in disturbing this cycle. In classifying these types of positions the rule to follow is to consider the position on an overall basis which covers the complete work cycle and classify on the basis of all duties and responsibilities.

- b. Non-Periodic Mixed Positions. - In non-periodic mixed positions there is no definite period in which recurring duties and responsibilities occur. The chief observation to be made in classifying these type positions is to look at past characteristics of the position in light of what might be expected to occur in the future.

- c. Rules for Allocating Mixed Positions. The basic guideline in allocating mixed positions is to allocate to the classification of the highest type of duty performed. However, this rule can only be applied when the following conditions are met:
 - (1) All mixed positions should be clearly defined so the highest level duties are discernible beyond doubt.
 - (2) The duties upon which classification are based should represent a significant amount of working time and not just be exceptional. It must not be an infrequent, minor, exceptional, or temporary duty or responsibility.
 - (3) The higher level duties should require corresponding increase in qualifications which must be met when recruiting.

18.10.2 The above rules should not be manipulated in order to secure a higher classification for an employee by spreading work out among several employees when it would be an inefficient and wasteful means in distributing the work load.

18.12 Definition of Class Specification. - A class specification is a summarized description of the positions included in one class, in which description of the salient differentiating factors are described and illustrated by examples and the minimum qualifications for competent

performance on the job are set forth. A class specification differs from a position description in that a class specification is a general illustration of a typical position in a class featuring only enough examples of duties and responsibilities to establish a level of difficulty whereas a position description is a specific picture of a given position featuring all the exact duties and responsibilities of that position.

18.13 Class Specifications as They Relate to Personnel Management. - Class specifications can be useful tools of personnel management. Some of the ways they can be useful are:

- a. They are the basic tool for properly classifying one position in relation to others, and for requiring the same qualifications of individuals doing like work.
- b. They aid in establishing a fair pay system, and in demonstrating why one individual earns more than another.
- c. They point out the distinctive relationships between one position and those of similar character, but of higher or lower level.
- d. They may assist the employee to understand the functions which go into making up his or her job.
- e. They may serve as a training guide to employees by depicting work processes.
- f. They assist in the hiring and placing of an employee by enabling the employee or candidate to visualize the types of positions which exist.
- g. They aid the supervisor in evaluating the performance of the employee by visualizing the type and level of work he is supposed to be doing.
- h. They help the Department, Division, Office, or Agency Head by depicting the class functions, and the number of class levels, thus aiding such Head in the organization process. They help in determining the feasibility of existing practices in a Department, Division, Office, or Agency.
- i. They outline and depict lines of promotion.
- j. They may indicate the areas of work for which there are training needs.

- k. They outline the channels of communication, the work flow, and the Department, Division, Office or Agency hierarchy.
- l. They indicate which traits, skills, etc., are required to perform satisfactorily in a given class of positions.
- m. They indicate the minimum training and experience which is normally necessary to perform the job satisfactorily.
- n. They serve as the official document for the requirements of a class of positions, thus, preventing unqualified candidates from erroneously filling or assuming vacant positions.

18.14 Minimum or Desirable Qualifications.

- 18.14.1 This statement is designed to present clearly and comprehensively the basic requirements of education, experience (including necessary requirements), knowledge, ability and/or skill, and in some instances, personal attributes and physical requirements necessary for competent performance in positions in the class. It is intended to answer the question: "What in the future should be the qualifications of an applicant who seeks to enter one of the positions in this class?"
- 18.14.2 The emphasis in the above question is upon the words "future" and "applicant". While the qualifications of a large number of incumbents may be a consideration in determining acceptable types of experience, it is important to keep in mind that minimum or desirable qualifications are intended, above all else, to reflect the importance, difficulty, and responsibility of the duties of the class, and that they should represent the appointing authority's well-considered and objective judgment of the qualifications to be required of future applicants to assure competent performance on the job.
- 18.14.3 Since the statement of minimum qualifications will be used as objective standards by which the qualifications of applicants will be rated, it is particularly important they be as specific as possible on the following points:
 - a. The number of years of education and experience and the recency of such experience.

- b. The kind of education and experience. The experience should be defined in terms not merely of occupation, but of types and grade of work within occupations.
- c. The basis and limits of substitution of additional experience for required education and of education for experience if the duties of the position are such that substitution is justified.

18.14.4 Desirable qualifications specify the type of qualifications we feel should be present in order to perform the duties of the class satisfactorily. This does not rule out applicants whose individual qualifications do not meet Hamilton County's desirable standards.

18.14.5 In addition to education and experience requirements, the qualification statement should include one or more paragraphs setting forth the special abilities, knowledges, and skills which are required of applicants and on which they may be tested in written and oral examinations being hired. Whenever possible, objective measurements of abilities and skills should be included. For example, the qualification statements for stenographic classes should specify, in terms of words per minute, the dictation and typing speeds required. Consistency in form and content can be achieved only by making careful comparisons

qualification statements included in the specifications. Such comparison should be made not only between classes within a series, but also across series lines between classes of approximately the same level.

18.15 Relative Weights of Examination Parts. - This is a statement of the varying emphasis placed on Education and Experience, and/or Written Test, and/or Interview as part of the total examination process. The possible numerical total for an examination for any position is always 10, but one, two, or all of the above may be utilized in varying weights to total 10, e.g., Education and Experience, 4; Written Tests, 4; Interview, 2.

18.16 Glossary. -

- 18.16.1 Advanced. - Denotes a skill level required of a job. It indicates the first level above the journeyman or normal operating level of the job.
- 18.16.2 Analysis. - The study and separation of anything into its principal parts, e.g., job, personnel, sales, etc.
- 18.16.3 Assistant. - An employee serving in a line capacity where the job is characterized by full responsibility for administering the total program in the absence of his supervisor.
- 18.16.4 Assistant for. - A specific program specialist serving in a line capacity where the job is characterized by full responsibility for administering a selected portion of the total program.
- 18.16.5 Assistant To. - An employee serving in a staff capacity to any one of a number of administrators. Depending on the level, assignments will be of a varied nature. He advises, prepares, and assists.
- 18.16.6 Characteristic. - A quality, peculiarity, duty, etc., which distinguishes one class from another.
- 18.16.7 Clerical. - Type of work which is normally assigned to a typist or clerk, i.e., office procedures involving typing, filing, and office service aids, usually to a professional or administrative staff.
- 18.16.8 Direct. - To organize and oversee others in program implementation. Supervision of employees will usually constitute a part of directing procedures.
- 18.16.9 Interview. - A patterned conversation directed toward a definite goal other than the satisfaction obtained from the conversation itself.
- 18.16.10 Knowledge. - Four levels of "knowledge" are used in specification terminology for County service. They are:
- a. Thorough knowledge - An usually broad and specialized knowledge; an almost complete mastery of the subject.

- b. Considerable knowledge. - An advanced knowledge of the subject matter, enough knowledge to permit solution of all routine and some unusual work problems, to advise on technical question, and to plan methods for work situations.
 - c. Knowledge. - Sufficient knowledge of the subject to enable the employee to work effectively in a limited range of work situations.
 - d. Some knowledge. - Familiarity with the elementary principles and terminology of the subject indicated.
- 18.16.11 Professional. - Word descriptive of a field of activity, type of work, or vocation which requires specialized knowledge and frequently lengthy and intensive academic preparation usually at a higher education institution.
- 18.16.12 Routine. -Work of a repetitive nature (this does not necessarily denote simple work).
- 18.16.13 Skill. -The factor in a class denoting the working proficiency that an incumbent in a position must possess, whether it be manual or mental. Skill may be described as "knowledge with ability to apply it on the job."
- 18.16.14 Supervision. -Five levels of supervision are recognized in specification terminology:
- a. "Under immediate supervision" indicates the greatest amount of supervision and control from above and the least personal independence of action.
 - b. "Under general supervision" indicates that the control from above is a general rather than a particularized control. This may also be referred to as "administrative supervision."
 - c. "Under general direction" indicates an extremely general and somewhat remote control that manifests itself only on detached occasions.
 - d. "Under administrative direction" indicates that control from above comes directly from a Department, Division, Office, or Agency Head.
 - c. "Under executive direction" indicates control comes directly from the County Judge.

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18.16.15 Technical. -Generally refers to a job requiring a specialized knowledge involving a mechanical or scientific subject; a practical knowledge involving a skill.

19.0 PERFORMANCE REVIEW AND GUIDELINES

19.1 Evaluation Periods -

19.1.1 Employee evaluations shall be conducted during the first two weeks of June and December of each year. Employees to be evaluated in June have salary anniversary dates occurring between July 1 and December 31. Employees to be evaluated in December have salary anniversary dates occurring between January 1 and June 30. Employees with no salary anniversary date are to be evaluated in December.

19.1.2 Performance Review forms will be provided to the Heads of Departments, Divisions, Offices, and Agencies at the appropriate evaluation times.

19.1.3 Supervisors shall evaluate employee performance for the following time periods:

- a. From hire date to date of current evaluation, if no evaluation has ever been completed;
- b. From date of last evaluation to date of current evaluation, if no promotion has occurred;
- c. From date of last promotion/demotion to date of current evaluation, if the action was completed after the last evaluation.

19.1.4 Forms shall be returned to the Personnel Office by June 21st for the June evaluation and by December 20th for the December evaluation.

19.2 Employees to be Evaluated - All employees shall be evaluated with the following exceptions:

19.2.1 Part-time/Seasonal/Short-term Federally funded employees

19.2.2 Employees on Sick/Military Leave

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- 19.2.3 Probationary Employees, only if the rater has had insufficient time to observe the employee's job performance.
- 19.2.4 Terminated Employees. A list of terminated employees scheduled for evaluation is to be sent to the Personnel Office at the time evaluations are returned.
- 19.2.5 Any employee whose rater has had insufficient time to accurately evaluate his performance. In this case, evaluations should be deferred until performance can be reasonably assessed. Employees not receiving an evaluation are to be identified and information forwarded to the Personnel Office.

19.3 Forms Completions

- 19.3.1 The supervisor must discuss the evaluation of the employee's performance with the employee.
- 19.3.2 Forms must be signed by the employee and his supervisor before they will be accepted by the Personnel Office.
- 19.3.3. Should an employee or a rater wish to record any remarks regarding an evaluation, a letter stating these remarks should be sent to the Personnel Office with the Performance Evaluation form.

CLASS SPECIFICATIONS

CLASS NO. 001

ACCOUNT CLERK

Definition

Under General supervision; to perform specialized clerical work in reviewing, processing and maintaining financial records; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

This is the basic working level in the account clerk series. The tasks performed require training and experience in fiscal record keeping as well as mathematical skill.

Responsible for proper accounting distribution, prepares, collects, and balances, and accounts for warrants and funds; prepares worksheets on expenditures, receipts, and the status of funds; general filing; assembles and posts fiscal and related data; general typing; audits and correct warrant copies; uses office machines including typewriter, adding and bookkeeping machines, and calculators.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and training equivalent to graduation from a standard high school including or supplemented by courses in bookkeeping principles and practices. One year of experience in office work involving general bookkeeping and accounting.

Knowledge of principles and methods of bookkeeping; business English and arithmetic; modern office practices, procedures, and equipment; ability to direct the flow of a considerable volume of detail work; make arithmetic calculations rapidly and accurately; general typing; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees; ability to follow oral and written instructions.

CLASS NO. 002

ACCOUNT CLERK I

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Work performed in applying elementary bookkeeping principles to the keeping of account of physical records; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Maintains general books of accounts according to established accounts classifications, including cash books, voucher registers, general ledgers, and general journals. Maintains a cost system according to an established procedure allocating cost items to a variety of accounts according to prescribed classifications. Keeps all budgetary accounts and records. Assists employees of higher classification. Prepares financial statements on standardized forms. Prepares trial balances.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and training equivalent to; Graduation from a standard high school including or supplemented by courses in bookkeeping principles and practices. Three years of experience in office work involving bookkeeping and accounting.

Knowledge of principles and methods of bookkeeping; business English and arithmetic; modern office practices, procedures, and equipment; the application of bookkeeping principles to routine transactions. Ability to direct the flow of a considerable volume of detailed work; make arithmetic calculations rapidly and accurately; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

CLASS NO. 003

ACCOUNT CLERK II

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Work performed in executing difficult clerical-accounting or auditing work and/or supervising personnel of lower classification engaged in clerical and routine clerical-accounting or auditing tasks; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Maintains general books of accounts according to established accounting classifications, including cash books, voucher registers, general ledgers, and general journals. Maintains a cost system according to an established procedure allocating cost items to a variety of accounts according to prescribed classifications. Keeps all budgetary accounts and records. Prepares financial statements and standardized forms. Composes letters and correspondence. Interviews the public and employees of the other departments on matters requiring the interpretation of departmental policies and regulations. Operates, independently and with only limited direction from above, an office involved in clerical accounting tasks.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and training equivalent to graduation from a standard high school including or supplemented by courses in bookkeeping principles and practices. Five years of progressively responsible experience in office work involving bookkeeping and accounting.

Knowledge of principles and methods of bookkeeping; business English and arithmetic; modern office practices, procedures, and equipment; the application of bookkeeping principles to routine transactions; the principles and methods of supervision. Ability to direct the flow of a considerable volume of detailed work; Make arithmetic calculations rapidly and accurately; evaluate situations and make decisions; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

CLASS NO. 004

ASSISTANT BUILDING AND GROUND SUPERVISOR

Definition

Under direction, to assign, supervise and review the work of a crew of janitors and porters in maintaining a public building, or buildings, in clean and orderly condition; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Plans, schedules, assigns and supervises the work of a group of janitors engaged in sweeping, mopping, and waxing floors, gathering and disposing of trash, cleaning light fixtures and door and window frames, washing walls and windows and in otherwise maintaining buildings and their immediate surroundings in a clean and orderly condition; maintains supplies and keeps simple records.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of the eighth grade and one year of experience in the supervision of janitorial work.

Knowledge of the materials, equipment and practices of janitorial work; ability to keep simple records; ability to supervise others.

CLASS NO. 005

ASST. DIRECTOR OF ACCOUNTS & BUDGETS

Definition

Under general direction of County Judge to supervise and participate in the maintenance of a central accounting system; to Provide information on availability of cash to invest and maintain an investment ledger; to serve as general assistant to the division chief; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Maintains an accounting system including budgetary control records; maintains cost accounting records; pre-audits and approves bills, invoices, payrolls and other claims on funds; prepares financial statements and reports; consults with department heads to determine anticipated needs for funds; invests surplus funds for short periods; prepares monthly reports for health insurance and F.I.C.A.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college with major work in accounting and five years of increasingly responsible accounting experience including two years of supervising professional accounting personnel.

Knowledge of accounting principles and practices and their application to an accounting system; knowledge of control accounting methods and procedures; knowledge of short-term investment practices; ability to compile comprehensive financial statements; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships; Ability to express ideas clearly, concisely, and convincingly; ability to evaluate situations and make decisions; ability to plan, organize, assign, supervise, and inspect the work of subordinates.

CLASS NO. 006

ASST. COUNTY AUDITOR

Definition

Under direction, to do professional auditing work of average difficulty in the examination of financial transactions; to determine propriety and conformance with auditing requirements; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Conducts independent protective and constructive audits for County Auditors to review effectiveness of controls, financial records, and operations; examines records of departments to insure proper recording of transactions and compliance with applicable laws; inspects accounting systems to determine their efficiency and protective value; reviews records pertaining to material assets, such as equipment, buildings or manpower, to determine degree to which they are utilized; analyzes data obtained for evidence of deficiencies in controls, duplication of effort, extravagance, fraud, or lack of compliance with County Auditor's established policies or procedures; prepares reports of findings and recommendations to County Auditor; must be able to provide advice and systems help to county departments.

Employment Standards

Assists in moving furniture and other equipment. Opens and closes offices. Turns off or on lights and opens or closes windows. Performs minor repairs and maintenance, including routine maintenance on heating plant.

Employment Standards

Knowledge of basic custodial procedures; the material and equipment used in custodial and general maintenance work; Ability to carry out simple oral instructions; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to successful completion of the 3rd grade.

DATA PROCESSING MANAGER

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college in industrial management, business administration or a related field and five years of increasingly responsible supervisory and management experience in the development, installation and maintenance of electronic data processing systems.

Knowledge of the principles, practices, and equipment of electronic data processing including computer programming; ability to develop applications to office systems and procedures; knowledge of the principles and techniques of systems and procedures analysis; knowledge of public administration and organization with particular reference to local government; ability to plan, supervise and execute major research and implementation projects; ability to train, develop and motivate personnel; administrative ability; ability to prepare effective reports and make effective oral presentations; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with others.

DIRECTOR OF ACCOUNTS AND BUDGETS

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision of County Judge. Work performed in planning, organizing and directing the overall activities of the fiscal office of the county; performs related work as required by County Judge.

Typical Tasks

Performs or supervises the performance of the pre-audit function of the invoices and bills of all funds including General Purpose, School, Highway General, Bond Debt, Right-of-Way, and Special Highway Project. Supervises the posting of encumbrances, expenditures, and revenue funds. Performs or supervises the performance of the pre-audit for all payrolls. Prepares monthly reports and balance sheets for all funds. Prorates local Sales Tax each month to city schools and special highway funds. Coordinates and confers on the preparation of the budgets for all departments. Prepares the final budget document for presentation to the County Council. Establish and maintains accounts for all funds. Attends all County Judge's staff and regular County Council meetings. Serves in an advisory capacity to all departments, division, office, and agency heads in fiscal matters, under the direction of the County Judge. Supervises the data processing division.

Employment Standards

Knowledge of accounting theory and practice of auditing procedures; budgeting procedures; modern office practices, procedures and equipment; principles and methods of supervision. Knowledge of business English and arithmetic. Graduate from an accredited college with a master's degree, preferably in public administration. A minimum of five years experience in planning, administration and program development.

CLASS NO. 025

DISPATCHER

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Work performed in receiving and transmitting messages by radio and telephone, preparing and maintaining communication records; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Receives emergency calls by telephone; determines type and requirements and dispatches proper apparatus or department; maintains a type-written log on all radio messages received or transmitted as required by the Federal Communication Commission and the Department; maintains record of the location of all equipment and personnel on duty.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school with some interest in radio operation.

Knowledge of the rules and regulations of the Federal Communication Commission covering the operations of radio receivers and transmitters; knowledge of the proper use and care of radio telephone equipment; ability to speak clearly and concisely; ability to maintain accurate records; ability to think clearly and act quickly in emergencies; ability to establish effective relationships with other employees and with the public; ability to type accurately.

Composes correspondence and reports in conformity with office procedures, and departmental policies. At the discretion of the County Judge, maintains control over incoming and outgoing correspondence for the department. Develops forms, bulletins, pamphlets, and departmental memoranda. Investigates requests for services and refers to appropriate agency. Attends and takes minutes of public meetings. Maintains confidential files. Acts as a receptionist and arranges for interviews, appointments, and conferences. Serves as an assistant to and relieves the County Judge of administrative details.

Employment Standards

Knowledge of business English and arithmetic; modern office practices, procedures, and equipment; procedures of organizing and writing administrative reports; Ability to evaluate situations and make decisions; express ideas clearly, concisely, and convincingly; perform a variety of administrative and clerical tasks; take dictation involving frequent unusual and technical terms at the rate of 100 words per minute, to transcribe from notes at the rate of 35 words per minute.

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to graduation from a standard high school including or supplemented by general secretarial courses. Four years of progressively responsible experience as a Secretary.

FIXED ASSET CLERK

Definition

Under general direction to perform clerical and inventory assignments; processing and maintains purchase orders and reports; and do related work as required.

Responsible for compiling and filing all purchase orders for the Hamilton County Board of Education; Responsible for tagging all County equipment in general; responsible for completing inventory on equipment at end of each fiscal year.

GUARD

Definition

Under direction, to supervise and guard prisoners in a variety of construction, maintenance, repair and housekeeping activities at the County workhouse or at outside location; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Guards prisoners in a variety of work activities such as cutting grass, collecting and disposing of garbage, trimming trees, shrubs and hedges, meal preparation, road construction and maintenance, hauling lumber and janitorial tasks; makes rounds of cells to insure security and welfare of prisoners; transports prisoners and maintains proper security measures; supervise prisoners in a variety of house activities; checks prisoners in and out of work assignments; supervises sick call; may operate radio equipment in the dispatching and contacting of mobile units; searches and feeds prisoners; admits new prisoners; guards prisoners at a hospital or at court; censors mail; keeps records.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and some experience in public contact work. Applicant must be at least 21 at the time of employment.

Knowledge of the modern techniques of supervising persons incarcerated in a prison; knowledge of the laws, rules and regulations governing the detention of prisoners; ability to maintain order and discipline in a penal institution; ability to follow written and oral directions; ability to act quickly in emergency situations; ability to use firearms; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.

HEAVY EQUIPMENT OPERATORS

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Work performed in operating a variety of heavy equipment such as heavy duty dump truck, road grader, bulldozer, large Hi-lift, backhoe, and asphalt roller; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Performs such work as ditching, grading roads, and shouldering black top. Operates a heavy roller to compress material such as black top and dirt. Operates a bulldozer to move dirt and other material. Works on road construction projects. Digs holes for special purposes. Operates Hi-lift and other such heavy equipment. Maintains and performs repair work on equipment. Operates other heavy equipment as necessary.

Employment Standards

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to successful completion of the 8th grade. One year of experience in heavy equipment operation. Must possess a valid Tennessee operator's license.

Knowledge of practices used in the operation of heavy equipment; State and County traffic regulations; safety precautions and maintenance of heavy equipment; the materials and equipment used in general maintenance work; occupational hazards and safety precautions. Ability to operate a variety of heavy equipment; understand and follow oral and written instructions; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

CLASS NO. 031

HEAVY EQUIPMENT SUPERVISOR

Definition

Under general supervision, work performed in supervising and working with a crew performing a variety of road maintenance and construction tasks; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Supervises operators in road repair, gravel spreading and drainage or paving work. Operates specific equipment in the absence of an operator and performs other tasks required of his crew as necessary. Supervises crews in the clearing of rights-of-way. Oversees cleanup and maintenance of tools and equipment. Supervises and aids in the preparing of subgrades and laying of road surfaces and curbing.

Employment Standards

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to graduation from a standard high school. Three years experience in construction, maintenance, equipment operation or related fields, of which 1 year must have been in a responsible supervisory capacity.

Knowledge of the materials and equipment used in general maintenance and construction work; occupational hazards and safety precautions; principles and methods of supervision. Knowledge of modern housekeeping methods and equipment; ability to schedule and supervise work details; ability to recognize and attend to needs of residents; ability to establish and maintain cooperative working relationships with residents and co-workers; ability to follow oral and written directions.

MECHANIC

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Work performed in the maintenance, repair, and servicing of motor vehicles and other county equipment; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Services motor vehicles and equipment, changes oil filters, lubricates vehicles, balances wheels and other routine preventive maintenance services. Performs routine light mechanical work such as tune-up, brake work, and clutch adjustment and repairs. Fills out work tickets on all service repairs. Replaces, assembles and sub-assemblies on vehicles and equipment. Keeps records of work completed and inventories of parts and supplies. Uses special tools and equipment, such as welders.

Employment Standards

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to successful completion of the 10th grade. Two years of progressively responsible experience in automotive repair.

Knowledge of the functioning and repair of automotive vehicles and equipment; the tools and equipment involved in automotive repair; occupational hazards and safety precautions; Ability to operate necessary mechanical tools and equipment; follow oral and written instructions; ability to read and understand pertinent manuals; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

CLASS NO. 053

MENTAL HEALTH OFFICER

Definition

Under direction of County Judge; has responsibility for issuing and completing commitment papers and follow up for people who refuse to enter mental hospital after two doctors have concurred that psychiatric help is needed; and do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Receive referrals from Chattanooga Police Dept. and Hamilton County Sheriff Dept. concerning people who have mental conditions that require medical attention and possible confinement in Moccasin Bend Mental Hospital; Investigates background of patient and relatives, to determine his or her eligibility to be committed involuntary to psychiatric hospital. If two doctors agree that mental help is needed, their statements are notarize and referred to County Judge for hearing date; Mental health officer picks up patient using force if needed, and transports to hospital; also in charge of handling all service connected with mental cases of return at VA hospital. Works in cooperation with County Court Clerk in compiling records of cases; files necessary reports. On call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from standard high school with additional two years college training in social work field; Ability to deal with citizens in a fair and just manner; Must receive commission from Tennessee Mental Health office.

CLASS NO. 054

MICROFILM CLERK I

Definition

Under general supervision, to coordinate the activities of the County Microfilm Department; and do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Microfilms old minutes and rule docket books from various clerk's offices in Court House. Locates old files and returns to court house as requested. Refiles records as they are returned; is in charge of duplicate rolls of microfilms filmed at court house; arrange all transfer files sent from court house into proper racks; Supervisor of warehouse where all records from court house are stored; Prepare necessary reports as needed.

Employment Standards

Any combination of experience and education equivalent to graduation from High school.

Ability to use microfilm camera and read prints; ability to establish effective working relationships with the public and other employees.

CLASS NO. 055

MICROFILM CLERK II

Definition

Under general supervision, to operate photocopying and microfilming machines; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Operates a photocopying machine in reproducing a variety of records and documents; microfilms official records and documents; makes necessary adjustments and cleans and makes minor repairs to machine; Types indexes and prepares documents for binding; may operate xerox and other reproducing machines; performs routine office work.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and one year of experience in the operation of photocopy and microfilming machines, or closely related photography work.

Knowledge of the operation, adjustment and care of microfilming equipment; ability to operate photocopy machines with speed and accuracy and to prepare the necessary chemical solutions; ability to perform office work related to photocopying services.

CLASS NO. 056

OPERATIONS DIRECTOR

Definition

Under direct supervision of County Engineer and general supervision of County Judge and County Manager for special assignments on operational problems regarding departments, division ., offices and agencies; performs special tasks as liaison for County Engineer, County Manager and County Judge; and does related duties as required by County Engineer, County Manager and County Judge.

Typical Tasks

Follows up on complaints made by citizens to County Judge, County Manager and County Engineer to see that appropriate measures are taken to correct the problems concerning the effective operation of agencies, offices, divisions and departments; provides supervision at the direction of County Judge, County Manager and County Engineer, to see that problems are corrected; prepares necessary reports and correspondence as directed; ability to communicate effectively with public and county employees; assists County Engineer in general supervision of County Penal Farm and County Women's Detention Unit.

Employment Standards

Completion of two years college with a minimum of three years practical experience in dealing with management problems; should have a strong background in human relations; actual experience in supervisory capacity of five more years may be substituted for educational experience.

CLASS NO. 057

PAINTING FOREMAN

Definition

Under general direction, to plan, coordinate and supervise the work of journeyman painters and leadman; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Confers with superior on over all work plans and makes assignments to his crews; lays out, assigns, and inspects various painting jobs including brush and spray work, flat finishing, varnishes, and lacquer; supervises the painting of building exteriors and interiors; supervises the painting of floors, furniture, and office equipment; delivers materials to jobs; moves men from one job to another; supervises the replacement of broken window glass; receives and stores materials; makes estimates of materials required for jobs.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of high school and three years of experience as a journeyman painter preferably including some leadman responsibilities.

Knowledge of standard painting practices; knowledge of the basic qualities of various paints and their proper application to a variety of surfaces; ability to plan, organize, and direct the work of painters and painter leadmen; ability to estimate materials and labor and to select materials needed for jobs; ability to prepare and maintain records and reports.

PARKING LOT ATTENDANT

Definition

Under general supervision, to direct and control the parking of automobiles and trucks at an assigned parking area; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Directs drivers of cars and trucks into designated parking spots; personally parks cars and trucks; moves parked cars and trucks from parking spots into driveway.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of the eight grade.

Skill in parking cars and trucks; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with others; ability to follow written and oral instructions.

CLASS NO. 059

PART - TIME SCALEMAN

Definition'

Under general supervision, operates scale at landfill; to do routine watching of landfill; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Operates scales at landfill; weighs trucks in and out, charging or collecting cash per hundred weight, records number of pounds of refuse per vehicle in ledger; records cash amount received or charged; sends monthly statements to charge customers; sends record of cash received and deposited to Accounts and Budgets Department; keeps records of fuel oil and antifreeze used in landfill equipment; keeps records of vehicle maintenance; answers telephone and supplies information regarding landfill; keeps work records of landfill employees; does routine watching and guarding of landfill.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to high school graduation.

Knowledge of general record keeping; ability to read scales, ability to use an adding machine; ability to communicate by telephone; ability to follow oral and written instructions.

PENAL FARM WARDEN

Definition

Under general direction, to have charge of the activities of the County Workhouse; to coordinate the operations of the institution with activities of law enforcement agencies; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Plans, assigns and supervises subordinate help in the care and custody of prisoners; directs workhouse activities such as food service, commissary, laundry and building maintenance; develops recreational programs; prepares operating and capital improvement budgets; insures the requisitioning of adequate supplies and equipment; maintains inventories; reviews and evaluates reports on prisoner activities, ordinary changes in work assignments; disciplines prisoner as required; develops and enforces rules and regulations governing workhouse operation and prisoner activity; receives complaints as to prisoner work crews and makes necessary adjustments; interviews, hires and trains new employees; cooperates with other law enforcement agencies in the care and custody of prisoners; insures the keeping of adequate records; prepares reports.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school, supplemented by courses in criminology and prison administration and two years of supervisory experience in the care and custody of prisoners in a penal institution.

CLASS NO. 061

PERSONNEL DIRECTOR

Definition

Subject to determination of policy, to administer central personnel program for departments of the County Government under the jurisdiction of the County Judge and County Manager; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Formulates and recommends personnel policies, regulations and practices; consults with department heads and other officials regarding personnel problems and needs; determines the need for examining and directs the scheduling, recruiting, testing and scoring involved; maintains a classification and pay plan; directs the collection and analysis of pay data and makes salary recommendations; initiates and encourages operating departments in the installation and continuance of modern personnel practices; keeps abreast of trends in the field of public personnel administration and develops short and long range plans to meet those needs; supervises the selection, assignment, development and evaluation of subordinate personnel.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college preferably with specialization in public or business administration and five years of responsible experience in public personnel administration including two years of supervisory experience in one of the principal fields of personnel administration.

Knowledge of the principles and practices of public organization and management with particular reference to personnel administration; knowledge of the functions, organization and problems of local government; knowledge of current trends in the field of personnel administration; ability to plan, organize and direct the work of technical and clerical staff; skill in oral and written communications; ability to gain the confidence and cooperation of other officials, employees and the public.

PROGRAM ANALYST (DATA PROCESSING)

Definition

Under general supervision, to analyze and define systems requirements and to develop programs of average difficulty for electronic data processing; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Studies existing systems and procedures in terms of function, personnel, equipment, organization, flow of data, methods and forms in various phases of the County's operations; develops block diagrams for computer system; defines data inputs and computer outputs; develops item layouts for computer runs; prepares flow chart logic of computer runs; writes programs from logic charts; tests, debugs and refines programs by processing actual data through the system; confers and consults with operating and service department personnel; prepares reports.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of two years of college and one year of experience in data processing programming work.

Knowledge of the principles and techniques of developing programs for a computer system together with the ability to apply them to specific problems and processes; knowledge of modern office procedures and equipment and the characteristics of the various kinds of data processing equipment; ability to prepare clear and concise reports; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with others.

CLASS NO. 005

PROGRAMMER - (DATA PROCESSING)

Definition

Under general supervision, to analyze and define systems requirements and to develop programs of average difficulty for electronic data processing; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Studies existing systems and procedures in terms of function, personnel, equipment, organization, flow of data, methods and forms in various phases of the County's operations; develops block diagrams for computer system; defines data inputs and computer outputs; develops item layouts for computer runs; prepares flow chart logic of computer runs; writes programs from logic charts; tests, debugs and refines programs by processing actual data through the system; confers and consults with operating and service department personnel; prepares reports.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of two years of college and one year of experience in data processing programming work.

Knowledge of the principles and techniques of developing programs for a computer system together with the ability to apply them to specific problems and processes; knowledge of modern office procedures and equipment and the characteristics of the various kinds of data processing equipment; ability to prepare clear and concise reports; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with others.

PURCHASING AGENT

Definition

Under general direction, to plan, organize, and conduct a centralized purchasing program for the Hamilton County Government; to purchase supplies, materials and equipment; to contract for services, and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Assists the Director of Accounts & Budgets in the formulation of policies and procedures in connection with a central purchasing program; confers with departmental official regarding their purchasing needs and problems; directs and participates in all purchases of materials, supplies, equipment and contractual services; supervises the operation of a centralized duplicating and printing service; establishes and enforces a program of standard specifications and inspection of materials delivered; arranges for the sale or disposal of obsolete or surplus property.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college. Preferably in Business.

Knowledge of the methods, practices, and procedures of governmental purchasing; knowledge of the types of materials and supplies and equipment commonly used by a municipality; knowledge of the sources of supply, commodity markets, marketing practices and commodity pricing methods and differentials; ability to establish and maintain effective relationships.

CLASS NO. 065

SCALEMAN

Definition

Under general supervision as Scale Operator at Hamilton County landfill; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Operates scales at Hamilton County landfill weighing trucks in and out of landfill charging or collecting cash per hundred weight; Records number of pounds of refuse per vehicle in ledger, along with cash amount received or charged; Sends monthly statements to charge customers; Sends record of cash received and deposited to Accounts and Budgets department.

Keeps records of fuel, oil and antifreeze, used in equipment at landfill; keeps record of vehicle maintenance; answers telephone and gives out information regarding landfill; keeps work records of landfill employees.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school; have ability to read scales and use adding machines.

SECRETARY I

Definition

Employees in this class are under general supervision. Performs routine to moderately difficult stenographic (Secretary I s) or transcriptive (Secretary I), administrative and clerical tasks; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Takes by shorthand or transcribes from a machine, dictation of a moderately difficult nature. Assembles materials, composes, and types routine correspondence, reports, and other materials. Gives a variety of routine information to the public on request. Schedules visitor appointments. Answers telephone and gives information to callers or routes calls to appropriate officials. Greets visitors, ascertains nature of business, and conducts visitors to appropriate person. Establishes and maintains a filing system for various types of records, forms, and correspondences. Assists staff as required in making arrangements for meetings, scheduling appointment, etc. Assembles data or narratives for report purposes and occasionally summarizes such data in oral or written form.

Employment Standards

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to graduation from a standard high school including or supplemented by general secretarial courses.

Knowledge of modern office practices, procedures, and equipment; business English and arithmetic; the procedures of organizing and writing administrative reports; Ability of evaluate situations and make decisions; express ideas, clearly, concisely, and convincingly; perform a variety of clerical tasks; type accurately from plain copy at the rate of approximately 40 words per minute.

CLASS NO. 067

SECURITY GUARD

Definition

Under direction, to patrol public parks in the prevention of crime and protection of the public, buildings and property; to regulate and enforce traffic for cultural or athletic events in the parks; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Patrols County Park in a radio car; answers calls for the protection of life, of public and private property, and the enforcement of laws; keeps order; checks all unauthorized persons off the premises; gives information and directions to the public; directs traffic; maintains records and prepares reports.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and some experience or training in guarding of law enforcement work.

Ability to read and understand police policies, rules, instructions, laws and regulations; ability to think and act quickly in emergencies; ability to write clear and accurate reports; ability to use and care for small firearms; keen observation.

SECURITY WATCHMAN

Definition

Under general supervision, to do routine watching and guarding of County buildings, property or facilities where there is relatively little personal danger or exposure to hazards; to perform incidental maintenance tasks; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Patrols buildings and grounds, being alert for trespassers; checks doors and windows for security; locks doors and turns out lights; checks boilers, electrical equipment and plumbing and reports operating failures; checks ventilation and starts or stops coolers; may operate elevator; patrols parking lot to prevent use of unauthorized vehicles.

Employment Standards

One year of work experience.

Knowledge of buildings utilities; ability to think and act quickly in an emergency; ability to follow written and oral instructions.

CLASS NO. 069

SEWAGE PLANT OPERATOR

Definition

Under direction, to operate waste water treatment plant acting as leadman on an assigned shift; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Supervises and participates in the work of a operating waste water treatment plant; supervises the making of chemical analyses of waste water and of treatment plant effluent to determine effectiveness of treatment; reads various gauges at frequent intervals, recording readings on log sheets; interprets gauge readings and test results and makes indicated adjustments in the plant operation.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and three years of experience in the operation of a waste water treatment plant.

Knowledge of the materials, methods and equipment used in the operation of a modern sewage treatment plant; knowledge of the testing of sewage and of treatment effluent; ability to read and interpret from gages the operating status of plant equipment; ability to supervise the work of a plant operation crew.

CLASS NO. 070

SHOP FOREMAN

Definition

Employees in this class are under administrative direction. Work performed in planning, organizing and directing the overall activities of the equipment and vehicle maintenance division; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Manages and directs personnel involved in vehicle and equipment repair. Advises and assists the Highway Superintendent in equipment maintenance policy and procedure formulation. Schedules vehicle and equipment repairs. Performs other administrative activities involved in the operation of the division. Maintains an inventory of repair parts and requisitions parts as required to complete jobs and sustain the departments operations. Keeps records and makes reports as required.

Employment Standards

Knowledge of the principles and techniques involved in the repair of vehicles and equipment; tools and equipment involved in mechanical work; principles and methods of supervision. Knowledge of the occupational hazards and safety precautions. Ability to use resource publications in the ordering of parts and in repairing of vehicles and equipment; evaluate situations and make decisions. Ability to plan and direct the work of others; express ideas clearly, concisely and convincingly; to use the necessary tools and equipment and to train others in their use; Keep operational records and make reports; establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to graduation from a standard high school. Five years of progressively responsible experience in automotive or equipment maintenance and repairs of which 1 year must have been in a responsible supervisory capacity.

CLASS NO. 071

SIGN PAINTER

Definition

Under direction, to supervise several crews in the fabrication and/or installation of street name and various traffic signs; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Prepares and supervises the preparation of various traffic signs by Mono-Printer, the silk screen process and the use of Scotch-Lite; installs, repairs and clean street name and various traffic signs; performs maintenance on various equipment; keeps records of supplies; Paints signs as needed for County Departments.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and three years of experience in the fabrication and/or installation of street name and various traffic signs, including painting and silk screen work.

Knowledge of the methods, materials and equipment used in making signs by Mono-Printer, the silk screen process and the use of Scotch-Lite; skill in operating a Mono-Printer; skill in using the silk screen process; skill in using Scotch-Lite and associated equipment; Knowledge of methods, materials and equipment used in installing, repairing and cleaning street name and various traffic signs; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with employees and the general public; ability to keep records; ability to supervise others.

SUPERINTENDENT OF PARKS

Definition

Under general direction, to plan, organize and direct the work of personnel engaged in the maintenance and development of parks, recreational facilities, and allied landscaped areas at Hamilton County Park and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Plans and directs the maintenance of park and recreation structures, facilities and areas; plans, organizes and directs the work of planting and transplanting trees, shrubs, and flowers, and supervises the the construction and maintenance of walks, retaining walls, playground facilities and parking areas; supervises the maintenance of park lighting for buildings, playgrounds, and recreation facilities; directs the work of a staff of park patrolmen; assigns, supervises and trains staff in department policies and procedures; maintains records and prepares reports.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college in landscape architecture, park management or horticulture, and three years of increasingly responsible supervisory experience in landscape maintenance and installation.

Knowledge of the layout and construction of parks, parkways and their facilities; knowledge of the standards and methods desirable in providing parks and park facilities in urban and rural areas; knowledge of gardening, fertilizers, insecticides and fungicides and of the kinds of grasses, soils and equipment desirable in the development of parks; ability to plan and direct the work of a staff; ability to establish and maintain harmonious public relations; ability to maintain records and prepare reports.

CLASS NO. 073

TRANSFER GUARD

Definition

Under general supervision; Transfer prisoners to county Jail and Penal Farm and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Primary job duty is transporting prisoners from the County jail after they have been found guilty of crimes and sentenced to terms at the County Penal Farm. Also takes prisoners to the parole board when they have a hearing before the board; Picks up prisoners at State Penitentiary when they have been sentenced to serve time at the County Penal Farm; Picks up groceries and supplies for use at Penal Farm; Picks up daily reports at White Oak and Silverdale and delivers them to Court House.

Employment Standards

Graduation from high school or equivalent; Must be bonded and have Deputy Sheriff's commission; Be adept in the use of firearms; Have no criminal record.

TRUCK DRIVER - ASST. GUARDS

Definition

Under general supervision. Primary job duty is driving truck with workhouse prisoners to work site. Assists in guarding prisoners when needed.

Typical Tasks

Picks up crew of prisoners each day at workhouse and transports to designated work sites in the county. Instructs and supervises prisoners in work that is to be performed; cleaning of road right-of-way, cutting of trees and grass, picking up trash, etc. Assists regular guard in guarding of prisoners; Transports prisoners back to workhouse at end of day.

Employment Standards

Must have chauffeur driver's license and have a maximum of six months experience in driving of truck. Must be adept in the proper use and care of firearms. High school graduate or G.E.D.

CLASS NO. 075

UTILITY MAN

Definition

Employees in this class are under immediate supervision. Work performed in executing maintenance of an unskilled or semi-skilled nature; performs related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Removes debris from street right-of-ways and other County property. Assist skilled laborers in the performance of their duties. Loads and unloads dirt, gravel, trash, and other debris. Works as part of crew in road repair, gravel spreading, ditch digging, chat spreading, and patching. Sweeps shops and stock rooms.

Employment Standards

Any combination of training and experience equivalent to successful completion of the 6th grade.

Knowledge of the materials and equipment used in general maintenance and construction work. Knowledge of occupational hazards and safety precautions. Ability to carry out simple oral instructions. Ability to establish and maintain an effective working relationship with the public and other employees.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE OFFICER

Definition

Subject to determination of policy, to plan, organize and direct the public welfare programs and facilities of the county; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Formulates a public welfare program consistent with the established purposes of the department; represents the department in varied activities; supervises the work of professional and clerical employees; formulates and justifies budget requirements; explains and interprets the laws, rules, and regulations relative to the administration of the public welfare program; keeps abreast of trends in the field of welfare and develops short term and long range plans to meet the needs of the program; supervises the selection, assignment, development and evaluation of subordinate supervisory personnel; prepares or directs the preparation of administrative and regular or special reports; participates in management level policy and planning conferences.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to a college degree in social work and two years of increasingly responsible administrative experience in a welfare agency.

Knowledge of organization methods, principles, and procedures; knowledge of the principles and practices of social welfare administration; knowledge of principles of case supervision; knowledge of and skill in public relations; ability to plan and execute a large scale administrative program; ability to develop and control a budget; knowledge of community needs and resources; ability to plan, organize, and supervise the work of a staff.

CLASS NO. 077

ASSISTANT PURCHASING AGENT

Definition

Under the general direction of the Purchasing Agent, to plan, organize, and conduct operations of a centralized purchasing program for Hamilton County Government.

Typical Tasks

Assists the purchasing agent in the formulation of policies and procedure in connection with a central purchasing program. Directs the implementation of policy and procedures through supervision in effectively purchase of materials, supplies, equipment and contractual services.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college, preferably in business. Knowledge of the methods, practices and procedures of governmental purchasing; Ability to establish and maintain effective relationships; Ability to plan, organize, assign, supervise, and inspect the work of subordinates.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT TO COUNTY JUDGE

Definition

Under the direction of County Judge to perform administrative, professional and legal services which do not require special attention of county attorney.

Typical Tasks

Advises County Judge concerning legal obligations and privileges. Examines legal data to determine its sufficiency. Searches for and examines public records and writes opinions. Provides administrative and professional support as directed by County Judge. Attends all County Judge staff meetings and other related duties.

Employment Standards

Graduation from college with a law degree.

CLASS NO. 079

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT HEALTH PLANNER

Definition

Under general supervision of Director of Community Development to plan and help organize health programs for residents of Hamilton County.

Typical Tasks

Compiles and interprets statistical data and develops needs analysis, bases on data, for a variety of possible health programs in the County. Work with the planning and administrative staff of the Health Department, Erlanger Hospital, County Nursing Home and Hamilton County in the identification of needs, planning, programming and budgeting for health programs. Defines goals, alternatives and objectives necessary for the implementation of health related programs. Identifies funding sources and develops proposals that are necessary for funding. Describes and explains purposes and programs to County, State, and Federal, as well as community organizations and agencies.

Employment Standards

Graduate from an accredited college, preferably with a master's degree. minimum of three years experience in health or health related planning or the equivalent in administration or program development.

COUNTY FIRE CHIEF

Definition

Under the administrative direction of County Judge and is responsible for professional and administrative operation of the Hamilton County Fire Department.

Typical Tasks

Professional and administrative responsibility for supervising all fire prevention, fire suppression, fire and rescue communication, and fire research and training activities in the Hamilton County Fire Department.

Employment Standards

At least five years of progressively responsible experience in supervisory positions in a large city or county fire department, including at least two years equivalent to the position of assistant chief or deputy chief. College graduate or completion of college level course in fire prevention, suppression technology, and other fire science courses.

CLASS NO. 081

COUNTY CHAPLAIN

Definition

To provide spiritual and moral guidance and assistance to Hamilton County hospitals and detention centers.

Typical Tasks

Provides spiritual and moral guidance to Hamilton County Penal Farm inmates, Women's Detention Unit inmates, and patients at Bork Hospital. Counsels those in spiritual need, comforts bereaved and visits family of inmates and Bork Hospital patients. Conducts non-denominational religious services at Hamilton County Penal Farm, Women's Detention Unit and Bork Hospital.

Employment Standards

College graduate and ordained with 2-3 years service as pastor, priest, rabbi or minister.

CLASS NO. 082

PUBLIC INFORMATION SPECIALIST

Definition

Under the administrative direction of County Judge, to direct and coordinate public information services.

Typical Duties

Creates good will and professionalism in planning public relations programs designed to inform citizens of Hamilton County regarding the operation of Hamilton County government. Writes news releases and submits photographs to newspapers. Writes scripts for radion and television presentation. Participates in community and civic programs.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from college with major work in public relations or journalism.

Class No. 083

DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION - HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Definition

Under the direct supervision of the Hamilton County Judge; Plans and carries out responsible administrative work. He prepares general budgets, including specific line item details with input from appropriate Health Department staff and responsible citizens, presents such with negotiations together with the medical director to the appropriate County officials and maintains control over expenditures. He performs non-medical supervision of Health Department personnel and develops and carries out special programs as required.

Typical Duties

To assist in the planning and carrying out of programs designed to increase the operating efficiency of the Health Department; exercises general supervision over the work of personnel engaged in duties in the field of personnel management; to assist in coordinating program operations; to maintain liaison with County and State governmental agencies and official and lay groups; to participate in staff development by relating administrative problems to program services; to assist in planning and carrying out public relations, employee relations, and health education programs for the Health Department; to be responsible for budgeting and fiscal operations and for the purchasing and maintenance of supplies and equipment; at the State level to work in cooperation with the Office of Business Administration and the Personnel Department in the above matters; to assist in preparing planned material, annual and special reports, and other information for the appropriate governing bodies.

Employment Standards

Graduation from an accredited four-year college or university and six years of progressive responsible full-time paid employment in hospital administration, public administration, or business administration of which two years within the past five years must have been in an administrative or supervisory capacity.

COUNTY VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER

Definition

Under general supervision of the Hamilton County Judge; Is contact person for veterans, and veteran's widow, in Hamilton County regarding benefits due them under law.

Typical Tasks

Files claims with Veterans Administration on behalf of Hamilton County veterans. Represents veterans at hearing before the V.A. regarding benefits due them under law. Provides Hamilton County veterans with: Counseling about V.A. pension, hospitalization, educational benefits under the G.I. bill, home loans.

Employment Standards

Graduated from a standard high school, or equivalent. Tennessee State law requires that person employed must be a wartime veteran.

CLASS NO. 085

COMMUNICATIONS COORDINATOR

Definition

Work under supervision of County Manager to coordinate and insure that all county departments and agencies are provided with a method of direct communications.

Typical Tasks

Conveys money, purchase orders, messages, and other documents and related tasks as deemed necessary by the County Manager and County Judge. Individual will coordinate telephone expansion and other changes necessary. Other tasks will include any coordination efforts deemed necessary by the County Manager upon the approval of, at the direction of, the County Judge.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school. Ability to maintain good working relationships with others and ability to organize and coordinate with all levels of County Management and with the various County Agencies.

CLASS NO. 086

BUILDING & GROUNDS ENGINEER

Definition

Under general direction of County Engineer, to review and approve schedules of assistant supervisors of buildings and grounds (Court House, Justice Building and Court House Annex); and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Reviews and approves work assignments submitted by supervisors; makes periodically inspections to review work performances and results; approves all orders for stock supply; helps recruit and train new employees when necessary; reviews activity reports; approves all major repairs and is in charge of all routine maintenance.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to completion of high school and three years in a supervisory capacity.

Knowledge of methods, materials and equipment involving air conditioning, plumbing and heating; ability to plan, schedule and supervise the work of others; ability to carry out oral and written directions; ability to maintain harmonious working relationships with officials, subordinates and the public.

CLASS NO. 087

DRAFTSMAN

Definition

Under general supervision to prepare technical drawings from field notes and other information provided by county engineer and files.

Typical Tasks

To prepare drawings, specifications and other material to construct county roads, buildings and other public works projects; to keep records and make reports to the County Engineer regarding maps and plans on file.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and two (2) years experience in drafting and general engineering work.

Knowledge of general engineering and construction; ability to effectively explain plans and specifications to construction people; ability to establish and maintain an effective working relationship with others.

SURVEYOR

Definition

Under general supervision, to perform survey work both for routes and metes and bounds.

Typical Tasks

To do actual field surveys for roads, streets, highways, and other routes of communication; to do land surveys by metes and bounds; to assist in the reduction and plotting of field notes.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and two (2) years experience in field survey.

Knowledge of general engineering and constructions principals; ability to read and plot deeds; ability to research records in the county registers office; ability to establish and maintain an effective working relationship with others.

CLASS NO. 089

RODMAN

Definition

Under specific supervision, to assist in field surveys.

Typical Tasks

To assist a surveyor in performing field surveys including but not limited to chaining; operating various survey instruments and keeping notes.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school and one (1) years experience in survey work.

Ability to establish and maintain an effective working relationship with others.

HEAD MATRON

Definition

Under general supervision, to supervise and approve schedule of matrons guarding and caring for female residents detained at the Hamilton County Penal Farm; to supervise housekeeping duties, and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Supervises matrons guarding female residents detained at the penal Farm; makes inspections for cleanliness and sanitation of dormitory and adjoining rooms; responsible for residents' welfare while detained at penal farm; participates in searching female residents for weapons, cigarettes, drugs, other necessities accordingly to established penal farm policies; approves work schedule of residents; reviews and maintains docket of incarcerated individuals to meet requirements of federal, state, and local ordinances and laws; arranges transit for female residents by automobile or public transportation between jail, court room, penal farm, or other points as instructed by the Penal Farm Warden or County Engineer.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to high school graduation and some experience in institutional work or house-hold management plus some police training.

CLASS NO. 091

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PHYSICAL PLANNER

Definition

Under general supervision of Director of Community Development to plan for future federally funded programs that may be implemented by Hamilton County.

Typical Tasks

Compiles and interprets statistical data and develops needs analysis, based on data, for a variety of possible programs in the county. Defines goals, alternatives and objectives necessary for the funding and implementation of physical programs. Identifies funding sources and develops proposals. Describes and explains purposes and programs to county, state and federal, as well as community organizations and agencies.

Employment Standards

Graduation with a masters degree or equivalent with one year planning experience.

COORDINATOR OF ASSESSMENTS

Definition

Under direct Supervision of Assessor of Property; to coordinate the various phases of assessing real and personal property to solve daily operational problems and handle taxpayer complaints.

Typical Tasks

Responsible for coordination between Assessor's Office and Trustee's Office. Prepares or requires clerks to prepare Error and Release (E & R) and Pick-Up forms for corrections in property assessments. Acts as supervisor for clerical staff, drafting department, field appraisers and key punch operators.

Employment Standards

Requires High School education with extra schooling in the field of property appraisal; requires a certificate from the State of Tennessee as a qualified property appraiser; requires ability to supervise others, to communicate well in writing, to maintain a good working relationship with the public.

CLASS NO. 093

SENIOR APPRAISER

Definition

Under general direction of Assessor of Property to supervise the work of the field appraisers and to offer expertise and guidance to new field appraisers.

Typical Tasks

To assess real property throughout the County; to aid real estate developers and the general public in securing information regarding their property or proposed real estate developments.

Employment Standards

High school education with additional studies in property appraisal or equivalent experience working in the real estate field. Ability to communicate well in writing; ability to meet the public; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.

FIELD APPRAISER

Definition

Under general direction of the Assessor of Property to assess real property within Hamilton County; to assist property owners in securing information on their property.

Typical Tasks

To assess real property throughout the County; to aid real estate developers and the general public in securing information regarding their property or proposed real estate developments.

Employment Standards

High school education with additional studies in property appraisal or equivalent experience working in the real estate field. Ability to communicate well in writing; ability to meet the public; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.

CLASS NO. 095

PERSONALTY ASSESSOR

Definition

Under general supervision, work performed is to assess businesses and individuals within Hamilton County for an ad valorem personal property tax based on the laws of the State of Tennessee.

Typical Tasks

To coordinate and implement the assessment of personalty taxes in Hamilton County; to discuss assessments with taxpayers, to search for new taxpayers, to correspond with taxpayers, to coordinate with the Trustee's Office.

Employment Standards

High school education with additional studies in property appraisal or equivalent experience working in the real estate field. Ability to communicate well in writing; ability to meet the public; ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships.

DRAFTSMAN I - PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Definition

Under direction to assist draftsman II in laying out subdivision of property from deeds and plats recorded in the Register's Office; to answer questions from the public.

Typical Tasks

To review and determine the correctness of the existing property maps; to enter all subdivisions of property resulting from deed changes, to enter new property plats entered in Register's Office; to assist fieldmen by referencing working appraisal records to the maps; to assist the public by answering questions.

Employment Standards

High School graduate with three year experience in drafting or property assessment. Standards are subject to waiver of experience for training purposes; ability to work well with others; ability to meet the public.

CLASS NO. 097

DRAFTSMAN II - PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Definition

Under general direction to lay out changes in property maps resulting from registration of a plat or deed changes.

Typical Tasks

To review and determine the correctness of the existing property maps; to enter all subdivisions of property resulting from deed changes, to enter new property plats entered in Register's Office; to assist fieldmen by referencing working appraisal records to the maps; to assist the public by answering questions.

Employment Standards

High School graduate with three years experience in drafting or property assessment. Standards are subject to waiver of experience for training purposes; ability to work well with others; ability to meet the public.

COMPUTER OPERATOR

Definition

Under general direction to monitor and control computer to process business, engineering, or other data according to operating instructions; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Selects and loads input and output units with materials, such as tapes or punch cards, and printout forms; moves switches to clear system and start operation of equipment; observes machines and control panel on computer console for error lights, verification printouts and error messages, and machine stoppage; clears unit at end of operating run and reviews schedule to determine next assignment; records operating and down time.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school with moderate training in computer programming.

CLASS NO. 099

COUNTY ATTORNEY

Definition

Under direction of County Judge to serve as legal counsel for the County; to answer and defend the County and to issue legal opinions upon request.

Typical Tasks

To issue legal opinions on questions regarding Public or Private Acts of the State of Tennessee and on Federal laws; to defend the County in all cases against the County; to attend all council meeting; to proceed with condemnation suits for the County.

Employment Standards

Professional requirements are completion of Law School and completion of bar examination. Knowledge of operation of County and State government; ability to establish effective working relationships with others.

ASSISTANT COUNTY ATTORNEY

Definition

Under direction of County Judge and County Attorney to serve as legal counsel for the County; to answer and defend the County and to issue legal opinions upon request.

Typical Tasks

To issue legal opinions on questions regarding Public or Private Acts of the State of Tennessee and on Federal laws; to defend the County in all cases against the County; to attend all council meetings; to proceed with condemnation suits for the County.

Employment Standards

Professional requirements are completion of Law School and completion of bar examination. Knowledge of operation of County and State government; ability to establish effective working relationships with others.

CLASS NO. 101

COUNTY CORONER

Definition

Under direction of County Judge to act as Coroner as defined under the laws of the State of Tennessee.

Typical Tasks

Certify the cause of death when the death occurs and is not under the care of a physician, other functions as designated under the Tennessee Code.

Employment Standards

Licensed medical doctor.

COUNTY PHYSICIAN

Definition

Under direction of the County Judge to handle the medical needs of the prisoners in the County Jail, Penal Farms and Women's Detention Unit; and employees injured in the line of duty.

Typical Tasks

To administer necessary medical examinations and prescriptions of medicine for prisoners in the County Jail, Penal Farm and Women's Detention Unit. To treat County employees injured on the job.

Employment Standards

Licensed medical doctor.

CLASS NO. 103

ACTING DIRECTOR - CIVIL DEFENSE

Definition

Under direction, to coordinates activities of workers engaged in preparing for or combating disaster situations; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Negotiates with civic and professional leaders to develop and implement survival plans in accord with local needs and Federal and State policies; assigns paid or volunteer to duty during simulated or actual emergencies; directs activities of headquarters Technical, clerical and administrative staff; directs location, marking, and stocking of vadiation shelters in accord with accepted standards; obtains cooperation of property owners, civic leaders, and professional groups in providing facilities and services to civil defense effort; reviews plans in accord with changes in State or Federal policy, military technology, economic character of community or region; serves as liaison between communities and State or Federal authorities; establishes communications services before, during and after attack to warn populace and provide survival information.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school with three years of responsible work in local, regional, or state civil defense activities.

Knowledge of State and Federal Civil Defense regulations; ability to communicate with public; ability to act under disaster situations.

OPERATIONS AND TRAINING OFFICER - CIVIL DEFENSE

Definition

Under direction, to coordinate civil defense public information programs in community or region; and to do related work as required.

Typical Tasks

Instructs paid and volunteer workers in techniques for meeting disaster situations; prepares information materials, such as pamphlets, speeches, and radio scripts to inform public of preparedness measures; conducts classes in first aid, use of radiological monitoring equipment and techniques, shelter management, fire fighting, disaster communications and organization and post-attack operations for paid or volunteer workers; confers with Federal and State authorities and with representatives of police, fire, sanitation, and public works departments to coordinate training efforts.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school with experience in rescue operations.

Knowledge in first aid administration; ability to communicate; able to follow oral and written instructions; knowledge of State and Federal Civil Defense regulations; to coordinate job assignments.

CLASS NO. 105

SWITCHBOARD OPERATOR

Definition

Under direct supervision to act as information clerk for all incoming calls requiring assistance; to take messages and relay calls; to serve as clerk in other aspects of communications program.

Typical Tasks

To operate centrex switchboard; to answer questions about the County Government and direct callers to correct office; to assist communications coordinator in scheduling, clerical tasks and other functions of communications.

Employment Standards

High school graduate with ability to meet the public, answer general questions regarding the structure of County Government.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF PARKS

Definition

Under direction of the Superintendent of Parks, to plan, organize and direct personnel engaged in the maintenance and development of parks, recreational facilities, and allied landscaped areas of Hamilton County or other work as required.

Typical Tasks

Supervises the maintenance of park and recreation structures, facilities and areas; supervises construction and maintenance of walks, retaining walls, playground facilities and parking areas.

Employment Standards

Any combination of education and experience equivalent to graduation from high school.

Knowledge of park management or horticulture. Ability to supervise other employees and maintain harmonious public relations.





BE IT REMEMBERED, That on this the 23rd day of June, 1975, an Adjourned Meeting of the County Council was begun and held at the Court House in the City of Chattanooga, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:-

Present and presiding, the Honorable Don Moore, Chairman.

County Court Clerk Bill Knowles was not present and Deputy Clerk Donald Hixson called the Roll of the County Council and the following, constituting a Quorum, answered to their names: Councilman Fuller, Councilman Long, Councilman Mayfield, Councilman Ricketts and Judge Moore. Total present-5. Absent-0.

Judge Moore stated that at the close of the business session last Wednesday the Council recessed until today to reconvene for the consideration of the 1976 fiscal year budget which has been delivered to each of the Council members.

The 1976 budget shows an increase from \$60.9 million last year to \$64.2.

Figures were compiled to show a decreased effort on the part of the State to schools and an increase on the part of local government. In 1965 the State provided 1/3 of the total budget for local schools. 52% of the funds were provided by local county. In 1966 the County provided \$8.4 million; the state \$4.4 million. In 1967 the state's percentage was 48% and remained that until 1970 when the state went to 51%. (County provided \$13.3. million and the State \$6.8 million.) In 1971 the percentage was the same and went up by 1% in 1972. In 1973 the County provided \$18.3 million to \$8 million by the state. In 1974 local government provided \$21 million to \$9.7 by the state. In 1975 the state percentage was down to 42% - \$24.9 local government and \$9.3 by the state.

In 1976 the percentage will be 37% - \$22.6 million by local government to \$8.4 million by the state. This is a drop in 10 years of approximately 15%. We would like to encourage the state to increase their support to help us meet the growing needs and continuing needs. Some of our legislators are helping. This has been an extremely poor year economically but there are reasons to consider a tax increase; we do have a pressing problem on education. You can see the marked decreases in the last three years on the part of the state as opposed to the local effort. The budget you have for your consideration provides no proposed tax increase for the fiscal year 1976. We have worked and reworked on operations and capital expenditures. In an effort to maintain our economic stability we have proposed no tax increase. We are hopeful that by next year we will be out of the slump and better able to meet the needs. What we have done is to use revenue sharing funds and to re-allocate some funds that we have. Basically what we did was to shift 5¢ per \$100 in assessed valuation - the general debt service fund reduced from 56¢ to 51¢ and the general fund levy from 70¢ to 75¢. The rate of taxation is \$2.96 inside city of Chattanooga, \$3.20 inside other municipalities; and \$3.25 for the remainder of the county.

Councilman Fuller noted that the Hamilton County Schools were to be appropriated \$20.8 million although they had asked for \$23.2 million - a difference of \$2.4 million.

Judge Moore stated that the situation on education funds is limited in large measure to the division with the City of Chattanooga. The school fund tax levy is \$1.65. In order to meet their request we would have had to increase 60¢ per hundred. This was not feasible at this time.

Mr. Jim Booth of the Hamilton County Education Association stated that they realize this is a tight year but they wish the Council would consider a compromise between 60 and nothing. The County schools are hurting. We are responsible to our students in our county. Our teachers

have suffered a demoralizing blow. The burden of Hamilton County is great. Education cannot continue on the downgrade in Hamilton County. The buildings are in terrible condition. Salaries will not increase much. With the higher cost of living, teachers will actually make 12.4% less than last year. They hope the Council will consider this and possibly make some arrangement.

Mr. Booth's statement was followed by applause.

Judge Moore told Mr. Booth that they agree there is a serious problem but one of the reasons he read the difference in what the local government is doing and what the state has done is to emphasize that had the state continued at the same level we would be in a position of meeting most of the school needs without having to face the frankly extremely unpopular suggestion of a 60¢ tax increase. It is a calculated thing at this particular point that we have no tax increase. We need to encourage the state to assist us. It will be a problem - how local government will shoulder the gap between present taxes and the school needs.

Dr. Dale Carter of the Hamilton County Schools stated that he would like to bring them up to date on the work they have done on the budget. This figure is \$2.4 million under what they have asked for. In attempting to reduce the budget they removed all additional positions to improve their program, they removed all aids, they reduced salary increase of teachers not just the 12.4% but 8% as well, leaving only a 3.76% increase. By reducing and removing all these the deficit amounts to \$955,000. But this \$20.8 million includes \$1.7 million in the fund balance, and this is not part of the appropriation. This \$1.7 million balance will not be in next year's budget. This leaves nothing for improvement of buildings and the teachers will have to go with practically no salary increase. Dr. Carter told Judge Moore he appreciated the comments Judge Moore made with respect to the limited state involvement. The educational staff will work to get more state support. They will assist in every way they can. The local effort in this city for education is not up to the

standards across the country. The tax rate in Hamilton County for the support of education is still not at the point it is in most areas across the nation. How willing are we to support education in Hamilton County? Since the county is still in the position of subsidizing education in Hamilton County, they need to replace the money education has lost by some compromise increase. (Applause)

Vic Graymount spoke to the Council. He said he was a former newscaster for Channel 12 and is trying to become a teacher but he was speaking today as a private individual and taxpayer. He has three children ages 7, 5, and 2. Speaking for himself he would be more than happy, ready, willing and able to increase his share of taxes in the county--that that might sound like heresy--if the Council will take into consideration to at least continue some of the services that have been provided. He mentioned specifically the state supported kindergartens and speech therapy. He is worried about what will happen about transportation. This issue is still very much up in the air. Suppose his children who should go to Patton have to be bused to East Ridge. Is there money to take care of this?


I submit herewith the proposed Budget for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 1975.

You will note the tax rate is changed by .05¢ per \$100.00 of assessed valuation by reducing the General Debt Service Fund levy from 56¢ per \$100.00 of assessed valuation to .51¢, and increasing the County General Fund levy from .70¢ to .75¢ per \$100.00 of assessed valuation.

The total County levy on property inside the City of Chattanooga amounts to \$2.96 per \$100.00 assessed valuation. The levy for municipalities other than the City of Chattanooga will be \$3.20, and on property outside all municipalities the levy is \$3.25 per \$100.00 assessed valuation.
